## Altus begins first volleyball season with low expectations

As Altus High School opens its first-ever girls' volleyball season, Head Coach Maggie Sasse says she doesn't expect the team to win the state tournament in its first season, but she has some talented players who will probably win more games than expected.

Sasse has spent the first few weeks of practice, which began July 15, teaching the basic skills of serving, digging, setting and receiving the volleyball. At the same time, she has to teach them about rotation and how the high school game differs from physical education classes' volleyball.

With cross country and fast-pitch softball the only other girls' sports to compete

with in the fall, she had close to 100 girls sign up for the team. Now the team is down to about 93 players, but the new program will field three teams, varsity, junior varsity and ninth-grade teams. And she said some players haven't even practiced yet because of family vacations, summer camps and jobs.

By the time you read this,

the team will have opened with a scrimmage match at Clinton on Aug. 6. And they scrimmage Elgin tomorrow. And it's first game begins the regular season at home against Vernon Northside on Monday, Aug. 12.

The team schedule is still in a bit of flux because the announcement of having the volleyball program didn't come until late in the spring when most teams had already filled their schedules. Still, the teams are entered in three tournaments and 10 matches including three at home. Besides the opening day at home, the other home matches are against Tipton on Sept. 16 and against Lawton Christian on Sept. 30. "We have a very young

and sophomores," Sasse said. "That allows us to build the program from the ground up."

Even with saying that, she has a few juniors and seniors with talent she hopes to fully develop.

She pointed to Lexie Kelley, a junior, who has already developed into a strong outside hitter. She said she has a lot of natural talent and, at 5'10", stands as one of her tallest players.

Sase also highlighted senior Rebekka Stottman, an outside hitter; Kaileigh Weaver, a junior defensive specialist; freshman setter Taylor Johnson; senior middle back Faith Biddlecom; sophomore right outside hitter Hannah Pederson; freshman setter Kady Bowen and sophomore middle front blocker and hitter Addison Stulz. Most of the players have

never played on a high school volleyball team, as she said, but some who came here through Altus Air Force Base, have played in junior high.

Assisting Head Coach Sasse will be assistants Kelly Cox, Robert Garrison and Paul Loe. Cox will serve as assistant head coach and head junior varsity coach. He retired from teaching and coaching in Missouri last year and moved back to Altus where he once taught and coached. He has experience coaching volleyball.

Garrison will serve as an assistant coach and head ninth grade coach.

He has experience playing recreational team volleyball. Sasse said late summer

practices were beginning at 9 a.m. and most girls arrived by 8:30 a.m. to practice some of the skills they have been learning.

And while she said practices are focusing on the fundamentals of serving and hitting the ball correctly, she's been impressed with how quickly they're catching on. 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# **Boys cross country** team loaded while girls rebuild

The Altus High School

Bulldogs' boys' cross country team should be loaded this year with its only state qualifier, Calvin Wagoner, leading the team.

Wagoner gained confidence last year after qualifying for state. He finished 46th with a time of 18.14 his best time of the year. But he's coming back after being on the sixth place 4X800-meter relay team and placing 11th in the open 800-meter run where he ran 2:05 in the state track meeting in Moore in May

Wagoner and his coach Rick Patterson know that cross country state championships are won in the summer by athletes who use the summer to build mileage to go into the season ahead of runners who start during team practices. Wagoner said he's been running once or twice a day during the summer and building to about 50 miles a week.

Using that same philosophy of training, junior Michael James, a number three cross country runner in 2018, used the cross country season to build a base for winning a state championship in track in the open 400-meters in 48.99 during his sophomore year. James was also on the 4X800 meter relay that finished sixth and the 4X400 relay that finished third in state.

Patterson also has back Justin Ortiz, a sophomore who won the Altus High School track meet as a freshman last year in the 3.200-meter run and was on the 4X800-meter relay at state. Other returning starters include seniors Macel Canterbury, Jonathon Wathen and Rafael Ramos. Two new runners came

in from Ohio including Taeve Elliot, 11th grade and his brother Tuck Elliot, ninth grade. Patterson said Taeve Elliot ran track last year but is in his first year of cross country. He's been keeping up with Wagoner in the early going of practices this year and shows promise.

Other incoming freshmen Nic Borghini and Carson Brooks-Petty are looking good early in the practice sessions. Practice

began on July 15. One notable runner, Moses McCaskill is sitting out cross country this year and is reportedly working in the conditioning program. McCaskill placed fourth in the 200-meter dash at state last year and was on the relay teams that placed third in the 4X100-meter, 4X200-meter and 4X400-meter relays at state.

And while the boys' team appears loaded this year, the girls' team only returns one starter, Bethany Garrison, who was the number one runner for some meets for the Lady Bulldogs last year. She was a key runner that led the girls' 4X400-meter relay to a state title last year. and even hurdle races in track, was also on the third-place 4X800-meter relay team that finished third at the state track meet.

Beckner qualified for state as a freshman but was involved in a car accident that required her to sit out an entire track season her sophomore year. But, she qualified for the state track meet and placed 10th in the 3,200-meter run last spring with a time of 13:15.

Still, Patterson, who has built solid teams from the ground up before, has a dozen or more runner including Allison Cope, a senior who ran track for the first time last spring, and Kylie Allemeier, a junior. Olivia James, Michael James' older sister, is a senior who is also on the team.

Patterson will know more about his team after the first meet at Duncan High School on Saturday, Aug. 31.

## Experience is key for Lady Bulldogs' softball

There is both uncertainty and a certain amount of confidence for coach Ricky Bull as he and the Lady Bulldogs prepare to enter the 2019 softball season.

On the one hand, Bull will be without star pitcher, hitter and softball extraordinaire Kaylen Carroll. On the other, Bull returns eight starters, five of which have been threeyear starters for the Lady Bulldogs.

Returning that many players puts the Lady Bulldogs in a good position, and Bull said one thing is certain, "we won't be able to use lack of experience as an excuse for

anything." Bull is hoping that experience will generate wins for a team he said is solid in nearly every position.

At the pitcher position, Bull expects Brooke Hill and Whitley Townsend to pitch most of the innings for the team, but he said two freshmen pitchers might compete for time in the circle.

"Jayce Foster and Chloe Hill," Bull said, "have really impressed me. We still don't have that type of pitcher who can go out and strike out a bunch of people, but having said that, this is far and away more pitching depth than we've had in the years I've been here. So, that's a good thing.'

That pitching depth will

help alleviate fatigue and give Bull options.

Should the pitching present a problem, Bull said he's confident in the team's defense to keep opponents in check, especially in the outfield.

Alana Lopez is a threeyear starter in left field, and Annie Petzold is a three-year starter in center field. Lakysia Johnson will start in right field.

Bull said his confidence in his three outfielders is unwavering.

"All three can run really well," Bull said, "and I feel confident if they get to a ball that's in the air, they're going to catch it. If there are balls hit to the fence, they've got the speed to get to them and make a play. That's a big

asset in softball, especially when you don't have that power pitcher that can limit the number of balls going to the outfield."

Not every hit is going to

travel to the outfield, and for the ones that don't, the Lady Bulldogs have playmakers on the infield, as well.



middle and make a play at first which Bull said is essential in softball and baseball at any level.

As for hitting, Carroll was a player whose production cannot be replaced. Bull said she did it all for the team, leading the Lady Bulldogs in home runs, RBIs and batting average. But, Bull said there are a few players he is looking for to step in as Altus' power hitters.

"Brooke, Jerzey [Ybarra] and Star [Sims]," Bull said, "all have power. They're the ones capable of hitting the long ball. Most of the girls are good contact hitters, and several have good speed. For use, just hitting the ball hard and making sure we get it in play, we have a pretty good chance of getting on base.'

Bull said several of the team's returning players hit between .300 and .400 last year, and he expects them to do as well as or better than last season.

Emily Hughes is just one of the players he has high expectations for this season.



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# Beach to take over the reins for the Bulldogs

The Altus Bulldog football team will look a little different this upcoming season.

The program graduated a large senior class, including playmakers like Kobi Gomez, Izaiah Hall, Garrett Pride, Scotty Brown and Daniel Riley. That's left the Bulldogs breaking in a new starting quarterback.

But Derek Beach is no stranger to the system.

The team's new signal-caller has plenty of experience to pull from after backing up Gomez last season. He saw action in several games last year as the team built insurmountable leads against Elk City, Southeast, El Reno and Bishop McGuinness. In those games, Beach ran the ball a total of 10 times for 31 yards.

Still, practice is one thing, competing in front of large crowds both at home and on the road is an entirely different beast, especially without a few of the players who made Altus so exciting last season.

Coach Matt Terry said he expects little, if any, fall off from when Gomez ran the offense in 2018.

"Obviously," Terry said, "we're a run-heavy team, so our fullbacks are going to have to get us some yardage. The biggest thing on offense is our depth because we're pretty shallow in some positions. We're going to have to figure out a way to get certain people the ball in certain situations. But overall, we get about nine guys who have playing experience, so we should be able to keep doing what we've been doing."

The Bulldogs will also rely on many different running backs while waiting for a true leader to

emerge, but that's an area where the Bulldogs are stacked.

The team loses leading rushers Hall and Gomez, as well as the consistent Riley and Nehemiah McCaskill, but the Bulldogs' third-leading rusher in 2018 returns for one final season.

Cabe Dickerson ran the ball 71 times for 458 yards last season. Behind him was Laethon Patterson who rushed for 288 yards on 32 carries.

Both backs are of the bruising variety, preferring to lower their shoulders and run over defenders rather than around. Additionally, the Bulldogs re-

turn Mysean Wells and Chehemu Morgan. Wells ran the ball 23 times for 231 yards after returning to the field midway through the season. Morgan ran the ball six times for 101 yards.

And of course, there's D'Marco De La Paz who was called on often over a three-game stretch before taking a step back. Over those three games, De La Paz ran the ball 26 times for 193 yards.

Luckily for any ball carrier for the Bulldogs, there's plenty of experience to run behind. "On our offensive line," Terry said, "including the tight end, we got five out six starters back with the sixth guy playing two or three games for us last year. We're going to hang our hats on the guys upfront."

A strong, unified front is what the Bulldogs need to keep their offense on the field, and by all appearances, that's precisely what Altus has as the team gets prepared for the upcoming season. The only real question mark is on the defensive side of the ball.

"We lost," Terry said, "a bunch of our leading tacklers. We get Cabe back, and he's going to play middle linebacker for us instead of the defensive line. We get Hunter Webb back at defensive end. We'll have some guys at defensive tackle that played for us last year, but they weren't starters. Mysean and Derek will be back in the secondary, but we'll also break in two new guys."

Defense has always been one of the areas in which the Bulldogs excelled the most. Terry said he's hoping nothing changes, but there are a few concerns tasking players who have limited in-game reps with stopping such juggernauts as Ardmore and Lawton MacArthur.

"The guys we're going to put out there," Terry said, "they are high motor guys. They're fast, and we're going to put them in positions where they're going to be successful rather than throw them out into the fire."

While Terry expects the team to go out and perform, he was quick to admit that the team will rely on the offense to put points on the board early in the season.

Terry said he hopes the team will be at full strength by week five, which is when the Bulldogs welcome in the always tough Ardmore Tigers.



The last time the Duke Tigers baseball team took the field, it was April 26 at the Oklahoma Secondary School Activities Association's Class B Regional baseball tournament.

Calumet had handed Duke a 13-8 loss in the first round of the tournament, but the Tigers bounced back with a 6-5 win over Sentinel. That win put the Tigers in another head-to-head matchup with Calumet, and unfortunately, Duke fell 8-4 to end its season.

Brooks was the team's leading pitcher in the spring. He pitched 39 innings and struck

There will be two noticeable absences when the Navajo Indians take the baseball field this fall — Dallas Cox and Holdyn Mandrell. Other than that, the roster remains largely unchanged.

That's a good thing for the Indians, but a bad thing for the rest of the fall baseball teams in Oklahoma.

The Indians return their core group of players. Cox was a significant arm in the rotation, but there are plenty of other options for head coach Weston Winters and assistant Kale Thompson, which will make pitching Navajo's greatest strength.

A lot of games are won or lost on the mound, and there might not be another school in Class A baseball that can field the amount of talent the Indians do

## each year.

Navajo returns Mitchell Smith, Jaden Lingle and Airen Josefy at the pitching position, but they are far from being the only arms on the roster. Winters said Lingle spent

most of the spring baseball season injured, which affected how well the Indians competed down the stretch. Before he went down, Lingle pitched 19.1 innings and posted the third-lowest ERA (3.25) on the team amongst pitchers who threw more than 10 innings. The firstand second-lowest belonged to Smith and Josefy, respectively.

The Indians also have a solid pitcher in Kaleb Covey who threw 14.2 innings and posted a 4.73 ERA. And there is Jacob Tison, who was also injured, Jackson Gilbert and Caden Konen. Each put in time on the mound for the Indians in the spring. Considering the strength of the team's pitching, Winters said, "we can win every game, as long as we're scoring five runs a game." But winning every game is an improbable, if not impossible, feat, and Winters knows the team will still have to put forth a solid effort on the field to win.

A big reason for that is the difficulty of playing fall baseball.

While nearly every school in Oklahoma fields a baseball team in the spring, only schools with few other options play baseball in the fall. This means smaller schools like Navajo have to play in one of two classes. Some games are against similarly sized schools, and others are against Class 2A, 3A and 4A schools.

It's a loaded field with plenty of teams vying for a spot in the playoffs. The Indians can use their pitching to stay ahead, but
