### Man who killed woman Saturday dies from self-inflicted gunshot

STAFF REPORT

The man who shot and killed his girlfriend Saturday afternoon on Young Street in Cartersville died in an Atlanta hospital Monday morning due to injuries sustained from a self-inflicted gunshot, according to a Bartow County Sheriff's Office press

According to the release, Stanley Burton Smith, 61, of Cartersville, shot and killed his 62-year-old Young Street prior to the incident.

## Hundreds turn out for 'miraculous' Bible

### Dalton-based Flowing Oil ministry draws a big house at Cartersville stop

Parking was at a premium at the Freedom Worship Center Sunday afternoon — and so were seats inside the church at 1941 Cassville Road Northwest in Cartersville.


"We've got 300 chairs in there and we've got more than 300 people in there," said Pastor Ronnie Richardson. "We've seen a ot of people are seeking God right now.

Indeed, some guests had to watch the worship service from the church's Freedom Hall annex, where it was livestreamed through social media.

And as to what drew the capacity crowd? A single Bible held in a plastic container ... albeit, one that some people claim is imbued with miraculous powers.

Representatives of Whitfield Countybased His Name Is Flowing Oil — more commonly referenced as the Flowing Oil ministry - dropped by Bartow County over the weekend to showcase their worldfamous "bleeding" Bible.

"They came out of Dalton about a year and a half ago," Richardson recounted the ministry's origins. An air of melancholy hung over the Kingston City Council Monday. Harold Posey's seat was empty, his place on the rostrum marked by a wreath and a memo-

"Everyone here knows we lost a great friend last week," Kingston mayor Chuck Wise said as he struggled to find the right words. "He is going to be truly missed. When you are as dedicated as Mr. Posey was, well I just want to pay respect to him."

Posey, 80, was in his second term on the city council when he died suddenly.

"Although we will miss him terribly," Wise said, "the city's busi-

ness continues and we must continue too. I had hoped to be able to just appoint someone to fill the unexpired term, but Elections Supervisor Joseph Kirk tells me we must have a special election."

With that, Wise announced a special election would be held Nov. 6, the same day as the state elec-

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## Recording: GOP governor's race about who can be 'craziest'

ATLANTA — Another secret recording is shaking up Georgia's Republican primary runoff in the governor's race.

Lt. Gov. Casey Cagle's campaign was already rocked last month by the release of a secretly recorded conversation in which Cagle said he backed what he called "bad public policy" for political gain. Cagle's runoff opponent, Secretary of State Brian Kemp, released another snippet of that conversation Monday.

In this 50-second piece, Cagle can be heard candidly discussing the GOP primary's sharp turn to the right, saying the five-man race came down to "who had the biggest gun, who had the biggest truck and who could be the crazi-Kemp said in a statement to the

"The issues you talk about are the issues I care about as well. The problem is in a primary and you and I are just talking off the record frank - they don't give a [expletive] about those things, OK. In the general election, they care about it, OK. But they don't care about it in a primary." Cagle says in the newly released snippet.

At the time of the conversation, Cagle was seeking Tippins' endorsement. Tippins has yet to formally endorse either runoff candidate.

Asked by The Associated Press whether the Kemp campaign has still more snippets it's holding onto, Kemp spokesman, Ryan Mahoney, said: "We will continue to create a clear contrast between Kemp and Cagle in the weeks leading up to Election Day on July 24th.

In an article by ESPN.com's Myron Medcalf, R.A.W. Athletics coach Howard Martin said, "At the end of the game, one of my players was complaining about a call. He made a comment to the referee. The ref didn't like it. So the other team inbounded the ball, walked it up, the ref said to my player, 'Say it again.' Then he T'd him up and kicked him out of the game. And he walked behind him, still having words.

"Then the ref pushed my player, and they squared up right by my bench. When they squared up, another one of my players jumped off the bench and took [the ref] down. We separated

Raptors coach Bobby Benjamin rejected the notion that the officials instigated the ordeal, according to Medcalf.

"The referee definitely didn't attack the kids," Benjamin was quoted as saying. "Absolutely not. Once things got going, and he was attacked ... he got assaulted. They were too outnumbered to even try to defend themselves."

Medcalf also spoke with tournament director Josh Miley, who said the referees were supplied by LakePoint.

In a news release, LakePoint condemned the actions, while pointing out that the event was not affiliated with the sporting

"We were very disappointed about the incident that occurred Sunday at the end of a basketball game organized by a third party tournament operator," the release said in part. "This behavior is not tolerated at LakePoint. The Emerson Police Department is investigating the incident and we are cooperating with them. We will continue to work closely with our tournament operators to ensure that good sportsmanship is expected and any inappropriate behavior is sanctioned. The safety and security of our athletes, families and staff is paramount."

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

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
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## Off to Europe: Trump to meet worried NATO heads, then Putin

WASHINGTON — With the established global order on shaky footing, President Donald Trump's weeklong trip to Europe will test already strained bonds with some of the United States' closest allies, then put him face to face with the leader of the country whose electoral interference was meant to help put him in office.

Trump departs today on a fournation tour amid simmering disputes over trade and military spending with fellow Western democracies and speculation about whether he will rebuke or embrace Russian President Vladimir Putin. He meets the Russian leader in Helsinki as the finale of a trip with earlier stops in Belgium, England and Scot-

Trump has shown little regard for America's traditional bonds with the Old World, publicly upbraiding world leaders at NATO's new headquarters a year ago for not spending enough on defense and delivering searing indictments of Western trading partners last month at an international summit in Canada. On this trip, after meeting with NATO leaders in Brussels, he'll travel to the United Kingdom, where widespread protests are expected, before he heads to one of his Scottish golf resorts for the weekend.

In the run-up to his trip, the president did little to ease European concerns by delivering fresh broadsides against NATO, an intergovernmental military alliance of 29 North American and European countries aimed at countering possible Russian aggression.

"I'll tell NATO: 'You've got to start paying your bills," Trump

## Trump picks Kavanaugh for **Supreme Court**

WASHINGTON — After days of frenzied lobbying and speculation, President Donald Trump decided on federal appeals Judge Brett Kavanaugh for his second nominee to the Supreme Court, setting up a ferocious confirmation battle with Democrats as he seeks to shift the nation's highest court further to the right.

Trump chose Kavanaugh to replace retiring Justice Anthony Kennedy.

With customary fanfare, Trump planned to unveil his choice on prime-time TV. His final options were all young federal judges who could help remake the court for decades to come with precedentshattering rulings on issues such as abortion, guns and health care.

Top contenders had included federal appeals judges Raymond Kethledge, Amy Coney Barrett and Thomas Hardiman, as well as Kavanaugh, who is currently a federal appellate judge in the District of Columbia.

Relishing the guessing game beyond the White House gates, Trump had little to say about his choice before the announcement. Some conservatives have expressed concerns about Kavanaugh

 a longtime judge and a former clerk for Kennedy — questioning his commitment to social issues like abortion and noting his time serving under President George W. Bush as evidence he is a more establishment choice. But his supporters have cited his experience and wide range of legal opinions.

Ahead of his announcement, Trump tweeted about the stakes: "I have long heard that the most important decision a U.S. President can make is the selection of a Supreme Court Justice — Will be announced tonight at 9:00 P.M."

With Democrats determined to vigorously oppose Trump's choice, the Senate confirmation battle is expected to dominate the months leading up to November's midterm elections. Senate Republicans hold only a 51-49 majority, leaving them hardly any margin if Democrats hold the line. Democratic senators running for re-election in states Trump carried in 2016 will face pressure to back his nomi-

Republican Sen. John Kennedy of Louisiana said he was bracing for a tough confirmation battle as Democrats focus on abortion. Kennedy, a member of the Judiciary Committee, which will get the first chance to question the nominee, predicted a "rough, tough, down in the dirt, ear-pulling, nose-biting fight."

Trump's success in confirming conservative judges, as well as a Supreme Court justice, has cheered Republicans amid concerns about his limited policy achievements and chaotic management style. Of the court's liberal justices, Ruth Bader Ginsburg is 85 and Stephen Breyer turns 80 next month, so Trump may well get another opportunity to cement conservative dominance of the court for years to

Repeating the program each year is beneficial because it allows the band boosters to "maintain predictable, renewable revenue" from year to year, she said.

And since the goal is to seek sponsorships instead of advertising, the boosters hope the businesses will appreciate the value of the band program to the community and will want to renew their support every year, she added.

Tax-deductible sponsorships, which are due by Oct. 31, are \$310 for color and \$250 for black and white for a full page, \$200 for color and \$150 for black and white for a half page, \$140 for color and \$100 for black and white for a one-third page and a minimum of \$50 for a directory listing. Platinum sponsorship status is an additional \$250, and gold status is an extra \$100.

Rockathon sponsors also have the opportunity to go above and beyond in their support of the band by becoming a Woodland Band Fan, which means they make an additional donation to a specific student to help him or her raise the \$2,000 needed for the once-in-a-lifetime trip to New York City in November to march in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.







WASHINGTON — From the safety of a resilient U.S. economy, President Donald Trump lit the fuse Friday on a high-risk trade war with China.

History suggests that a cycle of tariffs and retaliations can eventually choke economic growth. But for now, employers, investors and U.S. consumers are weighing the perils of a prolonged rift between the world's two largest economies against a far more positive backdrop: America's healthiest job market in years.

Evidently confident despite the risks ahead, U.S. employers have added jobs this year at a robust monthly average of 214,500. Many businesses say they've year. reached the point where they can't

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## Four more boys rescued from flooded Thai cave



MAE SAI, Thailand - The generals and other officials overseeing the desperate operation to rescue 12 young soccer players and their coach from a flooded cave labyrinth in Thailand's sweltering far north were only half joking when they quipped Monday that success was in the hands of the rain god Phra Pirun.

They were celebrating a second day of stunning triumph after divers guided four more boys Monday through tight passages and dank flooded caverns to safety. "Two days, eight Boars," read a Facebook post by the Thai Navy SEALS of the dramatic rescue that began Sunday, more than two weeks after the members of the Wild Boars soccer team were trapped. Another five still await rescue, including the team's 25vear-old coach.

The eight rescued boys were recuperating in a hospital from their ordeal, huddled together on a tiny patch of higher ground where they had sought refuge after a rainstorm flooded the massive Tham Luan Nang Non cave complex as they were exploring it after soccer practice on June 23. Their families were being kept at a distance because of fears of infection and the emaciated-looking boys were eating a rice-based porridge because they were still too weak to take regular food, au-





"It's something that I didn't know it would ever be quite possible," Moreland said. "I'm definitely excited about the opportunity and appreciative of having that opportunity."

Trout is working on perhaps the best season of his stellar career with the Los Angeles Angels. Judge has 25 homers and 58 RBIs for the Yankees, and Betts is batting .342 with 22



BMC beat Froome's Team Sky by four seconds on Monday to win a team time trial in Stage 3, with Belgian rider Greg Van Avermaet taking the yellow jersey.

'We have the yellow jersey, we won a stage with the team ... and Richie can finish it off with a nice podium spot in Paris," Van Avermaet said. "Everyone is working well together and we have a strong team and Richie can be up there."

Riding at an average speed of 54.9 kph (34 mph), BMC clocked 38 minutes, 46 seconds over the 35.5-kilometer (22-mile) route that began and ended in Cholet near the Atlantic coast.

Sky finished second and Quick-Step Floors came third, seven seconds behind. World champion Sunweb featuring Tom Dumoulin finished fifth, 11 seconds back.

Overnight leader Peter Sagan was dropped by his Bora Hansgrohe teammates and fell to 80th overall, three minutes be-

Van Avermaet, who excels at single-day classics, isn't a threat for the overall title but he could keep the lead through the cobblestoned Stage 9 ending in Roubaix.

Froome was left 55 seconds behind in the overall standings with another week of nervy rolling stages before hitting the Alps.

Froome said
