Fall Caramel Apple Dumplings

beverage

1 packet
The
Grateful
Gourmet's
Caramel Apple Dip Mix
2 large Granny Smith
apples, peeled and
cored
1 cup butter

½ cup sugar
2 (10 oz.) cans
refrigerated crescent
roll dough
1 tsp. ground cinnamon
1 (12 fluid oz.) can or
bottle Mountain Dew™
or any citrus soda pop

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease a 13x9-inch baking dish. Cut each apple into 8 wedges and set aside. Roll each apple wedge in crescent roll dough starting at the smallest end. Pinch to seal and place in the baking dish. Melt butter in a small saucepan and stir in the Caramel Apple Dip Mix, sugar and cinnamon. Bring to boil while stirring constantly. Remove from heat. For the topping, combine Cheeseball Mix (topping used later), cream cheese, 2 eggs and powdered sugar; mix until smooth. Pour mixture into pan on top of crust and sprinkle with topping. Bake for 40 minutes. Let cool before serving.

Raspberry Filled Caramel Donut Holes

½ cup butter, softened ½ cup vegetable oil 1 cup sugar ¾ cup brown sugar 4 eggs 2 tsp. caramel extract 3 tsp. baking powder ½ tsp. baking soda 1½ tsp. salt

2 cups milk 11 oz. The Grateful Gourmet's Seedless

51/3 cups flour

Red Raspberry Preserves 1 cup sugar

1/8 tsp. caramel extract 1/2 cup butter, melted

Preheat oven to 325° F. In the bowl of an electric mixer, cream together butter, vegetable oil, sugar and brown sugar. Add eggs and 2 teaspoons caramel extract and mix until combined. Add baking powder, baking soda and salt. Stir in flour and milk, alternating between the two and beginning and ending with the flour until just combined. Using a tablespoon scoop, add batter to cavities of cake pop pan. Place top on pan and lock into place. Bake 15-17 minutes or until golden. Fill pastry bag or zip top bag with corner snipped and fitted with decorating tip with plain circular opening with preserves. Push tip into the top of each donut hole and squeeze bag as you pull it from the center of each donut hole. Remove holes to cooling rack. Stir 1/8 teaspoon caramel extract into sugar. Brush each filled hole with butter and roll in caramel sugar mixture. Makes 4 dozen.








Why is the event in September?


"Working with the homeowners. They have a lot of pride in their properties because they have put in lots of time, money and effort to make their historic homes the best they can be."

TAKE A HIKE

Winston Tunnel > Surrounded on all sides by looming deciduous trees, you'll have to overcome slope after slope, followed by climb after climb, followed by another slope and a lot more climbing. But it's all worth it.

The long, winding road to the Winston Tunnel is as beautiful as it is treacherous. The steep climbs let up occasionally, plateauing every now and then to give hikers a chance to breathe, recharge and take in the scenery. It's these spots, where the canopy opens up and the sky is welcomed back into the trail, that make the trip worth all the toil and sweat.



DIY SCENIC ADVENTURE

Apple River Canyon State Park > It's a journey into the forest, it's a walk along the river, it's whatever you want it to be. From towering walls of trees in the forest to beautiful limestone bluffs carved out by the Apple River, Apple River Canyon State Park offers a wide variety of breathtaking views. Most of the walking paths are paved and easy to navigate. Feel free, however, to venture off the path, rappel off some cliffs and make your own way down to the river. Apple River Canyon State Park is a DIY adventure with no shortage of wildlife or scenery.



If fluctuations in altitude aren't your prerogative, don't worry, there's another path. Path #2 is quicker, flatter and straighter. It's a thin, tapering trail; if you're traveling in a company, you'll have to adopt a follow-the-leader-style approach rather quickly to squeeze your way through. With this trail you'll finish faster, but you'll sacrifice the sights, sounds and legroom of the big kahuna.

Regardless of which path you choose, after some walking, you will eventually find yourself nearing the end of the line. Because there are no formal trail markers, there is only one surefire way to check your ETA: the air.

If you feel the hairs on the back of your arms and neck begin to stand up, and a wave of goosebumps brushes itself onto your epidermis, you're in the home stretch. The air surrounding and emanating out of Winston Tunnel brings the mean temperature of its environment down about 20 degrees.

You'll have to traverse through patches of mud (sometimes an entire swamp, depending on the previous days' precipitation) but there are logs and rocks strategically scattered across to protect your shoes. As soon as you take that final leap from mossy boulder to dry land, you'll finally come face to face with the

trail's namesake: Winston Tunnel.

Originally built as a part of the Minnesota and Northwestern Railroad, the Winston Tunnel has since been abandoned, and its bores have been chain-linked shut. The tunnel, just outside both Galena and Elizabeth, was at one time the third longest railroad tunnel in Illinois.

The path to the Winston Tunnel is approximately two miles in length, and covers quite a bit of ground, but it is a spectacle to behold—the hidden gem of Jo Daviess County—and worthy of every step.



Apple River Canyon State Park

8763 E Canyon Rd, Apple River

Limestone bluffs, deep ravines, springs, streams and wildlife characterize this almost 2,000-acre site. Once a part of a vast sea bottom that stretched from the Alleghenies to the Rockies, the scenic Apple River Canyon State Park area was formed by the action of the winding waters of the Apple River.

Casper Bluff Land And Water Reserve

870 S Pilot Knob Rd, Galena

Casper Bluff Land and Water Reserve offers rich Native American history on its 100-acre site of prairies, savannas and effigy mounds. Breathtaking views of the Mississippi River, Iowa and Illinois can be seen from dawn until dusk at Casper Bluff. There are 51 burial mounds indicating that the area served as ceremonial grounds for the Late Woodland Indians. On the property, visitors will also find the last known intact Thunderbird Effigy Mound in the state.

Chestnut Mountain Resort

8700 W Chestnut Rd, Galena

Bask in the glory of cotton candy skies while skiing down one of 19 slopes at Chestnut Mountain. During the warm fall months, try your hand at their alpine slide weaving through the mountainside or fly through the sunset on the Soaring Eagle Zipline overlooking the Mississippi River.

Eagle Ridge Resort & Golf Courses

444 Eagle Ridge Dr, Galena

Eagle Ridge Resort offers high rolling hills and water views of the setting sun from their resort and Lake Galena, as well as their four golf courses. Find one of over 200 birds identified around the resort, including bald eagles, white pelicans and white trumpeter swans. During the annual Fire and Ice Show, Galena On The Fly will light up the night sky with hot air balloons on Lake Galena at the marina behind the resort.

Galena Gateway Park

9300 W Powder House Hill Rd, Galena

Visit one of Illinois' most scenic views, overlooking downtown Galena and surrounding mounds. Galena Gateway Park includes natural prairies with an always-changing population of wild flowers and woodlands. There are mowed and gravel paths for hiking, running, mountain biking, bird watching and picnicking.

Gramercy Park

190 Beecher St, East Dubuque

Gramercy park overlooks the bluffs of the Mississippi River. This 10-acre site is an Illinois Natural Heritage Landmark with 26 ceremonial and burial mounds from the Hopewell Native American Culture. The park offers walking trails, a playground, scenic picnic sites and educational signage.

Grant Park

625 Park Ave. Galena

Walk around one of Galena's most historic parks. Grant park offers views of the sun setting over downtown Galena and the Galena River. Multiple statues about the Civil War and Galena generals can be found throughout. For the little ones, there is a recently renovated play ground and basketball court.

Horseshoe Mound Preserve

1679 N Blackiack Rd. Galena

Located at the eastern gateway to the historic city of Galena, the 40-acre Horseshoe Mound features a central gathering area with a stone compass, viewing scopes, hiking trails and scenic outlooks with a 40-mile view including parts of Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin and the Mississippi River. All of these offerings make Horseshoe Mound the perfect place to watch the sunset.

Valley Of Eden Bird Sanctuary

5559 E Rush Creek Rd. Stockton

Explore 109 acres of grassland, prairie and forest at the only bird sanctuary in the county, which offers a peaceful environment to watch the sun set. It features six miles of walking trails and two observation decks for bird watching. So far, over 120 species of birds have been identified on site.

Wapello Land & Water Reserve

8642 Illinois 84 South, Hanover


Named after the original name of Hanover and the chief of the Fox Indians, Wapello is located just south of Hanover. Referred to as the "John Chapman Archaeological Site" by the National Register of Historic Places, Wapello was the meeting point of two Native American cultures, the northern Woodland and southern Mississippian Native American tribes. Walking trails, featuring effigy mounds and barred villages, are equipped with interpretive signage.











Watch a wide array of birds soar through the sky while hiking 409 acres of preserved prairie, forest and grassland at Valley of Eden Bird Sanctuary.

he Jo Daviess Conservation Foundation (JDCF) opened the Valley of Eden Bird Sanctuary, near Stockton, on June 2. Valley of Eden is the first JDCF preserve in the Stockton area and also the largest property owned by JDCF. The 409-acre property features 6 miles of walking trails and two observation decks for bird watching, as well as two cattle pastures.

In 1990, Nancy Hamill-Winter inherited the land from her mother, who purchased the land before she passed away. She moved from her seven-acre property in Kane County, where the suburban sprawl was overwhelming the landscape, to the property in Stockton.

She worked to restore the land and attract more wildlife by planting some native grasses and hardwood trees. One spring, Winter and her friends planted 40,000 natural hardwoods.

"Different types of birds came with every tree we planted." Winter said.

It had been an ambition of Winter's to complete a large-scale restoration of the property to prairie forest border—where the great forest of the east meets the great plains of the west. She worked diligently for almost 30 years to establish the plants she wanted and eliminate the invasive ones.

Prairie and natural area restoration wasn't anything new to Winter when she began her work in Jo Daviess County. She's spent the first 50 years of her life in Kane County, where she'd learned all sorts

of techniques for prairie restoration through her involvement with the Nature Conservancy. She relied on an extensive network of people to help guide her work.

According to Steve Barg, JDCF executive director, Winter placed her property in the Conservation Reserve Program. Much of the farmland was put into grassland and forest.

In 2007, Barg said, Winter worked with JDCF to put a conservation easement, a permanent legal agreement between the owner and a land conservation trust to protect and preserve conservation values, on the property.

In 2014, when Winter decided to move east, she donated her land to JDCF. JDCF seemed the natural fit for the property because she wanted others to be able to enjoy the natural place she had worked to create.

Winter sought to establish a natural wildlife habitat, particularly for birds, the barometer for the health of the environment.

"If you will preserve it, [the birds] will come." Winter said.

The birds had special meaning to Winter. When she lived in Kane County, Barg said, Winter watched as land was developed and birds disappeared. It was very important for her that the property remain a sanctuary for birds, and Winter honored the Eden families, who've farmed the valley for generations, as namesakes.

The Valley of Eden took two years to restore and preserve before

JDCF officially acquired the land from Winter in 2017. The conservation easement was then transferred to the Natural Land Institute in Rockford.

"It's really an amazing place in terms of bird habitat," said Barg of the Valley of Eden, which falls a little over 300 feet from its highest to lowest points, the ridge to the valley.

The property features a diverse topography of forest, prairie and savanna, which draws broader wildlife to the land. Rush Creek also flows through the property. However, the management plan for the diverse topography, Winter said, was difficult.

She added, "You want the forest and you also want the prairie, but they fight each other."

Valley of Eden offers a variety of habitats to sustain native Illinois birds that have been on decline for the past 50 years due to the loss of habitat.

Winter said, "Birds are coming in increasing waves every year, and everywhere else, they are shrinking exponentially."

The grassland habitat at Valley of Eden attracts and supports many threatened birds including bobolinks, Henslow's sparrows,

dickcissel and sedge wren. So far, over 120 bird species have been identified at Valley of Eden, and that number is increasing. The land is recognized as an Important Bird Area, which gives designation for recognition of bird species and keeps track of all the birds born on property.

Barbara Bernard, committee member of Valley of Eden, encourages everyone to come out to Valley of Eden and enjoy the beautiful land and wildlife.

"We hope to create a place for the community to come together and make Northwest Illinois prairie interesting and a great place to come." Bernard concluded.

Future plans include the expansion of existing trails and the installation of benches and signage along those trails. Valley of Eden is open year-round. Visitors are welcome to snowshoe, hike and cross-country ski the ungroomed land all winter. For a full list of bird species found at Valley of Eden, check out the bird sanctuary brochure at the kiosk. Please note that dogs are not allowed on this property due to ground-nesting birds.

Head out to Dittmar Farms and Orchard for all the fall fun, treats and pumpkins you could ever need.

Over the past 160 years, six generations of Dittmars have farmed on the same land, located just outside Elizabeth on South Grebner Road.

Last fall, Dittmar Farms Orchard Station, located at 106 Diagonal St. in Elizabeth, opened as a sales outlet for apples, corn pumpkin cider donuts.





for a larger space to make and bake sweet treats.

They had been baking in St. Mary's church. However, a larger space became available on the main drag in Elizabeth, and the Dittmars bought it.

Now, Jonna and Peg have the room to make large batches of donuts and other treats for events and fundraisers.

Also last fall, the Dittmars built a pavilion on the farm to sell their fresh produce.

They even expanded their orchard with 600 new trees planted. The orchard, maintained by Rick, now boasts 800 trees, from honey crisp to ginger gold and every variation in between.

"We love the people and the apples," Jonna said.

U-pick apples are offered as first come, first serve until the supply is depleted.

She continues, "I love pruning the apples, and I love watching our kids play and work out on the farm."

The last weekend of September, they will hold their first Honeycrisp Apple Event. In addition to pony rides and antique tractor

troduced last fall, they will have live music and a petting.

For something extra sweet, visitors can also pick their own fresh raspberries.

Mike adds, "Every year we try to bring something new and exciting to the farm that people will like."

Admission is \$8, which includes a corn maze, hay ride, a u-pick pumpkin patch, gourd launchers, a playground and much more.

"We have a deep family history, and we narrate our hay rides to share the history of our family, our farmland and the Driftless Area. You can also learn more about planting and harvesting pumpkins and apples," Mike said.

"Dittmar Farms is just good family fun," Jonna adds.

Dittmar Farms and Orchard even offers a haunted pumpkin and hayride for groups. These activities and more are offered every weekend in September and October.

"We like to keep it fresh, so people will keep coming back." Mike concludes.





Explore the natural beauty of the Driftless Area on the Galena River Trail



inding through remote areas of Galena alongside the railroad track and the backwaters of the Mississippi River, the Galena River Trail offers over nine miles of scenic walking, jogging, hiking, biking, cross country skiing and snowshoeing.

You can also partake in activities such as bird watching, geocaching, fishing, kayaking or canoeing on or around the trail, all free of charge. The 3.4-mile Galena Junction Trail segment is the original trail.

Originating from Depot Park just below the U.S. 20 bridge, the forested trail winds south to Galena Junction and the backwaters of the Mississippi River. At the junction, trains pass close by the trail.

Interpretive signs detailing the history and wildlife of the area are located at various locations along all of the trails. The Galena Junction Trail also offers some of the best bird watching in the region. There are 60 species of birds already identified.

Capture the natural beauty of Galena in various locations along the trails. The downtown trail covers a half mile from the Meeker Street bridge to the trailhead at Depot Park, while the Buehler Trail covers 1.4 miles from the trailhead to the Buehler Preserve.

Along the Muchow Park Trail and Depot Park, donated fitness equipment lines the sides of the river trail. The fitness equipment is designed to target a variety of muscle groups, allowing users to incorporate interval training into their workouts.

Another trail to enjoy is the Recreation Park Trail that covers 1 mile from the trailhead to Recreation Park.

Recently, 2.1 miles from Galena Junction to South River Road in Aiken,

near Chestnut Mountain Resort and Blanding Campground, has opened. Along the new trail, new access points to Casper Bluff Land and Water Reserve will be offered.

The new leg of the Galena River Trail will offer access to Native American burial grounds and effigies at Casper Bluff. Now, the distance from the U.S. 20 bridge to Aiken is 5.5 miles one way.

Free parking is available at several trail entry areas, including under the U.S. 20 bridge, Meeker Street at Field Street, Recreation Park and South River Road. Please note: For the safety of all, the trail is closed annually during firearm deer hunting season.





Bootleggers Saloon, located in downtown Hanover, is a local favorite. It's a hole in the wall with a wide selection of alcohols, multiple pool tables and electronic gaming machines.

2. Cajun Jack's, Elizabeth

Formerly Shark's Roadhouse, Elizabeth's new and improved Cajun Jack's Bar & Grill brings Cajun cooking from the bayou to the corn field. From gumbo, to po' boys, to alligator bites, Cajun Jack's serves up a delicious blend of Creole flavors. The moment you enter Cajun Jack's you're greeted by a wall of mounted animal heads, some traditional, others not. If it's ever been your dream to sit at a bar and eat traditional Cajun food while staring into the gaping maw of a giant shark, then Cajun Jack's is where you ought to be.

3. Small Town Saloon (Dually's), Flizabeth

6. Thriving Thistle Market, Apple River



moved to Galena in the early 2000s. She is a native lowan, while he was born and raised in South Africa. Both Bells have been busy entrepreneurs and business owners in Galena ever since their arrival, owning and operating everything from guest houses to horse carriage

riding companies.

"We refurbished a house (on) Dodge Street, which turned out to be an old brewery; we didn't actually realize it when we bought it. It used to be the Illinois Brewery; it was built in 1857. Once that was refurbished we had decided to explore the whole possibility of putting a whole brewpub in Galena.

"I contacted a number of breweries in the region and asked them to make some beer for us. We applied for a distribution license for the liquor. We had a brewery in Black River Falls, Wisconsin make two beers for us: a Hefeweizen and an amber ale. And it really took off in the first nine months."

Galena Brewing Company was established in 2009, and started brewing in 2010. Since then, they've been churning out award-winning brews.

Off Kilter–Nitro, a creation by Galena Brewing Company, recently competed at the World Beer Cup competition, winning gold in the Classic Irish-Style Dry Stout category.

Galena Brewing Company offers an everchanging selection of brews, all developed by an in-house team of brewmasters. They also carry six seasonal ales: Uly's Dark (oatmeal stout), Anna Belle's IPA, Farmer's (blonde ale), Fevre River Ale (hefeweizen), Miner's Treasure (American amber ale) and Uptown Brown (nut brown ale).

In the 1800s, there were loads of competing breweries in Galena. Bell said that Galena Brewing Company is very proud of Galena's rich brewing history, and tries to preserve and share the stories of its heyday.

"It seems like we're the only people who propagate the history," Bell said. "Whenever we do tours, we tell them about the history. In fact, on our logo—there are nine stars above the logo—that celebrates the nine breweries of Galena. Those are not the nine generals, those are the nine breweries!"

Galena Brewing Company's location in downtown Galena is ideal for locals and tourists alike, and helps preserve its atmosphere of community and history.

"The people that come into this town are so friendly," Hammel said. "They're here to escape their lives and have a little mini vacation. People shop, hit a bar, shop, eat, enjoy some nightlife. Everything about this town is relaxing."







Apple River Fort

311 E Myrtle St, Elizabeth, 815-858-2028, appleriverfort.org

The Apple River Fort at 311 E. Myrtle St, Elizabeth, was the site of an important battle during the Black Hawk War.

On June 24, 1832, the settlers of the fort turned back an attack by 200 Sauk and Fox warriors led by Black Hawk himself. The war ended the threat of Indian attacks in the area and opened the region to further settlement.

Today, the fort has been reconstructed and is open for self-guided tours from May-October.

Chicago Great Western Railway Depot

111 E Myrtle St, Elizabeth, 815-858-2343, elizabethhistoricalsociety.com

Located in a former Chicago Great Western Railway station, the Chicago Great Western Railway Museum in Elizabeth focuses on the railroads of northwest Illinois. The museum houses thousands of railroad artifacts, and also gives visitors the opportunity to step into a full-size Milwaukee Road caboose.

The railway depot is open May - October on weekends from 11 am - 3 pm.

Elizabeth History Museum

Elihu Washburne House

This handsome Greek revival home once belonged to Elihu Washburne and his family. Here lived a future mayor of Chicago, a friend to Abraham Lincoln and U.S. Grant and a U.S. Congressman whose efforts assisted in the Union success.

The Elihu Washburne House was constructed in 1843, three years after Washburne came to Galena and became a Whig lawyer. The home that was constructed at this time was one third of the size it is today.

On the eve of U.S. Grant's election in 1868, Grant went to Washburne's house to await the election results. At 1:30 a.m., the telegraph announcing the final election results came through, naming Grant the president of the United States.

It is open May through October, on Fridays and Saturdays, 10 am to 1 pm.



Old Blacksmith Shop

Take a step back in time as you visit the Old Blacksmith Shop on North Commerce Street. In Galena's past, the town had more than two dozen operating blacksmiths.

Today this red wood-framed shop, built in 1897, is the only one left in the city of Galena, operated by the Galena-Jo Daviess County Historical Society. The shop serves as a museum with fully functional forges operated by blacksmith historians. The forging equipment also displays historical charm, being the original tools used in the 1890s.

You can even watch blacksmiths transform a piece of heated metal into a decorative hook. pendant, fireplace set, or other unique handmade items, all available for purchase. The Old Blacksmith Shop is open May-October, Friday-Monday 10 am-4 pm.

Old Market House

The Old Market House, erected by the city of Galena in 1845-1846, served for 65 years as the city market during the decades of Galena's

greatest prosperity as a river port, lead-mining center and commercial hub. The Old Market House also served as the seat of Galena government and for years had two jail cells.

U.S. Grant Home

500 Bouthillier St. Galena. 815-777-3310

The U.S. Grant Home was built in 1859-60. When Gen. Ulysses S. Grant returned to the city in 1865 as a Civil War hero, he was presented the house. Grant used the home as his official political and voting address, living there with his family during his 1868 presidential campaign, then for a few brief periods during his presidency (1869-1877) and retirement.

The restored U.S. Grant Home is a two-story brick structure. All of the rooms are decorated and furnished to represent a mid-1860s appearance, primarily with family heirlooms. The site includes several small mid-19th century homes comprising the three-block Grant Home Historic Neighborhood.

Grant State Park, a tree-shaded area south of the Grant Home, has picnic tables for use. Also in the park is the Long House, a log building constructed in 1851 and moved to the site from Elizabeth in 1976, representing a typical settler's home of mid-19th-century Jo Daviess County. The house is not open Mondays or Tuesdays.

1876 Banwarth House & Museum

of Galena, women in Galena, Congressman Elihu Washburne, the Civil War and commerce.

Upon entering the museum, visitors are greeted by U.S. Grant and his wife in hologram form and are able to participate in many interactive exhibits. Many impressive artifacts are showcased in the museum, including: the Vicksburg Flag, "Peace and Union" painting, an interactive steamboat exhibit and an original 1830s lead mine in the back of the museum.

The heart of the museum is the 9 feet by 12 feet oil painting, "Peace

and Union," by Thomas Nast. This piece of art is the most significant artifact that belongs to the museum because it signified the peaceful ending to the Civil War.

Two rooms contain rotating galleries: Galena in Maps and World War I exhibit. Outside of the rooms, a poster hangs in remembrance of all Galena soldiers who have fought in the World War I. Alongside, a binder contains all of the names of the soldiers, in which visitors can look for

those to whom they are related.

Study Smith family artifacts donated by Smith descendents, including a handwritten letter by John C. Smith, in a new display unveiled in 2018. There is also a new interactive exhibit about Galena's nine Civil War generals.

Inside the museum, there is a gift shop and a historical research center, all operated by the Galena-Jo Daviess County Historical Society. The Main Street location features a museum store and also sells tickets to Galena and Jo Daviess County attractions at a 5 percent discount. Trolley tours leave from Gateway throughout the day as well.



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



St. Rose Academy

1859. Designed and built by Father Samuel Mazzuchelli, the St. Rose Academy was an all girls Catholic school also known as "the Academy." From 1868 to 1875, the building was used by the German Lutheran Church as a part of Wartburg College.



Union Baptist

212 N Bench St.

1854. When this church was first built, it struggled to prosper. In the early 1900s a concrete block porch was added, hiding the original front of the building. Today it is the home to the Odd Fellows and Masons.

First Presbyterian Church

106 N Bench St.

1838. The architectural style of this church comes from the East Coast, specifically the New England area. The steeple is said to be copied from the Old South Church of Boston.

Turner Hall

105 S Bench St.

1874. Constructed by the local Turner Society, Turner Hall was to serve as a public hall for lectures, theater, rallies and events. In 1926, it was gutted by fire but then rebuilt. Many famous visitors have been to Turner Hall including William McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt.

Galena Methodist Church

125 S Bench St.

1857. The original structure, built in 1832, burned in January 1838. The present church building was dedicated in 1857. General U.S. Grant attended church here with his family. The Grant pew is marked with a U.S. flag.

Liberty Engine #1

Bench & Washington streets

1851. This Italianate structure is the oldest of its type in the state of Illinois. It showcases Galena's original 1855 fire engine, which was pulled by horses and pumped by hand.

Daniel A. Barrows Home

211 S Bench St.

1858. Designed by architect William Dennison, who also designed U.S. Grant's home, this residence was home to Daniel A. Barrows and his family. Barrows was a prominent businessman, owning a confectionery store, distillery and lumber yard. He was also a Republican and Lincoln supporter, which led to his front window being smashed by rocks during a Democratic rally on Bench Street in 1864. In 1938, the city purchased the building and used the front two rooms as city hall until 1967. Today, the building houses the Galena-Jo Daviess County Historical Society & U.S. Grant Museum.

St. Michael Catholic Church

227 N Bench St.

1856. The current church was built after the previous building burned down. The building was designed and the parish was established by Father Samuel Mazzuchelli. St. Michael's Parish was made up largely of Irish working class families.

Dr. Horatio Newhall House/ Miller & Steinke Funeral Home

235 S Bench St.

1848. This building served as the home of Galena's foremost physician, Dr. Horatio Newhall. Its use as a funeral home goes back over 80 years.

Old High School Steps

106 N Bench St.

This stairway, originally wooden, has been in this location since the 1850s. In addition to hilltop residents, these stairs serviced hundreds of students who attended the Old Galena High School, which overlooks Galena on the top of the hill.

Galena United Methodist Church

Old Galena High School

411 S Prospect St.

1905. This massive structure dominates Galena's skyline. Built after the previous school burned, the new building features a square tower with four circular openings, each nearly seven feet in diameter. In 1980, the school was sold and converted to condominiums

Asa Haile House

209-211 S Prospect St.

1856. This brick home was built by Asa Haile, a prominent bricklayer and building contractor. It was Haile who laid the brick for the five floors of the DeSoto House Hotel in 1854. It was also Haile who removed the top two floors of the hotel in 1880.

Felt House

125 S Prospect St.


1850. This house was originally built in the 1850s for dry goods merchant Lucius Felt. What you see today, however, is a "new" version, as the house underwent major remodeling in 1874. The "new" house was done in the Second Empire style and sports a large dance hall under the mansard roof. The double stairway cost thousands of dollars—more than the house itself—and was for many years known as the "Felt's Folly."

Grace Episcopal Church

Hill & Prospect Streets

1848. This church was built partly from stone quarried at the site. The original 1837 Henry Erben organ has been restored, making it the oldest organ still in use in Illinois.

Flood Gates

1951. In 1828, Galena had its first recorded flood. The water was high enough to have steamboats travel in the city streets.

In 1951, the floodgates were completed to connect to the river levee system.

Schmohl Building

201 S Main St

1886. Lena Schmohl's millinery store in the 1850s. In 1886, after her husband died, Lena built and installed Galena's first hydraulic elevator. She was a highly-respected business leader long before most women had the opportunity.

Newhall Drug Store

101-103 S Main St

1843. The Newhall Drug Store was built in 1843 by Galena's foremost physician and pharmacist, Horatio Newhall, a Yale graduate, who also published Galena's first newspaper, the "Miners Journal."

Newhall's most notable work was treating

cholera victims in the 1832 and 1848 outbreaks. The observations that he made about the disease and its spread were considered some of the best of that period.

Hempstead Store

100 N Main St

1846. The second floor of this building was home to the law office of John A. Rawlins, one of Galena's nine Civil War generals. He later served as Grant's chief of staff.

Old Stockade

208 Perry St

1832. Originally home to trader Amos Farrar, during the Blackhawk War this homestead was transformed into a refuge for women and children, though it was never used.

The home has been remodeled since its days as a stockade and now welcomes visitors on Saturdays from 1 to 4 pm.

Perry Street

1888. The stone laid on this street was laid down originally as a deterrent to erosion, not a paving stone. However, maintaining control of horses and wagons on steep hills was a constant concern in the early days of Galena.

J.A. Meusel Cigar Factory

208-210 N Main St

This building was home to the Standard Cigar Factory, one of the many cigar manufacturers in Galena. Tobacco was a cash crop for some county farmers, particularly in the Stockton area.

Flat Iron/Diagonal Building

222 N Main St

1856. The original building housed Bradley/ Taylor House hotels and was three stories, until it was destroyed by fire in 1876. The new Italianate structure is only two floors and has housed many different businesses from the People's Bank (original safe still there) to a Justice of the Peace.

This tour is a perfect combination of past and present. Explore unique shops and restaurants as you learn about Galena's Main Street buildings and their purposes.

Barrows And Coatsworth Stores

120-126 S Main St

1856. This section of buildings housed the leather goods shop of Jesse Grant (U.S. Grant's father). Located at 120 S Main St., you can shop in the same store where U.S. Grant worked from 1860 to 1861.

Desoto House Hotel

230 S Main St


1855. Named after the discoverer of the Mississippi River, the DeSoto House Hotel was opened in 1855 at Galena's economic peak. The hotel was billed as the "Largest Hotel in the West," and was built to service the many people arriving in Galena.


Abraham Lincoln and Stephen A. Douglas spoke from the hotel's balcony on separate occasions. The hotel also served as the venue of Ulysses S. Grant's reception ball and celebration after his homecoming from the Civil War. His presidential campaign head-quarters were also housed in rooms 209 and 211.


Davis Block

304-310 S. Main St


1846. This was the very first all-brick block in Galena. Consisting of five stores, the block housed a jewelry store owned by Civil War general John E. Smith, and office to controversial lawyer M.Y. Johnson.

include the Old Stockade, Dowling House, Blacksmith Shop, Grant's Home and many more historic homes, churches and downtown Galena buildings.

Four years ago, retired fourth grade history teacher Paula Schonhoff was inspired to share the rich history of Galena that she loved so much.

When she visited the Callahan house to find information on her parent's house, Schonhoff found files of other Galena properties. She was hooked on the history of Galena she found within the files, so she began

an in-depth research of Galena properties with assistance from many local historians.

With the historical information she compiled on various Galena properties, Schonhoff wanted to create an audiobook. She said, "I want tourists to have appreciation for our town."

She then spoke to her former student, Andy Willis, about her idea for an audiobook. Willis persuaded Schonhoff to make an app instead of an audiobook.

For the next three years, she worked on creating an app in collaboration with Nathan Greiner of Red Brick LLC. Schonhoff researched, took photos and recorded narrations for the 291 historical sites.

"I enjoy it so much to compare Galena today to when I was growing up in the 60s and 70s," Schonhoff said.

The Galena Tours app includes hundreds of historical photos from the Alfred Mueller collection and narration for all 291 gps coordinated historical sites. Users can review the app at home and then go outside to explore the sites that are the most intriguing to them.

Users can choose from nine main tours of Galena including the east side, the west side, Main Street, and Bench Street, as well as the famous Americans in Galena, architecture styles, top 10 sites, generals and lead, steamboats and railroads. They can either take a full tour or a mini tour of each area.

Along with the four main tours, the app includes informational tours of architectural styles, famous American visitors, early Galena history, and the nine Civil War generals of Galena.

Since the release of the app in July 2016, the app has expanded.

Recent updates have added text for downtown historical sites as well as new pictures and information for existing sites. Schonhoff has also expanded the app to include Main Street businesses.

Galena Tours is \$3.99 and can be purchased through the Apple App Store or on Google Play.

For Schonhoff, "It was a labor of love." She did not create the app for money, she just wanted to share the history of Galena with those who were interested.

Schonhoff said, "It's hard to make back all the hours of work you put into something you love."



As people flocked to Galena during the lead boom of the late 1800s, the need for everyday items grew, including utilitarian clayware.

Before the Gold Rush, there was a lead rush to this area. It was recalled that a "mysterious medley of people located" in Galena "on account of the celebrity of the lead mines." People of all grades and classes thronged to the mines almost as if they "were literally crazy and rushed to the mines with the same blind energy and speed that people would in a panic flee from death."

One of greatest assets to Galena's early history was the river, once called the Fever River, but later changed to the Galena River. With the influx of many people and businesses, there was a need for many things on a day-to-day basis. One of those needs was kitchen wares like pots, pans, crocks and jugs. The simplest solution to manufacture of these types of things was pottery made from local materials.

The clay for most of the pottery was found in this area. It's interesting to note that Galena pottery had a glaze that contained lead, but people of that time did

not realize the danger. The pottery was placed in an oven for a number of hours to reach proper firing and the result was that the raw clay was transformed into a work of beauty and color.


One very unique thing to note is that the colors found in the finished pottery of long ago can be attributed to natural causes basically the minerals in the soil rather than any direct action of the craftsman making it. Some of the colors included were pumpkin red, orange and a yellow to a brownish green.

Dating back to its earliest beginnings in the Galena area the pottery

was made by D. A. Sackett, Alfred Sackett, John Wagdin, Andrew Jennings. Pottery was also made in Elizabeth and Mineral Point and Belmont, Wis. Again, it was the need for these basic items like pots, pans and crocks in day to day use that caused local pottery to be essential to people in the area.

This pottery continues to be a very collectible item even to the present time.





Eli-Who?

Meet Elihu B. Washburne, unsung hero of the Civil War



History seldom credits Congressman Elihu B. Washburne, as much as it does his contemporaries.

The Union fought the Civil War on three fronts: the White House, the battlefield and Congress. President Abraham Lincoln took command from 1600 Penn, General (later President) Ulysses S. Grant led the U.S. troops at the Battle of Vicksburg and Congressman Elihu B. Washburne fought it out on the Hill.





It was inside Congressman Washburne's house, on election night 1868, that General Ulysses S. Grant recieved the news that he had just won the Presidency. Due to its cultural and historical significance, the Washburne House is listed on the U.S. National Register of Historic Places.



A bust of Elihu B. Washburne was recently installed in downtown Galena, in the center of the namesake Washburne Garden. The marble bust was sculpted by local artist David Seagraves, who is pictured at the dedication ceremony.

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
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

Cory Ritterbusch shares what it's like portraying Galena Civil War General John C. Smith alongside eight other Galena Civil War Generals.



As you investigate Galena and all it has to offer, one thing is apparent- the rich history of our Civil War generals. Galena boasts nine Civil War generals, which is unusual a town of its size.

To tell the story of these nine courageous men and commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Civil War, the Galena Generals formed in 1961. The Galena Generals are a group of area men who take pride in portraying the lives of all nine Galena Civil War generals at area events and activities.

Cory Ritterbusch, who portrays Gen. John Corson Smith, voices what it is like to step back into the 19th century as a man of prestige.

"I met Bob Buman, (who portrays Ulysses S. Grant), and he asked me to join him as a general because of my passion for local history," Ritterbusch said.

Before dressing up in his blue and gold Civil War uniform as Smith, Ritterbusch absorbs ev-

erything about Smith, from his personality and way of communication to his work accomplishments and personal life.

"To prepare for events, I research information pertaining to Smith

and the event. I then work individually and with the other generals to customize a dialogue for the event. We always give audiences a customizable performance," said Ritterbusch.

John Corson Smith was born in Philadelphia, Pa., on February 13, 1832. He married Charlotte Gallagher of Galena, with whom he reared five children. At the age of 30, he enlisted in the 96th Illinois Infantry, and was later elected as Captain and commissioned Major. By 1865, Smith had advanced to full ranking.

Besides his title of General, Smith wore many hats throughout his lifetime, including state treasurer and lieutenant governor of Illinois. He was also a Mason.

Smith helped to build the Galena United Methodist Church and the Galena Post Office.

Smith died in Chicago on December 31, 1910, and he was buried in Galena's Greenwood Cemetery.

Ritterbusch emphasized the significance of Smith and the other eight generals in Galena.

"The generals make Galena a memorable trip. It is such an oddity for a town of our size to produce this many generals. All the generals did it on their own merits."

He continued, "The focus of the group has broadened over the last 20 years, so now we attend everything from parades to high profile

events, funerals, performances and dinners. . . Parades are always nice and to hear the roar of the crowd is awesome."

Ritterbusch's favorite event is the Boy Scout Parade. The generals walk down Main Street and engage in conversation with scouts lining the parade route.

"When a kid comes up to you and says, 'You are my favorite general' it is so awesome," he said

During Boy Scout Parade weekend, generals are stationed around downtown Galena. Each general gives a presentation at their station and encourages conversation about Galena's rich history.

In addition to the Boy Scout parade, the generals have also marched in the Galena St. Patrick's Day parade and county 4th of July parades. The group has even unveiled two sculptures this year.

While portraying Smith over the years, Ritterbusch has had the opportunity to attend one-

of-a-kind events.

He recalls attending the annual meeting of Lincoln portrayers. ". . . there were 75 Lincolns in attendance, and you just don't get to experience something like that as an average citizen. Galena Generals have allowed me to have these unique experiences."

Ritterbusch is grateful to represent a man of Smith's capacity.

"What I love is that we are always highly respected and people are nice to us wherever we go," he said.

Prior to the Galena Generals, not many people knew who Smith was.

Ritterbusch said, "How people understand (Smith's) entire life has changed. That wouldn't have been possible without what the Galena Generals are doing for these men. Portraying Smith has been very special to me and has added a lot of enjoyment in my life," Ritterbusch concluded.



Parker, Chief of the Six Nations of Northern New York, who in the great Civil war 1861-5 became a Brig. General, and Military Secretary to General U.S. Grant. It is made of cherry, the same wood as used for interior finish of building."

Displayed alongside the letter are an upholstered Victorian chair and footstool thought to be made by John Corson Smith; the framed record of service of John Corson Smith; a 2-piece cherry wood secretary and miscellaneous books and photographs.

Galena Center For The Arts







The Galena Center for the Arts was founded in 2013 as part of the community development initiative in Galena's 2020 vision study. Since its 2014 opening, the works of over 200 artists have been displayed at the center, an Illinois not-for-profit organization aimed at cultivating the arts in Galena and Jo Daviess County.

Art exhibits, performances and workshops take place at Galena Center for the Arts, located at 219 Summit St, Galena. The gallery hours are 11 am - 4 pm Thursday through Sunday. For a full list of events, visit galenacenterforthearts.com or call 774-214-0261.

A goal of the Galena Center for the Arts is to highlight and showcase high-quality local art and artists and make art accessible to all in the rural area as well as tourists. The center also serves local children who attend educational art workshops.

Over 25 major exhibits have been showcased, each for

two months, ranging from photography to ceramics, pottery, wood-carving, sculpture, textiles, paintings and needlework.

In addition to the gallery, the Galena Center for the Arts offers an art resource lending library, a young people's art space, a recently expanded gallery gift shop and rental art studios. The young people's art space features an animal mural painted by Girl Scouts, as well as art supplies for children to create their own artwork.

Studios may be rented by the month for working artists. Specific studio space has been dedicated to the Alfie Mueller Historic Photo Collection, as well to a space dedicated to featuring art movies or area schools artwork. A feature gallery has also been created for local art collections.

Downstairs in the Galena Center for the Arts is a performance space offering live entertainment including Sunday Salons, Songwriters Showcases and live radio shows. Weekly yoga classes and live drawing workshops with models are held downstairs as well.

Introduced in January 2017, live drawing workshops have become a very popular activity for locals and visitors. Anyone interested must provide their own drawing materials. The cost is \$10 per session and drop-in artists are welcome.

"The arts are such an integral part of life, and they can benefit anyone, whether you're rich or poor, educated or uneducated. The center offers all types of things for all ages."



In addition to drawing workshops, the center holds an embroidery circle once a week for anyone to come and enjoy social time with area embroiderists and work on their projects. There is no cost and anyone interested must bring their own supplies or whatever they want to work on.

In September, the center will hold a new showcase, Art that Stands Out in its Field: Scarecrows. Anyone can create their own scarecrow for display outside in the field behind the center or around town.

Future plans for the center include an expansion for a theatre and the use of the surrounding acres of land as a prairie sculpture garden. The theatre will be located on a parcel of 6.7 acres on the south side of the property that has previously been used as parking. The prairie sculpture garden will be created around the building to connect visitors to art and the natural world. Additionally, the center is working to reach a greater audience by moving art out of the building and into the public.

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Richard Hess POTTERY

Though Richard Hess has been working with clay for over 30 years, he did not pursue his passion of pottery full-time until age 50.

During his undergraduate studies at Alfred University, Hess developed an interest in ceramics. He was particularly intrigued by the students who "wore" clay on their jeans. After college, Hess moved to Greenwich Village, New York, where he took private pottery classes every week.

"I just loved clay, and I gradually drifted to building with slabs," Hess added.

Instead of pursuing his passion full-time, Hess attended graduate school and taught history. At age 40, Hess decided he needed to work with his hands, so he became a carpenter.


He said, "At a young age, I had an affinity for clay, but I didn't think I could make a living out of it, so I pursued carpentry instead."

Hess knew he needed more creativity than carpentry could provide, and he did not like working with metal or wood, so pottery seemed to be the perfect occupation for him.

"Clay has so many possibilities and it has a forgiving nature. You can never mess up with clay," he said.

At age 50, Hess pursued his true passion. He moved to Ithaca, New York, and revisited working with clay. During his time in Ithaca, he worked as a custodian at Cornell University to support his day job as a potter.

Hess participated in various art shows throughout the Northeast, which allowed him to eventually give up the night work and focus on clay full-time. Hess started to believe he could make a living making products by hand.









"After pursuing things other than clay for so long, I realized you can make a living doing anything. You can make it work if you want it." Hess said.

Four years ago, Hess and his wife, Elizabeth Boggess, decided to relocate. They researched cities across the country, and landed on Galena because it was a beautiful and friendly town.

Hess said, "I am finding the beauty of the area to be a new inspiration for my pottery."

Since moving to Galena, Hess has contributed greatly to the local artist scene.

Carole Sullivan, Galena Center for the Arts executive director, said, "Richard has donated a great amount of time and effort here at the center and in Galena. He has become a big part of the arts in this community."

Hess organizes volunteers for Galena Center for the Arts.

He added, "The Center for the Arts is great. It makes the town a different place, a place full of the arts."

At his Galena studio, located at 519 4th St, Hess makes hand-made clay paint brushes, houses, fish, bags and horses.

Hess said, "I needed to create something different. By attending clay workshops and art fairs, I developed a method for making special clay horses."

Hess knew nothing about horses prior to constructing them. He believed it would be a challenge, both technically and conceptually, to capture the essence of horses.

Paintbrushes and other smaller clay pieces are created in an extruder, where long tubes of clay are cut and shaped by hand.

"Throwing on a wheel is very disciplined, and I am not very disciplined, which is why I work with slabs and hand-shape my pieces," Hess said.

He continued, "Slab construction (gives) me the whole approach of being creative, it (does not) force me to do anything."

He added, "I haven't seen anyone else who makes what I do." Though he is best known for his stylized horses, Hess still enjoys

designing and working with other forms.

Hess said, "I am also producing unique, handcrafted funerary urns. The urns are both decorative and functional and come in a variety of sizes and finishes."

All of his clay creations are constructed from slabs of clay and bisque fired. The clay's surface is then treated in a variety of ways, from horsehair to Raku.

"My work is hand-built, slab constructed and characterized by alternative firing techniques," Hess said.

The horsehair effect is produced by firing clay at 1,200 degrees fahrenheit and then applying horsehair on the hot surface to carbonize the hair onto the clay and create black lines that resemble marble.

In Raku firing, glaze is applied to the surface of clay and it is fired twice. During the second firing, the clay is taken out of the kiln and placed into a container of newspaper or straw. These materials burst into flames, and a lid is placed over the container to stop oxygen from flowing, which creates a crackle effect or iridescent surface.

"I love the forgiving nature of hand-building and the adventure of alternative firings, but the unique and distinctive results of raku firing are the most exciting to me." Hess said.

Ever since his starring role as servant to the king in Galena Art Theatre's 1961 production of "Puss in Boots," Mark Haman has been in love with the stage.



Haman is a seasoned veteran of the Galena theatre scene, boasting a long list of stage credits including everything from historical fiction and cemetery walks, to Shakespeare and melodramas.

"I got roped into playing a bit part when I was in fifth grade. The Galena Art Theater did productions at Turner Hall and they did a show of 'Puss in Boots,' which was a play written by a Galena writer and poet named Rowena Bennett. And our next door neighbor played Puss and she was going to make her son be the servant to the king, but he backed out, and I got roped into doing it. I think I had two or three lines."

Originally from Montana, Haman and his family moved to Galena when he was 3 years old. After his theatrical debut in fifth grade, he started becoming involved in grade school theatre. When he got to high school, however, Haman had already established himself in the community, and spent most of his time working with the Galena Art Theatre, occasionally helping out with the Galena High School productions as well.

Once he graduated from Galena High School, Haman enrolled at the University

of Wisconsin-Platteville (UWP) where he began to further his theatre education. There, he stumbled into many diverse and non-traditional roles.

"I played a role that was created for me when they did the 'Comedy of Errors.' The first three or four pages of 'Comedy of Errors' is exposition. (The narrator) is telling this whole story about how the ship wrecked and everybody got mixed up, and he's relating this to the Duke. And just so that there weren't two actors standing on stage rapping this off—the tech director was actually the director of this show and he had me play the Mad Barber who was giving the Duke his morning shave. They just played it to blah blah and it was all throw away lines because nobody could listen to four pages of exposition. So I came out and we used a lot of anachronisms, had a little green rubber hammer, and I came out with kind of a clown wig—I had hair then—looked like Bozo the clown and I had stuck little pieces of toilet paper with red dots all over like I had shaved myself and cut myself like nine times. That was a lot of fun, no lines, just kind of mugging for the audience."

While at UWP, Haman discovered his knack for playing unconventional roles. In "King Lear," another Shakespeare, Haman played the Fool—a part for which he designed and made his own "foolish" blue denim hat.

After partying too hard and getting on academic probation his first year, Haman transferred to Western Illinois University before eventually transferring back to UWP where he completed his education and gradu-

ated with a bachelor of science in speech/communication with an emphasis in theatre. While a lot of his time was spent on stage, in college Haman found that his true passion was in technical theatre.

"Being a theatre major at Platteville there were classes in tech theatre. Take a lighting class or set design, set construction. And that just kinda went hand in hand. The old adage is 'Doesn't hurt to have some technical skills because there's more jobs backstage than there are on stage.' And that's pretty much where I cut my teeth on that. I never really got much into lighting. As part of a makeup class I learned a little bit of makeup from a guy who was

a hold over from Vaudeville, I mean he had mimeographed sheets of how to do these stock characters for Vaudeville. It was pretty old school. Makeup is my least favorite aspect of theatre. And the irony is that when we'd do stuff at Turner Hall, people would come to me to help them with their makeup."

After graduation, Haman put his newly acquired technical theatre skills to work, scor-

ing a job with a local builder at the lumber yard in Platteville. He worked in Platteville for a while, then moved to Galena for another carpentry job. While working in carpentry, Haman found it difficult to juggle both work and theatre, and had to give it up for a while.

But Haman couldn't stay away for long, and eventually became one of the first men to allowed to perform theatre at (the formerly all-girls/newly co-ed) Clarke College in Dubuque, Iowa. Soon after, Haman began his foray into Galena-centric historical fiction.

Haman has inhabited many famous figures from Galena's past, including Gen. Augustus Chetlain in Galena's cemetery walk and Thomas Nast in "Peace In Union." He said that the traditions of Galena inspire some great theatre, and that some of his most cherished moments have come from re-enactments.

"I enjoyed playing John Turney, the first attorney here. I had initially done it as a special presentation for friends of the museum. They had a big soiree for him down at the Turney House. They had a big tent rented and put out on the lawn down there and they fed them fancy desserts and what not. And I came out and did my spiel as John Turney, who

was a southerner. And my changing room was on the third floor of the Turney House. Well, the house was open to the people that were there because it was an event. And I was miked for it. In any case, I went upstairs and took a break and a couple of guys came and started coming up the steps. And I still had my mic on, I didn't know it, and fortunately I happened to say, in character 'I'm sorry, you—these are my private quarters you cannot be up here!""

From Benedict in "Much Ado About Nothing," to Norman Thayer in "On Golden Pond," Haman has worn many hats in his career. He says that his fa-

vorite theatre memory occurred through his work at Turner Hall, and was a result of quick-thinking and audience participation.


"I played the villain in some nameless melodrama and rather than just have row on row of seats, they had card tables set up with red gingham tablecloth, some bowls of popcorn and people would sit around there. And of course (audience members) were encouraged to cheer the hero and boo the villain and catcalls and heckling and all that stuff. And there was this one woman who took those instructions to heart, and she was merciless. I mean as soon as I set foot on stage 'Boo you villain (hisses)!' So in the third act when it comes time to shoot


Old Farmer Brown, well I shoot him and I don't know what made me think of this, but I just turned out into the audience and I shot her. The whole place lost it, and she loved it more than anybody. And it was just one of those inspired moments. I didn't think 'Oh this is what I'm gonna do,' it just kinda happened. It was one of my favorite things."

Haman is retired now and lives in his childhood home

with his wife, Sheila. Haman said getting older makes it more difficult to memorize lines, but that doesn't stop him from doing what he loves.

"Sometimes I will stay away from it for two or three years and I'll say 'You know, it's time I did a show; I need to do a show.' My participation in the arts is through theatre, and that's an important part of my life. . .The process is fun—the rehearsal and all that. Even when I was in college, it wasn't 'let's have a good time' it was more like 'let's do a good job,' and that's where the good time comes in—doing a good job."







Marie's WOOD CARVING

hree years ago, Marie McDonough turned her hobby of carving into her livelihood. "I always thought that when I grew up, I would carve. At age 66, it's time I start growing up," McDonough said.

About 30 years ago, McDonough briefly studied painting and advertising design in college, but nothing seemed to stick. That was until she met master carver Kent Quesnell at an arts and crafts fair in

Dubuque, lowa. Quesnell taught McDonough the basics of carving, and she worked alongside him for a year.

Together, they carved a carousel for the governor of lowa.

Through the years, she set carving to the side as just a hobby in pursuit of another career. In 2016, McDonough returned to carving because she realized that it was about time to do what she really loved.

"I just love wood, and I couldn't wait any longer to pursue it full time!" She exclaimed.

She soon outgrew her workshop space on her deck at home and moved to a studio in the Galena Center for the Arts for a year.

The demand for her carvings was steadily increasing, and McDonough outgrew that studio.

In winter of 2017, McDonough found a larger space on Main Street in Stockton,









where she permanently planted her carving business, Marie's Wood Carving.

Since opening Marie's Wood Carving in February 2017, McDonough has been supported by her community. She said, "Stockton has been incredible and they have embraced me. This has been a great location for my business."

McDonough takes custom orders for wildlife and other natural things.

She said, "I love to learn more about animals and create pieces that tell a story."

Having grown up around a vibrant wildlife scene in Canada, she has always been passionate about animals and flowers. Some of her most popular wood creations include rose wine stoppers made out of a variety of hard woods, including pink ivory and purple hearts, as well as her natural fox scenes and Chirp and Tweet birds.

McDonough sees potential in every piece of wood and removes what doesn't belong to create her carvings.

"I haven't found anything that I can't carve yet." McDonough said.

She is willing to carve anything, unless it is a human or people's pets. McDonough has even carved cervical spine for her chiropractor.

"My mind doesn't stop with all the possibilities for wood. I get my best ideas for carvings at 2:30 a.m." She added.

Most of her carvings are mounted on natural bark, stumps or wood.

McDonough likes to keep her creations natural with a clear polish, and she uses realistic measurements for her animal carvings.

"I love those 'wow' moments when people are amazed by what I do, and realize the pieces I make are made out of wood," McDonough said.

Marie's Wood Carving also offers carving lessons for youth and adults.

"I love teaching kids," she said.

She continued, "I am trying to get more youth involved with wood because a majority of carvers are elderly men."

Learn the tools and techniques required to carve a comfort bird, or a project of your choice, in the 4 hour adult or youth beginners wood carving class.

Classes cost \$25 and all supplies for the carvings are included. Classes are the first full weekend of every month.

"Tourists get to make their own souvenir, and they leave with something that is truly a treasure," McDonough concluded.

leather lovers LOOK NO FURTHER



What began as a small tobacco shop in Dubuque, lowa, has since relocated and evolved into the leather capital of Jo Daviess County.

Union Leather, a family-run business dedicated to selling quality leather goods and accessories of all kinds, has been a fixture of downtown Galena since its opening in 1992.

"I'm a leather store, not (just) a biker store," Union Leather manager Don Andresen said. "I want little old ladies coming in and buying their bingo purses as well as biker clubs coming in and buying their jackets. Sometimes it makes an interesting mix of people. We got cute little coin purses and we got biker patches that [have] skulls."

Andresen is the son of John "Honest John" Andresen, the namesake of Honest John's Trading Post (est. 1982) also in downtown Galena. Several of downtown Galena's vendors, including Union Leather, Beyond The Horizon (est. 2008) and Fashion Emporium (est. 1989), are owned and operated under the Honest John's umbrella.

"It's me and my brother, my brother-in-law and my sister," Andresen said. "Husbands and wives work with each other. We're far enough apart that we all operate independently but we're all under the same mom and dad. Way too many chiefs, not enough indians."

For the most part, the Andresens plan on keeping the business in the family for as long as possible.

"I got nieces and nephews that need jobs too," Andresen said.

Every week, hoards of motorcyclists cruise through Galena, often stopping at Andresen's shop. Andresen believes that the biggest draw for bikers to come to Galena, is the ride.

"It's the texture of the terrain," Andresen said. "It's very beautiful scenery. During the leaf season, it's just spectacular views. People get tired of driving in a straight line on flat ground."


Unlike other small town retailers that got scared and had to adapt during the rise of the internet in the early 90s, Union Leather didn't even flinch.

"Leather is something tactile, you want to feel it," Andresen said. "When the internet started up, I wasn't sure if people were going to jump on that and buy all their leather stuff. I could show you five coats looking exactly the same way but there's five different types of leather. Leather is something you want to feel and touch and find out what the quality is, where you can't do that online."










All River Road Talent

After visiting Galena for 30 years, Chicago native Henry Matthiessen III permanently moved to Galena and opened a studio for his artwork. In 2013, Stoned Art Studio opened six and a half miles off of U.S. 20.

As a result of its location off the main road in Galena, Matthiessen III knew he needed a way to attract visitors. So, Matthiessen III applied marketing strategies he learned while working in the business and marketing department at McDonald's Corporation.

While working in Galena for a while, Matthiessen III found that there was no link between area artists. He wanted to synergize artists for exploration and expansion of the arts in Jo Daviess county and surrounding areas.

He contacted area artists to address ways in which the arts can be better publicized in Northwest Illinois.

Matthiessen III believed the creation of a not-for-profit art business would allow for artists to join together and publicize art tourism in Northwest Illinois.

Matthiessen III partnered with Amy Laskye

of Amy May Photography, and All River Road Talent (ARRT) was founded. ARRT consisted of a monthly self-guided artist drive, including tours of area studios and galleries, across Jo Daviess and Carroll counties. The tour was held the first weekend of every month.

The Monthly ARRT Drive provided visitors the "opportunity to encounter art from its inception to masterpiece at the artists' personal gallery."

To develop ARRT, Matthiessen III utilized a simplified business model. Specifically, Marhiessen III focused on sharing. "None of us is more than all of us," he said.

Due to the nature of the Monthly ARRT Drive map being released the first weekend of each month, artists were able to opt out certain months, depending on their availability. ARRT needed a new tactic for promoting more artists and art businesses available all year long.

While photographing landscape in California a couple of years ago, Matthiessen III was inspired by Carmel Valley Wine Tour, which focused on sharing local artisans.







Focused on sharing art with Northwest Illinois and the need for a year long artist tour, ARRT developed a new map to promote artists and artisan business that are open every day.

In 2016, the Northwest Illinois Scenic Art Loop map was launched with 31 artists and art businesses participating. The addition of art businesses included breweries, wineries and restaurants that display art.

"The purpose of the Scenic Art Loop is to see the artist, meet the artist, talk to the artist and touch the artist in you. And I think we have done just that." Matthiessen III said.

Ten thousand copies of the Northwest Illinois Scenic Art Loop map were printed and distributed in 2016 alone.

"Ultimately, ARRT puts the art in front of tourism and is an economic driver for artists that is also an individual, over-the-top experience for tourists," said Matthiessen III.

He continued, "The stops along the art loop are like chapters of a book. Tourists walk into a new world with each artisan."

In 2018, 45 artisans are featured along the Scenic Art Loop and 25,000 copies of the map will be distributed. This year's focus is on expe-

riencing the artisan culture at art studios, wineries, breweries and business promoting the arts.

Laskye explains the artisan experience. "The Scenic Art Loop leads people to discover new talented artists and creates a new experience for tourists at every stop along the way," she said.

Matthiessen added, "ARRT is the only vehicle in Northwest Illinois that makes awareness of the arts and artisans that are available."

Future plans include national and international marketing and recognition in order to reach a greater audience, as well as expansion of the Scenic Art Loop into WI and IA. Additional plans include finding and maintaining more artists with permanent studios for stops along the loop.

The 113 miles of artisans features paved roads that are great for motorcycles. All artists along the tour can be found on GPS and can ship their art.

Check out ARRT meetings the third Tuesday of every month. The informational meetings, discussing pricing and marketing in the art business, are open to all artisans.

Get up and close with the paintings, which feature a Native American in headdress, a "Welcome to Stockton" sunset and a blooming rose. Two of the murals even change every year. On various buildings downtown Stockton.





















Located on the eastern side of the Mississippi River, opposite of Dubuque, East Dubuque is a small picturesque community with breathtaking views. The city is connected to Dubuque, lowa, by the Julien Dubuque Bridge, one of the longest tied arch and cantilevered bridges ever built.

East Dubuque's history is quite an interesting one, featuring Hopewell Indians, railroad tycoons, ferryboat kings and even Al Capone. Stop at the East Dubuque District Library for artifacts on Sop-Ho-Kab, locally known as Indian Kate. She was a full-blooded Sauk who escaped the Battle of Bad Axe, a battle between the Sauk and Fox tribes and the Illinois militiamen.

Visitors can also walk in the footsteps of history while visiting Gramercy Park. The 10-acre city park is an Illinois Natural Heritage Landmark, and is home to 26 ceremonial and burial mounds from the Hopewell Native American Culture. It has views of the Mississippi River bluffs and Port of Dubuque (see photo above). Pack a picnic or plan to cook out on the charcoal grills. The area also offers walking trails, a playground and modern restroom facilities.

Visit the legendary Merry Building on Sinsinawa Avenue, which was once a popular stop for travelers who were making the trip across the Mississippi, but also served as a stop on the underground railroad. Take a stroll through East Dubuque's downtown, or "The Strip."

Many of the neighborhood bars and nightclubs located here are left from prohibition. During prohibition, many speakeasies, gambling halls and whiskey stills popped up throughout the area, and legend has it that Al Capone was involved.

STOCKTON

The eastern gateway to Jo Daviess County

Stockton is the youngest community in Jo Daviess County and was established as a result of the increased railroad traffic to the area. Established after the Minnesota Northwestern Railway, which later became the Chicago Great Western Railway, built a station in Stockton Township in 1886, Stockton's industry grew with the newly added transportation.

In 1914, the Kraft brothers opened their first cheese plant in Stockton. The location was perfectly situated in an area with an abundance of quality milk and easy access to transportation.

Stockton showcases panoramic views of the landscape. It can credit its sea level to the glaciers.

Galena Country is known as the driftless region, meaning the glaciers did not come through this area, flattening the hills. When the glaciers came to Stockton, they halted.

Stockton offers a variety of activities for all ages. Spend a day at the Memorial Park, where you can hit up three playgrounds and a pool all in one. Check out Kidstown, a fantastic wooden playground at the Stockton Elementary School.

Head downtown to enjoy some local shopping and local history. Looking to play a round of golf? Choose from two area 18-hole golf courses, Black Hawk Run and Woodbine Bend.

ELIZABETH

Breathtaking beauty and deep history

Nestled between Galena and Stockton, the drive to charming Elizabeth is a beautiful scenic tour and makes a perfect stop for the beginning, middle or end of your trip. The village of Elizabeth has something for everyone.

In the early 1800s, white settlers were drawn to the area as the lead mining rush began. They began a settlement, which resulted in the Black Hawk War of 1832. Native Sac and Fox warriors attacked the Apple River Fort, the battle lasted for about an hour.

Legend states that three women, all named Elizabeth, stood shoulder-to-shoulder with their husbands, assisting in successfully defending the fort. It was in their honor that the settlement was re-named Elizabeth.

History buffs and seekers of knowledge will delight in the Apple River Fort State Historic Site, a replica frontier fort modeled after its predecessor which was constructed quickly during the Black Hawk War.

There's also the Planetary Studies Foundation Earth and Space Science Museum, which features an array of artifacts including dinosaur bones, fossils, and moon rocks, and the Chicago Great Western Railway Depot Museum, which sources an extensive library and knowledgeable exhibits in a former Chicago Great Western Railway station.

Brush up on Elizabeth's history by visiting the Elizabeth History Museum, and explore the 1876 Banwarth House, filled with period furnishings.

Antique collectors will find a haven of treasures as they explore northwestern Illinois' largest antique mall, the Elizabeth Grand Antique Co. Set in an old school building, each room is full of special finds and gems.

While you have shopping on the mind, head to downtown Elizabeth, where you will find a collection of stores featuring clothing, art and even gourmet cupcakes!

A. THE GALENA TERRITORY, ILLINOIS

(9 miles E) was founded in 1973 by the Branigar Organization. The Galena Territory, which encompasses 6,800 acres, is home to Eagle Ridge Spa & Resort and numerous outdoor activities including Shenandoah Riding Center and Lake Galena and Marina. thegalenaterritory.com

B. APPLE RIVER, ILLINOIS

(21 miles NE) population 366, Apple River grew along with the Illinois Central Railroad in 1854. The town was known as a farming community and a shipping mecca for minerals. Three churches built in the 1870s–Methodist, Catholic and Presbyterian–still stand.

C. SCALES MOUND, ILLINOIS

(12 miles NE) population 378, Scales Mound was founded in 1853. Just west of town on Stagecoach Trail is the famous "Jesus Saves" rock. Ninety percent of the town is on the National Register of Historic Places. scalesmound.com

D. WARREN, ILLINOIS

(27 miles NE) population 1,600, grew with the arrival of the Illinois Central Railroad. Alexander Burnett and Freeman Tisdel founded Warren in 1853 and named it after the first son of Captain Burnett. The Pumpkin Festival is the last full weekend of September. Take in the community's historic downtown. villageofwarren.com

E. APPLE CANYON LAKE, ILLINOIS

(18 miles E) was developed in 1969 by the Branigar Organization. The dam, which created the lake, was constructed in 1975. Activities include water sports, camping and golfing. applecanyonlake.org

F. HAZEL GREEN, WISCONSIN

(13 miles NE) population 1,200, was the first permanent settlement in Wisconsin in 1825 and is part of the region's mining heritage. In 1831, Lucias Lyon began surveying two miles south of Hazel Green. This "Point of Beginning" is the basis for all descriptions on all property deeds in Wisconsin. This "Point of Beginning" is featured on a historical marker just south of the community. villageofhazelgreen.org

G. SAVANNA, ILLINOIS

(32 miles S) population 3,000, is best known for the Army Depot. The depot, established in 1918, was used for several munitions-related purposes, including manufacturing, testing and storing of different types of weapons. The site's military use was gradually phased out and the depot closed in March 2000. It is now the Lost Mound Unit of the Upper Mississippi River Wildlife Refuge. Visit Palisades State Park and the Great Mississippi River Bike Trail. savanna-il.gov

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H. SHULLSBURG, WISCONSIN

(19 miles NE) population 1,200, home of Shullsburg Creamery, is the third oldest community in Wisconsin with roots in the mining and trapping industries. The last mines were closed in the 1970s, but the Badger Mine & Museum keep the history alive. A visit to Gravity Hill is also a must. Today, Shullsburg features a restored downtown on the National Register. experienceshullsburg.com

I. CUBA CITY, WISCONSIN

(22 miles NW) is known as the City of Presidents. Drive through this community of 2,012 and you can't help but see shields lining its Main Street honoring each of our presidents. Also lining the Main Street are a number of local businesses. The first name of the community was Yuba, but was later changed to Cuba and then Cuba City. cubacity.org

J. NEW DIGGINGS, WISCONSIN

(12 miles N) provides a look back at another day and age. St. Augustine Church was founded by Father Samuel Mazzuchelli in 1835 and built in 1844. He opened a school which was staffed by the Sinsinawa Dominican Sisters. The church has been restored by the local Knights of Columbus. New Diggings also boasts two well-preserved bars.

K. POTOSI, WISCONSIN

(33 miles NW) population 685, is along the Great River Road and within a "stone's throw" of the Mississippi River. Potosi is also home to the Potosi Brewery, first established in 1852, as well as a brewery museum, transportation museum and interpretive center. potosiwisconsin.com

L. SINSINAWA, WISCONSIN

(12 miles NW) Sinsinawa is an unincorporated community one mile north of the border with Illinois, just north of Menominee. The town is known for being the mother house of the Sinsinawa Dominican Sisters, founded by Father Samuel Mazzuchelli. Sinsinawa Mound hosts numerous events throughout the year and runs a bookstore and art gallery which is open to the public. sinsinawa.org

M. PLATTEVILLE, WISCONSIN

(25 miles N) population 11,244, surrounded by rolling topography, the area around Platteville hosts some of the most breathtaking sights in the state. Besides being home to a University of Wisconsin campus, Platteville also offers recreational opportunities like fly fishing the Platte and Grant rivers. On the side of Platte Mound stands a large letter "M" that symbolizes the university's mining history.

N. DUBUQUE, IOWA


(16 miles NW) population 58,000, Dubuque is lowa's oldest city and is among the oldest settlements west of the Mississippi River. The first permanent settler to the area was French-Canadian fur trader Julien Dubuque in 1785. Today it is known for its casinos, the Mississippi Riverwalk and the National Mississippi River Museum and Aquarium. Eagle Point Park provides a panoramic view of Lock and Dam 11 and the Mississippi River valley. traveldubuque.com


O. BELLEVUE, IOWA

(77 miles NW) population 5,911, is located along the Mississippi River, and has a wide array of natural beauty, a history dating back many centuries, events all year around, and businesses, shops and attractions. Referred to as Wisconsin's second oldest city, Prairie du Chien was established by French voyageurs in the late 17th century, prairieduchien.org








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Just down the road from Elizabeth, Hanover is home to local businesses as well as multiple nature preserves, preserving the full history and beautiful land of the area.

Wapello Land & Water Reserve, named after a Fox and Sac Indian chief of the area, boasts premiere prairie restoration and is also the site where the University of Illinois excavated significant artifacts in 2003. It is a part of the Jo Daviess Conservation Foundation (JDCF), and you can find more information reserve by turning to pages 39-40.

The Apple River runs through the center of Hanover and plays an important role in the economic history of the town. In the early 1820s, settlers came to farm the area and found that a natural drop in the Apple River made an ideal location for a mill and dam site. The first mill was built in 1829 by James Craig. This later lead to the Hanover Woolen Mill in 1863, which operated for 86 years.

Hanover is the Mallard Capital of the World, being home to Whistling Wings duck hatchery. In September they celebrate their title with Mallardfest, a weekend of events including a farmer's market, parade, local vendors, inflatable obstacle course, live music, a duck-calling contest and fireworks.

Hanover is also home to two award-winning vineyards, Rocky Waters Vineyard & Winery and Fergedaboudit Vineyard & Winery. Both produce a variety of wines with locally Illinois-grown grapes, and offer a beautiful setting for visitors to enjoy.

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Green Galena

Galena boasts several environmentally responsible businesses





especting the earth and encouraging sustainable activity are only part of the city of Galena's quest to go green. You can join the green movement by making an eco-friendly decision on your lodging during your stay in Galena.

In 2016, a committee called Green Designation was formed to research and create programs that would enhance the area's reputation for being environmentally responsible.

This pilot program offered money-saving techniques to business owners, a marketing tool for the city and individual lodging properties and allowed more businesses to take responsibility for the health of the Earth. The pilot program was offered to Galena lodging properties, but it expanded into the greater Galena area.

The first program launched through the Green Designation Committee required lodging properties to complete an application of criteria including environmental conscious decisions to reduce waste and improve efficiencies. Upon meeting the requirements, the lodging property was eligible for a green designation with TripAdvisor.

So far, nine Galena hotels and bed and breakfasts have earned their green designation and an additional four properties have applications that need more work to achieve designation.

The properties with a green designation include Aldrich Guest House, Augustus Chetlain Home & Log Cabin Guest House, Country Inn & Suites Galena, Belle Aire Mansion Guest House, Farmers Guest House, Hawk Valley Retreat and Cottages, Jail Hill Inn, Ramada Galena and Alice's Snyder House Bed & Breakfast.

In addition to lodging, local businesses have been joining the green movement. The welcome center is replacing fluorescent bulbs with LEDs, recycling paper and break room waste and using shredded paper, rather than plastic nesting for shipping.

Servers at Galena Brewing Company ask customers if they want water, ice or a straw, rather than automatically providing them. The brewery also has three electric car chargers, motion sensors on lights and fabric bags in their gift shop.

This is just the beginning of an eco-friendly Galena. The Green Designation program is currently working to include educational opportunities and materials for properties to use in their own marketing campaigns and, eventually, the program will be tailored to fit other businesses in the Galena area.
