



## Prosecutor: Paramedic had 'hundreds' of child porn pictures

Cherokee Judicial Circuit Judge Jeffrey A. Watkins denied a motion to set bond for a 40-year-old Cartersville man facing at least 10 felony charges — including four counts of child molestation — in Bartow Superior Court Tuesday morning. Bryan David Somers was arrested July 19. In addition to the child molestation accusations, the

defendant was also charged with two counts of enticing a child for indecent purposes, three counts of distributing child pornography and one count of possessing child pornography, according to a Bartow County Sheriff's Office press release.

Somers previously worked as a full-time paramedic for MetroAtlanta Ambulance Service. He also served as a part-time substitute teacher for Bartow County Schools, primarily work-

ing at Emerson Elementary. He has since been fired by both employers.

Defense attorney Minerva Blanchette said the defendant has lived in Bartow County for the last nine years. She said Somers' two step-children are the alleged molestation victims in the case.

She said Somers has no previous arrests or convictions. If released from pretrial detention, Blanchette said the defendant would reside at his parents'

home in Dawson County; she said Somers would return to his residence in Cartersville after his wife and her children move out.

"He does have work potential in other areas that don't involve any type of children," she said. "He does have several years of experience doing bodywork as well as construction work, and he has a friend that actually owns a bodyshop ... so he would be gainfully employed and continuing to contribute to the com-

munity." Blanchette said the defendant was cooperative with authorities, stating he is not a "flight risk." At the request of Somers' parents, she asked Judge Watkins to set the defendant's bond "at no greater than \$50,000."

Cherokee Judicial Circuit Assistant District Attorney Austin Waldo said the State was opposed to setting bond.

## CCS educators learn about Capturing Kids' Hearts

With the start of a new school year only a week away, teachers are busy cramming in all kinds of training sessions before welcoming students back to their classrooms.

On Monday and Tuesday, 50 educators from Cartersville City Schools participated in Capturing Kids' Hearts, a relationship-based training program, at Cartersville Middle School.

According to a news release, the program gives educators and support staff a framework to help them develop healthy relationships and to learn effective skills that will allow them to:

- develop self-managing classrooms and decrease discipline issues through innovative techniques like a social contract.
- decrease delinquent behaviors such as disruptive outbursts, violent acts and drug use.
- reinforce the role of emotional intelligence in teaching.
- build classroom rapport and teamwork to create a safe, trusting learning environment.
- develop students' empathy for diverse cultures and backgrounds.
- increase classroom attendance by building students' motivation and helping them take responsibility for their actions and performance.

"Capturing Kids' Hearts is an approach to building healthy relationships that can be used in any setting," Superintendent Dr. Marc Feuerbach said. "It enhances our skills in communicating and engaging others. We all want to empower our students. We want to see them succeed in the classroom and in life. However, the only effective way to reach the heart of a child is to show them we care and to build a healthy connection. While most educators do this naturally, we wanted to give our staff members a framework on which to continue building their rapport with students."

The school system, which now has 150 trained teachers, first introduced CKH at the

## CHS graduate nominated for her role in 'The Wake of Light'

Referring to the film as "not your typical romantic drama," Rome Brooks is honored to be recognized by the Cobb International Film Festival for her work in "The Wake of Light." The former Cartersville resident is nominated for her portrayal of Mary in the Lead in a Feature Film category.

"I didn't know what to expect until I read the script, and it was one of the most beautiful scripts I've ever read," Brooks said. "There's poetry infused into every line and to be able to capture that on film was something I knew I had to do. Most scripts and characters are one-dimensional and Mary, this character, had a great deal of depth to her. I was a little intimidated but trusted [the film's writer, director and producer] Renji Philip implicitly so that made shooting the film a thrill ride.

"... I was so surprised and truly grateful," she said about the award nomination. "It means more than I can express.

Everyone that was involved with the film — the other actors, director, cinematographer — created a special world for me that allowed the performance to be what it was. To be recognized in your home state is an incredibly special thing."

For Brooks, "The Wake of Light" film "touches on a spiritual and emotional level."

"The character of Mary is a very loving girl that cares for her aging father and their broken-down farm," she said. "She grew up in a small town and never left. When she meets this charismatic young man that's traveling through town on a cross-country road trip, it's almost like he fell to earth from another planet. He's been everywhere, seen everything and knows the most incredible facts about everything. It's the opposite of who Mary is.

"The challenge of Mary was tapping into the mindset of someone that never left where she was born. Although I absolutely love Cartersville, I was ready to see what was over the next hill when it was time for college. I was hungry to see

what living in a big city would be like. The biggest joy of portraying this character is seeing where she ends up. I don't want to give away too much but it makes me smile every time."

Currently residing in California, Brooks was raised in Cartersville, graduating from Cartersville High School in 1998. She shared she was introduced to acting through friends after moving to Los Angeles in 2005.

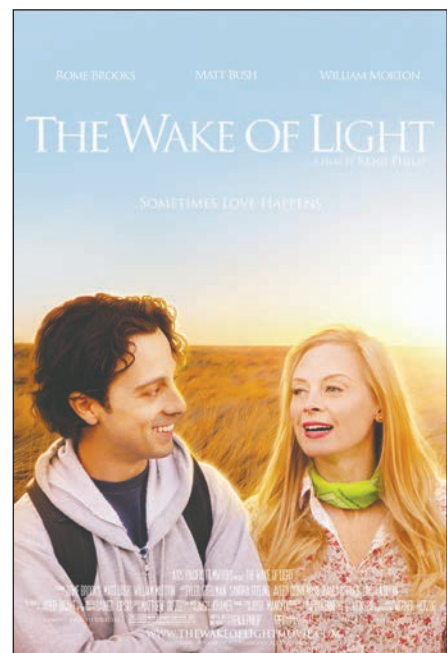
"I then got involved with different acting classes, went on auditions, landed roles in some short films at first and it all grew from that point," Brooks said. "In 2006, I was in a short film that turned out to be the last film James Garner filmed before he passed away in 2014. In [2012], I was in another feature film called 'Cheesecake Casserole' and had the best time filming it with Brit Morgan from 'True Blood,' Torrey DeVitto — 'Chicago Med' and 'Pretty Little Liars' — and Paige Howard, Ron Howard's daughter. I have a couple of future projects in the mix, but 'The Wake of Light' is keeping me busy for the cur-

rent time. "Cartersville was a very special place to grow up. It is a unique small town that fosters the arts, which I feel is so very important and is not always the case in some towns. When filming 'The Wake of Light,' I took my experience growing up here and used every bit I could to give the character as much emotional depth as I could."

Along with Brooks' nomination, "The Wake of Light" also is up for six additional awards in the Cobb International Film Festival: Best Domestic Feature Film, Director in a Feature Film, Writing in a Feature Film, Best Supporting in a Feature Film, Cinematography in a Feature Film and Best Local Film.

"I'm incredibly pleased with the response to the film so far," Philip said. "We've been fortunate enough to have been official selections at over 15 festivals so far and have won eight awards, including best picture, best director, outstanding screenplay and three best

## 2 dead, 2 wounded at a Walmart

SOUTHAVEN, Miss. — A gunman described as a disgruntled former Walmart employee fatally shot two ex-co-workers and wounded a police officer before he was shot and arrested Tuesday at a Walmart store in northern Mississippi, authorities said.

DeSoto County District Attorney John Champion said 39-year-old Martez Terrell Abram shot a Southaven police officer, who was protected by a bulletproof vest and suffered minor injuries. Southaven Police Chief Macon Moore said a second Southaven officer shot Abram, who underwent surgery at a hospital in neighboring Memphis, Tennessee.

Both the people killed were Walmart employees, Moore said. Employees told The Associated Press that the first was shot in the parking lot, and the second was shot inside the store.

Southaven Mayor Darren Musselwhite described the suspect as a disgruntled worker with a grievance against his employer. Abram, a Southaven resident, had been fired from the store in recent days after he showed a knife to a co-worker. A police report had been filed, but Champion said Abram didn't appear to have threatened the co-worker and criminal charges

were not being pursued. "It wasn't an accident," said Travis Jones, an overnight stocker who was working when he heard shots. "He knew what he was doing when he came in there."

Jones said he saw the body of store manager Anthony Brown on the floor as they ran out of the store. "It was an ugly scene," he said. DeSoto County Coroner Joshua Pounders said the 40-year-old Brown, an Olive Branch resident, appears to have died from a gunshot wound.

Nicholas Gales said the other slain worker was his brother, 38-year-old Brandon Gales of Hernando. Jones called Brandon Gales his best friend and an "all-around good guy," saying he was the father of multiple children.

The shooting at about 6:30 a.m. brought a massive police response to the shopping complex, at a busy exit off Interstate 55 in Southaven, a suburb of 55,000 people.

"Our police really showed their guts today," Musselwhite said, noting Southaven officers recently undertook active shooter training. "If it hadn't been for their efforts there would have been more lives lost."

Carlos Odom, 35, had just made his usual visit to his cousin, who works at the Walmart on Tuesday, and said he was leaving when he heard more than a dozen shots.

"I just hear gunshots," Odom

said. "Pow. Pow. Pow. Pow. Pow."

"When the cops run into the Walmart, you hear more gunshots," Odom said. "After that, it stopped." Phil Cox, 70, said he had just bought some nasal spray and was in the parking lot when he thought he heard a gunshot, and then saw a man who may have been the shooter run into the store. He got into his truck to leave as police began arriving.

"Everything went crazy at that point," Cox said, expressing sympathy for employees. "It's just hard to believe what happened here, but it seems like it's happening everywhere."

Officers kept working to clear the store hours after the shooting, Moore said, in part because they found a suspicious package and called a bomb squad. Champion said police had recovered multiple weapons and a vehicle and searched Abram's apartment. He said Abram had purchased guns legally, although he didn't describe them, and said Abram had no prior criminal record. He said investigators were also reviewing video recordings.

Investigators also believe Abram set a fire in the store. Champion said charges could be upgraded or more charges added after the investigation concludes.

"I feel extremely confident we'll have a very prosecutable case,"

Champion said.

The Mississippi Bureau of Investigation will handle the inquiry into the officer's shooting of the suspect.

Moore said about 60 employees were working at the time. They were taken to the parking lot of an adjoining Chili's restaurant and interviewed by officers, remaining there for hours. Some embraced, while one was placed in an ambulance. Others gathered in a circle to pray. Finally, authorities brought employees back into the store after noon, spoke to them and released them to go home. The store remained closed, even as businesses operated as usual elsewhere on the high-traffic suburban strip.

"The entire Walmart family is heartbroken by the loss of two valued members of our team," Walmart U.S. President and CEO Greg Foran said in a statement Tuesday afternoon. "We feel tragedies like this personally, and our hearts go out to the families of our two associates and the officer who was injured."

The company is relieved the suspect was apprehended, and appreciates the quick response by authorities and its employees, Foran said.

"We'll continue to focus on assisting law enforcement in their investigation and on supporting our associates," he added.

## Trump says blacks like his remarks about Baltimore

President Donald Trump is claiming a groundswell of African American support in response to his comments denigrating Democratic Rep. Elijah Cummings and the congressman's majority-black Baltimore district, despite polling showing consistently negative numbers.

Speaking to reporters as he left the White House on Tuesday, Trump claimed the building had been flooded with thousands of letters, emails and phone calls after his criticism of Baltimore thanking him for "getting involved" and exposing corruption.

"They really appreciate what I'm doing, and they've let me know it," said the Republican president. The White House did not immediately provide any evidence backing up Trump's claims.

Trump's comments came in response to fierce backlash against his earlier remarks lashing out at Cummings, the chairman of the House Oversight Committee, and calling his district a "disgusting, rat and rodent infested mess." Trump also is under fire for his on-going attacks on four Democratic congresswomen of color, who he tweeted should "go back" to their countries — even though three of the four were born in the United States and all are U.S. citizens.

But Trump on Tuesday nonetheless declared himself "the least racist person" in the world, despite his recent comments and bold tweets. And he said "African American people love the job" he's doing, despite the fact that numerous polls have shown African Americans are overwhelmingly negative in their assessments of his performance.

Approval among black Americans has hovered around 10% over the course of Trump's presidency, according to Gallup polling, with 8% approving in June. And a new Quinnipiac University poll out Tuesday found that 80% of registered African American voters think Trump is racist, versus 11% who think he's not.

Polling also suggests his recent attacks could hurt Trump with suburban voters — and especially women — whom he may need to win next year. Trump in recent days, however, has expressed to advisers on his reelection team that he believes his broadsides against the minority Democrats will help excite his core supporters.

Trump insisted Tuesday that there was "zero strategy" in his attacks and that he was only "pointing out facts," even as he argued they were benefiting him.

"I think I'm helping myself because I'm pointing out the tremendous corruption that's taking place in Baltimore and other Democratic-run cities," Trump said, as he continued to hammer his criticism.

"Those people are living in hell in Baltimore," he said, adding he was open to some kind of unspecified federal involvement.

"If they ask," he said, "We will get involved."

Maryland's two Democratic senators, saying they could not sit by as Trump continued his assault on the city and its representative, delivered back-to-back Senate speeches Tuesday urging the president to do better.

Sen. Chris Van Hollen called Baltimore a "great American city." He said Trump's "poisonous barrage" has only served to rally not just the people of Maryland, but all over America, to support it.

## Stocks end slightly lower amid mixed earnings

A mixed batch of corporate earnings helped drag the major U.S. stock indexes slightly lower Tuesday, pulling the market farther from its recent record highs for the second straight day.

Mixed or disappointing reports from Under Armour, Dish Network, Corning, HCA and Beyond Meat and others weighed on the market. Capital One Financial slumped after the credit card issuer and bank disclosed that roughly 100 million people had some personal information stolen by a hacker.

Apple climbed 3% in after-hours trading after its latest results handily beat analysts'

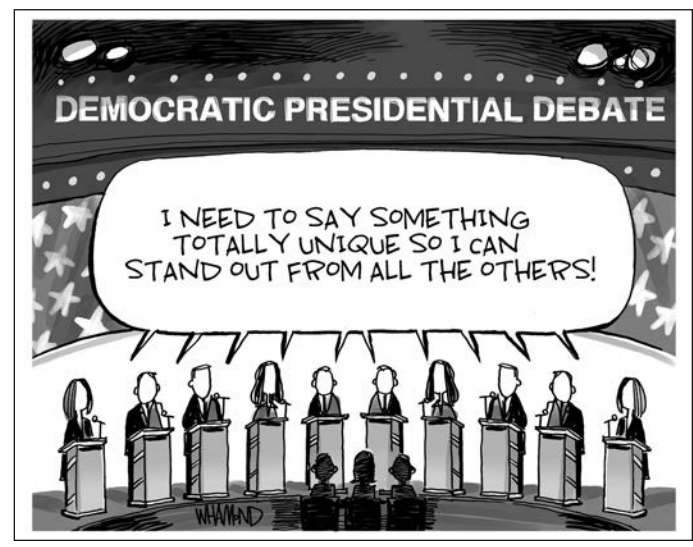
estimates. Homebuilders also bucked the broader decline after D.R. Horton reported strong quarterly results and positive gains in new home orders.

This week's modest market pullback came as investors looked cautiously ahead to a key policy update from the Federal Reserve on Wednesday. That's when the central bank is widely expected to cut its benchmark interest rate for the first time in a decade. The Fed has decided that a rate cut now — and possibly one or more additional cuts to follow — could help inoculate the economy against a potential downturn.

"There's just a lot of confusion on whether is there really going to be a rate cut, which the market seems to think there will be, and then if there's going to be any indication of further rate cuts," said Karyn Cavanaugh, senior markets strategist at Voya Investment Management.

The S&P 500 index fell 7.79 points, or 0.3%, to 3,013.18. Despite its two-day slide, the benchmark index remains within 0.4% of its all-time high set on Friday.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average dropped 23.33 points, or 0.1%, to 27,198.02. The Nasdaq composite slid 19.71 points, or 0.2%, to 8,273.61.

It is generally acknowledged that defense is the most difficult part of the game. The principal reason is that the defenders can't see each other's cards and so are often forced to make blind assumptions during the play.

Today's deal illustrates the type of thinking that goes into good defensive play. West got off to a fine start by leading a heart instead of a diamond, which would have handed declarer the contract.

South won with the king and finessed the queen of spades, which held, and then the ten of spades, which lost. The outcome now hinged

on East's return at trick four.

The bidding and play to this point convinced East that South would collect at least nine tricks — four spades, three hearts and two clubs — as soon as he regained the lead. The only hope of defeating the contract therefore lay in scoring four immediate diamond tricks. This in turn meant finding West with the A-K-x-x or, more realistically, the A-J-x-x. The trouble in the latter case was that if East made the normal return of a low diamond from the Q-9-2, declarer would play low to protect his king, and so make the contract.

For this reason, East chose the diabolically clever return of the diamond queen, hoping South would place him with the jack. If so, declarer would duck the queen, since covering would enable West to win and lead through dummy's ten. If the play worked, another diamond lead by East would then allow West to run three more diamonds for down one.

In practice, however, South elected to cover the queen with the king. After taking the ace, West then did his part by making the equally diabolical return of the diamond four!

This time, declarer went wrong. Afraid that dummy's ten would lose to the jack, he played low from dummy, hoping West held the nine. But when East produced the nine and returned a diamond, West scored two more diamonds to sink the contract.

# Demolition looming for building with country music legacy

**ATLANTA** — Thousands of petitioners are hoping to stop the demolition of a downtown Atlanta building where the first country hit song is believed to have been recorded.  
 Fiddlin' John Carson likely recorded "Little Log Cabin in the Lane" in the building in 1923, The Atlanta Journal-Constitution reported.  
 Last month, a Myrtle Beach-based developer planning to build a 21-story Margaritaville-themed hotel, timeshare rental and restaurant obtained a permit to tear the building

down.  
 The lot where the building now stands would be used for dumpsters and grease traps next to the hotel's first-floor restaurant, according to design plans reviewed by the newspaper.  
 "All the grease off those 'Cheeseburgers in Paradise' would end up where this building now stands," said Atlanta resident and architect Kyle Kessler, who started the petition to save the building. "I'm not a songwriter, but that would be saddest blues or country song you could possibly write."  
 So far, more than 8,000 peo-

ple have signed the online petition.  
 Laurie Gorman, a publicist for Buffett, told The Associated Press on Tuesday that she had no comment.  
 The Strand Capital Group of Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, is managing the development, the Atlanta newspaper reported. J. Patrick Lowe, a senior partner with the firm, told the newspaper in May that he didn't think the Atlanta project could move forward without the piece of land. Strand was the developer of Margaritaville of San Antonio on the city's popular River Walk, its

website shows.  
 In Atlanta, Kessler set up a portable, hand-cranked 1923 Victrola Talking Machine in front of the building last week and played the records that were recorded inside nearly a century ago.  
 Now, Kessler says he may stand between the building and the demolition crew if that helps to stop the building's destruction.  
 On Tuesday afternoon, workers were throwing items from inside the building into a large dumpster in the parking lot across the street from Centennial Olympic Park.

# Georgia, South Carolina commit \$1.29 million more to joint port

**SAVANNAH** — Georgia and South Carolina on Tuesday committed an additional \$1.29 million toward developing a port terminal on the Savannah River that would be joint-

ly operated by the neighboring states.  
 Nearly \$830,000 of the project's fiscal 2020 budget will pay for a year of work on the detailed environmental studies required to earn a permit from the federal government. Other funding will go toward the de-

sign of the actual port terminal in Jasper County, South Carolina. Each state is contributing half of the cost.  
 The budget agreement is "indicative of the states' commitment to the project," said David Posek, a board member of the South Carolina Ports Authority

who serves as chairman of the joint venture.  
 Georgia and South Carolina operate competing seaports, but they have worked together for more than 12 years to develop a terminal for cargo ships on 1,500 acres across the river from Savannah. Both sides

say a jointly owned terminal is their best option for expansion once their rival ports in Savannah and Charleston run out of space.  
 Including the latest budget, the states have spent more than \$19 million on the proposed Jasper Ocean Terminal. But

that's only a fraction of the project's total cost, which consultants have estimated could reach \$5 billion.  
 Developing the terminal's first phase alone is expected to take more than a decade. The first cargo ships aren't expected to arrive until 2035.

 "The situation is still fluid," he said. "There's still a lot of electronic evidence that Homeland Security is going through."  
 Waldo said the case began when an image was detected in Polk County that appeared to

be distributed from an internet protocol (IP) address in Bartow County, which law enforcement officials determined was sent from the defendant's home off Corinth Road.  
 "A multi-agency search warrant was conducted, electronic devices were seized," Waldo said. "The law enforcement agencies involved decided to set up an interview with the chil-

dren to find out if anything had happened."  
 According to Waldo, during those interviews the alleged victims disclosed situations "in which the defendant would essentially use his position as an EMT to play doctor with the children at the household."  
 At the time of the alleged incidents, Waldo said the children would have been 8 or 9 years

old.  
 He also said the searches of the defendant's electronic devices have turned up more images of child pornography.  
 "I don't know the exact number," Waldo said, "but it's hundreds."  
 Blanchette said that she does not believe that any of those "child pornography-related pictures" involve the defendant or

the alleged molestation victims.  
 "They're naked children, is what my understanding of the charges are from what I've gathered," she said.  
 Both the defense and the pros-

ecution said the investigation is ongoing. If the case is not indicted by a grand jury within 90 days of Somers' arrest, the defendant would automatically be eligible for bond under Georgia law.

start of the 2018-19 school year, and three groups of 50 have successfully completed the training, the release said.

In addition to the training sessions, Flippen Group founder and program creator Flip Flippen spoke to staff members, Mentor Canes volunteers, the school board and the community during a teacher-in-service day on Jan. 7.

Title III/ESOL Specialist Ashley Chupp, one of the 50 educators who participated in the two eight-hour sessions this week, said she wanted to attend after working with teachers who had already gone through the training.

"I could see a positive difference in their interactions with students and wanted to know more about this program," she said. "I believe this training will help me build relationships with students, colleagues, family and friends as well as handle conflict when it arises."

Chupp said she was happy she was able to participate in the training "as it was well-planned, interactive and fulfilling."

"There are so many great take-

aways from this training that I am eager to implement in my personal and professional life," she said. "Capturing Kids' Hearts is about growing and empowering students."

The most beneficial concept Chupp believes she can bring to her classroom is the social contract, "which is an agreement of behavior."

"The goal of this contract is to have 'a self-managing group' if used and referred to daily in the classroom," she said. "This contract is something the students and I are held accountable to."

She also said she plans to implement the "Four Questions," which are used to "keep a safe environment during conflict, de-escalate behavior, keep [the teacher] consistent with all students and model appropriate skills to deal with conflict."

And lastly, Chupp said the practice of speaking affirmations to co-workers and students is "something I need to do more often."

"We oftentimes have positive or appreciative thoughts about people; however, we never verbalize them," she said. "Speaking affirmations grows and encourages others to want to do better and gives them strength even in mistakes."

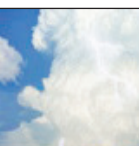

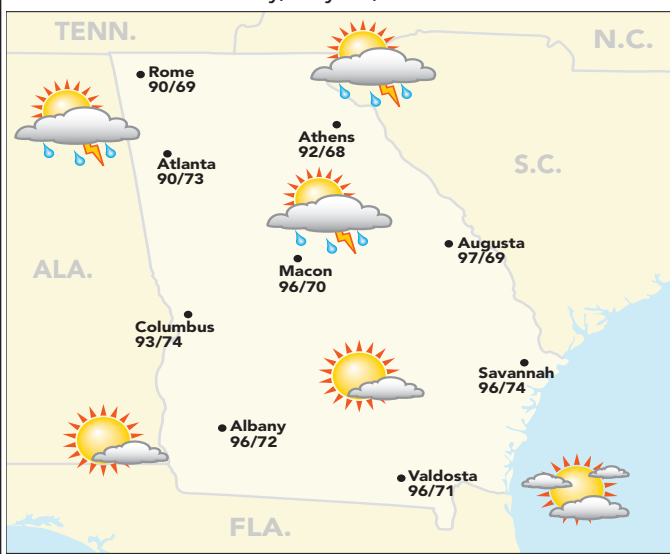

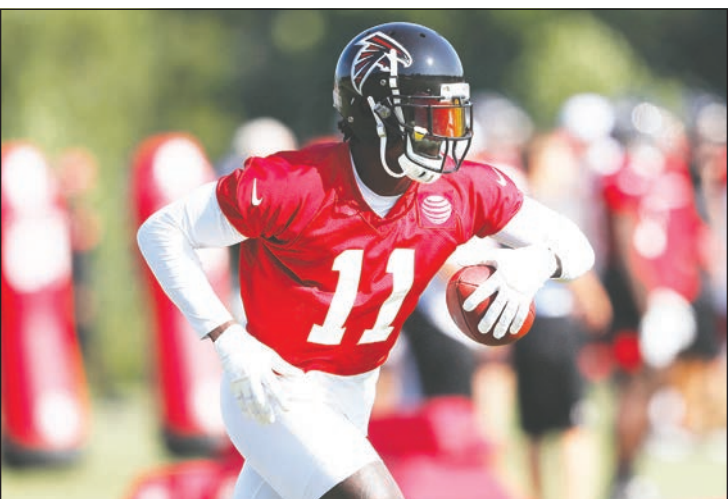

## Jones to skip preseason schedule again

FLOWERY BRANCH — For the second straight year, Julio Jones will sit out the Atlanta Falcons' full preseason schedule.

Jones said Tuesday he will be coaching the team's youngest wide receivers in Thursday night's Hall of Fame game against the Denver Broncos in Canton, Ohio.

Jones and the Falcons continue to negotiate a contract extension. Jones said his preseason plan has

nothing to do with those talks.

"I'm a veteran. I've been doing this," Jones said. "I don't need preseason to get ready. ... I'll get my reps in practice. I practice the way I play. When I get my reps in, I'll be ready to play."

Jones has been working his way back from a foot injury in training camp.

Falcons coach Dan Quinn said he's confident Jones will be ready for the season.

"We've got a good plan in order," Quinn said. "We know where we need to get him to."

After missing the preseason schedule last year, Jones led the NFL with 1,677 yards receiving. He joins receivers Mohamed Sanu and Calvin Ridley and tight end Austin Hooper as quarterback Matt Ryan's top targets.

Jones, 30, is a two-time All-Pro and six-time Pro Bowl receiver. He has two years remaining on his five-year, \$71.5 million contract, but he now ranks only 12th among the league's top-paid receivers.

The Falcons gave him a modest \$2.9 million last year. This

time, Jones is expected to receive a new long-term deal. He has said he wants to play his entire career in Atlanta.

Despite Jones' nagging physical problems, which frequently force him to miss practice, there is a reason the Falcons have confidence in his health in 2019: He has not missed a game the past two seasons and is looking to extend a string of five consecutive seasons with at least 1,400 yards.

Jones ranks fifth among active players with 698 career catches and 10,731 yards receiving.

Continuing to improve culture tops Adairsville softball's priorities

Adairsville softball coach Amanda Nelson is always excited to begin another season. She's loves seeing her players get out on the diamond and step up to the challenge of facing good competition.

But there's one thing, especially this season, that she's looking forward to even more.

"I'm excited about the culture of our program that we've really been developing," Nelson said. "Just creating a positive culture within our program, where our student-athletes are able to grow and thrive as a person and a player. ... I'm excited to see that culture develop as much as I am excited to see our girls play softball. That's a key piece for us this season."

Nelson will officially start her third season in charge of the Tigers, when they travel down Joe Frank Harris Parkway to face Bartow County foe Cartersville in the season opener at 5 p.m. Friday. This has the chance to be an extremely pivotal year for the direction of the Adairsville program.

In her first campaign, Nelson led the Tigers to a 10-10 record and a county championship. Last year,

Adairsville finished 8-20 and 5-11 in Region 6-AAA. However, the team, which graduated five seniors, suffered several narrow defeats — including nine by two or fewer runs — and easily could have finished .500 or better.

The hope is those tight ball-games have given the returning players the experience needed to flip the script this year. With only one senior on the squad, the Tigers have the opportunity to establish an identity that could truly move the program forward.

Luckily for Nelson, the lone 12th-grader on her side, Alexa Varner, epitomizes what she looks for in her players.

"Alexa is the definition of the core values we have defined for our team," Nelson said. "She's ev-

erything we are expecting from each individual player. We could not have a better senior to lead this group of girls. She's a quiet leader. She leads by example, but she's a fabulous senior leader for us."

Below Varner, who starred at shortstop last year, there's a talented crop of juniors. That class includes Adairsville's top two pitchers in Victoria O'Neal and Taylor Rhoades. Both pitchers logged innings as freshmen before combining to throw nearly every pitch in 2018.

Unlike most star pitchers, O'Neal and Rhoades aren't really expected to throw seven innings every outing. Nelson said the pair are accepting of the roles, while adding that the dynamic brings out healthy competition between the two.

"Having two pitchers with that much varsity experience, going into just their junior years is exciting as a coach," Nelson said. "It's exciting for our team that they know how to handle themselves in the circle. We know they're going to be great at that."

"They also complement each other well. They throw different speeds; they throw different pitches. Depending on what we're trying to accomplish each game, we can kind of determine who will be the starter and who will come in in relief and come up with a game plan we think is best suitable for each game."

While Nelson said the varsity roster has yet to be finalized, it

## Braves jump out, hold off Nationals

WASHINGTON — Adam Duvall had two home runs and four hits, Josh Donaldson added a three-run homer and the Atlanta Braves beat Washington 11-8 on Tuesday night to reopen a 5½-game lead over the second-place Nationals in the NL East.

Julio Teheran (6-7) allowed two runs and seven hits in 6 2/3 innings for Atlanta, which burst to an 11-1 lead and held on to split the first two games of the three-game series. Teheran had a 1.48 ERA in July as the Braves won four of his five starts but was just 1-1 those games.

Yan Gomes, Trea Turner and Juan Soto homered for the Nationals, who rallied late.

## Atlanta trades for Texas reliever Martin

ARLINGTON, Texas — The NL East-leading Atlanta Braves have gotten some bullpen help, acquiring hard-throwing reliever Chris Martin from the Texas Rangers for former first-round draft pick Kolby Allard.

Martin, whose fastball has averaged 96 mph this season, has 24 strikeouts and only one walk over his last 19 appearances since May 24 for his hometown Rangers. The 6-foot-8 Martin has four saves and a 3.08 ERA in 38 games this year, with 43 strikeouts and four walks in 38 innings.

"We felt he had as much upside as anybody on the trade market," Braves general manager Alex Anthopoulos said Tuesday night after the deal was announced.

Allard, a 21-year-old lefty, was the 14th overall pick by the Braves in the 2015 amateur draft and signed for a \$3,042,400 bonus. That was the same year that Dansby Swanson, now Atlanta's shortstop,

## Arms race ahead of trade window closing

NEW YORK — If Madison Bumgarner, Noah Syndergaard, Trevor Bauer, Mike Minor or Robbie Ray is going to get dealt to contenders desperate for arms, it will happen this week or not at all.

Baseball's trade window shuts today — completely, not like in years past. Marcus Stroman, Jason Vargas, Andrew Cashner, Jordan Lyles, Drew Smyly, Homer Bailey, Jake Diekmann and Derek Holland are among the pitchers dealt as the deadline approached. Most of the big names fans envisioned changing jerseys have stayed put in this new era of baseball economics, where prospects and youth are more prized than ever.

"Teams are doing a better and better job of understanding younger and younger players, and that's why you see the value in teams trying to keep prospects," Toronto general manager Ross Atkins said Monday after dealing Stroman, a first-time All-Star, to the New York Mets for a pair of pitching prospects. "The younger players seem to be really increasing in value."

Major League Baseball's deadline for trades without waivers was June 15 from 1923 through 1985, and has been July 31 or Aug. 1 each year since. Players who cleared waivers could be dealt after the deadline, but they had to be in an organization by Aug. 31 to be eligible for the postseason.

That changed in March, when MLB and the players' association agreed to a rules change that prohibits trades from Aug. 1 through the World Series. The only way a player can change clubs during that period is to be claimed on waivers or get released and sign with a new team.

"I think one of the things we're going to find in the next couple of days as a result of there being no August trades anymore, there's going to be a lot of teams looking to make moves to fortify their depth," Philadelphia general manager Matt Klentak said Monday, when he acquired left-hander Jason Vargas from the Mets.

In a season of record home runs, most contenders think they'll need more pitching to survive the pennant races and the postseason. With the season about two-thirds over, there had been just 31 complete games entering Monday — only slightly ahead of the pace that led to a record-low 42 last

year. That's down from 104 in 2015, 209 in 2003 and 302 in 1998, a sign of just how much the sport has transformed in two decades. Managers want plenty of power arms available inning after inning, leading rebuilding teams to sell off their veterans to clubs hoping to win now.

The Los Angeles Dodgers, New York Yankees and Houston Astros have large leads and the Atlanta Braves are comfortably atop their division. But the Yankees' starting pitching has stumbled in the past week, leading them to consider deals for starters and relievers with teams hungry for youngsters such as Gleyber Torres, Miguel Andújar, Clint Frazier and Deivi Garcia.

Houston is looking for a starter to join a rotation headed by Justin Verlander, Wade Miley and Gerrit Cole. The Dodgers have been seeking relievers from a market that may include Joe Biagini, Ian Kennedy, Ken Giles, Mychal Givens, Shane Greene, Francisco Liriano and Seth Lugo.

About a half-dozen teams in each league are competing to reach the wildcard playoffs, forcing some of them to make critical decisions whether to go for it or give up and stock for the future.

Even though the Mets are 50-55, first-year general manager Brodie Van Wagenen's approach is to win now.

"Brodie understands that I know we can win now. He knows that we can win now," manager Mickey Callaway said. "We both feel like we can win and get on a run and get into this thing."

## Jill Ellis stepping down as US women's national team coach

With two Women's World Cup titles in hand, U.S. national team coach Jill Ellis says it's time to move on.

Ellis announced Tuesday that she's resigning, just more than three weeks after the United States raised a second consecutive World Cup trophy following a dominant and record-setting run. She said she started thinking about stepping away around the start of the year, with the intention of seeing the team

through this summer's tournament.

"It's obviously been a fantastic run, a fantastic ride," she said.

Ellis said she wanted to spend more time with her family after more than five years in charge of the team. Currently taking some time off following the victorious monthlong odyssey in France, she said doesn't know what's next.

"I just need to take a step back and take it all in and see what next intrigues me and

was the first overall pick by Arizona before Houston used the second pick to get Alex Bregman.

The Rangers were playing a home game against Seattle when the 33-year-old Martin was seen high-fiving teammates in the bullpen before leaving down the tunnel. Texas announced the trade a few minutes later.

Atlanta assumes the remaining \$737,903 of Martin's \$2.25 million salary. He has earned \$100,000 in bonuses for 15 games finished, would get another \$50,000 for 20, and \$100,000 each for 25 and each additional five through 40.

Martin, who has only five career saves in 124 big league games, might get a chance to close in Atlanta. Luke Jackson has 17 saves but has struggled at times, failing to convert seven other chances.

Martin made his big league debut with the Colorado Rockies in 2014 and then pitched with the New York Yankees for part of the 2015 season. After two years in Japan, he signed with Texas before the 2018 season.

The Rangers optioned Allard to Triple-A Nashville. He was 7-5 with a 4.17 ERA in 20 starts this season for Triple-A Gwinnett.

piques my interest," she told reporters on a conference call.

Ellis, 52, was named coach of the team in 2014 and has led it to eight overall tournament titles, including victories at the World Cup in 2015 and earlier this year. Over the course of her tenure, the United States lost just seven matches.

She will remain with the team for a World Cup victory tour which kicks off Saturday with a

match against Ireland at the Rose Bowl. Following the conclusion of the five-match tour in October, she will serve as a U.S. Soccer ambassador for at least a year.

Ellis' contract was set to expire following the World Cup with a mutual option to extend it through the 2020 Tokyo Olympics. U.S. Soccer will begin the search for a new coach after a general manager for the women's team is named. The federation expects to name a GM soon.

"Jill was always extremely passionate about this team, analytical, tremendously focused

and not afraid to make tough decisions while giving her players the freedom to play to their strengths," U.S. Soccer President Carlos Cordeiro said in a statement. "She helped raise the bar for women's soccer in the USA and the world, and given the history of this program, the level of success she achieved is even more remarkable."

Ellis' assistant coach, Tony Gustavsson, is also stepping down after eight years with the team.

Over the summer in France, Ellis broke April Heinrich's U.S. women's team record for most

games coached. Overall, she has led the team in 127 matches, with 102 wins.

Ellis was named head coach after serving as interim coach following the dismissal of Tom Sermanni. Ellis also served as interim coach after Pia Sundhage resigned in 2012.

She was an assistant to both and was on the staff of the gold medal-winning teams at the Beijing and London Olympics. She also served as head coach at UCLA for 12 seasons.

"When I accepted the head coaching position this was the

timeframe I envisioned," Ellis said. "The timing is right to move on and the program is positioned to remain at the pinnacle of women's soccer. Change is something I have always embraced in my life and for me and my family this is the right moment."

The World Cup title in 2015 was the team's first since winning it all in 1999. Overall, the team has won soccer's most prestigious tournament four times.

The top-ranked U.S. team has been dominant throughout Ellis' tenure. The team went undefeated in the 2015 World Cup in Cana-

da en route to a 5-2 victory over Japan in the title match. The United States gave up just three goals over the course of the tournament.

Earlier this month, the U.S. defeated the Netherlands 2-0 in Lyon, France, to claim its second straight championship, after challenging knockout victories over No. 4 France and No. 3 England. The Americans never trailed at the tournament and set records with 26 goals and a 12-game World Cup winning streak dating to 2015. Ellis became the first coach to lead a team to two Women's World Cup titles.
