Former teacher sentenced to 8 years

The 26-year-old pleaded guilty last year to child pornography charges

A former Joel E. Barber teacher was sentenced in federal court Wednesday for receiving and distributing child pornography over the Internet.

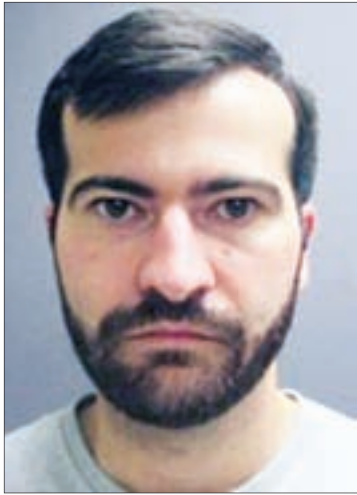
Brandon Hileman, 26, of Lebanon, was sentenced by U.S. District Judge M. Douglas Harpool to eight years in federal prison without parole, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Western District of Missouri.

Hileman, formerly a junior high math teacher at Joel E. Barber pleaded guilty on Nov. 14, 2018. Hileman admitted that he received child pornog-

raphy over the Internet between Jan. 1 and Sept. 29, 2017.

Hileman was a teacher at the time the pornography was downloaded. He was placed on leave from Joel E. Barber at the time of the investigation and was later dismissed from employment with the school district.

The investigation began when a Lebanon police detective was notified that Hileman had uploaded two videos of child pornography to his Google Drive account. Law enforcement officers executed a search warrant at Hileman's residence on Sept. 29, 2017, and seized computers, an iPad, cell phones and digital storage de-

vices. Investigators examined the devices and found 886 images and 46 videos depict-

ing child pornography, along with nearly 500 depictions of children engaged in the act of urination or defecation. Almost 600 images of a juvenile with whom Hileman was acquainted were also located, at least two of which were inappropriate (although not pornographic).

Hileman told investigators he began viewing child pornography as a teenager.

This case was prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney James J. Kelleher. It was investigated by Immigration and Customs Enforcement's (ICE) Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) and the Lebanon Police Department.

Chief Schneider: Fighting fires for 30 years

Lebanon Fire Department Chief Sam Schneider has spent most of his professional life in the fire service. It is a career choice that has given him a lot of satisfaction.

"I very much enjoy the job. I am appreciative of the challenges that it provides and the brotherhood of the emergency services and the fire service. Here in my own community, I hope to improve and build a department that responds to the needs of the community, citizens and visitors coming through here. It takes a lot of work, a lot of time, a lot of dedication, and I truly enjoy all that," Schneider said.

He spent years rising through the ranks of the fire service on his way to become the chief.

Following his 1988 graduation from Lebanon High School, he began his career in the fire service in October 1989 when he joined the Lebanon Rural Fire Department as a volunteer. His reasons were twofold.

"I was, in all honesty, in a word, bored," Schneider said. Schneider was working as a computer aided drafter after graduation and wanted something interesting to do on nights and weekends. Plus, he was looking for a way to give back to the community where he was raised.

By the time he left Lebanon Rural in 1995, he had risen to the rank of assistant chief, an unpaid position at that time.

He became a licensed EMT through a program at Breech Medical Center. He left his drafting job for an EMT job with Breech Paramedics and began training to become a paramedic, working briefly for Breech.

He left Lebanon in December of 1995 for a job in the Kansas City metropolitan area as a firefighter-paramedic for the Fort Osage Fire Protection District outside of Independence, Mo.

He also worked part-time for the Sni Valley Fire Protection District in Oak Grove.

R-3 School Board hires new LTCC director

Mr. Johnson's expertise will support our District's effort to ensure that every student has a clear plan for their future,"

Johnson and his wife have three children, ages 19, 20, and 21. They also have three dogs, enjoy the lake and the beach, and are Cardinals and Chiefs fans. When asked about coming to Lebanon Johnson said, "We are excited to lay roots in Lebanon and build friendships and relationships."

I appreciate Lebanon's shared passion for career education and developing college and career ready students."

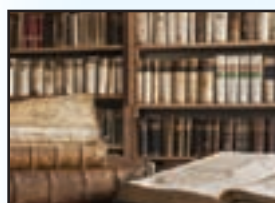

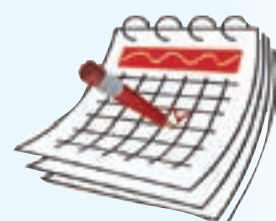

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Local author to release collection of veterans' stories

'Eclectica,' an anthology of stories written by veterans and veterans' family members will release later this month

"Eclectica" is Joyce Ragland's latest book, a collection of stories written by veterans and veterans' family members that grew out of veterans' writing workshops that Joyce facilitated. As editor, Joyce chose the entries for the book. Due out soon, her latest work will be welcomed with a book launch at Springfield's Barnes & Noble.

"I facilitated writing workshops for veterans and their families, sponsored by the Missouri Humanities Council in 2016, 2017, and 2018," Joyce explained while enjoying a cup of hot tea on a chilly February morning. "From there, some of the students wanted to continue to work together as critique groups and this book came to be as a result."

Ragland says the book is an "eclectic mix but a good mix."

"It includes stories based on whatever the veterans themselves wanted to write about. The book includes western stories, fiction, non-fiction, poetry, and science fiction. My story, for instance, is about my great-grandfather and his experience in the US Civil War. There are local writers featured in 'Eclectica,' as well as writers from other parts of the

country," she said.

Joyce Ragland began her professional life as a music teacher in Conway and Francis Howell School District in St. Charles County before securing a degree in educational administration. She went on to teach history, philosophy of education, and applied educational psychology at the University of Saskatchewan in Canada, East Tennessee State University, Aurora University in Chicago and Missouri's Eureka College and Truman State University.

"The longer I taught on that level, the less I liked it," Joyce laughed. "I loved the teaching but not the administrative roles. I started writing for fun and am still enjoying it. My first two books were academic, written while I was still a professor. After that, I took early retirement and moved back home to Laclede County. I'm a Conway High School graduate and when I heard the story of how the Conway Robotics team had won the B.E.S.T. championship in robotics, I was intrigued."

"Dread the Fred," published in 2013, is Joyce's riveting non-fiction account of the Conway robotic students' struggle to overcome a variety of obstacles in this true story of the underdog coming out on top.

"After that I was hired to tell the life story of John A. Garrison in 'Throwaway Child,' a self-made multi-millionaire who was mistreated and abandoned by his parents but went out into the world to make his fortune after graduating the eighth grade," she said.

Other books include "Travel in the Sixties," another anthology, a collection of short stories she compiled to benefit her charity and a novel, "Girls Don't."

"Girls Don't" is pure fiction," Joyce said, "but about an era that I know well. Set in the summer of 1962, sixteen year old

Lorena loves science at a time when girls don't do science. They became nurses or teachers or took up other traditional roles. Lorena, however loves Margaret Mead, a well-known anthropologist and no one in her family understands her except one aunt and one cousin. A sequel to that book, 'Boys, 1963' is in the planning stages right now."

Joyce Ragland's life has revolved around more than just her writing and her books in recent years.

"In 2005, my mother, Ella Ragland died of Alzheimer's. She was a gifted artist and when

I tried to donate in her name, I found there were few resources available to people other than medication. I started the Ella Ragland Art charity, a non-profit charitable organization to fund music therapy for Alzheimer's and dementia patients," she said. "As a former music teacher, I know 50 years of research tells us that music can reach these patients. They still remember old songs and church hymns, especially from their teen and younger years, even when they can't remember their loved ones and other important parts of their lives. We help to

Plans for a coffee house at 351 South Adams are in question, but the rezoning of the property continues.

The Lebanon City Council voted Monday to give first reading approval for plans to rezone the property from residential to neighborhood

commercial. The council plans to vote on a second reading at a future council meeting.

Craft said they want to proceed with the rezoning.

"We're going to go ahead and pursue it, it just leaves the potential out there for another prospective buyer," she said.

Craft said she had signed all the paperwork for the rezoning and planned to continue with it.

Museum attracts 12 to 15K visitors

If you have never stood in a 41,000 square foot space, it is big, really big! So big, in fact, you cannot imagine filling it. That is exactly what I was thinking 17 years ago when I toured the empty Kmart building for the first. It had sat empty for about three years and had a hole in the roof that you could put your arm through. It was difficult to imagine that anything beautiful and inviting would ever be possible. Because I am surrounded by well-wishing friends, I received countless suggestions for the same. After all, we were moving from a 9,000 square foot building so 41,000 square feet was ridiculous. One person suggested we use half as a library and the other half as a skating rink. Another thought one side would be perfect for a bow range. No, I am not kidding. And neither were they. So, I was not surprised when I had a visit from a man I had never met. That man was Bill Wheeler. He had this crazy idea that we should include a museum in the new library. Not just any museum, a Route 66 museum. Crazy, right?! At this point, I was still the interim Director and scared to death to tell anyone “no” about anything. Instead, I would happily turn them over to my District Board who were very smart people. I just knew the Board would smile, nod and send him on his way. They not only listened, they agreed. What?!The nearly 200,000 visitors who have visited the Lebanon-Laclede County Route 66 Museum would indicate that it was not as crazy as I had thought. Thus, our Library became a Destination Library. It works as a win-win from either the Library’s point of view or the Museum’s. With Bill and his new organization, Lebanon-Laclede County Route 66 Society, we were on our way. The Board agreed to allot about 3,000 square feet to the Museum and like the Library, it was filled quickly.

All these years later, we average 12-15,000 visitors each year. They come from all over the state, the nation and the world. We’ve had hordes (seriously, hordes) of Harleys, classic cars, family vans and a few who looked like they were headed to Walley World, parked in our lot. Our library is featured in dozens of Route 66 books, magazines, website and travel guides. The only autographs I have ever given were for Japanese tourists who document their travels by the signatures next to the location listed in the guide. Does that make me only famous for my Museum? I’m okay with that.

Another lesson learned. Sometimes the craziest ideas are the best.

At the same time, he was volunteering with the Lake Lotawana Fire Department and teaching for the University of Missouri's Fire and Rescue Training Institute and another training program elsewhere.

He worked at the Fort Osage Fire Department for over two years before he began working for the city of Liberty for another two years before leaving for Belton to be a full-time training officer.

Schneider made one last career move in April of 2001 when he returned to Lebanon as Lebanon City Fire Department's chief.

Coming home had not been on his professional to do list.

"It wasn't on my radar. It wasn't even a thought process that I had at the time. I knew over time that I would like to continue to rise through the ranks of the fire service and possibly potentially become a fire chief at some point," Schneider said.

On a Tuesday morning just a few minutes into his work day, his mother called with the word that Chief Bob Acuff had announced his retirement at the city council meeting the night before.

A few minutes after his mother's call, a friend of his living in the Lebanon area also called to tell him of the opening.

The information lit a fire under Schneider. He filled out an application and sent in a résumé.

Schneider remembers being told at the time that the city had received a dozen applications from across the country and interviewed four or five applicants with Schneider being one of the last two.

"When I left, I met a friend of mine in the hallway, a gentleman that I knew who had been in the service longer than I had and had already been a fire chief in other places," Schneider said.

Schneider decided the interview had simply been good practice since

his friend had likely landed the job.

However, he got the call from then City Administrator Scott Shumate for a followup meeting that Schneider predicted would be a polite thanks for interviewing for the position. He was about to be promoted to assistant chief in charge of training in Belton. Consequently, not being selected as the Lebanon's fire chief would not have ended his rise through the ranks.

Surprising to him, Shumate offered him the job. Schneider's résumé building ended. He has been Lebanon's fire chief for almost 18 years.

As chief, Schneider is proud of the capabilities of his staff. They are trained in technical rescue, hazardous materials, fire suppression and emergency medical care.

"I can't say enough about the good they do and the work they put in. The dedication from the staff has been tremendous," Schneider

said.

He appreciates the cooperation he received from the city councils and city administrators over the years in providing the resources needed to be well equipped with two ladder trucks, a heavy rescue vehicle and two engines that pump over twice the volume of the 1995 engine that was in service when he arrived in 2001.

He is appreciative of his staff as well.

"The nice thing about a career fire department that is staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week is that you do have that timely response to incidents. The staff, the firefighters we have, simply in my own estimation are incredible. We have a minimum staff that is on duty. If you look at other communities our size, sometimes we don't always have as many on duty as they do, but we still do the job," Schneider said.

While he still dons a turnout coat occasionally, Schneider's role as chief typically involves

administration, management, planning and strategies.

"My job is more one of command and management and administration than it is hands-on physically fighting the fire. I do get suited up once in a great while, not as often as I used to by any means," Schneider said.

Schneider makes certain that training is ongoing at the Lebanon Fire Department.

"We try to train everyday on something. Some days are more intense and take longer than others. Training is one area where we would like to see some improvements made, and we recognize that and we're trying to take steps to correct those things and provide more training," Schneider said.

Training is not limited to in-house activities. Five firefighters recently went to winter fire school at the University of Columbia at the Fire and Rescue Training Institute

Schneider said the fire department responds to calls for emergency medical services to get trained medical personnel on scene as quickly as possible to start patient care. Depending on the scene, ambulance personnel might need extra hands to move a patient from a ditch or down stairs.

It happens rarely, but when events warrant it, like the multiple wrecks on Super Bowl Sunday a year ago, when all ambulances were committed elsewhere, Chief Schneider's crew will transport a patient to the hospital.

The fire service has given him more than just a successful career.

"I actually met my wife because of a high speed car chase that ended in a motor vehicle accident," Schneider said.

While on scene, Schneider noticed an attractive young lady in a sheriff's uniform and introduced himself. The lady was engaged but became a friend of Schneider's and did him the favor of introducing him to Lori who was working for Clay County child services division.

Schneider has a few non-fire related hobbies.

For four years, he has coached Wicked Gold, a traveling girl's fast pitch softball team of which his daughter Katie, 15, is a member.

"My wife Lori enjoys it. My wife likes picking on me from the stands with text messages asking me why I'm doing something or why I'm not doing something. 'What were you thinking?' As a family we enjoy it, and our friends enjoy it as well," Schneider said.

Katie may be responsible for another of Schneider's hobbies down the road.

"I am sure my next hobby will be worrying. My daughter is about to get her license in the next few months. I'm sure my hobby will be worrying about her when she's out driv-

ing around," Schneider said.

While he may spend some time in the future worrying about an event not likely to happen, he will spend more time preparing for what will.

"We hate responding to any type of a fire or any emergency, but the realization is we know it's going to happen and we want to be ready for it and to respond to it in a quick and efficient way," Schneider said.

Sometimes, Schneider gets surprised by what he finds at the scene of motor vehicle accidents.

"I have seen accident scenes where I knew everybody in the car was dead and nobody was hurt or just minor injuries, and I've seen others where it literally looked like they had slid off the side of the road or something and, unfortunately, they were deceased. You just never know what to expect in those situations," Schneider said.

As fire chief, he was on the scene of the Five Angels fire that took the lives of five Lebanon children in June of 2018.

"Anytime you respond to something of that nature, it certainly wears on you. That has probably been the most devastating and emotional incident that I've ever responded in my almost 30 years of doing this. The hardest part for me would just be seeing things of that nature at times. Fortunately, they are few and far between. It wouldn't bother me to never see them again," Schneider said.

What happens more often than a loss of life is the cheating of death. These incidents form the highlights of Schneider's job.

"The times when our crews have saved someone from a car wreck or a fire—we've had a number of saves like people who were in cardiac arrest and are still alive today—those are great moments to see," Schneider said.

Lebanon Fire Chief Sam Schneider said the cause of the fire is undetermined, but

lightning was a possibility.

"We couldn't isolate a cause. We had storms earlier (that night), and we can't rule out lightning," he said.

No one was inside the building at the time.

Schneider said there was significant heat and smoke damage to the interior of

the building.

A driver passing by the building reported seeing the blaze at about 10:47 p.m. and firefighters were dispatched to a smoke investigation at 1110 Springfield Road.

"When crews arrived on scene, they found smoke coming from the building around the roof area," Schneider said. "An

active fire was visible as well. They were able to gain entry to the building and did an interior attack on the fire and had it under control in less than an hour."

Lebanon firefighters received assistance from Lebanon Rural Fire Department, Mid-County Fire, St. Robert Fire and Tri-County Fire.

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A small church with a big ministry

Sleeper United Methodist has many programs to help others

The Rev. Marsha Vincent states that she never ceases to be amazed at the number of ministries that come out of Sleeper United Methodist Church, the small church where she has served as pastor for the past 10 years.

When asked about her life before becoming a pastor in mid-life, she laughed, "I had wonderful teachers all along the way."

As a teenager, Vincent started working for Joe Knight in his downtown pharmacy. She then started a career in the floral business. First working for Wallace Willard at Scarborough Florist then opening her own floral business with a partner. She also worked for Norman's Bridal Shop for several years.

"I think God has a delicious sense of humor when he calls the completely unprepared to serve his purposes. But then hasn't He done that all through the years?" Vincent said.

Marsha is married to Dee Vincent and they have a grown daughter, Tori, a son-in-law Bill and a grandson, Vincent.

"I was asked at one point if we ever considered changing our church's name since Sleeper doesn't sound like a real exciting place. Having been in business, though, I know how important advertising is. We have the Missouri Highway Department advertising for us with that large highway exit sign out there that says Sleeper and a big 40 foot cross in our front yard. When you put those two things together, it's pretty easy to tell folks how to find us. And you know what a 'sleeper' is in a race? That's the one to watch and that's the truth

about this church, too," Marsha Vincent said.

The church's ministries include a prayer shawl ministry and a quilt ministry as ladies from the church make prayer shawls to hand out to "someone who literally needs a hug as well as a prayer."

"We've given out around 600 prayer shawls over the years. I know one lady in our church has made over 200 of them. We have another young woman who has started making them who is new to the church so that's exciting, too," the reverend said. "The lap quilts are for those in nursing homes, in cancer treatment, anywhere they might need a little extra comfort, a little extra warmth. We have an

80-year-old couple who make many of those. Now that is sweet."

Vincent believes the church's most powerful ministry is its prayer ministry, which is people praying for others.

"God is so good. This church does an excellent job of reaching out to comfort the grieving and providing memorial services. We are a small congregation, with an average attendance of 50 or so, who come from all around the area, from Lebanon to Waynesville and back," she said.

Another ministry is administered by a grade school aged church member named Nora. The ministry, Nora's Blessing Bag, gives out bags filled with necessary items to

people in need. Plastic bags are filled with hygiene items needed by the growing number of homeless.

"She puts them together and people are now bringing items to church to help her fill the bags. Anyone can take a bag or two to keep in their car and hand out when they come across someone who needs assistance," Vincent said.

Another service of Sleeper United Methodist is their backpack ministry that provides food packs to students in Stoutland schools. Their fastest growing ministry, however may be the Tri-County Christian School.

"We have amazing teachers who provide

so much more than just an excellent education to nearly 50 students, ages first through eighth grades," the proud pastor added. "Our leadership voted unanimously to open our church to this school. That was really important to me. This is one more essential way that our church is of service to this community and specifically to these students."

The church also is "very appreciative" to the Sleeper-Stoutland Fire Department. To show thanks, the church regularly provides the use of its gym for the fire department's fundraisers. The Sleeper Methodist's facility is called the GYM, which means God, You and Me who come together

at the church.

"This is our legacy," Marsha Vincent concluded. "I love our Sunday morning worship service at 10 a.m., but I also love our Wednesday evening gatherings at 7 p.m., which includes singing, prayer and testimonies, a time to share your story. I think so often we get a myopic or one-sided view of church but the truth of the matter is that in our changing world, our faith communities are more important than ever, serving in so many ways and they are going to continue to become even more so in the future. We are growing in so many ways and our doors are always open to those looking for a new church home."

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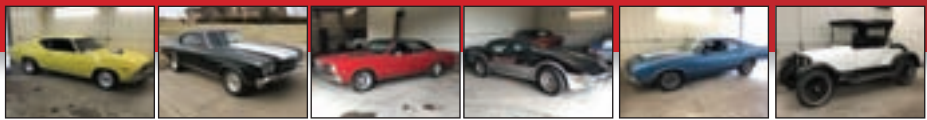
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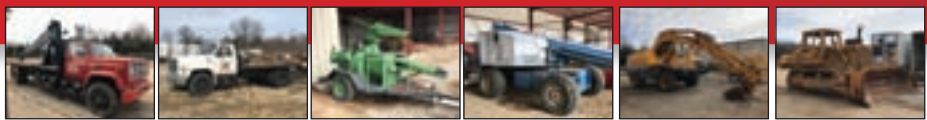

Ricky Gervais’ returns with a new TV series that is both familiar to the British comedian’s previous work but also sees the actor/writer/director stretch his acting skills to a new level.

“After Life” is the latest show from the mind of Gervais, who previously brought us beloved hits like “The Office” and “Extras.” If your’e a fan of the comedian’s previous work, then “After Life” is a must watch. If you didn’t like what you’d seen before, there’s a good chance that this will be more of the same for you. Those of us who are fans of Gervais, though, will note that the creator

peppers in moments to this new series that really have him showing off his abilities as an actor. He’s probably too much of a perfectionist to lend any control to anyone else creatively, but I feel like this TV series shows that with a perfect script and a better director, Gervais could show off some real dramatic acting chops.

“After Life” tells the story of Tony (Gervais), a man who has recently lost his wife (Kerry Godliman from Gervais’ “Derek”) and doesn’t want to go on living any more. After unsuccessfully trying to commit suicide, Tony decides to take his depres-

sion and inner pain out on everyone around him, including his coworkers at a small community newspaper. While the people around him try to raise him up out of the dumps, he spends all of his time trying to tear them down (usually in a pretty funny fashion). Interspersed with this dark comedy that Gervais is so well known for are moments of absolute dramatic sadness, including a side story involving a junkie who’s recent loss of a girlfriend to an overdose mirrors Tony’s story.

In the end, “After Life” is a pretty predictable story. We all know where this depressed curmudgeon is going to

end up from the very first episode. But, Gervais comedy and a few dramatic moments thrown in from out of left field shake things up enough to make this a very enjoyable show. It helps that the whole of the series can be taken up in a sitting or two with just six 30-minute episodes making up the entire first season.

Gervais may not be able to fool you with where his story is going, but he plans enough twists and turns, exploring the many sides of death and grief that you’ll forgive him for the cliches written into the story.

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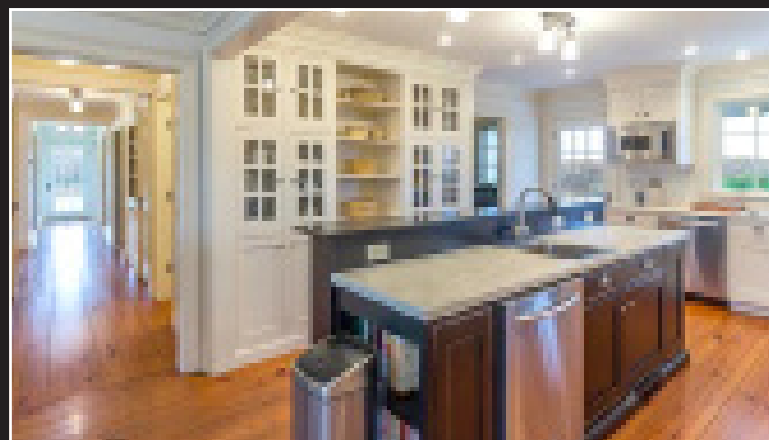

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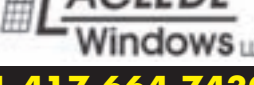

Husband's Adoption About-Face Makes Wife Unsure of Future

DEAR ABBY: When I first started dating my boyfriend seven years ago, I told him that I wanted to someday adopt a child. He said he would like his own children first, but adoption would be "cool." We now have two children, 5 and 3, and I'm ready to adopt. We're financially able to support another child, and we both have great careers. When I recently mentioned adoption to him, he said he has changed his mind and doesn't want to adopt. He says because we have our own children, he wouldn't want the adopted baby to potentially feel like the "odd one out." Is this something to end an otherwise happy marriage over? Or should I give it one more shot and hope maybe he'll want to adopt? I have wanted to do this since I was a little girl, and it is important to me.

PRO-ADOPTION IN OHIO

DEAR PRO-ADOPTION: You and your husband may need professional mediation to reach an agreement that will work for both of you. Bringing a child who needs a loving family into your home can be managed if everyone is on the same page with it — including your biological children. Your husband may not want the responsibility of another child because he has experienced parenthood twice and knows how much is involved in raising them, but the reason he gave doesn't strike me as valid. That said, leaving your husband would be no guarantee that you would be in a position to adopt a child alone. There may be other options for you if you want to help children waiting for adoption — including fostering, mentoring or volunteering with the Big Brothers Big Sisters program.

DEAR ABBY: I read your column daily and notice that you often suggest readers consult a "nutritionist" for assistance with healthy eating, weight loss, etc. I have been a registered nurse for almost 50 years, and I would like to point out that the professional to be consulted about nutrition is a registered dietitian. A registered dietitian holds a college degree and usually a higher level degree, and teaches to the American Dietetic Association nutritional standard. This is an important distinction. A nutritionist can be anybody who says they are one. Registered dietitians do not promote any fad diets and teach proper eating. This is especially important for people with medical diagnoses such as diabetes or heart disease, among others. But the teaching is for anyone who wants information about healthy eating to maintain good health throughout life. Some dietitians have private offices, but if your readers can't locate one, they should ask their primary doctor so he/she can refer them to one. Or call the nutrition department of their local hospital, as there are often classes that can be attended at the hospital. NURSE WHO KNOWS IN MASSACHUSETTS

Exercise and aging: How to work out safely after 50

In an ideal world, people young and old exercise each day. But as men and women age, finding time to work out is not so easy.

• **Speak with your physician.**

• **Begin with low-intensity exercises.** Even if you feel great and have maintained a healthy weight, don't push yourself too hard at the start. Your body needs time to adjust to physical activity, so choose low-intensity exercises like walking and light strength training so your muscles, tendons and ligaments can adjust. Initially, exercise every other day so your body has ample time to recover between workouts.

• **Choose the right places to exercise outdoors.** Exercising outside provides the best of both worlds for many people, providing a chance to get healthy all while enjoying the great outdoors. When exercising outdoors, choose areas that are not remote and

where others can see you and offer help if you suffer an injury or have an accident. Boardwalks, public parks and outdoor gyms are safer places to work out than wooded areas or other places well off the beaten path.

Exercising after 50 can help people live healthy well into retirement. But caution must be exercised when aging men and women return to exercise after a long break.

• **Stay hydrated.** The NIA notes that many people lose their sense of thirst as they age. But just because you aren't thirsty does not mean you don't need water, especially while exercising. Water regulates body temperature and lubricates the joints, thereby decreasing your risk of injury during exercise.



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
