Man allegedly attacks deputy

Suspect allegedly grabbed taser and zapped LCSO officer after choking homeowner

A Lebanon man is behind bars after allegedly wrestling a taser from a deputy and zapping him with it.

James Allen Deslongchamps, 36, of Lebanon, is being held in the Laclede County Jail in lieu of a \$25,000 bond after being charged with felony assault of a law enforcement officer, according to court records.

A Laclede County Sheriff's Office deputy was dispatched just after 9 p.m. Sunday to a home on Jeffries Road to investigate a fight

between two men. When the deputy arrived, he spoke with Deslongchamps, who allegedly became "very upset" and came at the deputy in a "very aggressive manner."

The deputy told Deslongchamps to stop and sit down, but Deslongchamps allegedly kept coming toward the deputy. As he got closer, the deputy took Deslongchamps to the ground and

tried to stun him with his taser. Deslongchamps allegedly took the taser and struck the deputy with it, tasing him in the lower back, according to a probable cause statement filed by the LCSO.

The deputy got the taser back and tasered Deslongchamps in the back and chest. The deputy reported the taser had no effect on Deslongchamps.

Deslongchamps allegedly continued to try and grab the deputy, so the deputy struck Deslongchamps in the mouth, knocking him to the ground. The deputy placed Deslongchamps

in handcuffs and put him in his patrol car, the court document says.

A man at the residence told the deputy that Deslongchamps had been in his field yelling. When the man went to the field to see what was going on, Deslongchamps allegedly grabbed him by the neck. The man said he "forced" Deslongchamps to release him, the statement says.

The deputy reported that the man had redness on his neck. The deputy also allegedly sustained a cut on his hand and elbow during the scuffle.

Defeating the past

Dugger's book examines 'unbecoming all the stuff that you were never meant to be'

For anyone who has tried over and over again to kick the same bad habit only to have it come creeping back, a new book might bring a fresh perspective to their struggle.

Lebanon pastor Larry Dugger recently published "40 Days to Defeat your Past,"

a book aimed at helping people identify and overcome their own detrimental behaviors.

"The message of the book is really that change is tough, and the way to change is to unbecome everything you were never meant to be," Dugger said. "A lot of times in life we feel like we can't become the person that everyone is expecting us to become or be. And I say that it's not about becoming anything new; it's about becoming you. And you do that by unbecoming all the stuff that you were never meant to be. I talk about how life is difficult, and if you want to change, you really have to get in the trenches

with that person that you no longer want to be and roll up your sleeves and really fight to secure your future."

Dugger is the pastor of Real Life Church in Lebanon, and he is also the administrator of the Real Life Counseling Center, which he says is Missouri's only free professional counseling center. According to the cover of his book, he has a certificate of theology and principles of Christian counseling from Berean University.

"This isn't a self-help book; it's a self-confrontation book," Dugger said of his work. "The problem with most people is (that) all we do is help ourselves. We never confront ourselves. We never get honest, never get gut-level honest about why we are the way we are, and that's why we never change."

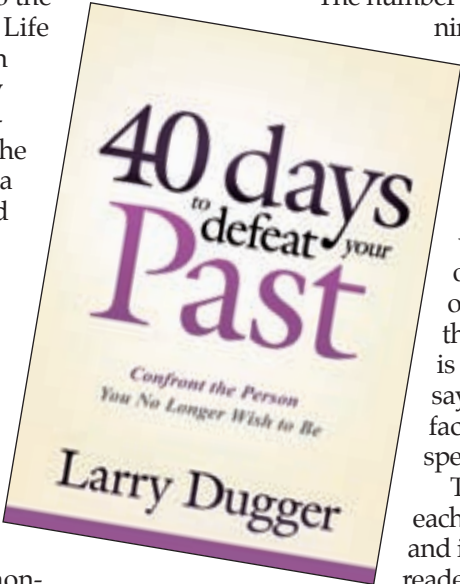
The book "40 Days to Defeat Your Past" is

designed for readers to read one passage per day for 40 days. Dugger said that he chose the number 40 because he noticed that, in the Bible, it is associated with times of transition.

"The number 40 in the Bible is related to winning battles that you usually lose, getting rid of the old so that the new can come, being set free from prison," he stated.

"Especially in the life of Jesus: he spent 40 days with the devil in the wilderness, just fighting with the devil, and we all have our own devils. We have our own personal demons, things that we fight with. So what I do, is I challenge the reader, and I say, just like Jesus spent 40 days facing the devil, you need to spend 40 days facing your devil."

The reading assignments for each day average about four pages and include advice about how readers can stay on track with their goals, as well as references to relevant Bible stories related to the number 40.

The Lebanon boys' tennis team celebrated Senior Night by capturing a thrilling 5-4 win over the Hillcrest Hornets on Wednesday at Lebanon High School.

The 'Jackets got a key 8-6 win from senior Ben Esther in No. 3 singles, who helped seal the victory for Lebanon, who improves to 7-11 on the season.

"What a match," Lebanon head coach Ron Crowell said. "It was a great

effort tonight against a very strong Hillcrest team and it was one of our best wins of the season. We are playing our best tennis of the season and we had a great night to recognize a fantastic group of seniors, and we celebrated with a huge win."

LHS also got wins from Davin Malone in No. 1 singles, Dalton Beard in No. 4 singles, Sawyer Nichols in No. 5 singles and Tanner Judy in No. 6 singles.

Aaron Crowell and Judy teamed to capture a

win in No. 3 doubles.

"Esther is playing awe-some tennis and he sealed the win with a huge 8-6 win," Crowell said. "Davin (Malone) once again played great at No. 1 singles and Tanner Judy was solid in singles.

Lebanon was slated to next face Kickapoo on Thursday, then will begin play in the Missouri Class 2 District 10 tournament. The 'Jackets will open as the No. 5 seed and will face No. 4 seeded Camdenton at 4 p.m. on Monday at Camdenton.

LHS golf team gears up for sectionals

Yellowjackets knock off Dixon on Monday, defeat Joplin in league contest on Tuesday

The Lebanon boys' golf team is headed to sectionals after placing third at the Missouri Class 4 District 5 tournament on Monday at Piney Valley Golf Course in Waynesville.

The Yellowjackets finished behind Glendale and Columbia Rock Bridge in the team standings.

"It is probably one of the toughest districts in the state," Lebanon head coach Rod Sullens said. "We don't get anything for third, but we still did pretty well."

Four Lebanon golfers will advance to a sectional round, which will be held on Monday at Rivercut. The top two two teams qualify to advance, however, since LHS had four golfer advance as individuals, the rules allow the 'Jackets to compete as a team at the sectional meet.

"We did this a few years ago, we took four guys, so it's not our first time, but it is kind of unique," he said.

Freshman Cooper Hess and senior Harrison Carr each shot a 78 and made all-district as they finished in a tie for 11th overall, while senior Lawrence Bowlin and junior Jack Ehrhardt each shot an 83, which was the cut to advance to sectional.

They both finished in a tie for 21st overall and also received honorable mention all-district status.

The tournament was won by Rock Bridge's Ross Steelman, who shot a two-under par 74.

"They (Bowlin and Ehrhardt) didn't play their best games and we are kind of looking for a rematch this Monday at sectionals," Sullens said. "They can play better than that and they know they can and they are going to have an opportunity to go and try again and I was happy for them to get that opportunity."

Glendale finished with a 302 team score, while Rock Bridge finished with a 308.

Lebanon's Tryn Titus also competed on Monday and finished in a tie for 24th overall. His 12-over par 84 was just one stroke off the pace to advance to sectionals, however.

"We knew going into this that Glendale was going to be really hard to beat and we wanted to be competitive with Rock Bridge," Sullens said. "We weren't because we shot so high, but still, getting to take a team to sectionals is a big deal, and it tells you how well the guys scored to get to qualify to go to sectionals."

"Our goal all this year is for everyone to shoot in the 70s and we've done it a few times. When we do that, we are pretty good, but if we shoot in the high 70s and 80s, then we don't have much of a chance and we know that. We all need to stay in the 70s."

The top two teams at Monday's sectional meet will advance to the state tournament as a team. LHS is one of five teams to qualify, and will play alongside a host of players who qualified as individuals. Sullens said the quality of competition at the District 5 meet has given the team some confidence as Monday's sectional approaches as the field in District 5 appears to have been much stronger than District 6.

Nixa won District 6 with a team score of 320, while Kickapoo, which also advanced with a second-place finish, shot a 345.

By contrast, Glendale won District 5 with a 302 team score, Rock Bridge was second with a 308 and LHS third with a 322.

"They are really excited about moving forward as individuals and as a team," Sullens said. "In sectionals, two districts (5 and 6) meet and the low score at the other district was a 320, that won districts. Our district was won with a 302, that's how much better our district was than the other district."

"All we have to do is compete and beat Rock Bridge, and we could sneak in with a team score, which we have an opportunity to do. We are lucky to have another opportunity to do that."

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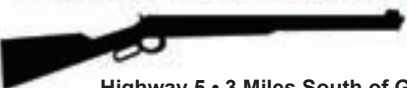
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HARVEST TABERNACLE

The hymn, "It is Well With My Soul" was written after traumatic events in Horatio Spafford's life, including the death of his son at the age of 2 and then the 1871 Great Chicago Fire, which ruined him financially because he had invested significantly in property in the area of Chicago that was extensively damaged by the great fire). His business interests were hit by the economic downturn of 1873, at which time he had planned to travel to Europe with his family. In a late change of plan, he sent the family ahead while he was delayed on business following the Chicago fire. While crossing the Atlantic, the ship sank rapidly after a collision with another sea vessel. All four of Spafford's daughters died. His wife Anna survived and sent him the now famous telegram, "Saved alone ...". Shortly afterwards, as Spafford traveled to meet his grieving wife, he was inspired to write these words as his ship passed near where his daughters had died.

We sang this song at our Women's Retreat this past weekend. Then I read a devotional which focused on this song. 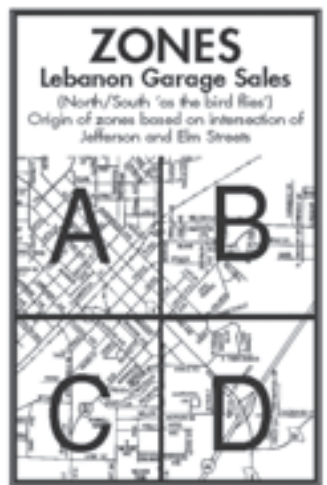

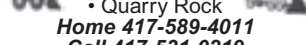

Every day I wake up with an aching, stiff back. I have a job that keeps me standing all day, so my back pain is starting to affect my performance. I like living with him,

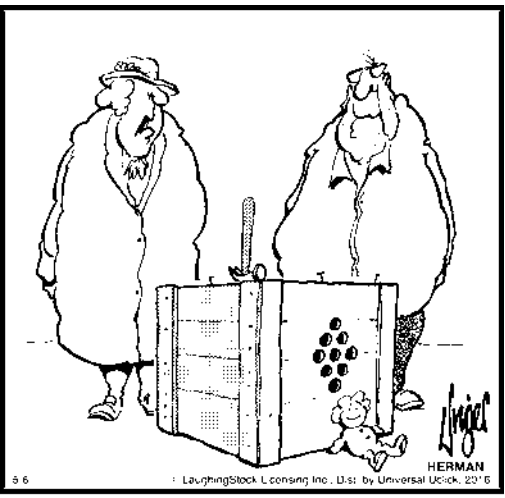
but how can I get him to replace the mattress? It seems he has chosen the mattress over me, so I guess I'll start sleeping on the floor.

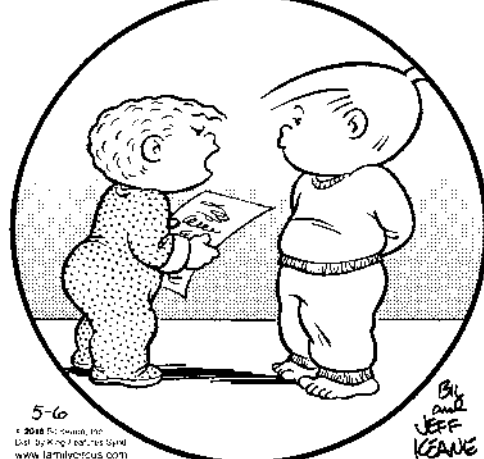

Speaker Ryan refuses to back Donald Trump

WASHINGTON — House Speaker Paul Ryan is refusing to support Donald Trump as the Republican nominee for president, insisting Thursday that the businessman must do more to unify the GOP.

The surprise declaration from Ryan on CNN's "The Lead" amounted to a stunning rebuke of Trump from the Republican Party's highest-ranking officeholder.

"I'm just not ready to do that at this point. I'm not there right now," the Wisconsin Republican said. "And I hope to. And I want to, but I think what is required is that we unify this party."

Even in an election cycle that's exposed extreme and very public divisions within the GOP, Ryan's decision to withhold his support from Trump was remarkable, as the GOP's top elected leader, second in line to the presidency, turned his back on his own party's presumptive nominee.

Ryan had maintained his silence since Trump effectively clinched the nomination with a commanding win in Indiana on Tuesday that forced his two remaining rivals from the race. Other Republican leaders, including Senate Majority Mitch McConnell, offered their grudging support for Trump, and Ryan had seemed likely to eventually do the same.

Instead he balked, in comments that could also reflect concern for his own political future and potential run for president in 2020.

"We will need a stan-

dard-bearer that can unify all Republicans, all conservatives, all wings of our party, and then go to the country with an appealing agenda that can be appealing to independents and disaffected Democrats," Ryan said. "And we have work to do on this front, and I think our nominee has to lead in that effort."

Ryan made clear he won't be supporting Hillary Clinton and that he wants to come around to backing Trump. And he acknowledged the import of Trump's victories over a field of some of the GOP's most experienced politicians, saying the mogul had "tapped into something in this country that was very powerful. And people are sending a message to Washington that we need to learn from and listen to."

"But at the same time, now that we have a presumptive nominee who is going to be our standard-bearer, I think it's very important that there's a demonstration that our standards will be beared," Ryan said.

Ryan himself, his party's 2012 vice presidential nominee, had been seen as a possible "white knight" candidate who could emerge as an alternative to Trump at a contested convention. He called a press conference last month to rule himself out, and Trump now looks set to gather the 1,237 delegate votes needed to clinch the nomination ahead of the July gathering in Cleveland, foreclosing the possibility of a contested convention.

Each daily reading ends with a question about the reader’s behavior, followed by a few lines where the reader is encouraged to keep a “reflection journal.”

“The journal’s very personal,” Dugger said. “So we talk about, if you want to change, who do you need to get rid of out of your life? Who do you need to pull closer? Where do you need to stop going? What do you need to stop buying?”

Dugger said that he tested the book’s effectiveness before he ever approached a publisher with it. He traveled to several churches, where taught the principles of “40 Days to Defeat your Past,” then 41 days later he came back to interview those who had taken the 40 day challenge. Now the stories of that pilot group are laced throughout the published version of the book under the heading of Real People,

Real Stories. Examples include stories of weight loss and overcoming addiction, as well as one story about a man who used the book as motivation to get a better job, Dugger said.

Dugger’s book will be released on May 3, and it will be available at Walmart, Barnes and Noble, Books A Million and Target, as well as online. Dugger will be holding a Lebanon book launch from 9 a.m. until noon on May 7 at the Starbucks located in the Price Cutter located at 550 North Jefferson Ave.

“I wrote the book from a Christian counselor’s perspective,” Dugger said. “Basically, we’re all just fellow strugglers. You never spiritually outgrow your difficulties and your problems and the things that make you human. So if you’re never going to spiritually outgrow those things, the only thing you can do is just attack those things head-on.”
