Lebanon man charged in stabbing

Witness describes drug deal gone bad leading up to the alleged assault

A man sustained knife wounds to his hands following what might have been a marijuana sale gone bad, but the alleged stabber claims he did not use a knife when fighting the man.
Roger Allen Howser, 41, of Lebanon, has been charged with a class B felony of first-degree assault and one count of armed criminal action after he allegedly injured another man with a knife on Tuesday.
At approximately 8 a.m. Tuesday, Lebanon Police officers were dispatched to the Red Fox Motel on West Elm Street to investigate a report of an assault with a knife. According to a probable cause statement from the Lebanon Police Department, the officers located a suspect matching a description they had been given and reported what appeared to be blood droplets in the parking lot in front of the motel room in question.
The Lebanon Police Department also learned that a man with knife wounds had been admitted to Mercy Hospital Lebanon.
A witness told police he and two other people — a woman and the eventual stabbing victim — had gone to buy marijuana prior to the altercation. The witness said that he and the victim gave the woman \$60, and she went into an apartment to buy the drugs. When she returned, she told the two men that the person from whom she was purchasing marijuana had gone out the back door with the money and had not given her any drugs. However, the witness said that he and the victim thought the woman had kept the money for herself because they did not think the apartment had a back door, according to the court documents.
The witness said that the group went to the Red Fox Motel and stood arguing in front of a motel room. As the argument became more heated, Howser, who is the woman's fiancé, came out of the room with a knife, which he described as a survival-style knife.

'It would give me a life...'

Christina St. Martin has been battling kidney failure all of her life. Now, she's looking for one more donor to give her another shot at a normal life.

After four kidney transplants and years on dialysis, Laclede County resident Christina St. Martin is looking to the community for what she hopes will be a life-altering final transplant.
St. Martin was three years old when she contracted strep throat in 1989, and in about two and a half weeks the illness changed her life forever.
"We had went to the doctor," St. Martin related. "My mom took me in, and kept saying, 'There's something wrong.' And the doctor just said it'll be fine."
However, a visit to a specialist revealed that the strep had traveled to St. Martin's kidneys, causing them to fail. St. Martin's mother, Lonnie Waterman, immediately donated one of her own kidneys to her daughter, which prevented St. Martin from needing dialysis at the time.
Although St. Martin's childhood included biopsies and medication, her mother's gift allowed her to attend school and even participate in sports.
"It was a little different, but definitely I feel like when you do have a transplant, it's more normalcy in your life," St.



Martin stated. "You have to take your medications and you have to monitor it and stuff, but it's a far cry from dialysis."

When St. Martin was 14, though, the kidney she had received from her mother began to fail.

"We had to let it fail, and I got really, really sick," St. Martin remembered.

Lebanon soccer team off to strong start

Yellowjackets have allowed just one goal in four games this season

Lebanon girls' soccer head coach Matt Jernigan says the 'Jacket soccer team has had several players stand out through the early going as the team has opened the 2016 season, 3-1.

Leading the way has been Lexi Wapelhorst, who has scored 11 goals and added four assists in four games. The school record holder for most goals in a season and career, Wapelhorst is now just 11 goals away from 100 for her career.

But she has had help across the field as the 'Jackets have posted wins over Marshfield (9-0), Crocker (10-0) and Mountain View-Birch Tree Liberty (3-0).

The 'Jackets have allowed just one goal through four games. That goal came in a 1-0 loss to Southern Boone in the tournament finale on Saturday.

Jernigan said sweeper Mariah Mitchell has been a big part of the team's success defensively.

"She is playing phenomenal and is one of the fastest girls in the area," he said. "She has had that both years she has played for us, but has really added some touch in the offseason playing club ball.

"She is a standout

player back in the back, along with senior Becca Tucker. The two of them really work well together. Both have speed and touch and the defense has really stepped up and played well."

In the midfield, Alea Becker is closing in on her goals scored total of a year ago as she has four this season.

"She is doing really well controlling the middle of the field," Jernigan said.

Abbie Schmidt is a first-year starter at keeper and has helped LHS post three shutout, including a PK save against Liberty on Saturday.

"She made a couple of good saves this weekend against Southern Boone and Liberty," Jernigan said.

Lebanon was slated to face Waynesville on Thursday at 'Jacket Stadium. The Lady Tigers were off to a 1-3 start, but had played a tough slate early, falling to Columbia Battle, Columbia Hickman, Helias, and posting a win over Bishop DuBourg.

The two teams split a pair of close games last year, with Lebanon winning the regular season game 1-0, and Waynesville taking a district contest 3-2 in PKs.

"I think the past couple of years it has been a battle," Jernigan said.

"(Waynesville) has been playing well and our girls and their girls both get up for this game.

"It is just going to be a matter of who makes the least mistakes. Both teams have some great

individual talent, but it is going to take a great team effort to pull it off."

MISSOURI TIGERS

University of Missouri football program holds pro day for NFL scouts and coaches

COLUMBIA — Kentrell Brothers likely bolstered his stock in the 2016 NFL draft during Missouri's pro day on Wednesday.

Brothers improved his metrics from February's NFL combine, shortening his 40-yard dash time from 4.89 seconds to 4.73 and increasing his standing vertical jump from 28.5 inches to 31.5.

After earning first-team All-American and All-SEC honors in 2015, Brothers is projected as a second-round draft pick on most mock boards.

"I was really stressing about the 40 and I improved a lot," said Brothers, who led the nation in tackles last season with 152. "I thought the drills went well. I improved my vertical. I didn't improve the bench (press), but overall I thought I had a good day."

There were 32 NFL scouts and four coaches in attendance, including the Colts assistant offensive line coach Joe Gilbert and the Patriots offensive line coach Dante Scarnecchia.

Ten former Missouri players participated in a variety of workouts, including combine participants Evan Boehm and Connor McGovern. Boehm

and McGovern did not seek improvement on their combine numbers, instead showcasing their skill sets in a series of live drills led by Gilbert and Scarnecchia. McGovern's 33 reps of the combine-standard 225-pound bench press were second only to former Arizona State guard Christian Westerman, who had 34.

Running back Russell Hansbrough, who did not receive a combine invitation, showed signs of full health after a nagging

ankle injury limited him to 111 carries for 436 yards and a touchdown in 2015. He paced the event with a 4.38 second 40-yard dash and recorded a 30.5 inch vertical jump.

"It just drove me more to come out here and do what I did today," Hansbrough said of the combine snub. "It was kind of a downer, but coming out here, it was just like a combine. I just let it go and just got working for this right here."

Hansbrough confirmed

he hired agent James Peterson, who also represents former Missouri running back and current member of the New Orleans Saints Marcus Murphy.

Defensive backs Ian Simon and Kenya Dennis posted 40-yard dash times of 4.64 seconds and 4.48, respectively. Simon's vertical jump was 32 inches, while Dennis' was 36.

"Today was everything for me," Dennis said. "I thought I could have done better as far as my posi-

tion drills and a few of my jumps, but overall, I thought I did a pretty good job."

Dennis met with representatives from the Chicago Bears and the San Francisco 49ers yesterday, and said some teams have expressed interest in utilizing him as a safety.

"I'm okay with that," said Dennis, who recorded 35 tackles, seven pass breakups and an interception as a cornerback in 2015. "I played (safety) in junior college and in high school, so I'd be cool with that."

Simon confirmed meetings with several teams, including the Kansas City Chiefs, the Oakland Raiders and the New York Giants, as well as the hiring of Dallas-based agent Antoi Preston. He likened the uncertainty of the future to the end of a season.

"You kind of recap everything that you've done so far, but you don't let yourself settle, because there's still a lot of work to be done. And now, you're in limbo. You're playing the waiting game."

Other participants included Clayton Echard, Wesley Leftwich, Tyler Hunt and Andrew Baggett.

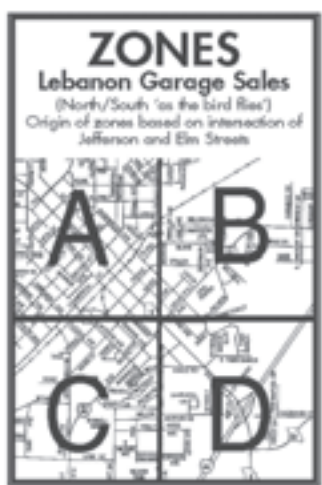

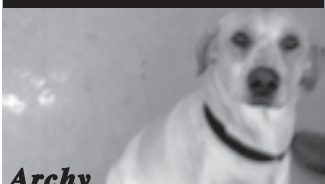

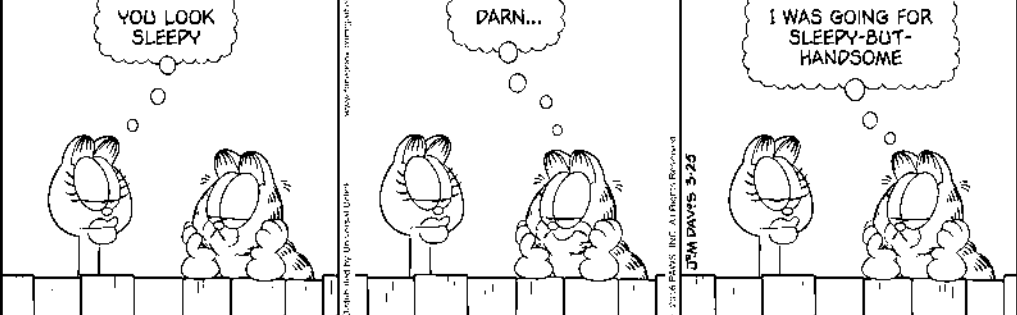

St. Martin

St. Martin's sister, Nicole Deptula, a then-19-year-old student at the University of Missouri, was discovered to be a match, and she also donated a kidney to St. Martin. St. Martin received her second kidney transplant at age 15, but two years later, she contracted an infection that caused her body to reject the kidney.

St. Martin recieved a third transplant from her aunt, Karen St. Martin, on Dec. 23, 2003, but that one only took two weeks to fail.

She came home from the hospital on New Year's day, and it didn't take long for her to realize something was wrong.

"I literally just got home," St. Martin said. "You drink a lot of water, you know, just recovering from surgery, and I kept saying, 'Something's not right, something's not feeling right, I don't feel that good.' ...I was drinking so much — a gallon — of water. I was drinking a lot, a lot of water, and it just was staying on me so I was just swelling."

When a trip to the bathroom resulted in blood rather than urine, St. Martin's family called her doctor at home, and she ended up being airlifted from the Eldridge Fire Department fire station.

After that, St. Martin was on dialysis for five years and was not a good candidate for a new kidney in Missouri.

St. Martin said that when the first transplant from her mother lasted 13 years, that was considered to be a long time. Since then, medical practices have improved so that kidney recipients can expect to keep their transplant for life. For St. Martin, the problem was that she had already had so many transplants. Her body was producing antibodies that made it difficult a matching donor.

Eventually, St. Martin heard about a clinical trial in which the Mayo Clinic of Rochester, Minn. was working with patients who had high antibodies. The trial included immunoglobulin therapy and replacement of her antibodies through plasmapheresis Two days before her transplant, doctors decided to also remove her spleen, which manufactures antibodies.

For one year, St. Martin lived in Minnesota for two out of ever four weeks. At

one point, she was in the hospital for three straight months because her body was shutting down.

St. Martin's friend Stephanie MacMahon gave St. Martin her fourth kidney.

"It got me healthy right away. The kidney just worked great," St. Martin said.

That transplant allowed St. Martin to have a full-time job and live what she describes as a normal life, but eventually routine blood work revealed that that kidney was failing as well.

"It failed just out of the blue," St. Martin said. "It was really hard to take, and we had to just let it fail."

St. Martin has been on dialysis for the past four years. She works three times per week as phlebotomist at the Phelps County Hospital, and she takes home dialysis treatments for two and a half hours five times per week with the help of her fiancé Justin Hilton.

"I have good days and bad days, and when I get off dialysis, I'm tired, and so I have to lay down. My body's just basically exhausted, and your muscles hurt," St. Martin said.

Now St. Martin is hoping for another kidney transplant — one that will last the rest of her life. She needs a living donor, and in addition to donating a kidney that person will also donate bone marrow for a bone marrow transplant.

But first, she needs to find a donor.

"Basically, I've just kind of run out of family members that match," St. Martin said. "It's just me and my one

sibling."

St. Martin said that at the Mayo Clinic a kidney donation involves laparoscopic surgery leaving a 1 1/2 inch scar. Her last donor was in the hospital for two days and was back to work in two weeks. Two of St. Martin's donors have since had babies, St. Martin said, and donors have no financial responsibility for the surgery.

"It would give me a life, more quality of life," St. Martin stated. "When I have the transplant, to me it's so much worth it because I get to spend more time with my family. It means a longer life for me, because on dialysis your life is shortened by a lot, and I'm only 31."

She continued, "With a

transplant, the benefits to me, you can't measure them. If you took yourself and were sick all the time... and had to go to the hospital all the time, and so if you didn't have to do that, and you can take some medicine every day and just kind of monitor stuff — you know, things happen, but not anything like now. You'd be able to go on vacation and go see your family."

Charges

The report says an officer saw what appeared to be dried blood on the blade of the knife.

Additionally, the officer noted that Howser had what appeared to be blood stains on the legs of his pants.

Howser is being held in the Laclede County Jail with bond denied.

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
