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
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


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26TH ANNUAL GALENA CEMETERY WALK







JUNE 8, 9 & 14

Visit Galenians of the past as you step into Old City Cemetery to hear their captivating stories during the Cemetery Walk.

Step back into Galena's rich past as you watch former residents recount their captivating stories during Galena-Jo Daviess County HIstorical Society's 26th annual Cemetery Walk. Ronn Toebaas, Galena writer and director of the walks, describes these guided tours as live theatrical performances that allow

you to celebrate and experience a piece of Galena's history. More than 10 local performers

More than 10 local performers will share the life stories of past Galenians, connecting them with the history of Galena. This year, the walk's theme is old settlers of Galena. It will feature the lives of several Galenians, including Hezekiah Gear, an earlier miner, James Griffeth, an Irish Stagecoach driver, and Cholera victims, just to name a few.

The outdoor performances will

be held at Old City Cemetery, located on Dodge Street in Galena, on Saturday, June 8 at 2-4 pm and Sunday, June 9 at 2-4 pm. On June 14 at 7 pm, there will also be an indoor, seated performance at Grace Episcopal Church, located at 309 Hill St, Galena. Visit galenahistory.org or call 815-777-9131.

Ronn Toebaas, director of the Cemetery Walk

What is new about this year's walk?

"It's exciting to go to the new location (at Old City Cemetery) with all the work and updates done to the cemetery. I'm amazed at all of the talent in this area, and I'm looking forward to new talent this year and working with all of them."

What do you enjoy about writing the cemetery walk performances?

"It's amazing to discover these people that were Galenians and the great stories of courage, such as a mother losing four of her six children, all before the age of 10 and how the family endured that. There's also phenomenal success stories of miners and businesses."

Why do you think people are attracted to this?

"I think people are intrigued by the concept and that there are stories behind every stone. . . and the talent. We've had a very loyal following of over 300 people."

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GREAT GALENA BALLOON RACE JUNE 21-23

Enjoy a rainbow of glowing hot air balloons, live entertainment, food and the rolling hills of Jo Daviess County with your family and friends at the Great Galena Balloon Race.

Co-organizer Eric Dregne shares everything you need to know about the 17th annual Great Galena Balloon Race. The three-day fundraiser supports the Juvenile Diabetes



Research Foundation and Camp Hertko Hollow, a summer camp for children with diabetes.

Visitors can partake in tethered hot air balloon rides, wine tasting, great food and live mu-

sic at the Eagle Ridge Resort and Spa. For kids, there will be a blow-up bounce house and obstacle course. The festivities kick off on Friday and Saturday at 5 pm, and both nights, there will be a balloon glow at dusk.

What is special about this event?

"It's a really great familyoriented event. The balloon glow is cool, and there is no other event similar in the area. It's the biggest summer event in Galena with about 3,000-4,000 people in attendance each night."

How has the balloon race grown over the past 17 years?

"The balloon race started with only a half dozen balloons, and now we have 18-20 racing each night. There's also the Ale Fest on Friday and Wine Flight, wine tasting, on Saturday. "

What is rewarding about this fundraiser?

"Hearing positive messages from children we've supported through this fundraiser makes this rewarding for me. We have raised over \$200,000 for JDRF and Hertko Hollow in the past 17 years."

What are you most excited to do each year?







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FARMERS' MARKETS IN GALENA



G oing to a farmers' markets can be a little overwhelming. There are copious offerings of fruits and vegetables so fresh that they are still covered in dirt, music, lots of people and arts and crafts. For all you farmers' market first-timers, look at these tips for buying the best fresh produce at Jo Daviess area markets this spring and summer.



WHY SHOULD YOU BUY AT MARKETS?

Because you can buy fresh produce from the farmers directly, they are often cheaper. The middlemen are cut out of the equation, eliminating most of the labor and transportation costs.

WHAT YOU SHOULD BRING TO THE MARKET

> Reusable bags for fresh produce and crafts. It's great for the environment.

> Cash/change because that is the only money most markets accept.

> A cooler if you are planning on purchasing dairy or meat and have a long distance to drive.



WHAT YOU SHOULD ASK SELLERS

> What is this? Farmers may sell produce you are unfamiliar with. They can provide insight about how they grow their products and how you should store them.

> What is the freshest produce for this season? They will tell you what to look for in fresh produce.

> What kind of pest control measures do you use? Do you spray all year or at the beginning of the season, or only as needed?

> What variety of crops do you grow? Ask your farmer about what produce they grow throughout the year and their crop rotation methods, as an indication of whether they support soil fertility. Crop rotation allows the soil to rest and replenish.


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
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GALENA RIVER TRAIL

Wind through beautiful remote areas of the Driftless Area on the Galena River Trail

inding through remote areas of Galena alongside the railroad track and the backwaters of the Mississippi River, the Galena River Trail offers over nine miles of scenic walking, jogging, hiking and biking.

You can also partake in activities such as bird watching, geocaching, fishing, kayaking or canoeing on or around the trail, all free of charge. The 3.4-mile Galena Junction Trail segment is the original trail. Originating from Depot Park just below the U.S. 20 bridge, the forested trail winds south to Galena Junction and the backwaters of the Mississippi River. At the junction, trains pass close by the trail.

Interpretive signs detailing the history and wildlife of the area are located at various locations along all of the trails. The Galena Junction Trail also offers some of the best bird watching in the region. There are 60 species of birds already identified.

Capture the natural beauty of Galena in various locations along the trails. The downtown trail covers a half mile from the Meeker Street bridge to

the trailhead at Depot Park, while the Buehler Trail covers 1.4 miles from the trailhead to the Buehler Preserve.

Along the Muchow Park Trail and Depot Park, donated fitness equipment lines the sides of the river trail. The fitness equipment is designed to target a variety of muscle groups, allowing users to incorporate interval training into their workouts.

Another trail to enjoy is the Recreation Park Trail that covers 1 mile from the trailhead to Recreation Park.

Recently, 2.1 miles from Galena Junction to South River Road in Aiken, near Chestnut Moun-




tain Resort and Blanding Campground, opened. Along the new trail, new access points to Casper Bluff Land and Water Reserve are offered.

The new leg of the Galena River Trail offers access to Native American burial grounds and effigies at Casper Bluff.

Now, the distance from the U.S. 20 bridge to Aiken is 5.5 miles one way.

Free parking is available at several trail entry areas, including under the U.S. 20 bridge, Meeker Street at Field Street, Recreation Park and South River Road.

The course features many elevated tees, undulating greens



Jo Daviess Conservation Foundation preserves over 5,000 acres of land in the Driftless Area for the lasting wellbeing of people and wildlife. Jo Daviess Conservation Foundation (JDCF) is on a mission "to preserve land for the lasting well-being of people and wildlife."

For over 20 years, JDCF has stood as one of the leading conservation organizations in the state of Illinois. Cultivated by the generosity of local donors, likeminded groups and the time of many volunteers, JDCF has raised millions of dollars in order to purchase and protect over 5,000 acres of environmentally, as well as culturally, sensitive lands.

Steve Barg, director of JDCF, says the non-profit's commitment to preserving the land is not only for the well-being of natural wildlife, but also for the indigenous tribes that once lived on the land is what distinguishes JDCF from other land conservation foundations across the nation.

Chloris Lowe, Jr., a former president of the Ho-Chunk Nation, agrees and applauds JDCF for acting intentionally on conserving the memory of those forcibly moved from their home, as indigenous people called North American land home before it was considered the United States, and they still do today.

"The commitment I have seen JDCF demonstrate to letting Native Americans have a seat at the table is what keeps me tied to JDCF," said Lowe, who has worked with organizations across the nation.

For over 12,000 years, people have lived, worked and played on the grounds that are now a part of Jo Daviess County. Long before the JDCF properties, such as the Buehler Preserve, Casper Bluff Land and Water Reserve, Galena Gateway Park, Horseshoe Mound Preserve, Portage Preserve, Schurmeier Teaching Forest, Wapello Land and Water Reserve, and Valley of Eden Bird Sanctuary, were owned by the Jo Daviess Conservation Foundation, the land belonged to the Ho-Chunk and the Sac and Fox Nations between A.D. 700 and A.D. 1000.

Functioning then as ceremonial and gathering areas for celebration and social events, such as births, weddings and funerals, the landmarks, today, they continue to serve as gathering places for the public.

Encompassing 851 acres that are open to the public for free outdoor experiences, the seven public preserves are frequently admired for their beauty, significant burial mounds, as well as their archaeological significance.

"It is a dynamic, rich intersection of nature and culture," Barg said.

Barg says he has been intentional about avoiding transactional sentiments with members of Native American tribes. He values developing relationships, as there is so much necessary dialogue to be expressed after centuries of promises made and broken.

In addition to having met with Chloris Lowe and John Greendeer, both of the Ho Chunk Nation, JDCF has made already made some steps toward restorative justice at the recommendation of the native tribes, including the decision to move trails away from the burial mounds, as well as halt the mowing of mounds at JDCF sites. Soak in the breathtaking sights and rich history of prairies, forests and effigy mounds at Jo Daviess Conservation Foundation sites.







Casper Bluff Land and Water Reserve

Casper Bluff Land and Water Reserve offers rich Native American history on its 100-acre site of prairies, savannas and effigy mounds. Breathtaking views of the Mississippi River, Iowa and Illinois can be seen from dawn until dusk at Casper Bluff. There are 51 burial mounds indicating that the area served as ceremonial grounds for the Late Woodland Indians. On the property, visitors will also find the last known intact Thunderbird Effigy Mound in the state.

Galena Gateway Park

9300 W Powder House Hill Rd, Galena

Visit one of Illinois' most scenic views, overlooking downtown Galena and surrounding mounds. Galena Gateway Park includes natural prairies with an always-changing population of wild flowers and woodlands. There are mowed and gravel paths for hiking, running, mountain biking, bird watching and picnicking.

Horseshoe Mound Preserve

1679 N Blackiack Rd, Galena

Located at the eastern gateway to the historic city of Galena, the 40acre Horseshoe Mound features a central gathering area with a stone compass, viewing scopes, hiking trails and scenic outlooks with a 40mile view including parts of Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin and the Mississippi River, making Horseshoe the perfect place to watch the sunset.

Wapello Land & Water Reserve

8642 Illinois 84 South, Hanover

Named after the original name of Hanover and the chief of the Fox Indians, Wapello is located just south of Hanover. Referred to as the

"John Chapman Archaeological Site" by the National Register of Historic Places, Wapello was the meeting point of two Native American cultures, the northern Woodland and southern Mississippian Native American tribes. Walking trails, featuring effigy mounds and barred villages, are equipped with interpretive signage.

Valley Of Eden Bird Sanctuary

5559 E Rush Creek Rd, Stockton

Explore 109 acres of prairie, forest and grassland at the only bird sanctuary in the county, which offers a peaceful environment to watch the sun set. It features six miles of walking trails and two observation decks for bird watching. So far, over 120 species of birds have been identified on site.

Buehler Preserve

102 Jefferson St, Galena

The eastern portion of Buehler Preserve contains a hilly woodland; the western portion, a flood plain that offers water filtration, a prairie restoration and open space values in close proximity to the city of Galena. The Galena River Trail, open for bikers, dog-walkers and hikers, extends from the Meeker Street footbridge.

Schurmeier Teaching Forest

147 E Reusch Rd, Elizabeth

In memory of their parents, Jerry and Jon Schurmeier donated 52 acres of land to JDCF in 1994. With the help of the Northwest Illinois Forestry Association and a grant from the Illinois Council on Forestry Development, the Schurmeier Teaching Forest was created on the 11 westernmost acres of the property. This is the only teaching forest in Illinois. The site consists of rugged hillside that is entirely wooded.





Exhibits. Classes. Workshops. Performances. Events.

For the past five years, the Galena Center for the Arts has been a focal point in the community, striving to elevate and celebrate regional arts and artists by offering high-quality art in an atmosphere and presentation expected of larger institutes and theaters. The not-for-profit organization has welcomed over 15,000 guests to the center and has shown the work of over 130 exhibiting artists since it started in 2013.

By highlighting regional artists, alongside innovative and diverse programming, the Galena Center for the Arts strives to make the arts accessible to our rural area as well as showcase our best regional talent in a professional art setting for our considerable visitor population.

Exhibits

The center features a special exhibits gallery, a feature artists gallery, pop-up gallery and regional artists' gallery, with the work presented in those galleries changing on a regular basis. Opening receptions are held for the exhibits in the special exhibits gallery.

The Alfie Mueller Historic Collection of photographs of Galena and Jo Daviess County is in a two-room gallery and video-viewing room. Images change seasonally.

Classes/workshops

Maybe you feel like yoga. Or perhaps you'd rather try your hand at embroidery or figure drawing. The Galena Center for the Arts has a variety of specialized classes and workshops. Many are led by professionals and are suitable to all ages and levels.



The center houses nine studios as business incubators for artists as well.

Performances

The Galena Center for the Arts hosts highquality performances including theatrical productions, film viewing opportunities, educational presentations and music events, many of them featuring the talents of local residents.

The center offers a monthly table reading series and songwriters showcase. Each spring and fall, radio shows draw crowds to the lower level theater space.

There is ample parking available and the center is accessible to individuals with disabilities.

Located at 219 Summit St, Galena, the Center for the Arts is open Thursdays-Sundays. In the spring and summer (after May 10) hours are 11 am-4 pm. During the winter months, hours are 1-4 pm.

rom 'tube talking' for the Blue Man Group, to providing voiceover for one of the most popular video game franchises of all-time, Michael Crawford's acting resume is as impressive

as it is unconventional.

Raised in Connecticut, Crawford began his acting career in the third grade. "My third grade teacher was the director for the school plays and she was like 'You should try out for it," Crawford said. "I don't know why...maybe I acted up too much, maybe I had too much energy and she saw something. She supported me through all of grade school and then I got to high school and I did all the school musicals there. From time to time I'd do community theatre."

Crawford got his first professional acting gig in the eighth grade, when he was cast as John in the Candlewood Playhouse's production of "Peter Pan." His commitment to theatre didn't end there.

"I played the son of Macduff in 'Macbeth,' also when I was in eighth grade," Crawford said. "I missed my eighth grade graduation because I was out in the middle of a field doing Shakespeare."

Following high school, Crawford decided to further his education at Western Illinois University, studying theatre. While at WIU, Crawford was heavily involved in the theatre scene, starring in several productions, including: Charles Guiteau in the musical "Assassins," Friar Francis in Shakespeare's "Much Ado About Nothing," Curley in John Steinbeck's "Of Mice and Men" and Virgil in William Inge's "Bus Stop."

Crawford also played R. M. Renfield in WIU's production of "Dracula," for which he was nominated for an American College Theater Festival award.

After graduating from WIU, Crawford moved to Chicago. "I never really thought of it like I would make a career out of (acting)," Crawford said, "but I definitely thought I would do acting when I got in Chicago."

In a wild turn of events, what began as a simple temp job repairing broken Ataris for Midway Games, would soon lead to the opportunity of a lifetime.

"It used to be Williams, Bally, Atari and Midway were all the same company and I worked in the parts sales department, replacing joysticks and pinball flippers and stuff like that. And then that division closed and then I got swapped over to Midway's creative media. Then one day, (Mortal Kombat's original designer) John Vogel actually came in and said 'Hey would you be willing to do voiceover work for us?' and I was like 'Yeah, that'd be great.' I jumped at the chance."

"I was the voice of Shang Tsung in a couple of

'Mortal Kombat' games," Crawford said. "That was a lot of fun because I was a huge 'Mortal Kombat' fan since the first one and then to move to Chicago and then through a temp agency to get a job with Midway's sister company and then get a job with Midway and then ultimately be in the game was unbelievably cool."

In addition to lending his voice to one of Mortal Kombat's most infamous villains, Crawford also voiced Shujinko in several "MK" installments. Getting to breathe life into these fixtures of a beloved video game franchise has been one of Crawford's proudest accomplishments. While working for Midway in Chicago, Crawford also picked up another quasi-acting job—working at the Briar Street Theater for the Blue Man Group.

"I wasn't a Blue Man because I didn't know how to drum," Crawford said, "I did what was called 'tube talking.' There were 24 pieces of PVC piping that went down into the lobby, 16 of those played 'Smells Like Teen Spirit' in different genres–like, there was a country version and a polka version. But eight of those would go up to a small room upstairs off of the green room where it would be me and another person. We would talk through these tubes to people and kind of mess with them before the show–get them psychologically off-kilter because of the show being such a mindfreak. So we would watch people on these closed-circuit cameras and they'd put their ear (to it) thinking they were gonna hear another version of 'Smells Like Teen Spirit' and I'd be like 'Hey, (I) like your hat.' And without question they would always ask 'Is this a recording?' and I would go 'Would a recording know you're wearing a hat?'"

Crawford later moved out of Chicago, eventually finding his way to Galena, where he now lives with his wife, Stephanie. Since being in Galena, Crawford has worked with the Galena Center for the Arts on a number of shows, including: a radio-play of "Another Thin Man," a table reading of Lee Blessing's drama "Two Rooms," a table reading of James Goldman's historical drama "The Lion in Winter" and the radioplay of "Yes Virginia, There Is a Santa Claus."

"It's just fun," Crawford said. "The people (here) are great and it's a warm welcoming community. There's no-and you have to deal with this sometimes in theatre-there's no ego, there's no arrogance. It's just everybody working together, everybody's laughing and having a good time. Everybody that comes to see the shows really enjoys them. It's community theatre with an accent on community."

Over the course of his career, Crawford found success in many different facets of entertainment. After college, however, he started performing on stage less and less.

"I've been re-bitten by the bug thanks to Galena," Crawford said.

"It feels good. I didn't realize I missed it as much as I did but I really did. And everyone here has been so great."



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

SELF-TAUGHT CARVER CREATES BEAUTIFUL PIECES OF ART

When Paul Pendola decided it was time for a hobby, he wanted something that didn't require a lot of space or tools and something with which he'd quickly see results.

Spoon carving turned out to be the perfect fit.



After using an ax to cut the initial piece of wood, Pendola is able to carve out a simple cooking spoon in an hour's time. He can don a backpack with his tools, go for a hike and return with a piece of usable art. His spoons are all made from found wood. He searches out trees—oak, black walnut, cherry, any hard wood basically—that come down in storms, and then utilizes pieces that neighbors leave sitting on his porch, as well as other lucky finds.

He's completely self-taught in the art of carving and even had a box of mistakes, he laughed, "proof that spoon carvers are made, not born."


Starting out

"It's not a big surprise that my hobby would also be in food service," said Pendola, who's been carving since 2014.

A culinary school graduate, this is Pendola's 40th year working in various capacities in the food service industry for a number of companies. Pendola's current job allows him to work from home, making it possible for him to relocate from the Chicago area to Galena in July 2017. Galena has always been a special get-away spot for Pendola, who grew up in the Chicago suburbs and has lived around the world.

The spoons Pendola creates under the name Fox River Spoon Company are all meant to be used, he explained, and when he made pieces for friends in the food service industry, they encouraged him to sell his wares. He also makes a special wood balm to ensure the spoons remain in top condition.

It was during a farmer's market in East Dundee in the fall of 2015 that Pendola saw potential. He sold out and then took a call for a custom order. A family was cutting down





Galena and once that is finished, other artists will be able to utilize the cottage for their own events and even visiting artists might wish to stay for extended periods, perhaps to work on photography, write a book, quilt or embroider.

In the past Pendola has set up shop at Galena Country Fair and the NW IL Art Fest in Stockton. He also showed and demonstrated at the Waterford Fair in Virginia.

His cutting boards are available for sale at Galena River Wine & Cheese on Main Street in Galena. And for those who would like to learn from him, Pendola will teach a class on carving this summer–on Aug. 17–at Shake Rag Alley in Mineral Point, Wis.

With the success of his spoons, Pendola has recently branched out in two more businesses: Block & Board Co., for the cutting and serving boards, and the 1850 Cottage, named after his home on South High Street, which features products he's created from salvaged wood–votive holders, clipboards, succulent boxes and more.

an oak tree and asked if Pendola could carve some spoons from the wood. He ended up making several.

"The response was overwhelming," he said, noting that it's unusual to see someone carving and it captures attention.

Spoons, too, are special pieces. He's had people share stories about their childhoods, remembering their grandmother's spoon and special memories from the kitchen.

"It's a very personal kitchen item," said Pendola.

An artist community

Since relocating to Galena in an attempt to downsize and simplify, Pendola has been overwhelmed by the warm welcome of the artist community. From the All River Road Talent (ARRT) group, Pendola has found support and encouragement among like-minded individuals.

"Galena was open arms," he said. "They really welcomed me with open arms."

Pendola said he wasn't comfortable, and still struggles with, calling himself an artist. The ARRT community gave him the confidence to do more.

Deb Bertucci of the DeSoto House Hotel invited Pendola to carve in the hotel lobby, and then asked him to make cutting and serving boards-yet another hobby-for the restaurants.

Later, when he'd sit outside his South Prospect

Street cottage–overlooking the downtown between the Green Street steps and Galena Green condominiums–and carve, visitors would stop by to see what he was doing. They'd climb to the top of the steps, look right, look left and see the cottage. Others discover the cottage on trolley tours that pass by.

"This is not so much a destination as a discovery," he said.

Many of those who discovered Pendola's art wanted to purchase a piece of their own, but because of zoning restrictions Pendola was unable to sell. That led Pendola to pursue and recently gain approval for a text amendment to allow an artisan studio.

The Spoon Carver's Cottage, as the sign outside 306 S. Prospect reads, is tiny and welcoming. Pendola sees it as the perfect location for himself and other artists to thrive.

The cottage, he said, will transform into a shop and gallery, a place to showcase and cultivate art. Instead of only Pendola's work, he's able to include other artists and show off their work as well. The patio will be open, weather permitting, to enjoy non-alcoholic beverages that will be offered for sale. The cottage will be open on several special occasions and is currently part of the ARRT Monthly Art Drive the first weekend of each month. When his hours expand in the spring, he'll move to the ARRT Scenic Art Loop.

Pendola is currently renovating another home in






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
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

JOHN EUGENE SMITH Galena General

Kirk Foecking has a long history with the Galena Generals.

"The Galena Generals started in 1961...for the Civil War Centennial," Foecking said. "At that time, Grant was portrayed by my father. And he was Grant, and of course my mom portrayed Mrs. Grant, and (the Grants) had four kids and there were four of us. So, my older brother and I were Grant's kids, my sister was one of Grant's kids and then they had another (neighborhood) boy...and he was the other kid. I know at least one parade we were in where he wasn't available and so my little sister dressed up and played the other brother."

> Growing up in Galena, Foecking, who currently portrays Brevet Major General John Eugene Smith, was immersed in the culture of the Galena Generals. He says the organization has grown tremendously since the 1960s.

> "The first Galena Generals...they were not the same as we are now," Foecking said. "At that time they just put together that they were generals and they went out and bought some generals costumes because they were not generals. They went around, they went all over the place. They went to Gettysburg, they went to Chicago. They had a guy dressed up as Lincoln with them—and that was my girlfriend's dad, he was Lincoln. And they had a whole pageant out at the fairgrounds. I was in the pageant. Bob Buman who plays Grant now, he was in the pageant."

> General John E. Smith was born in Bern, Switzerland, on Aug. 3, 1816. The Smith family later emigrated to the U.S. and settled in Philadelphia, where the future general grew up and

trained as a silversmith and a jeweler. Eventually, Smith would move to Galena, accompanied by his wife and four children.

"When (Gen. John E. Smith) did something, he got it done," Foecking said. "He accomplished what he set out to do. He (set out) to be a jeweler, he did that. He started businesses. And I haven't been able to prove it yet, but I think he built about four or five houses in this town."

So, how did this European immigrant jeweler from Philadelphia become one of Galena's most renowned generals? In addition to having a steady hand in precious metalwork, Smith also had a hand in politics-helping candidates in many historic elections, including President Abraham Lincoln, Congressman Elihu Washburne and Illinois Governor Richard Yates.

At the start of the Civil War, Smith served as aide-decamp to Governor Yates—whom would later appoint Smith to organize the 45th Illinois Volunteer Infantry Regiment.

General Smith would find great success with Illinois' 45th (which was organized in Galena)—fighting in historic battles at Donelson, Shiloh and Corinth, and leading troops alongside General William Tecumseh Sherman on his infamous March to the Sea.

"You don't hear all this big fancy famous stuff about (General John E. Smith) because he didn't really--it isn't like he him, but he didn't brag about his accomplishments," Foecking said.

"He was more laid back. He was older, he was 45 at the beginning of the war-he's not a 20-year-old out there trying to prove anything. He knew what he could do and he did it. He took care of his men and his men really liked him."

General John E. Smith led one of Illinois' most successful regiments, and did so with humility and conservatism. He and his wife are buried in Galena's Greenwood Cemetery.

"I like being a (Galena) General," Foecking said.

"I like bringing the history to the people on the streets. People come up to us a lot and they'll ask us if we're reenactors. And my answer to that is 'reenactors are people who put on uniforms and pretend they're in a war.' I personally have been in a war, I'm not gonna pretend I'm in a war.

"I was a nerd in school. It's not like I really had this dying desire to learn about history, but I don't like it when people have their history incorrect. I want to be in (Galena Generals) so we can be accurate on stuff. I tell you what, it's the uniform. They come to you, they talk to you. It's the way to get the conversation started, we show up in uniform."





PRIFTLESS AREA HISTORY

Apple River Fort

The Apple River Fort at 311 E. Myrtle St, Elizabeth, was the site of an important battle during the Black Hawk War.

On June 24, 1832, the settlers of the fort turned back an attack by 200 Sauk and Fox warriors led by Black Hawk himself. The war ended the threat of Indian attacks in the area and opened the region to further settlement.

Today, the fort has been reconstructed and is open for self-guided tours from May-October.

Located in a former Chicago Great Western Railway station, the Chicago Great Western Railway Museum in Elizabeth focuses on the railroads of northwest Illinois. The Elihu Washburne House was constructed in 1843, three years after Washburne came to Galena and became a Whig lawyer. The home that was constructed at this time was one third of the size it is today.

On the eve of U.S. Grant's election in 1868, Grant went to Washburne's house to await the election results. At 1:30 am, the telegraph announcing the final election results came through, naming Grant the president of the United States.

It is open May through October, on Fridays and Saturdays, 10 am to 1 pm.

Galena & U.S. Grant Museum

Hanover Historical Society

The Hanover Historical Society provides an indepth look at the history of the village of Hanover. A recently added exhibit is the Larry Bell, Jr. Collection, featuring 1,000 Native American artifacts. The artifacts have been collected over 45 years, and 70 percent were found just down the road at the Wapello Site.

Old Blacksmith Shop

245 N Commerce St, Galena, 815-777-1893, galenahistory.org.

Take a step back in time as you visit the Old Blacksmith Shop on North Commerce Street. In Galena's past, the town had more than two dozen operating blacksmiths. Today this red wood-framed shop, built in 1897, is the only one left in the city of Galena, operated by the Galena-Jo Daviess County Historical Society. The shop serves as a museum with fully functional forges operated by blacksmith historians. The forging equipment also displays historical charm, being the original tools used in the 1890s.

You can even watch blacksmiths transform a piece of heated metal into a decorative hook, pendant, fireplace set, or other unique handmade items, all available for purchase. The Old Blacksmith Shop is open May-October, Friday-Monday 10 am-4 pm.

Old Market House

123 N Commerce St, Galena, 815-777-3310

The Old Market House, erected by the city of Galena in 1845-1846, served for 65 years as the city market during the decades of Galena's greatest prosperity as a river port, lead-mining center and commercial hub. The Old Market House also served as the seat of Galena government and for years had two jail cells.

Planetary Studies Foundation Earth And Space Museum

Visit the Planetary Studies Foundation Earth and Space Museum, which is dedicated to fostering scientific literacy and interest. View unique artifacts, such as dinosaur bones and fossils, as well as pieces from Antarctica expeditions and the U.S. space program.

U.S. Grant Home

The U.S. Grant Home was built in 1859-60. When Gen. Ulysses S. Grant returned to the city in 1865 as a Civil War hero, he was presented the house. Grant used the home as his official political and voting address, living there with his family during his 1868 presidential campaign, then for a few brief periods during his presidency (1869-1877) and retirement.


The restored U.S. Grant Home is a two-story brick structure, decorated and furnished to represent the mid-1860s, primarily with family heirlooms. The site includes several small mid-19th century homes comprising the three-block Grant Home Historic Neighborhood.


Grant State Park, a tree-shaded area south of the Grant Home, has picnic tables for use. Also in the park is the Long House, a log building constructed in 1851 and moved to the site from Elizabeth in 1976, representing a typical settler's home of mid-19th-century Jo Daviess County. The house is not open Mondays or Tuesdays.

A MEMORIAL TO THE PAYS OF LONG AGO



The Old City Cemetery, located at Dodge Street and Mars Avenue, has many stories to tell.

The oldest cemetery in Galena, burials there began in 1826. In the late 1850s, when burials began in the New City Cemetery, now known as Greenwood Cemetery, located on Gear Street, a number of families removed their loved ones from Old City and buried them at Greenwood.

Although there were still people being buried in the Old City Cemetery, it began to suffer from neglect as several Galena Gazette newspaper articles reported: "The fences are not in thorough repair and the burial ground has become a pasture."

Another article mentioned that "cows were grazing there, a cheap way to keep the grass trimmed."

In the Alfred Mueller Historical Collections Room at the Galena Public Library, patrons can look through a book listing some of the burials at Old City Cemetery. Much of the information was transcribed and researched by Alice Barthell and later by Robert Hansen. Some of the information found in the book included the cause of death: consumption (tuberculosis), cholera, lung fever, liver complaint, heart disease and cancer. The location of graves is also very interesting as it sometimes went by natural markers that no longer exist such as "twenty eight feet from the white oak tree," "between the two



black oak trees," "near the south gate," the "middle of the yard" or "the first row near the fence."

There are a number of soldiers buried in the Old City Cemetery. There is one reference stating that Galena resident Hezekiah Gear's father, a veteran of the Revolutionary War, was buried there.

Charles Peck, a veteran of the War of 1812 who died in 1849, is also buried there.

A number of Civil War veterans are

buried at Old City Cemetery as well. Gideon Stoddard, one of the first volunteers at the beginning of the Civil War, died in 1880. His grave is just a short distance from the pre-Civil War home of Ulysses S. Grant and his family, which is located on High Street. It is almost as if he were keeping a silent watch on that home.

In mid-October of 1881, Caroline Weston died. She came to Galena with her family at about the time that the Illinois Central Railroad arrived in Galena in 1854. When the Civil War began, her son, Hugh, was one of the first to enlist. He later died from wounds he received at the Battle of Shiloh. With her characteristic patriotic spirit, Weston once commented if she had 50 sons, she would gladly let them go.

There was an interesting story reported in the Galena Gazette from May 10, 1882. A man by the name of Rawling had settled in Galena in 1850. After residence here for three years, he had taken sick, died and was buried in the Old City Cemetery. One day, Rev. Hiller, whose residence adjoined the cemetery, "observed a well-clad man sitting by the side of a grave. He was weeping profusely, and being anxious to learn the cause of his sorrow, the good minister went up to the stranger and tenderly questioned him on the subject." The gentleman informed the minister that he had traveled thousands of miles to visit the grave in this city of his beloved brother and having found it was overcome with memories of the past.

There are also a number of strangers buried in the Old City Cemetery. Some records listed the person's name followed by the word "stranger." In April of 1855 there was a listing of "A man from the steamboat Galena, stranger," or "Eliza Lyne Smith, 16 years, stranger from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania." They were just not here long enough to become acquainted with many residents or they probably didn't have any form of identification.

Nancy Grey is buried in the Old City Cemetery. She lived to be 108, the oldest resident of Galena and Jo Daviess County, when she died in 1879. There is Sally Hazzard and her husband, Happ Hazzard, as well as a young girl who died in the mid-1850s, who had a most interesting name, Galena Illinois Brookes.

Though there were years of neglect to Old City Cemetery, in more recent times a group of wonderful volunteers have helped with cleaning

grave markers. The Galena Foundation, as well as a number of businesses, have assisted financially and with their expertise to help put the cemetery in good order.

The Old City Cemetery is a very peaceful place,



Tour 1: Bench Street

Make sure you wear good walking shoes because this tour involves climbing a large set of steps. For more history on each building along the route, download the Galena Tours app. *The tour is 45 minutes*.

Courthouse

330 N Bench St.

1839. The construction of the Jo Daviess County Courthouse began in 1839 and took five years to complete due to shortages of materials, labor and finances.

St. Rose Academy

228 N Bench St.

1859. Designed and built by Father Samuel Mazzuchelli, the St. Rose Academy was an all girls Catholic school also known as "the Academy." From 1868 to 1875, the building was used by the German Lutheran Church as a part of Wartburg College.

Union Baptist

212 N Bench St.

1854. When this church was first built, it struggled to prosper. In the early 1900s a concrete block porch was added, hiding the original front of the building. Today it is the home to the Odd Fellows and Masons.

First Presbyterian Church

106 N Bench St.

1838. The architectural style of this church comes from the East Coast, specifically the New England area. The steeple is said to be copied from the Old South Church of Boston.

Turner Hall

105 S Bench St.

1874. Constructed by the local Turner Society, Turner Hall was to serve as a public hall for lectures, theater, rallies and events. In 1926, it was gutted by fire but then rebuilt. Many famous visitors have been to Turner Hall including William McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt.

Galena United Methodist Church

125 S Bench St.

1857. The original structure, built in 1832, burned in January 1838. The present church building was dedicated in 1857. General U.S. Grant attended church here with his family. The Grant pew is marked with a U.S. flag.

Liberty Engine #1

Bench & Washington streets

1851. This Italianate structure is the oldest of its type in the state of Illinois. It showcases Galena's original 1855 fire engine, which was pulled by horses and pumped by hand.

Daniel A. Barrows Home

211 S Bench St.

1858. Designed by architect William Dennison, who also designed U.S. Grant's home, this residence was home to Daniel A. Barrows and his family. Barrows was a prominent businessman, owning a confectionery store, distillery and lumber yard. He was also a Republican and Lincoln supporter, which led to his front window being smashed by rocks during a Democratic rally on Bench Street in 1864. In 1938, the city purchased the building and used the front two rooms as city hall until 1967. Today, the building houses the Galena-Jo Daviess County Historical Society & U.S. Grant Museum.

St. Michael Catholic Church

227 S Bench St.

1856. The current church was built after the previous building burned down. The building was designed and the parish was established by Father Samuel



Dr. Horatio Newhall House/ Miller & Steinke Funeral Home 235 S Bench St

1848. This building served as the home of Galena's foremost physician, Dr. Horatio Newhall. Its use as a funeral home goes back over 80 years.

Old High School Steps

South Bench Street

This stairway, originally wooden, has been in this location since the 1850s. In addition to hilltop residents, these stairs serviced hundreds of students who attended the Old Galena High School, which overlooks Galena on the top of the hill.

Old Galena High School

411 S Prospect St.

1905. This massive structure dominates Galena's skyline. Built after the previous school burned, the new building has a square tower with four circular openings, each nearly seven feet in diameter. In 1980, the school was sold and converted to condominiums.

Asa Haile House

209-211 S Prospect St.

1856. This brick home was built by Asa Haile, a prominent bricklayer and building contractor. It was Haile who laid the brick for the five floors of the DeSoto House Hotel in 1854. It was also Haile who removed the top two floors of the hotel in 1880.

Felt House

125 S Prospect St.

1850. This house was originally built in the 1850s for dry goods merchant Lucius Felt. What you see today, however, is a "new" version, as the house underwent major remodeling in 1874.

The "new" house was done in the Second Empire style and sports a large dance hall under the mansard roof. The double stairway cost thousands of dollarsmore than the house itself-and was for many years known as the "Felt's Folly."

Grace Episcopal Church


Hill & Prospect Streets

1848. This church was built partly from stone guarried at the site. The original 1837 Henry Erben organ has been restored, making it the oldest organ still in use in Illinois.

Elihu Washburne House, 908 Third

St.: It was in the library of the Washburne house that General Grant received news of



his election as President of United States in 1868. It was welcome news. too, to Congressman Washburne, for he had long been a close friend and champion of Ulysses S. Grant.

Post Office. 110 Green St.:

This building was engineered by Ely Parker, a Civil Warera general. Parker

was present when Confederate General Robert E. Lee surrendered at Appomattox Courthouse in April 1865. He helped draft the surrender documents, which are in his handwriting.

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
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Main, Bench and Prospect Street, along with several other properties, are a part of the Galena Historic District. In 1969, the Galena Historic District was added to the U.S. National Register of Historic Places.

Newhall Drug Store

101-103 S Main St

1843. The Newhall Drug Store was built in 1843 by Galena's foremost physician and pharmacist, Horatio Newhall, a Yale graduate, who also published Galena's first newspaper, the "Miners Journal." Newhall's most notable work was treating cholera victims in the 1832 and 1848 outbreaks. The observations that he made about the disease and its spread were considered some of the best of that period.

Hempstead Store

100 N Main St

1846. The second floor of this building was home to the law office of John A. Rawlins, one of Galena's nine Civil War generals. He later served as Grant's chief of staff.

Old Stockade

208 Perry St

1832. Originally home to trader Amos Farrar, during the Blackhawk War this homestead was transformed into a refuge for women and children, though it was never used. The home has been remodeled since its days as a stockade and now welcomes visitors on Saturdays from 1 to 4 pm.

Perry Street

1888. The stone laid on this street was laid down originally as a deterrent to erosion, not a paving stone. However, maintaining control of horses and wagons on steep hills was a constant concern in the early days of Galena.

J.A. Meusel Cigar Factory 208-210 N Main St

This building was home to the Standard Cigar Factory, one of the many cigar manufacturers in Galena. Tobacco was a cash crop for some county farmers, particularly in the Stockton area.

Flat Iron/Diagonal Building 222 N Main St

1856. The original building housed Bradley/ Taylor House hotels and was three stories, until it was destroyed by fire in 1876. The new Italianate structure is only two floors and has housed many different businesses from the People's Bank (original safe still there) to a Justice of the Peace.

Barrows And Coatsworth Stores 120-126 S Main St

1856. This section of buildings housed the leather goods shop of Jesse Grant (U.S. Grant's father). Located at 120 S Main St., you can shop in the same store where U.S. Grant worked from 1860 to 1861.

Desoto House Hotel

230 S Main St

1855. Named after the discoverer of the Mississippi River, the DeSoto House Hotel was opened in 1855 at Galena's economic peak. The hotel was billed as the "Largest Hotel in the West," and was built to service the many people arriving in Galena. Abraham Lincoln and Stephen A. Douglas spoke from the hotel's balcony on separate occasions. The hotel also served as the venue of Ulysses S. Grant's reception ball and celebration after his homecoming from the Civil War. His presidential campaign headquarters were also housed in rooms 209 and 211.

Davis Block

304-310 S. Main St

1846. This was the very first all-brick block in Galena. Consisting of five stores, the block housed a jewelry store owned by Civil War general John E. Smith, and office to controversial lawyer M.Y. Johnson.



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

ELIZABETH A village with something for everyone

Nestled between Galena and Stockton, the drive to charming Elizabeth is a beautiful scenic tour and makes a perfect stop for the beginning, middle or end of your trip. The village of Elizabeth has something for everyone.

In the early 1800s, white settlers were drawn to the area as the lead mining rush began. They began a settlement, which resulted in the Black Hawk War of 1832. Native Sac and Fox warriors attacked the Apple River Fort, the battle lasted for about an hour.

Legend states that three women, all named Elizabeth, stood shoulder-to-shoulder with their husbands, assisting in successfully defending the fort. It was in their honor that the settlement was re-named Elizabeth.

History buffs and seekers of knowledge will delight in the Apple River Fort State Historic Site, a replica frontier fort modeled after its predecessor which was constructed quickly during the Black

Hawk War.

There's also the Planetary Studies Foundation Earth and Space Science Museum, which features an array of artifacts including dinosaur bones, fossils, and moon rocks, and the Chicago Great Western Railway Depot Museum, which sources an extensive library and knowledgeable exhibits in a former Chicago Great Western Railway station.

Brush up on Elizabeth's history by visiting the Elizabeth History Museum, and explore the 1876 Banwarth House, filled with period furnishings.

Antique collectors will find a haven of treasures as they explore northwestern Illinois' largest antique mall, the Elizabeth Grand Antique Co. Set in an old school building, each room is full of special finds and gems.

While you have shopping on the mind, head to downtown Elizabeth, where you will find stores featuring clothing, art and gourmet cupcakes!

<< SCALES MOUND, ILLINOIS




<< WARREN, ILLINOIS





HANOVER Village is known as the Mallard Capital of the World

Just down the road from Elizabeth, Hanover is home to local businesses as well as multiple nature preserves, preserving the full history and beautiful land of the area.

Wapello Land & Water Reserve, named after a Fox and Sac Indian chief of the area, boasts premiere prairie restoration and is also the site where the University of Illinois excavated significant artifacts in 2003. It is a part of the Jo Daviess Conservation Foundation (JDCF), and you can find more information reserve by turning to pages 72-73.

The Apple River runs through the center of Hanover and plays an important role in the economic history of the town. In the early 1820s, settlers came to farm the area and found that a natural drop in the Apple River made an ideal location for a mill and dam site. The first mill was built in 1829 by James Craig. This later lead to the Hanover Woolen Mill in 1863, which operated for 86 years.

Hanover is the Mallard Capital of the World, being home to Whistling Wings duck hatchery. In September they celebrate their title with Mallardfest, a weekend of events including a farmer's market, parade, local vendors, inflatable obstacle course, live music, a duck-calling contest and fireworks.

Hanover is also home to two awardwinning vineyards, Rocky Waters Vineyard & Winery and Fergedaboudit Vineyard & Winery. Both produce a variety of wines with locally Illinois-grown grapes, and offer a beautiful setting for visitors to enjoy.



<< CUBA CITY, WISCONSIN

(22 miles NW) is known as the City of Presidents. Drive through this community of 2,012 and you can't help but see shields lining its Main Street honoring each of our presidents. Also lining the Main Street are a number of local businesses. The first name of the community was Yuba, but was later changed to Cuba and then Cuba City. cubacity.org

<< HAZEL GREEN, WISCONSIN

(13 miles NE) population 1,200, was the first permanent settlement in Wisconsin in 1825 and is part of the region's mining heritage. In 1831, Lucias Lyon began surveying two miles south of Hazel Green. This "Point of Beginning" is the basis for all descriptions on all property deeds in Wisconsin. << NEW DIGGINGS, WISCONSIN

(12 miles N) provides a look back at another day and age. St. Augustine Church was founded by Father Samuel Mazzuchelli in 1835 and built in 1844. He opened a school which was staffed by the Sinsinawa Dominican Sisters. The church has been restored by the local Knights of Columbus. New Diggings also boasts two well-preserved bars.

<< SHULLSBURG, WISCONSIN

(19 miles NE) population 1,200, home of Shullsburg Creamery, is the third oldest community in Wisconsin with roots in the mining and trapping industries. The last mines were closed in the 1970s, but the Badger Mine & Museum keep the history alive. A visit to Gravity Hill is a must. Today, Shullsburg features a restored downtown on the National Register. experienceshullsburg.com

<< BELLEVUE, IOWA

(38 miles SW) population 2,172, is nestled along the Mississippi River straddling Lock and Dam 12. The city offers historic sites, lodging and dining opportunities and plenty of small-town hospitality. bellevueia.com

<< SAVANNA, ILLINOIS

(32 miles S) population 3,000, is best known for the Army Depot. The depot, established in 1918, was used for several munitions-related purposes, including manufacturing, testing and storing of different types of weapons. The site's military use was gradually phased out and the depot closed in March 2000. It is now the Lost Mound Unit of the Upper Mississippi River Wildlife Refuge. Visit Palisades State Park and the Great Mississippi River Bike Trail. savanna-il.gov

EAST PUBUQUE

A community with breathtaking views

Located on the eastern side of the Mississippi River, opposite of Dubuque, East Dubuque is a small picturesque community with breathtaking views. The city is connected to Dubuque, Iowa, by the Julien Dubuque Bridge, one of the longest tied arch and cantilevered bridges ever built.

East Dubuque's history is quite an interesting one, featuring Hopewell Indians, railroad tycoons, ferryboat kings and even Al Capone. Stop at the East Dubuque District Library for artifacts on Sop-Ho-Kab, locally known as Indian Kate. She was a full-blooded Sauk who escaped the Battle of Bad Axe, a battle between the Sauk and Fox tribes and the Illinois militiamen.

Visitors can also walk in the footsteps of history while visiting Gramercy Park. The 10-acre city park is an Illinois Natural Heritage Landmark, and is home to 26 ceremonial and burial mounds from the Hopewell Native American Culture. It has views of the Mississippi River bluffs and Port of Dubuque. Pack a picnic or plan to cook out on the charcoal grills. The area also offers walking trails, a playground and modern restroom facilities.

Visit the legendary Merry Building on Sinsinawa Avenue, which was once a popular stop for travelers who were making the trip across the Mississippi, but also served as a stop on the underground railroad. Take a stroll through East Dubuque's downtown, or "The Strip."

Wing Fest is held each August and car cruises Thursdays throughout the summer.

Many of the neighborhood bars and nightclubs located here are left from prohibition. During prohibition, many speakeasies, gambling halls and whiskey stills popped up throughout the area, and legend has it that Al Capone was involved.

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

<< SINSINAWA, WISCONSIN

(12 miles NW) Sinsinawa is an unincorporated community one mile north of the border with Illinois, just north of Menominee. The town is known for being the mother house of the Sinsinawa Dominican Sisters, founded by Father Samuel Mazzuchelli. Sinsinawa Mound hosts numerous events throughout the year and runs a bookstore and art gallery which is open to the public. sinsinawa.org

<< PLATTEVILLE, WISCONSIN

(25 miles N) population 11,244, surrounded by rolling topography, the area around Platteville hosts some of the most breathtaking sights in the state. Besides being home to a University of Wisconsin campus, Platteville also offers recreational opportunities like fly fishing the Platte and Grant rivers. On the side of Platte Mound stands a large letter "M" that symbolizes the university's mining history.

<< DUBUQUE, IOWA

(16 miles NW) population 58,000, Dubuque is Iowa's oldest city and is among the oldest settlements west of the Mississippi River. The first permanent settler to the area was French-Canadian fur trader Julien Dubuque in 1785. Today it is known for its casinos, the Mississippi Riverwalk and the National Mississippi River Museum and Aquarium. Eagle Point Park provides a panoramic view of Lock and Dam 11 and the Mississippi River valley. traveldubuque.com

<< PRAIRIE DU CHIEN, WISCONSIN

(77 miles NW) population 5,911, is located along the Mississippi River, and has a wide array of natural beauty, a history dating back many centuries, events all year around, and businesses, shops and attractions. Referred to as Wisconsin's second oldest city, Prairie du Chien was established by French voyageurs in the late 17th century. prairieduchien.org

STOCKTON

Ready to welcome visitors at the county's eastern gateway



Stockton is the youngest community in Jo Daviess County and was established as a result of the increased railroad traffic to the area. Established after the Minnesota Northwestern Railway, which later became the Chicago Great Western Railway, built a station in Stockton Township in 1886, Stockton's industry grew with the newly added transportation.

In 1914, the Kraft brothers opened their first cheese plant in Stockton. The location was perfectly situated in an area with an abundance of quality milk and easy access to transportation.

Stockton showcases panoramic views of the landscape. It can credit its sea level to the glaciers. Much of Jo Daviess County is part of the Driftless region, meaning the glaciers did not come through this area, flattening the hills. When the glaciers came to Stockton, they halted.

Stockton offers a variety of activities for all ages. Spend a day at the Memorial Park,



where you can hit up three playgrounds and a pool all in one. Check out Kidstown, a fantastic wooden playground at the Stockton Elementary School.

Head downtown to enjoy some local shopping and local history. Looking to play a round of golf? Choose from two area 18-hole golf courses, Black Hawk Run and Woodbine Bend.



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
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
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
