# Four more make history

## Wall of Honor holds new plaques honoring quartet of local luminaries

Four more of Lebanon's finest will be forever honored for their achievements on the Wall of Honor.

The 13th annual Lebanon Area Community Achievement Award Wall of Honor Banquet was held Thursday evening at the Kenneth E. Cowan Civic Center. After poring over dozens of suggestions, the Wall of Honor Committee, which is part of the Lebanon Area Chamber of Commerce, chose local businessmen T. Victor Jeffries and George E. Carr, singer and designer Patsy Sledd and long-time educator Vic Slaughter to join the 64 people already adorning

the Wall of Honor at the Civic Center. Drawing one of the larger crowds in the past 13 years, the event was moved from the meeting rooms to the foyer at the CCC to accommodate the crowd.

### T. Victor Jeffries

T. Victor Jeffries, the youngest son of John W. and Minnie Bland Jeffries, was born in 1901 in Old Linn Creek. Jeffries attended school in Linn Creek and Lebanon. After graduation, he attended Drury College and Georgetown University, where he received his law degree.

Jeffries represented the power company that constructed Bagnell

Dam, which in doing so destroyed his birthplace. Jeffries wrote the book, "Before the Dam," about Linn Creek before Bagnell Dam was built.

In the 1940s, Jeffries purchased E.B. Kellerman's abstract and title business and renamed it Jeffries Abstract and Title Company. Jeffries' company, though now under different ownership, is still in business and is considered the oldest business in Laclede County, having first been established in 1873.

Jeffries served as Lebanon's city attorney and Laclede County prosecuting attorney. He was elected to the Missouri State House of Representatives in 1934 and served three terms. Gov. Phil Donnelly, who also

was from Lebanon, appointed Jeffries as supervisor of Missouri Savings and Loan. He served in that capacity for 24 years.

Throughout his history, Jeffries continued to practice law.

"Vic was a mentor to many young people, but especially for three attorneys, Wendell Evans, Jack Miller and myself. We each started practicing law in Vic's offices with him.... providing each of us with office space, professional advice and guidance," said Judge Dean Whipple, who was a childhood friend of T. Victor Jr. and said he considered Jeffries a second father, during his introduction of the man.

## Gasconade kids honor fallen soldiers for Veterans Day

The student council at Gasconade C-4 School has chosen to honor those who have paid the ultimate sacrifice in Iraq and Afghanistan this Veterans Day by cutting and tying more than 6,000 red, white and blue ribbons to the fence in front of the rural school.

Each ribbon honors the life of a U.S. military member lost in the two wars.

Gasconade C-4 Superintendent Jim Bogle said the kids wanted to do something "different" this year.

"We all just started talking about what to do for Veterans Day," he said. "One year they put ribbons on all of trees, and we all said, 'That's neat, what else can we do?' And they came up with this."

Bogle said he is very pleased that the students had the idea to salute those who have died a world away.

"They are all really good kids anyway, but this is their idea, and they will remember for a long time that they hung that many ribbons," he said. "There are 2, 217,991 who have passed away in all of the wars. We can't hand 2 million ribbons, but we can tie 6,000-plus."

Students have tied the ribbons on the fence, and have also taken time to track down any that may have come loose and reattach them to the memorial.

"There are a lot of ribbons out there," Bogle said. "It's pretty cool. I honestly questioned how the kids were going to do this, but they got it done a lot quicker than anyone

thought. They have a banner up and all of ribbons, so it is really pretty neat. I was amazed.

"We didn't think they could ever get it done that quick," he said.

Bogle said Always Flowers helped the children and the project by donating the ribbon for the special salute.

The district will keep the display up for "a week or two," so that it can be enjoyed.

"If it still looks good, we'll keep it up longer," Bogle said.

The public is also invited to celebrate Veterans Day with a special assembly at the school at 9 a.m. Monday.

Bogle said members of the Lebanon High School Band will be performing at the event. Veterans in the area are encouraged to attend.

# Man arrested, then steals wallet at LPD

## Cameras show fistful of cash

A Lebanon man who was arrested for shoplifting couldn't pass up the temptation of another man's wallet at the police station.

Early Wednesday morning, a Walmart manager reported to the Lebanon Police Department that two people, later identified as 28-year-old Lebanon man and a 24-year-old Lebanon woman, took a can of beer and a bottle of whiskey and left the store, according to an LPD incident report.

Through a license plate number, the police were able to track them to a home on Nodaway Drive. The married couple were not found at the home, but were later picked up by a Laclede County Sheriff's Office deputy at a home on Osgood Drive and brought to the LPD.

The man allegedly admitted to taking a can of Bud Light, and the woman allegedly said she took a bottle of American Honey whiskey.

# Woman charged after police find meth pipes, drug paraphernalia

A Lebanon woman says someone left those meth pipes in her toilet tank, and the drug paraphernalia in the dresser drawer belongs to a jailed friend.

Carrie Ann Jones, 32, of Lebanon, faces a class C felony charge of possession of a controlled substance after officers of the Lebanon Police Department found pipes and drug paraphernalia in her home Tuesday.

Jones is free on a \$25,000 surety bond with special conditions.

Acting on a tip about possible drug activity, police went to Jones' home in the 200 block of Harrison Avenue Tuesday. Jones answered the door, and the officers told her why they were there according to a probable cause statement released by the Laclede County Prosecuting Attorney's office.

### US businesses boost hiring despite the shutdown

WASHINGTON — The 16-day government shutdown didn't seem to hurt the economy after all.

U.S. employers added a surprisingly strong 204,000 jobs in October, the Labor Department said Friday. And they added far more jobs in August and September than previously thought.

Activity at service companies and factories also accelerated last month in the midst of the shutdown.

All of which suggests the U.S. economy may be sturdier than many analysts had assumed.

The unemployment rate rose to 7.3 percent from 7.2 percent in September, the Labor Department said. But that was probably because furloughed federal workers were temporarily counted as unemployed.

"The economy weathered the government shutdown surprisingly well," said Ted

Wieseman, an economist at Morgan Stanley. "Businesses looked through the shutdown, remained confident in the growth outlook and kept hiring."

One weak link in the economy recently has been consumers, who spent cautiously over the summer, holding back growth. But the solid job gains in recent months, combined with modest increases in hourly pay, could encourage more spending.

Other trends have raised hopes that the economy will remain healthy in coming months: Growing demand for homes should support construction. And auto sales are likely to stay strong because many Americans are buying cars after putting off big purchases since the recession struck nearly six years ago.

Job growth is a major factor for the Federal Reserve in deciding when to reduce its economic stimulus. The Fed has been buying bonds to keep long-term interest rates low

and encourage borrowing and spending.

Stocks rose sharply in afternoon trading as investors assessed the stronger-than-expected job growth. But the yield on the 10-year Treasury note surged to 2.75 percent from 2.60 percent late Thursday. That showed that some investors worry that the healthier job growth might prompt the Fed to pull back on its bond-buying soon.

For some employers outside the Beltway, the government shutdown scarcely mattered.

Bob Duncan, founder and chief executive of Dallas-based American Leather, said his company is on track for a third straight year of steady revenue gains. American Leather custom-builds sofas, recliners and other furniture for Crate and Barrel and many smaller chains.

Duncan has boosted his 400-member workforce by about 2 percent in the past

three months.

"I think everyone's kind of numb to it," Duncan said, referring to the budget battles in Washington.

More important to Duncan has been a spate of remodeling by hotel chains, many of which had postponed upgrades until recently.

Economists differed about how October's robust jobs report might influence the Fed. Some said it probably isn't sufficient for the Fed to slow its \$85-billion-a-month bond-buying program when it meets Dec. 17-18.

"The one month of job growth is not enough to allow them to pull the trigger," said Patrick O'Keefe, director of economic research at CohnReznick.

But Paul Ashworth, chief U.S. economist at Capital Economics, disagreed, writing in a research note: "In our opinion, the data would justify the Fed reducing the pace of its asset purchases in December."

# Collecting black walnuts is an Ozarks tradition

GOODWIN — Terry Crocker's mother — Jearldean Shelton — was proud of her black walnut trees.

Every fall, as a child, Terry would collect the green globes off the ground for her mom, spread the nuts out on the driveway and crack them open with a hammer, the Springfield News-Leader (http://is.gd/fA568q) reports.

Her mom used the nuts to make "homemade fudge and awesome fruit salads" throughout the year.

But the tradition was short lived. Jearldean passed away when Terry was only 13.

"Nothing ever tastes as good as mama's cooking. She'll have to cook for me when I get to heaven," Terry said, on a crisp autumn morning, while she collected black walnuts in Phelps Grove Park.

Many people in the Ozarks remember collecting — or still collect — black walnuts.

Amie Breshears, a mother of three, picked the nuts with her parents. Her grandparents in Marshfield picked for years and would throw the nuts out in the driveway and run them over with the car.

Sometimes, Breshears, who lives in Warsaw now, used money from the nuts for Christmas gifts.

"I remember being in the

Bolivar Walmart with my dad and going through and picking a little kitchen sink thing with a stove on top. We got plastic food that went with it. That is a neat memory. I remember thinking it was the greatest day of my life because we had money and we had helped pick up walnuts," Breshears said.

Every October, the nuts rain down on city parks, farms and neighborhoods. Some people find the nuts a nuisance; some collect enough for their holiday baking; others see them as an opportunity.

They work through the wind and rain because that's when the black walnuts get knocked off the trees. And if they don't collect, then other harvesters will.

"It's like money that grows on trees," said Shaun Crocker, Terry's husband, who collects black walnuts with her. "This looks like a good year."

This is supposed to be a good harvest, and Stockton-based Hammons Products — a leading commercial processor of the nuts — is paying \$13 per 100 hulled pounds.

The busiest Greene County hulling station is located at the Ozark Empire Fairgrounds North Gate.

Already this year, the

Crockers have collected more than 5,200 pounds.

They are so well known that when they approach the hulling station, the "huller" starts writing the check, said

Terry.

In their worst year, they made \$400; in their best, they pulled in \$1,400.

For 2013, they've surpassed last year's earnings,

but 2012 was a bad year.

They work through the wind and rain because that's when the black walnuts get knocked off the trees.

And if they don't collect, then other harvesters will.

They start at the city parks, which are first come, first served, said Shaun.

"If I see someone picking nuts over here, it's common courtesy to go over there," said Shaun, after he dumped another bucket of nuts in the back of his pickup truck.

The heavier the load, the more the tires sink down.

As the season goes on, the price paid for the nuts can drop, so it's best to get in as early as possible, the Crockers said.

Brian Hammons, president of Hammons Products, said the price is not expected to change any time soon.

"I'd still encourage folks to get them in as soon as they can after they're picked up — that's when they're the best quality and weight," he said.

While the Crockers started off collecting in parks, over the years, they've cultivated clients.

Realtors will call when there's a house for sale and the nuts are falling in the yard; lawn services ask them to collect nuts before a mowing job; elderly people who are afraid of tripping on the nuts ask for help; and random people stop them, too.

"I had a gal the other day who said, 'You have to come get my nuts.' People just want someone to haul them off," said Shaun.

Shaun and Terry count on the annual harvest to

buy Christmas gifts for their three children, seven grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

"There wouldn't be Christmas in our home without it. We're on a fixed income and the government doesn't give us more for Christmas," said Terry. "This is the only time we get extra income."

While both of them collected black walnuts when they were children, the Crockers started collecting together nearly a decade ago, after Terry had a heart attack.

She weighed 220 pounds.

Both obese at that time, they started walking constantly and getting outdoors. They saw this as a way to keep fit in addition to earning extra money.

"We get a lot of good exercise doing this," she said.

They use a Nut Wizard — a contraption that resembles a broom with a round wire net — and sweep it along the grass. The nuts roll up into the Wizard as the Crockers move across the lawn.

They've come to know the parks around Springfield and venture out to other cities, too. At Phelps Grove Park on this morning, they end at the "money tree," which was full of nuts, said Shaun.

One year, they made a killing on this tree, which is why they call it the money tree. But this year, it's holding on to a lot of its nuts.

Still, they manage to fill a couple of buckets before moving on.

They'll be back.

The report showed that employers added an average of 202,000 jobs per month from August through October — up sharply from an average of 146,000 from May through July. And they added 45,000 more jobs in August and 15,000 more in September than the government had previously estimated.

Private businesses added 212,000 jobs last month. That was the most since February. By contrast, federal government jobs fell by 12,000.

Some consumers may spend more as the effect of tax increases that kicked in at the start of the year diminishes. In addition, banks are returning to health and may soon lend more freely. Even Europe is slowly recovering, and growth in Japan has picked up, which could boost U.S. exports.

Some companies expect a healthy holiday shopping season and are staffing up accordingly. UPS is filling 55,000 temporary jobs for the holidays.

One troubling detail in

the report: The percentage of Americans working or looking for work fell to a 35-year low. But that figure was probably distorted by the shutdown.

About 800,000 government workers were furloughed for all or part of the Oct. 1-16 shutdown. Many were counted as unemployed for the purposes of calculating the unemploy-

ment rate.

But because they were ultimately paid for their time off, the furloughed workers were still counted as employed by a separate government survey that calculates job growth.

Manufacturers added 19,000 jobs in October, the most since February. Construction companies gained

11,000 jobs; retailers, 44,400; and hotels, restaurants and entertainment businesses, 53,000.

Economic growth accelerated in the July-September quarter to an annual rate of 2.8 percent, the government said Thursday. That was up from a 2.5 percent annual rate in the April-June quarter.

## Pieces of history

The name of a 66th fallen warrior from Laclede County will be added to the memorial adjacent to the Kenneth E. Cowan Civic Center in a 10 a.m. ceremony Monday. He was Army T4 Sgt. Wayne Eldon Light, son of George Franklin and Cordelia Layman Light. He is buried at Hough Chapel Cemetery near Orla.

Donna Mason, president of the Lebanon Area Fallen Warriors Memorial Board, learned about Light from Dave Schneider, who spotted the soldier's gravestone. Researching Light's life, she discovered he was a Laclede County native who died as a Japanese prisoner after the infamous Bataan Death March in the Philippines. We learn more from Light's obituary, preserved in the Hough Cemetery book by Judith Cunningham and Checita Hoke:

Light was born near Lyons in 1918, just before the end of World War I. He grew up on a farm, attended school. At age 22, he enlisted in the Army. In August of 1941, Light was stationed in the Philippines, where America maintained several forts protecting its former possession.

"The last letter received by his parents was written November

23, 1941, just two weeks before the attack on Pearl Harbor, and it did not reach them until February 23, 1942," the obituary recounted. "A letter from the War Department later announced the young service man was missing in action since May 7, 1942, the fall of Corregidor."

The worried Light family heard nothing more until the War Department declared a presumed death date of May 8, 1944. A year later, a report offered the family information, but no hope. Wayne Light died May 26, 1942, at Camp O'Donnell, the terminus of the Death March. He survived the month-long siege of Corregidor and 20 days of brutal treatment as a prisoner of war, but succumbed to malaria.

In 1946, Light's remains were located in Manila Cemetery Nov. 2, "where he remained until the long journey home was started." The young soldier's final journey ended in his old neighborhood. Light was survived by his parents, three brothers and five sisters. All attended his re-interment in Laclede County. Decades later, his parents were laid to rest beside him.

Hundreds of young men served their country during World War II. Several, like Wayne Light, left for boot camp and never saw their families again. We must never forget their sacrifices.

A salute to Mrs. Mason and her committee for honoring our fallen veterans, reminding us of their patriotism and of the cost of freedom.

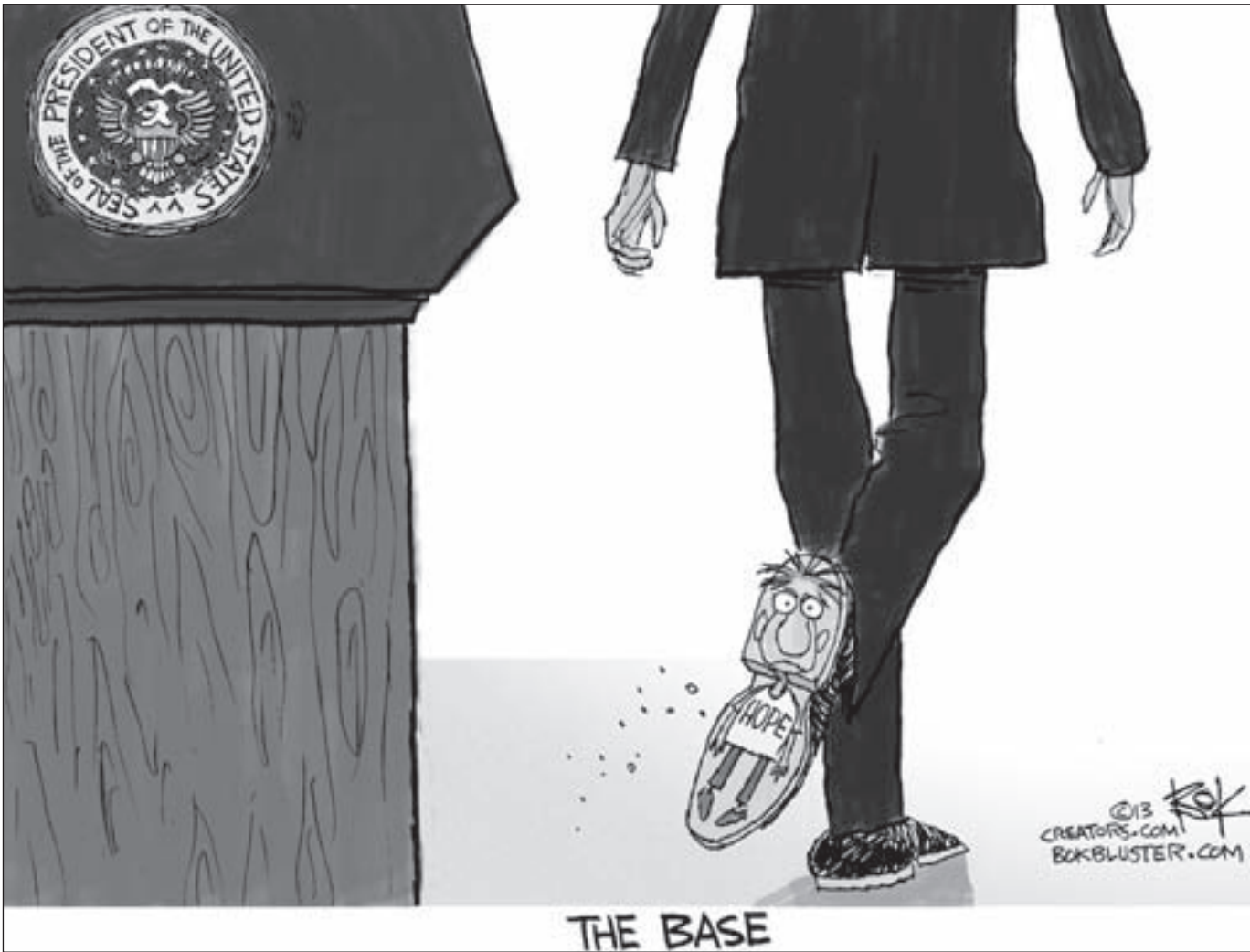
On Veterans Day, the successor of Armistice Day, we honor all who have served the nation in the armed forces, especially those who gave their lives to protect our freedoms.

## Eyes will dry over Obamacare

About the Obamacare website rollout: So-rry.

Yes, it's a mess. Tears of apology have flooded the streets of Washington, raising the Potomac to dangerous levels.

But the federal health plan's website will be fixed. (The state exchanges seem to have it right.) Once Americans can get inside the doors, most should appreciate their options. To use real estate parlance, Obamacare is not currently a "drive-by."

Between now and then, though, expect continued histrionics as only Washington can do them. Republicans frame the program as a disaster, and Democrats are into a defensive crouch, as they are wont to do. But when the situation resolves itself, most Americans will forget what they were mad about.

Some non-website concerns do deserve a respectful explanation right away. It is true that a small percentage of people are seeing their private policies canceled. This does not affect the great majority -- those covered by their employer, in Medicare or Medicaid, or with a high-quality private plan. Some may have to pay more for better coverage -- or possibly not. They'd know if the damn HealthCare.gov site were functioning.

Critics are correct that the president was -- how shall we put it? -- inaccurate in assuring the public that the Affordable Care Act would not affect people happy with their current private coverage. Point is, policies are being canceled because they don't offer the basic coverage required under the new law. And more to the point, many who bought these policies are being

cheated and don't know it.

We speak of the cheap mini-med insurance plans that, Consumer Reports writes, "may be worse than none at all." They are often issued by big-name insurance companies, leaving buyers the impression that they have serious coverage.

Sure, Fox News can dredge up lots of "victims" to insist they were happy with their substandard coverage. That's because they haven't had a medical crisis yet.

Consumer Reports offers the example of Judith Goss of Macomb, Mich. The 48-year-old was calmly going through life with a \$65-a-month policy from Cigna's Starbridge plan. Then she was diagnosed with breast cancer.

Goss found herself facing a \$30,000 hospital bill, with medical "coverage" limiting payments to \$1,000 a year for outpatient treatment and \$2,000 for hospital care. Frightened by the cost, the former Talbots saleswoman put off treatment until after her tumor had tripled in size.

So what was Goss getting for her \$780-a-year premiums? If she'd had no insurance, at least she'd have known she wasn't covered for cancer. Depending on income, someone in her position might now qualify for subsidies to bring the premiums for good coverage way down. And yes, under Obamacare, an insurer can't turn anyone away because of a pre-existing condition.

On to the other complaint: Obamacare makes those with decent incomes help the worse-off obtain health coverage. Not a terrible thing, in this opinion, but also not the full story. We who pay full freight have already been subsidizing the uninsured who show up at hospitals for "free" care. Now most

## The kids are amazing

For many American children, the floor has become their closet. This drives me crazy. I walk into a room where an urchin resides, and there are clothes scattered everywhere. Believe me, I know the passive-aggressive tactics that kids use to torture their parents, but something else is going on here.

More than a few times, I've heard parents describe their offspring as "amazing." If you look up that word, you will see this meaning: "To cause great wonder or astonishment." That's what "amazing" means. So occasionally, I will ask the parent of an "amazing" child to tell me exactly why that word applies to their tyke. What is the "great wonder" associated with him or her?

"He just is" comes the usual reply, along with a look that could kill a cactus.

Many children fully realize their parents see them as astonishing creatures and incorporate that into their daily presentations. That is, they throw their stuff on the floor because if you are truly amazing you can pretty much do what you want. Right?

When I confront the urchins about strewn clothing, I sometimes get a blank look. So I read their minds. And the brain waves come back this way: "Why are you bothering me? This is interfering with my texting. Someone will pick up my clothes. And if they don't, so what?"

American children are being done a great disservice by adult society. For reasons only Dr. Phil understands, many parents have decided to attach their own self-image to their children. So if the kid is amazing, that means the fa-

ther or mother is amazing, as well. That's what's going on.

The huge downside is that it takes a lot of work and perseverance to become amazing, and most human beings never reach that status. But children are generally not told that. They are rarely confronted with the fact that life is tough and that to succeed you have to be honest, industrious and disciplined. The discipline part kicks in when you hang up your clothing.

The disturbing thing about childhood these days is that some parents and grandparents excuse a lot of questionable behavior because they want their kids to approve of them. It all goes back to "amazing" again. If your extra-special kid doesn't like you at the moment, maybe you aren't topnotch.

Americans whose parents were raised during the Great Depression or World War II understand how drastically things have changed on the home front. My father did not care a whit whether I liked him, and it would have been unthinkable for him to pick up my stuff. There were rules in the house, and they were enforced.

So today, as an adult, I still pick up my stuff and recycle and keep a neat house. That is routine and not at all amazing. But I'm not sure that tradition will survive the next generation.

# Struggling to find answers

As those of you know who read what I write on a regular basis, I spent the last several days at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota. I was there for my annual physical examination, something I have done faithfully following cancer surgery exactly 20 years ago. I am pleased to relate that my tests all turned out good for me, and I can breathe a sigh of relief for another year. But I am sorry to relate that was not the case for many people there.

At the world-renowned Mayo Clinic, one sees children and adults from all over the world seeking answers to, and help for, their various medical problems. I saw far more people in wheelchairs and needing assistance in getting around in just a few days than I will see all the rest of the year.

My heart reached out: to parents, obviously tired and worried, taking care as best they could of their terribly sick children; to older women and men lovingly struggling to push the wheelchairs and otherwise care for their beloved spouses of many years; to those who had to use canes or crutches every step they took; to children and adults who wore assortments of head covers that shielded their heads made bare from chemotherapy;

to people who had numerous scars on their heads indicating severe injuries or surgery for brain tumors that left their actions jerky and irregular; to people of all ages whose bodies were supported by braces of one kind or another; and on the list goes. It made me wonder how people deal with such life-changing health problems: circumstances that affect not only the sick persons, but all their family members, as well.

To say that I fully understand would be incorrect, because I don't think any of us can fully understand until we have had to face those same heart-rendering situations. But having been a parish minister and dealing with those matters with families, I have learned from them what truly makes a difference. Initially, most of them have to deal with a great variety of issues, including bewilderment, anger, depression, guilt, fear, and "why did a good God let this happen?" But most of them also tell me that eventually they realize that without faith in God they could not possibly get through it. And I do not know how it would be possible for any individual, for devoted spouses, or for families to go through such life-changing situations without having faith in the God they have come to know through their particular religious faith.

It may surprise some readers that I, a Christian clergyman, would refer to finding understanding and comfort from a God other than the God revealed in the Old

and New Testaments of the Holy Bible. But keep in mind that I am not dealing here in theology; I am talking about people, regardless of what country they come from or the religious faith they practice, and how they are able to cope 24/7 with these terribly difficult medical problems. This is not the time to engage in what can end up being a continuous and divisive debate about theology. This is when we need to put away our differences and reach out in understanding to establish bonds of supportive friendship.

I confess that most of the time I do not think very much about these matters. You know the old saying: "Out of sight, out of mind." But at Mayo Clinic such matters are very much in sight, and it is pretty difficult not to think about them. During these last few days, my life has been temporarily interrupted, as it has been annually for the last twenty years, with having to deal with these unsettling emotions and wonderment—trying to make sense of why people have to go through such things, how they are able to cope, and why God allows such things to happen. When, for several days, you are in constant contact with the same critically ill and severely handicapped people—when you see them in the hallways, sit with them in the waiting rooms, chatter with them in the crowded elevators—you begin to bond with one another. It is difficult for me, a clergyman, to experience what I do at Mayo Clinic

and not have more answers. Yes, that's right, I don't have all the answers for them or myself.

Each year as I go through a reawakening to these seemingly tragic situations, I always come back to the same conclusion: although I do not understand why certain things happen, as a man of faith I believe that the world has been created by Almighty God and that he is a kind, benevolent, and all-knowing God. It helps me to read what the Prophet Isaiah wrote: "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, says the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts." (Revised Standard Version, 55:8-9) And then I turn to what Paul wrote: "For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall understand fully, even as I have been fully understood." (RSV, I Corinthians 13:12) Through faith, I trust that I and, more importantly, those who go through such afflictions, will someday understand.

Is that enough? For the cynic that will definitely not be enough. For me, it has to be enough: for I have nothing more to offer than believing in the goodness and wisdom of the God I have come to know through the Old and New Testaments of the Holy Bible.

If Lebanon and Laclede County do not want to keep Nelson Park intact, then I think they should return it to the Nelson's heirs.

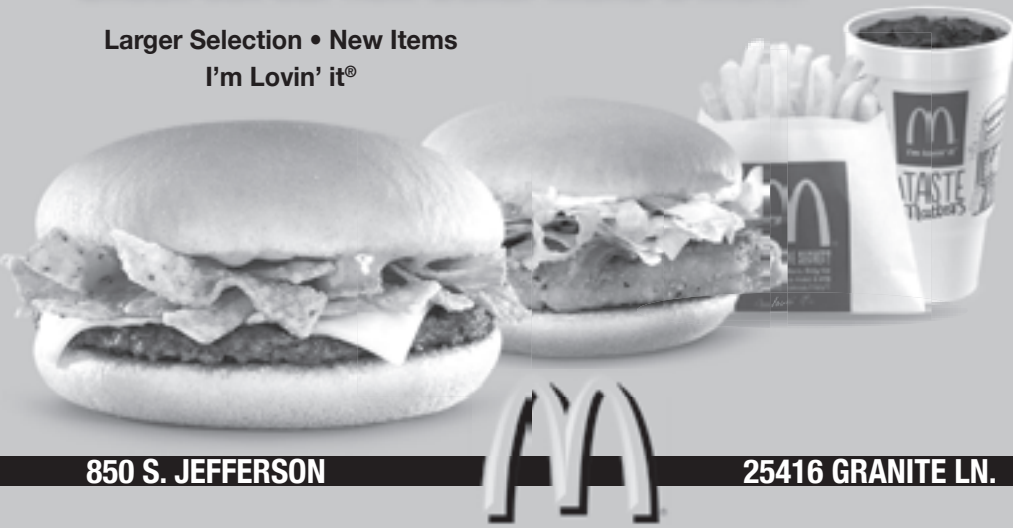

What Shark Tank can teach us about capitalism

It's an exceedingly simple show: A panel of potential investors — "the sharks" — sit in a row, taking business pitches from Americans of every imaginable stripe, and every imaginable walk of life. They are hoping to get those rich guys and gals — themselves a walk through the American diversity quilt — to fund their start-up businesses.

The show is ABC's Shark Tank. Now in its fourth season, it's exceedingly entertaining. It's so entertaining that it's the No. 1 show in America in the coveted 18-to-49-year-old demographic on Friday evenings. And what's not to

They're the American next door who wants to start a business and grow it. Maybe into the next McDonald's or Apple Computer. Or maybe something big enough to make a difference in their community, and hand down to their children. Or sell for a tidy profit.

They're Americans of all kinds: kids and adults, black and white people, Asians and Hispanics. But there is only one color on Shark Tank that matters: green.

Contestants come from cities, from suburbs, and from rural America too. Some pitch their businesses in suits and ties, others in flip-flops. We've seen firemen and teachers, housewives and executives, grade-schoolers and college kids, surfers and salesmen on the set of Shark Tank. All get treated equally. Equally well and poorly.

If the pitch is good, there are offers. Sometimes, the sharks compete against one another to land a deal. If it's bad, things get ugly. Sometimes, things get funny, too.

But one thing is certain: On Shark Tank, no one gets preferential treatment because of his race, or class, or where he's from.

What could be more American — and more likeable — than that?

The contestants want to own their own lives and build their own businesses, and need funding. And they're hoping against hope that one of those sharks takes the bait and invests in them.

Millions watching hope against hope, with them.

It's the show that every capitalist should watch. And tell his friends to watch, especially those who don't like capitalism. Because it makes capitalism cool.

It makes capital cool, too. Cool to want. Cool to have. And cool to invest in others. Because that's what the dreamers on the set of Shark Tank want: capital. Capital is oxygen to aspiring entrepreneurs. Most Americans just don't know it.

Karl Marx had a different view of capital, as do many leftists today. Why should rich people own a slice of a business for doing nothing more than investing in it? They aren't actually doing the work. Why should they reap the rewards? That's why many on the left think we should tax the heck out of capital. Because money that makes money is tainted. It would be far fairer if that money went to the government to redistribute and "invest."

Peddle that line at most American universities and you'll get some uninformed students to buy it. But peddle it to the contestants on Shark Tank and see how far it gets you. They are on the show to joyfully and voluntarily trade a portion of ownership in their businesses for capital.

But they looking for more than capital. It's stunning how often the contestants on Shark Tank tell their potential investors — plead with them — that what they want is their experience, too. Experience with distribution, cash flow, marketing, and more.

What they are seeking is knowledge, and knowledge is the capital of capitalism. That's what capitalism does best of all: It creates vast pools of knowledge no central planner or bureaucrat could ever manage.

In this respect, Shark Tank isn't just great entertainment. It's a great education. Indeed, no single show has been a better distillation of the genius of capitalism than Shark Tank. Nothing Milton Fredman ever did for PBS matches it. Nothing Adam Smith ever wrote by candlelight can touch it. Shark Tank does more than just give capitalism a good name; it also gives being rich a good name. The 1 percent's wealth can fuel dreams and create more wealth — and jobs.

Shark Tank makes being in the 1 percent cool. That's because the cast is cool, and thus very different from the caricature leftists generally paint of the rich. What makes the cast so good is that all are self-made millionaires, and all of them love growing small businesses into bigger ones, and making lots of money doing it.

The show is all about underdogs overcoming the odds and doing great things. The cast reflects those virtues.

One "shark" is Barbara Corcoran. She grew up in a lower-middle-class New

Jersey town, the second oldest of ten kids. She was a D student in Catholic school, and worked at 20 different jobs before she graduated from college, doing everything from selling hot dogs to being an orphanage housemother.

While waitressing at a diner, she took a \$1,000 loan from a man who soon became her live-in boyfriend, Ray Simone. He got 51 percent of the company she was starting. When he decided to leave her to marry another woman, she dissolved that company and started her own firm. What motivated Corcoran to succeed? She told CNN that it was what Ray Simone told her as she was walking out the door.

"'You'll never succeed without me,' he told me. Those words branded my soul. I started the Corcoran Group to prove my ability to succeed." Corcoran sold her company for \$66 million.

Then there's Robert Herjavec. He was born in Croatia and his family fled Communist Yugoslavia when he was eight, settling in Toronto, where the family lived in a friend's basement for 18 months. Herjavec was in his twenties and between jobs when a college roommate learned of an opening at a computer company that sold IBM mainframe emulation boards. He was underqualified for the position but talked his way into the role by offering to work for free for the first six months to prove his ability.

That's something they don't teach you in college.

While working for free, Herjavec did what Corcoran did — he waited tables at a local restaurant. He ended up becoming general manager of that computer company, left it to start his own business from the basement of his home, and ended up selling it to AT&T for over \$100 million.

Then there's Daymond John. He spent his childhood in Queens, N.Y., raised with seven sisters and brothers by his mother. In high school, he worked full-time as part of a co-op program, which he credits with stoking his entrepreneurial zeal. When he graduated from high school, John started a computer van service. But it was selling hats and clothing that would make John his millions. He got together with some friends, his mom mortgaged her home, and John started his own company. John held a full-time

job at a local Red Lobster to make ends meet, working on the clothing business between shifts.

That small business, FUBU, is now an apparel empire. And did I mention that John is African American?

Then there's Mark Cuban. His grandparents came to America with nothing but their name — Chabenskys. They lost even that possession: the Russian-Jewish family had their family name shortened at Ellis Island to Cuban.

Cuban grew up the son of an automobile upholsterer in a suburb of Pittsburgh, and started thinking about being an entrepreneur when he was twelve. He credits Ayn Rand's The Fountainhead for helping formulate his philosophy of life. "It was incredibly motivating to me," he has said. "It encouraged me to think as an individual, take risks to reach my goals, and responsibility for my successes and failures. I loved it." A serial entrepreneur, he sold his stake in Broadcast.com, a company he started, for \$5.9 billion, just before the dot-com bust. He owns the Dallas Mavericks.

And then there is the show's Simon Cowell, Kevin O'Leary. His nickname is "Mr. Wonderful," but there is nothing wonderful about being on the receiving end of his criticism. He is the guy everyone loves to hate on the panel. O'Leary too is a self-made millionaire, the son of a salesman and a seamstress. He too is a serial investor and entrepreneur.

That's what makes Shark Tank so good. The self-made millionaires and billionaires sitting on that panel are no different from the contestants pitching them. They were once those very same people, pitching their business to rich people. Struggling to acquire capital to grow their businesses. Seeking their piece of the American Dream.

That's why young people and older people alike like Shark Tank. It's aspirational — and egalitarian.

But what they really like best about Shark Tank — and may not know it — is that the star of the show is capitalism itself.

Is there anything more all-American than that?

Jeffries also was instrumental in raising money to save the old Laclede County Jail and transform it into a museum.

He was one of the founding members of the Laclede County Historical Society and Lebanon Country Club. He was a member of the Christian Church, the Lion's Club, Lebanon Chamber of Commerce and the Lebanon Cemetery Board.

Jeffries was married to Jessie Winfrey. They had two children, Sally and Victor Jr.

Jeffries passed away in 1991.

Jeffries' brother-in-law, Frank Milstead and his nephews, Jeff and David Milstead, accepted the award on Jeffries' behalf.

### George E. Carr

George E. Carr was born in 1935 to Geroge T. and Vesta Carr in Tulsa. The Carr family moved to Lebanon soon after. Carr graduated from Lebanon High School in 1952 and went on to receive a degree in engineering from Texas A&M. As an adult, he went back to school and earned his MBA from Missouri State University in 1992.

In 1957, Carr returned to Lebanon and began working for his father, George T. Carr, at Detroit Tool. During that time, he also joined the Army National Guard.

In 1961, Carr acquired the Durham Company, which was located in Washington, Mo., at the time. Two years later, Carr's father died, and he took over as chairman of the board at Detroit Tool from 1963 to 1965. He later served in that position from 1986 to 1988.

Since he was spending more time in Lebanon working with Detroit Tool, Carr moved Durham's operations to Lebanon in 1964. The company moved to its current location at 722 Durham Road later that year. The building has been expanded multiple times since then, as has the company to several locations, including Houston, Mo., New Bedford, Mass., and Springfield. The company started with six employees and now employs about 500.

"Because of George's decision to bring Durham to Lebanon there has been a difference made in the lives of literally hundreds of families with the jobs provided over these past 50 years. It has had an eco-

nomie impact on the community, but more importantly, it has an impact on families who have counted on these jobs," said Doug Russell, who is the president of the company.

Carr served Lebanon through the Lebanon R-3 School Board for three terms. He also was president of the Lebanon Rotary Club and Lebanon Area Chamber of Commerce.

In 1990, Carr established the Clinton Carr Foundation in memory of his son. The foundation provides scholarships to local students.

Carr has four other children, Jenny, GT, Jim and Steve.

### Patsy (Randolph) Sledd

Patsy Sledd, nee Randolph, was born in 1944 in Falcon.

By the age of 10, Sledd was already well on her way to becoming an entertainer. At that young age, she learned to play guitar and to sing. At 15, Sledd was hired to perform at the Ozark Opry. Shortly thereafter, Austin Wood offered her a job at the Nashville Opry.

While at the Nashville Opry, Sledd gained the attention of country musician, Roy Acuff. Sledd joined Acuff and went on tour around the world, including performing for soldiers stationed in Vietnam. During that time, she also appeared on the stage of the Grand Ole Opry.

Sledd later went on tour

with George Jones and Tammy Wynette. Through that tour, she was able to play in large venues around the world. She

even had the opportunity of headlining a concert at Wembley Stadium in London when a family issue kept Jones and

Wynette from performing.

During that time, Sledd signed a record contract with United Artists. One of her songs was played during a picture montage played at the banquet. Afterwards, Sledd's presenter, Chuck Kaufmann, her brother-in-law, proclaimed that Sledd, unlike current country artists, was "the real deal."

In 1977, Sledd gave birth to her son, Jeb, and decided she didn't want to raise her child on the road.

"I don't care how many platinum records you would have sold. You made the best decision you could ever make. ...Fame is often really brief, if you're lucky it goes on for a couple of decades, but your family is forever," Kaufmann said.

Sledd began another facet of her career at that time — making designer costumes for entertainers. During that time, Sledd made costumes for some of the biggest female entertainers in country music like Wynette and Barbara Mandrell.

Sledd went back to music later in her life, performing in

the northwest.

### Vic Slaughter

Vic Slaughter was born in 1933 to Rudie and Margaret Slaughter in Kennett. Slaughter went to school in Senath in southeast Missouri. He joined the Army and served in Korea. When he returned home, Slaughter attended the University of Missouri, where he obtained his BS, masters and doctorate degrees in education.

Slaughter served as superintendent of Lebanon R-3 School District for 16 years. During his tenure, additions were made to each of the elementary schools in the district and a new high school was built.

"I estimate that somewhere around 5,000 kids graduated from Lebanon while he was here. ...Imagine all the impact that those kids have done and will do in our world. They're out there right now making a difference," said presenter Jeff Carr, who was a school board member during several of Slaughter's years as superintendent.

Jones allegedly told police the only people there were her, her niece and her two children. She agreed to allow the police to conduct a walk-through of the home, the statement said.

Upstairs, there were clothes and other things scattered all over the floor, police reported. What was apparently dog feces was in two of the three bedrooms and on the stairwell.

Police went downstairs to the living area, then into a downstairs bedroom where a man was standing between the bed and the master bathroom, the statement said. The man told police he was just getting his stuff. Officers asked him to empty his pockets, and he did.

In the master bathroom, an officer observed what appeared to be two glass smoking pipes with their ends broken off in the bathroom garbage can.

Jones told the police that one of the toilets had been clogged, and when she lifted the lid of the tank, she found the pipes.

A green baggie also was found in the bathroom. A field test determined that methamphetamine was present, the statement said.

Jones consented to a full-scale search, according to the statement. Police found a glasses case in a dresser drawer that contained a hypodermic needle and two packages of rolling papers.

Jones allegedly first said

she had been in that dresser drawer earlier and the glasses case wasn't there, according to the statement. Then she allegedly said it belonged to a friend who had recently gone to jail.

A metal spoon that was on the floor by the bed also tested positive for the presence of meth, the statement said.

Jones and the man denied owning any of the items that were found, although the man admitted he was under the influence of methamphetamine at the time.

At the jail, Jones removed her jacket, and officers saw what they identified to be an injection mark from a needle on her upper right forearm, the statement said.

## Colts, Rams follow different paths with top quarterbacks

INDIANAPOLIS — Andrew Luck delivered on his promise as the NFL's top draft pick. He took the Colts to the playoffs last season and has them in position to win a division title this year.

St. Louis is still waiting for Sam Bradford to produce the same kind of results.

What could have been a showdown between the two former No. 1 picks Sunday at Lucas Oil Stadium is instead more of an example of why there are no sure bets in the draft.

"Nobody missed that guess," new Rams starter Kellen Clemens said when asked to assess Luck. "I think the biggest thing that stands out when you look at the body of work he's done is his composure in the fourth quarter. That's a feather in any quarterback's cap."

Bradford hasn't been bad.

The 2008 Heisman Trophy winner set NFL rookie records for completions and attempts en route to winning the 2010 offensive rookie of the year award — two awards Luck did not capture. He just hasn't been as lucky as the Colts quarterback.

Luck landed with a team that already had veteran leadership, a proven Pro Bowl receiver he could lean on, the two top tight ends in the draft and coaching continuity. The result has been a steady progression with Luck improving his touchdown total, trimming his interceptions and continuing to win.

Bradford, meanwhile, played for two head coaches and three offensive coordinators in his first three NFL seasons. This season, he was trying to get in sync with a whole new cast — free agent tight end Jared Cook, rookie receivers Tavon Austin and Stedman Bailey and rookie running back Zac Stacy — when he tore the ACL in his left knee against in a victory at Houston. Out for the season.

At the time, St. Louis was 3-3. Since Clemens took over, the Rams have lost three straight.

Meanwhile, Luck has thrived. Last season, he produced the second biggest turnaround in league history and this year the Colts (6-2) are in control of the division chase. The Colts are not surprised that Luck has lived up to the hype.

"He's definitely got the 'it' factor," coach Chuck Pagano said of his franchise quarterback. "Besides the measurables, height, weight, speed, athleticism, arm talent, intangibles, football IQ, leadership, all those type of things you look for — guys that are poised, in command — some guys have it and some guys don't. And it's pretty easy and pretty obvious to see early in a guy's career."

Here are five more things to watch Sunday:

## Lebanon basketball opens practice on Monday under new head coach Adam Thornhill

Lebanon opened the 2013 winter sports season on Monday and the boys' basketball team had its first official practice under new head coach Adam Thornhill.

With football still under way on Monday, the 'Jackets had a skeleton crew through the first few days of practice as 11 players were on hand.

But with the football team having lost to Waynesville in a Missouri Class 5 District 4 semifinal game on Wednesday, the basketball program has added several key players.

"We have gradually had better practices," Thornhill said. "Monday started off a little awkward, with the kids kind of figuring me out and me figuring the kids out and seeing what I expect in practice. Tuesday was good and Wednesday was even better."

One year after a tough 2-24 season that saw the Yellowjackets go 0-9 in the Ozark Conference, things appear to be looking up for first-year head coach Adam Thornhill.

Lebanon returns a host of young players that saw varsity action a year ago and will mix in several newcomers as well.

Perhaps most importantly, Thornhill said players within the program have bought into dedicating themselves to the game and putting in extra time in the gym. LHS had big numbers throughout the summer and had as many as 24 players in the gym for early-morning workouts in the fall.

"I'm excited about it," Thornhill said. "Things that are important to me are good character, we want guys that work hard, are

tough and want to be aggressive defensively and offensively.

"We've got guys that fit that to a T, that really have the right attitude."

Thornhill, who previously served as an assistant coach under former head coaches Jacky Payne and Kyle Paulson, had most recently served as head coach at Conway after a stint at Seymour. He was on hand with the team throughout the summer.

"I think up until now we have been developing relationships and getting to know kids and kids getting to know me and working on fundamental stuff, but actually putting it into practice and getting after it and setting the tone is so important," Thornhill said. "Getting kids to buy into how practices are going to be. We want our practices to be tougher than the game, and the games will be easy."

"That first day (Monday), the kids weren't really expecting that. But (Wednesday) was a great practice and we started with a skeleton crew (due to fall sports still being under way)."

Lebanon will open the season with a jamboree on Nov. 22 that will feature Buffalo and Warsaw

This is the first season for jamborees in winter sports. Lebanon originally had scheduled Hartsville to attend its jamboree, but will instead host Dora, a team that played in a Missouri Class 2 sectional game last season against Iberia at Boswell Auditorium.

"We jumped on it quick to be able to host one," Thornhill said. "We have three quality teams and should be an opportunity for us to warm up for Branson (on Nov. 24)."

Lebanon will open the season at Branson against a team that also features a new head coach, former Central Baptist University Hall of Fame head coach Kirk Hansen.

Thornhill said the upcoming season is the first in many building blocks for the future.

"I think that it is going to be a fulfilling year," Thornhill said. "What we expect our kids to do and get better at, I think we'll be able to do. Our kids just have such a good attitude and we'll be able to put a product on the floor that the community will be proud of. Expectations are that we are going to play hard every night and we are going to come to practice with the mentality that we are going to get after it and get better."

"And we want to enjoy it too. I think sometimes, especially after a year like last year, kids got away from enjoying the game."

# Chiefs credit culture change with 9-0 start

## Kansas City enters its bye week undefeated after winning just two games last season

KANSAS CITY — Andy Reid is tired of all the clichéd questions about fresh starts. He insists that he wasn't burned out or in need of a break after 14 seasons leading the Philadelphia Eagles.

Then again, maybe it wasn't Reid who needed to start all over.

Maybe it was the Kansas City Chiefs.

They had just endured one of the most miserable years in NFL history, one that was not only a complete failure on the field but a depressing disaster away from it. From the murder-suicide involving linebacker Jovan Belcher to the two measly wins, to the dismissal of general manager Scott Pioli and coach Romeo Crennel, there was very little positive that came

of last year.

In fact, just about the only positive may have been this: The Chiefs were able to hire Reid, who had just been fired by the Eagles, to orchestrate a much-needed culture change.

All of a sudden, jerseys were tucked into shorts. Everybody in the office was asked to wear matching outfits. There was no wasted time, not in practice nor in meetings. There was a sense of professionalism for the first time in years.

"The thing that stands out to me is he keeps it about football," said quarterback Alex Smith, whom the Chiefs acquired not long after Reid and general manager John Dorsey came on board.

"He created a healthy environment," Smith explained. "There are a lot of situations

you have to go through to build relationships, but he's created a healthy environment to come in and focus on football every single day. He's done a great job of doing that."

Indeed, what was once a volatile working environment has become serene. What was once a toxic place to practice and play has become energized and enthusiastic. What was once a 2-14 team is 9-0 heading into its week off.

"The team has been through so much the last couple years," linebacker Justin Houston said, "so we can withstand a lot of things."

The reclamation of the Chiefs may have begun with a culture change, but it took some savvy moves by Dorsey and some brilliant coaching by Reid to make it work.

Along with acquiring Smith,

the Chiefs selected right tackle Eric Fisher with the first pick in the draft. They bolstered their defensive backfield by signing Sean Smith and Dunta Robinson, and plugged other holes with guys such as defensive end Mike DeVito — not flashy, just effective.

But the real genius behind Dorsey's work has been seen in guys such as cornerback Marcus Cooper, who was two picks away from Mr. Irrelevant. He was waived by the 49ers and snatched up by the Chiefs, and he's developed into one of the best feel-good stories in all of football this season.

Tight end Sean McGrath was similarly picked off the scrap heap.

"That's all John," Reid said. "He's done a good job of finding talent wherever he can."

Once the talent was on hand, Reid began molding it into shape.

The Chiefs offense evolved into one that relies heavily on the short passing game, and is predicated on Smith playing mistake-free. The defense is no longer the read-and-react favored by Crennel but a blitzing, exotic and downright nasty group led by coordinator Bob Sutton.

What's been spit out is a team that has joined the 1977 Falcons as the only ones in NFL history to allow 17 points or fewer in each of their first nine games. They're a team that's matched the 2003 Chiefs for the best start in franchise history. They're a team that for a while was on pace to shatter the NFL record for sacks in a season.

"Confidence is constantly building," safety Kendrick

Lewis said.

There's perhaps no better example of how confident the Chiefs have become than the fourth quarter, when they're outscoring opponents 70-17. In fact, they've given teams 20 possessions with a chance to tie or take the lead in the fourth quarter and yielded just three points.

That's how you close out wins in the NFL.

There are detractors that say the Chiefs have played a soft schedule, and that an offense that only managed three field goals in a win over Buffalo will be their downfall. They argue that the Chiefs are the worst 9-0 team in NFL history, and that the crazy numbers they're putting up — the 23 takeaways, the plus-15 turnover differential — are all a mirage.

pass-rushing tandem in the NFL might be in St. Louis. While Mathis leads the NFL with 11½ sacks, Robert Quinn leads the NFC with 10, Chris Long is in the conference's top 10 with 5½ and the Rams are tied for third in the NFL with 29 sacks.

**REPLACING REGGIE:** Luck led the Colts to another fourth-quarter comeback last weekend, but it was hardly pretty. In Indy's first game in 15 years without either Marvin Harrison or Reggie Wayne on the field, Luck went 18 of 40 and was victimized by enough drops to stall the offense for most of the first three quarters. This week, the Colts need to

figure out a more suitable way to replace their most consistent receiver.

**DELIVERY MEN:** Austin and Colts receiver T.Y. Hilton have more in common than their smallish size and the fact that they were brought in to help their franchise quarterbacks. Austin, at 5-foot-8, 176 pounds, is becoming an important part of the Rams offense. He leads all rookies with 31 receptions. Hilton, at 5-9 and 178, led last year's NFL rookies with seven TD catches and is becoming an important cog with Wayne out with a torn ACL. Both are deep threats and could have a major impact Sunday.

**FOURTH ESTATE:** Luck gets most of the credit for Indy's late-game success, but he's only part of the equation. The Colts defense has allowed only 29 fourth-quarter points this season, 16 coming in the Oct. 20 game against Peyton Manning and the Broncos. In the other seven games, the Colts have allowed an average of 1.9 points in the final 15 minutes.

**TEAM CLEAN:** Pagano talks extensively about avoiding mistakes. Nobody has done that better than the Colts, who have a league-low six turnovers and a league-low 31 penalties.

# Wounds of war

## Stars align for telethon to help US veterans

LOS ANGELES — Connie Francis, Alan Alda and Joe Mantegna are joining forces to help raise money for veterans suffering the wounds of war.

The trio will host the Homeward Bound telethon to benefit victims of post-traumatic stress disorder and traumatic brain injury. The four-hour event, airing at 7 p.m. EST Sunday on the Military Channel, is a fundraiser for several charities.

Other celebrities set to participate include Mark Harmon and other "NCIS" cast members, Kevin Spacey, Jason Bateman, Lou Diamond Phillips, Gloria Loring and James Brolin. Scheduled performers include the American Military Spouses Choir, Patti Austin, Michael Feinstein, Ben Vereen and Steve Tyrell.

"This is a 45-year-old dream for me," said Francis, who entertained troops during the Vietnam War. A telethon was needed then but the social climate wasn't receptive to aiding veterans, the singer-actress said.

The Homeward Bound telethon came together after she gave a speech two years ago criticizing the lack of help for injured veterans and caught the attention of businessman Leonard Wilf, an owner of the Minnesota

Vikings NFL team, Francis said. She and Wilf joined with producer Bruce Charet to establish the Haven From the Storm Foundation for veterans.

Money raised by the telethon will be donated to charities that provide services and support to servicemen and women and their family members coping with war's aftermath, including the American Red Cross and Wounded Warrior Project, telethon organizers said. Gary Smith, whose credits include the Tony and Emmy Awards ceremonies, is the executive producer.

Francis, who said she endured a dark period in which she required mental health care, is focusing on victims of PTSD and the high rate of military suicides. She said she wants to erase the stigma of mental illness for those who have served as well as civilians.

In 2012, the U.S. military suffered the highest number of suicides ever recorded, prompting then-Defense Secretary Leon Panetta to declare it an epidemic.

The telethon will also stream live online and be rebroadcast on the Armed Forces Network on Veterans Day on Monday. The event's first two hours will air Sunday on stations PIX11 in New York, WGN Chicago and KTLA Los Angeles.

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## 'God Forgives' — but the audience might not

In just two years, director Nicolas Winding Refn has gone from making the best movie I'd seen

in a long time to making an equally unwatchable mess.

The fact that 2011's "Drive" was my favorite movie of the year makes the reteaming of Refn with leading man Ryan Gosling in "Only God Forgives" that much more disappointing.

Refn's films have always teetered toward indie art house nonsense with style always threatening to take over the narrative, but by some small miracle, his strong and intriguing characters have always come out on top over his artistic decisions. In "Only God Forgives," style finally won the battle, taking over the project, overshadowing the flimsy characters and what little plot there is in the film with a disastrous hard-to-watch result.

The movie tells the story of an American family running a muay thai, a form of martial arts, club in Thailand. One of the owners, Billy (Tom Burke), murders an underage prostitute. The police, led by the mysterious and almost mythical Lt. Chang (Vithaya Pansringarm), bring the girl's father to the scene and allow him to beat Billy to death. Afterwards, to teach the father a lesson, Chang, who has a penchant for doling out justice with a sword, cuts

off the father's arm. Did I mention this movie ups the ante on the violence seen in "Drive?"

Billy's brother, Julian (Gosling), and his gang of thugs go after the father but decide to spare his life after learning what Billy had done. Their mother, Crystal (Kristin Scott Thomas), who unfortunately for the audience has the most lines in this less than verbose film, wants the heads of the people involved on a platter, leading to the inevitable bloody end of the movie.

With a title like "Only God Forgives," you would expect a revenge movie of epic proportions, but the movie fails to even muster up a good revenge story. None of the main characters get any sort of true revenge, and, quite frankly, I don't think any of them deserved retribution, which is one of the main reasons "Only God Forgives"

doesn't work.

It doesn't help that all of the characters are paper thin. Want some background? Some motivation? Forget it. What you are going to get is a bunch of stilted actors progressing from one scene to the next, where they stare at one another, emotionless, and from time to time commit super violent acts on one another. Refn could have taken mannequins, placed them in a scene, filmed them then moved them to a new scene, starting the process over, and come up with essentially the same film.

Refn's "Drive" deftly walked the tightrope between absurd and masterpiece, but he gracefully stuck to the latter. With "Only God Forgives," Refn dove head first off the rope, leaving the audience and all hopes of this movie being good or even making any kind of sense

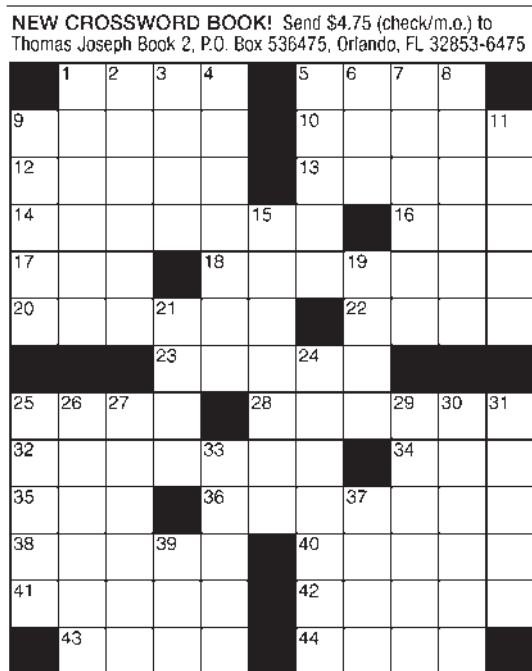

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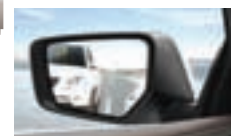
