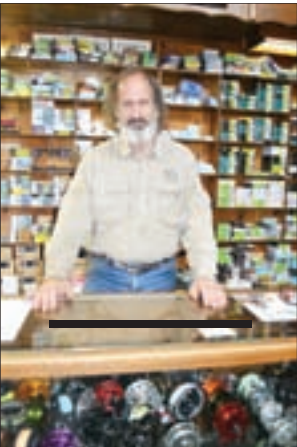

Police investigate murder

Area law enforcement are looking for a "person of interest" in an alleged murder that occurred Tuesday night near the Lebanon High School.
As of press time Tuesday evening, law enforcement agencies were on the lookout for a black 39-year-old man from Lebanon in connection with the shooting death of a 47-year-old Lebanon man at about 5 p.m.

Tuesday.
"We are currently working an active homicide investigation," said Lebanon Police Department Sgt. Kacie Springer. The LPD spokesperson was one of many law enforcement officers who were canvasing the apartments on New Buffalo Road, seeking information on the whereabouts of the "person of interest."
"It's an ongoing investigation, and we're still talking to a lot of people,"

Springer said.
According to Springer, the 47-year-old man was walking in the area of Sweet and Miller streets when another man came out of a house in the area and shot the 47-year-old with a handgun. The victim was declared deceased at the scene.
Springer declined to divulge any other details, including motive, in the crime.
The Laclede County Record will report more information as it become available.

Big Red 66 returns to

Janet McAllister stopped driving "Big Red" – her red 1973 Cadillac Eldorado convertible – in the Lebanon Christmas Parade several years ago.
"I knew Jack was watching me and wanting me to (drive it in parades)," she recalled, referring to her late husband, Dr. Jack McAllister, who loved that Caddy. "But I couldn't see over the hood!"
Janet and Big Red will be back in a parade in a prominent role on Saturday, June 16. The Lebanon-Laclede County Route 66 Society has selected her as grand marshal of the 2018 Lebanon Route 66 Festival parade.
"She was selected because her husband orchestrated the car show that we had at Bennett Spring as part of Hillbilly Days every year," explained Leland Townsend, parade coordinator and a Route 66 Society board member.
Janet reminisced about Jack McAllister's love of cars after posing by Big Red on a recent afternoon.
"We moved here in 1968," she said. The Lebanon Antique Car Club started soon after, and Jack was one of the 15 charter members. But unlike the other members, Jack, fresh out of optometry school, couldn't afford an antique car.
One day he saw an ad in the Kansas City newspaper for a Model A truck. "It was a price Jack could afford," Janet said. The McAllisters pulled a flatbed trailer to Kansas City to pick it up, only to discover that the truck was in pieces.
"We brought the truck back in buckets and baskets on top of the trailer," Janet said with a laugh. Jake Farrington, also a charter member of the car club, put the truck back together for him.

"It had no top on it," Janet said. "But we like convertibles." A photo of the McAllisters posing in the truck was used on the family's Christmas card one year.
Once Jack started buying antique and classic cars, he couldn't stop.
At first, he bought those that needed work and paid someone to fix them up. Later, as in the case of the 1973 Cadillac, he bought cars that already were in good shape.
Janet estimated Jack easily owned a dozen or two collectible cars at various times.
She rattled off a list of Jack's cars, mostly convertibles, that included two 1956 Thunderbirds, a pink and white 1956 Oldsmobile, a 1958 Corvette, a 1948 Ford, a 1934 Ford and a 1947 Cadillac. "He loved that car -- it came out of a museum (in Kansas City)," she said about the Cadillac. Jack was told that George Brett rode in the car in the Kansas City Royals' 1985 World Series parade.
"He's had some nice cars. He loved anything transportation," including boats and planes. Jack also was a licensed pilot.
Another car Jack purchased out of a museum, this one in Michigan, was a yellow 1948 Plymouth convertible, which he bought toward the end of his life. "Jack fell in love with the car," Janet said. Unfortunately, it took longer than expected for the Plymouth to be delivered. Unknown to Jack, "the guy who delivered it dropped it off at Marshfield." Jack wound up paying months of storage fees when he discovered where the missing car was.

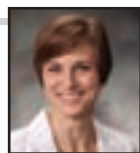

Never underestimate your role in customer service development

The wonderful world of social media can certainly be a complicated place. After recently making a post to Facebook I received some negative feedback from a person I have never even met in my life. I made a mistake. I misspelled a word within the content of the posting. As opposed to simply sending me a private message letting me know of the error and the new revelation that I am human (this really shocked me by the way!), the person elected to write a public message with a very negative tone telling me that if I am going to list the misspelled word, at least spell it correctly.

It would have been very easy to get angry and unleash a rebuttal tirade, however, I did my best to take the high road – although I did inform the individual that his usage of the word “your” was incorrect and should have been “you’re” in this particular case.

It seems we live in a very angry society at times. We all want to get our opinion out there and too often this comes with a lot of pent-up anger com-

ing out. And again, we are all human and frustration is a human emotion.

The same thing happens when we go to a local restaurant or convenience store and don’t get what we feel is proper customer service. First, we get upset about the less-than-favorable experience. Then we most likely go on Facebook, Twitter or some other social network and complain about it. Man, I feel better! But what about the times when we have a great customer experience? Sometimes I think we can overlook that as it becomes easy to think “this is the way it should be?”

One of my favorite quotes ever is “Never underestimate the power you give someone by believing in them.”

Imagine if we took that attitude and worked on being the absolute best customer we can be, even in times of lackluster service. We might just change the employee’s attitude and even set that person on the path to be a more productive person. A negative reaction to a negative experience is certainly not going to create a positive transaction.

I recently visited a local restaurant and was greeted by a young man who said it was his first day on the job. He literally was on his second hour at the establishment so his speed in creating the

sandwich I requested was not setting any world records, plus I could tell he was somewhat nervous. It would

have been easy to roll eyes or just act rude, simply wanting my sandwich as quickly as possible. But utilizing a little patience I tried my best to be a “good customer.” Hopefully others followed suit and made his first day a good one. That type of response and attitude might actually make him want to do the job well and be the best employee that he can be while under the establishment’s employ.

So each time we are a “customer” I think we should remember the impact we potentially can have. Now that is not to say that everyone will appreciate that demeanor. But if it is beneficial to one person, who goes on to be a contributor to our community and county, I think the extra friendliness and patience were a solid investment.

Metaltech celebrates 20th anniversary

The keys to Metaltech Products Inc.’s success for the past two decades are pretty simple: the latest technology, the best processes and the best people.

Metaltech is celebrating its 20th year in business in June at its facilities in Eldridge. The company is owned by Darrel and Dana Bishop, its first two employees when Metaltech opened its doors on June 1, 1998.

“Without the dedicated hard work performed over the years from some of the best people around, in addition to the experience and education I obtained ... I don’t believe Metaltech could have lasted as long as it has,” Darrel Bishop writes on the company website at www.metaltechproductsinc.com. “Some of these years have been difficult, but I continue to learn and greatly enjoy what I do. I have been truly blessed to be able

to make a good living working at what I enjoy doing.”

Darrel Bishop gained much of his manufacturing and management know-how by working his way up at Marathon Electric in nearby Lebanon and later at Electrovert, which is now ITW EAE of Camdenton.

At Electrovert in late 1997, the company was having trouble finding a reliable and cost-effective vendor for large machine frames. “I think this was when the light bulb went off in my head, and I had a reason to move forward with my dreams of owning my own company,” Darrel Bishop says. “At this point, I had a potential customer right out of the gate, and I could fulfill their need by giving them something they could not get.”

The Bishops built a 4,000-square-foot facility on Route E in Eldridge and began to fill it with the tools of the trade -- mig and tig welders, a

hydraulic ironworker, a band saw, a drill press and various hand tools. Their first hire was Tony Evans, who was known as the best metal fabricator in the area.

Other employees soon joined the team, bringing their own skills and a willingness to learn. Metaltech purchased Ozark Sheetmetal in 2001, absorbing its equip-

ment and workforce, and opened Powder Paint Inc. in 2003.

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Sharing the passion

For 40 years, Charlie Reading has been sharing his love for fly fishing with his customers

For some fishing is a weekend pas-time and for others, a vacation to dream about when not actively engaged in it, and for the very few, like Bennett Spring's Charlie Reading, fishing is the passion of a lifetime. For 40 years, he has been sharing the joy of fly fishing with visitors to Bennett Spring as well as people he has met in his travels around the world.

"What makes my job so interesting," he spoke recently from behind the counter of Reading's Fly Shop located just east of the park on Missouri 64, "is that I'm always teaching, showing, telling someone about something that is different than what they do with the rest of their lives when they are not here. I see all these people with their heads in the phones or the electronic notebooks, all this technology, but what we really do here, is help people connect again—with nature and with each other—by disconnecting. You know it all started at Grandma and Grandpa's house years ago with two longs and a short, the old rings on the party line. You ran like it was the most important thing in the world to get that call or you might miss something. People are still doing that. Answering that cell phone as if it is the most important thing in the world."

He continued with a smile. "I think it makes people lose their creativity because they don't store information in their head anymore, instead it's all in the phone. People are still better off to come out here, take your kid fishing and get engaged with nature rather than just watching something on a screen."

Charlie Reading grew up on a farm just

outside Lebanon and graduated from the College of the Ozarks with a degree in biology, chemistry and history which along with fishing and travel has also turned him into quite a philosopher and a student of human behavior and history.

"It was Mark Twain who said, 'Travel is fatal to prejudice, bigotry and narrow-mindedness,' and you certainly can see that when you travel to other parts of the world."

Charlie has fished in some of the most remote places in the world including multiple trips to New Zealand, Mali, the Seychelles, the Amazon and Papua New Guinea. While his shop features everything the local fly fisherman could want from flies to rods and reels to all the needed fishing apparel and equipment, he also carries two handed 11 to 18 foot long rods, used by those fishing for salmon and steel head in the big moving waters of the northeast and northwest United States as well as Europe. Charlie has also made many a custom fly rod including one for former president George H. Bush.

"I started out here in the summer

of 1978, working for the late Tony and Shirley Pack, who operated the original Springview Tackle Shop, located right at the head of the spring. I worked for them for four years and then

a few years later, went out on my own, moving to this location in 1987."

That original shop and its owners, although gone for many years now, are still fondly remembered by a few old time Bennett Spring residents and tourists alike, including Charlie.

These days as anyone driving by can see, Charlie has his hands full with the building of new casting ponds and landscaping the grounds around his shop as well as preparing to add on to the existing structure.

"When it's all done, there will be a total of three casting ponds," he explained.

"There is the one I already have here and one for the two-handed Spey casting. There will be decks on both ends of that pond and of course, we're working on the trees and the arch sign.

"The great thing about Bennett Spring is you meet a lot of good people here and you learn a lot. You hear a

great many good fish stories and no one has to prove they are better than anyone else. People come here, as novices, first timers and others who have been coming here with their families for years. It's a safe place and I've seen just about every emotion imaginable, up and down that stream, glad, happy, mad, excited, disappointed, you see it all."

That being said, he takes time to wait on a couple of different customers, a man and his son from the Rolla area, who found the specific piece of equipment they were looking for as they explained to Charlie exactly what that was. The next gentleman shared that he had never been to Bennett Spring before and never fished in Missouri and was basically looking for advice and information after having just set up at his camp site in the park.

Conversation from fish stories and techniques to politics to philosophy can all be found at Reading's Fly Shop, centered around a man who has been able to make a living at what he loves.

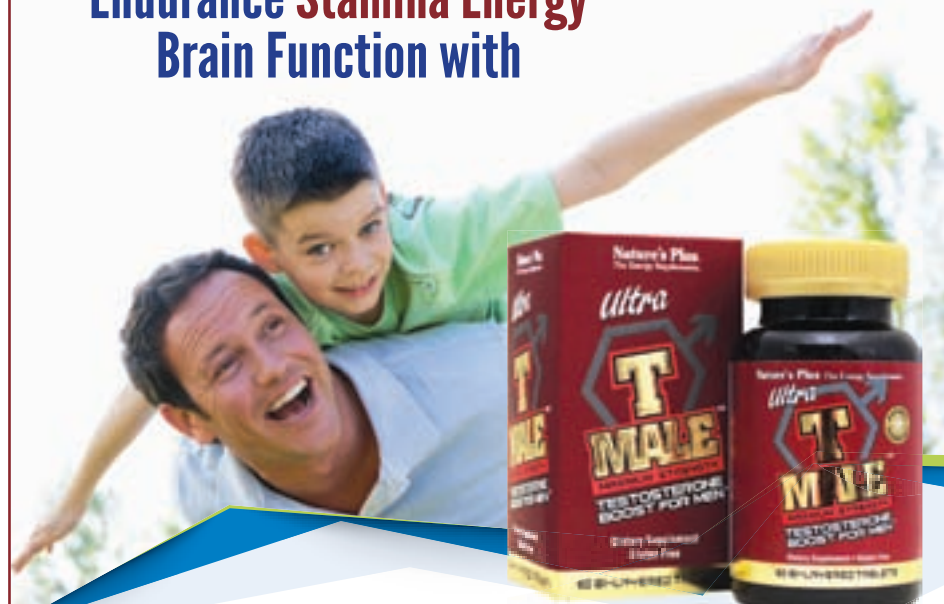
"I've been a lot of places and met a lot of people, a lot of great fishermen from all around the world," Charlie concluded. "One of the most profound might have been a little old Aboriginal grandfather, taking his grandson fishing in a dugout canoe in Papua New Guinea. Our guide gave him some hooks and he spoke a little English. He said thank you and then looked right at me and the other man fishing that day, and said, 'We're the same, you know, just different skin colors.' That comment has really stayed with me."

Indeed, fishermen around the world might well agree.

A self-admitted bit of a recluse, local artist Larry Holley has agreed to share his art work with the public at a reception on Saturday from 5 to 8 pm at the Lebanon Art Guild Studio and Gallery at 227 W. Commercial in downtown Lebanon.

As I've gotten older, my paintings have become more realistic."

He continued. "I've sold some over the years, both in Iowa and here. I sold one that hangs in Fast Eddy's Muffler Shop and several people have seen it and have even requested a painting, as a result. I like doing pieces for other people as well as the things I see on a regular basis."

Linda Spencer, Lebanon Art Studio and Gallery manager is excited about doing shows like this, featuring talented local artists.

"Larry's work includes American realism, farm life, men at work, European landscapes, scenes from his time in Viet Nam, self-portraits,

"We could tell many Jack stories," Janet said with another laugh.

For example, the 1947 Cadillac needed a part, and Jack ordered and paid for it after seeing an ad in Hemmings Motor News, a respected publication for collectors. But the part never came. Eventually, Jack discovered that the ad had been placed by a prisoner who was scamming car collectors.

"I like little convertibles, so he bought the T-birds," Janet recalled. "That was my car. I drove it around town. I drove it to Ronnie's Market."

But Jack wasn't as fond of the Thunderbords. At 6-foot-3, he couldn't fit into them when he wore his cowboy hat with the top up.

When Jack died unexpectedly in 2004 at age 64 – he had retired in 2002 – he had two MGs, an unfinished project, in the barn. He had bought an extra one for parts.

Because he didn't have a car when he joined the Lebanon Antique Car Club – later renamed the Lebanon Antique and Classic Car Club – Jack



took on other club projects, such as the car show for Hillbilly Days.

One year there was a complaint that the porta potties at the car show weren't clean, Janet said. "Jack said, 'I'll do it!'" Jack armed himself in hip boots, rubber gloves and a long-handled brush and kept the toilets clean.

"They were the cleanest all around," recalled Loretta Young, whose dad, Bob Russell, also was a charter member of the club.

Janet offered a slogan for Jack's dirty job: "Local

optometrist, he'll examine your eyes and clean your porta potty!"

After Jack began buying cars, he always drove in the Lebanon Christmas Parade. "We usually had two cars (in the parade)," Janet said. Once, Jack drove Miss Missouri in his 1934 Ford Roadster, another of his favorite cars.

Fourteen years after Jack's death, all the collectible cars are gone except the 1973 Cadillac, with 50,329 miles on the odometer. "When he died suddenly, the kids wouldn't let me sell the

Caddy," Janet said.

She expects that her daughter, Nancy Winfrey, will drive her in Big Red for the Route 66 parade, and that Cade Winfrey and Grady McAllister, two of her four grandsons, will ride along.

"All four boys want that car," she said with a smile.

Big Red doesn't get on the road often these days, although Janet fittingly uses it for Red Hat Society events.

"The Red Hats ride in it with the top down," she explained. "We go to eat; we go wherever we want to go."

"I hope Jack likes that. He's probably laughing."

Lineup for the Lebanon Route 66 Festival parade will start at 9 a.m. June 16 on Wyota Drive in the Lebanon Industrial Park, east of the Munger Moss Motel on Route 66.

The parade will roll at 10 a.m., following the route of Route 66 west to Boswell Park, where a cruise-in is planned along with crafters, food and memorabilia vendors, family games and music by four bands.

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Council replaces Ag Center contractor

The Lebanon City Council wants to see the Lebanon Agriculture Legacy Center ready in time for the fair and Tuesday night approved an agreement with a new contractor to do just that.

The council met in a special session Tuesday to enter into an agreement with True Construction of Lebanon to complete the center. The city sought bids for the work and True submitted the low bid of \$637,217.90.

The city had previously approved a contract with Hovey Homes, LLC, for construction of the agriculture arena, which will be used for agriculture-related events, including livestock shows at the Laclede County Fair. The council on May 25 decided to terminate its agreement with Hovey.

According to the ordinance, the council "desires to quickly move forward with a new contractor so a portion of the facility can be utilized as scheduled during the Laclede County Fair beginning July 9."

A bonding company will pay

the city the difference between the original Hovey contract and the revised contract figures for True Construction.

The City Council had voted in April 2017 to spend nearly \$1.1 million from the capital fund to pay Hovey for the construction. Other city expenses included \$25,000 for road construction and \$16,000 for water lines.

The city is receiving \$600,000 in reimbursable expenses for the project from the Missouri Development and Finance Board from private contributions, paired with 50 percent tax credits. Laclede County pledged the donation of \$100,000 for bleachers and other equipment.

City Administrator Mike Schumacher said financially there should be no change for the city at all.

"The original contract had a bonding company associated with it, so the dollars the city had allocated will still be the dollars the city spends towards it," he said. "Any gaps that exceeds the amount the city had budgeted will be covered by this bonding company."

He said the original contractor was required by the contract to pay for the bonding company and the new contractor was also required to hire a bonding company.

He said this is "pretty common for projects that are funded with tax dollars to protect the taxpayer."

Schumacher said the council's goal continues to be having the center open for the fair, despite the change in contractors.

"I can't comment on what challenges the original contractor may have found," Schumacher said. "But I know that council's focus has been on having this fair barn open and ready for the fair and all the organizations that plan on using it."

Schumacher said the project may not be completely signed off on by the fair, but the goal is to have it usable for some major activities, such as showing animals.
