




Council approves Olsson engineering to prepare new city master plan

The Lebanon City Council Monday night approved a contract with an engineering company to help produce a new master plan.

The Council agreed to contract with Olsson of Springfield to produce the plan at a cost of approximately \$125,000.

The agreement calls



for Olsson to assist the council and staff in creating Lebanon 2040, which is described as "an overall comprehensive plan for our community." The plan will establish "long term goals and vision,"

City Administrator Mike Schumacher said.

The city advertised a request for proposals twice and received one submission from Olsson, he said.

"While we would have preferred to receive additional proposals, we also felt Olsson produced an excellent product with the Parks Master Plan," he said in a memo to the Council.

Councilwoman Sheila Mitchell cast the sole dissenting vote against the contract.

Mitchell said the city already had a contract with a company to do citizen surveys and also said she believed the city itself could have handled a lot of the legwork.

"Personally I'm getting tired of paying other people to do things for a large sum of money. I just feel responsible for

citizens' tax dollars," she said.

Schumacher said the surveys were a way for the city to measure the services the city is offering today in the short term. "Lebanon 2040 is just that, where are we going? Where are we going to be in 2040?" he said.

Attorney General announces judgment against former Lebanon car dealer

In March of 2022, Lebanon car salesman Marcus James Hill was charged with 13 violations of the Missouri Merchandising Practices Act relating to his two car dealerships, Variety Auto Sales and Hilltop Auto Sales.

These charges alleged that Hill falsely promised consumers they would receive

proper title and warranties with their purchase of a used car however, Hill would fail to provide these items and in one instance, failed to provide the vehicle entirely.

According to a press release from the Missouri Attorney General's office, Attorney General Andrew Bailey announced his office has obtained a

judgement for \$27,000 against Variety Auto Sales as of April 20.

Bailey sought out the judgement in an attempt to recoup losses for Missourians who purchased cars and never received certificates of title or promised warranty work.

Bailey said, "As Attorney General, I will always work to hold those who attempt to rip off innocent Mis-

sourians accountable. This result is a testament to the diligent work my Consumer Protection Unit puts in

to protect consumers throughout the state." Hill is currently incarcerated in the Laclede County Jail on the 13 felony counts of unlawful business practices. This judgement is in connection to these charges. No court date has been released as of April 24, 2023.

William "Bill" Harrill

William Donald "Bill" Harrill, son of William Lafayette "Bill" and Clara Belle (Peterson) Harrill, was born June 20, 1930, near Falcon, and departed this life on April 23, 2023, at the age of ninety-two years.

He was united in marriage with Vera Lee Mitchell on Nov. 8, 1951, and together they shared 71 years of love and laughter while raising their four children.

Bill served in the United States Navy on the destroyer U.S.S. Benham during the Korean War. Bill earned his Bachelor's Degree in Electrical Engineering from Missouri School of Mines, now Missouri University of Science and Technology in Rolla. He worked for Sinclair Oil Company in Independence, Kan.; later for Atlantic Richfield Oil Company in Chicago, Tulsa, and Los Angeles; and for Alyeska Pipeline in Anchorage and Valdez. After working for Alyeska as part of the crew that built the communications system for the Alaska pipeline, he retired to the family farm and raised cattle.

Bill and Vera always made it a point to find a church home every place they lived. He was saved and baptized at Antioch Baptist Church, Lebanon, Missouri.

He enjoyed fishing for salmon and halibut while in Alaska. He played baseball and softball, and was a very good softball pitcher. He liked to play cribbage and rook. Bill worked hard because he liked to work and to provide for his family. He taught them the importance of sheer stubbornness. He worked hard to keep the farm a place the family could come, spend time, and make lasting memories.

Bill is survived by: his wife, Vera of Lebanon; children: Bruce Harrill and wife Madonna of Laquey; Joy Thompson and husband Randy of Anchorage; Sherri Harrill of Lebanon; and Sandy Harrill and wife Deborah of Philadelphia; grandchildren: Arthur Harrill and partner Amy Berry, Chancey Thompson and wife Marianne; Cody Thompson and partner Ashley Brevak; and Mitchell Harrill-Wright; great-grandchildren: Harry and Clara Thompson; brother: Stanley Harrill and wife Debbie of Lebanon; sisters: Linda Harrill of Lebanon; Gloria Lackey of Bessemer City, N.C., and many more relatives and friends.




SFC (Ret.) Mark Anthony Moda, 64, of Roby, died Thursday, April 20, 2023, in his home.









long-term issues, such as where a water tower should be built, he said.

"The surveys we're doing now clearly tell us what we're doing, we're doing right," he said. "It's been very helpful to get us on the right track." The plan will help the city know where to build out in the next 15 years, he said.

Shelby Ferguson, a senior planner with Olsson, spoke to the Council by videolink. She said the company would guide the city "each step of the way."

Ferguson said the process will include in-person meetings with the public, visiting workshops and public open houses.

According to the request of proposals scope of services, the city sought "qualified consultants/firms with considerable experience in community design, land use planning, parks planning, transportation planning, economic analysis and community engagement with the ob-

jective of completing a plan that will provide a clear vision for future growth and development."

In other business, the Council approved an agreement for Burns and McDonnell to conduct a sanitary sewer evaluation study for the Goodwin Hollow lift station. The cost is not to exceed \$320,000.

The Council approved the purchase of one 2023 1/2 ton crew cab truck for the fire department for \$51,623 and one 2023 1/2 ton extended cab truck for the police department for \$45,901 from Graven Chrysler Dodge.

The Council approved buying tables and chairs for the Civic Center, Wallace and Mills buildings from Office Essentials for \$129,414.

Mayor Jared Carr read a proclamation recognizing mental health programs for children. National Alliance on Mental Illness volunteers were at the meeting to accept the proclamation. Local Government Week was also recognized.



Man charged in Rainwater death granted change of venue

LCR STAFF

James Phelps, 60, has been granted a change of venue request by Judge Jill Porter. He is accused of the murder of Cassidy Rainwater in Dallas County from July 2021.

His current charges are first degree murder, first degree kidnapping, and abandonment of a corpse along with his co-defendant Timothy Norton, 58.

The two men were arrested in September, 2021 after authorities

received an anonymous tip about Rainwater's whereabouts. She had been missing since July, 25 2021.

While investigating the home, officers found human remains in a freezer located in Phelps's home.

Sheriff Scott Rice of the Dallas County Sheriff's Department in 2021, said Norton confessed to the murder of Rainwater, stating that Phelps had him come over while Cassidy was sleeping so he could have easy

access to attack her.

He went on to tell FBI that he held Rain-

water down while Phelps strangled her and placed a bag over her head.

Upon the arrest of Phelps, his home was burned to the ground which was deemed as arson by authorities.

Phelps is currently scheduled for a case management hearing on May 19 in Dallas County, after that, all proceedings will take place in Jasper County according to the change of venue request.

Two local fire departments set to receive matching ARPA funds

Two local fire departments are among the agencies that will receive grants approved last week by the Missouri Department of Public Safety.

Gov. Mike Parson's office announced last week that 428 grants totaling more than \$6.3 million would go to law enforcement, fire service, and EMS providers across the state.

Lebanon Fire Department was awarded

\$15,640.00.

Lebanon Rural Fire Protection District was awarded \$20,000.

Grant funded equipment includes patrol vehicles, mobile data terminals, fire fighter turnout gear, extrication equipment, cardiac monitors, and emergency communications radios.

Grants to additional law enforcement, fire service, and EMS agencies are still under review.

To date, a total of 224 fire service agencies

have been approved to receive a total of over \$3 million for equipment, including turnout gear, extrication equipment, and thermal imaging cameras.

The funding for these public safety grants is made available through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) and was part of Governor Parson's Fiscal Year 2023 budget plan, according to a press release from Parson's office.

Eligible grant expenditures include equipment,

supplies, training/travel, personnel, and benefits. Some equipment may have specific requirements to be eligible for funding.

The grants require a local match of 50 percent (for example, if the total cost of a project were \$40,000, the local recipient would be responsible for \$20,000 and the ARPA share of the grant would be \$20,000). Local ARPA grant funds may be utilized for the local match.

Items will only be accepted from residents, not from commercial businesses. Items that will be accepted include furniture, clothes, four tires per home at \$2 per tire and \$5 for additional tires, e-waste, bulk debris and two appliances per home.

Freon-based appliances like window units and refrigerators will not be accepted. Yard waste will not be accepted. House-

hold hazardous water will not be accepted. For household hazardous waste drop-off locations, visit ozarksgoinggreen.com/hhw-e-waste-recycling-locations.

A reuse swap area will be available for residents to drop and swap reusable collected items such as furniture and appliances.

Lebanon Lions working to replace Mercy Kids fish tank

Area Lions Clubs are heading up an effort to replace the fish tank for Mercy Kids patients in Lebanon.

Lebanon Host Lions Club President Debbie Cantrell said the idea started when Lebanon Host Lions Club were delivering the Build-A-Bear that they purchase annually to the Mercy pediatrics cancer St. Jude's area and they discussed Lions Foundation money that is available for a dream or wish.

"It was through that connection that we were able to discover the need that was there," she said.

She said the current fish tank that had been used is 40 years old and in very poor shape.

"They finally had to remove it since we first started our conversation so it's not there at all right now," she said. "Knowing that the fish tank offers a lot of relaxation and some escape for the families and children there, we thought that was something they would really like to replace."

Cantrell said they are being joined by other area Lions clubs in the district for the project.

"Our club is the lead since I'm the Lion that's spearheading everything

and we're just \$500 short of our goal right now of our \$19,000 goal," she said.

The Lions recently raised \$5,000 for the project at a fish fry held at the Mills Center last Saturday.

"It started at 4 o'clock and that was right when the weather got horrible," she said. "We had a monsoon but as soon as the weather started clearing, people started coming, we had our auction, State Rep. Jeff Knight volunteered to be our auctioneer, we're so grateful."

She said the next step is to call other clubs and find funds to close the

gap. She plans to submit the grant application by May 1 and is working with Mercy Foundation on the finishing touches.

The plans call for the old tank to be replaced by a 300-gallon freshwater tank. The tank would be self-feeding, eliminating the need for workers to feed the fish, giving them more time for patient care.

The new tank will be visible by all Mercy Kids patients and their families. Mercy Kids has about 6,000 patients a year and with their families included that would mean exposure to 20,000 to 30,000 people annually. The new fish tank design allows more visibility from the hallway, providing more exposure to patients and their family members. Some children and patients cannot enter the room because of infection prevention measures.


A sign will describe the fish in the tank and thank the Lions Club for their financial support.

They will submit the grant by May 1 and work would begin soon after. A plaque will be placed acknowledging the Lions' contributions.

eight or nine. My aunt was a florist and I loved helping her arrange flowers. I have always also wanted to own a flower shop, coffee shop, and bakery that was all in one. My original idea was just flowers until my husband bought an espresso machine and suggested I make drinks."

Miller specializes in floral arrangements for any occasion. "I do daily arrangements, sympathy, pretty much everything. I mostly want to focus on daily arrangements and weddings. I have done two weddings so far and have more scheduled for this year. I love weddings."

The floral arrangements start at \$65 and range to \$135 however, Miller also does special occasion arrangements for holidays such as Valentine's day or mother's day that usually start around \$35.

"I use premium flowers, I don't use your everyday flowers. I use local flowers. Missouri's growing season is the first of April through October so through those months I can buy local for most things. I can still outsource for other things but I am really big on supporting local people first. I have a local family to support so I always try to keep everything within our community or in the surrounding areas."

According to Miller, she had also been running an at-home bakery

business before opening Covell and learning the craft of sweet treats.

"I had an at home business where I was making little deserts, pastries and macrons and stuff and we were able to take my daughter to Disney world with that money. So, I decided to just go for it and bring everything I love together."

The coffee the business sells is locally roasted, and they have 11 different flavors to choose from.

Coffee is not all there is to be enjoyed at Covell though, Miller also sells sparklers which are Italian sparkling water with flavoring and fruit, cream sparklers which is like an Italian cream soda, Red bull zingers which is red bull, cream, and flavor, cold brew, tea and tea lattes.

Covell's signature drink is the Pink Tea Latte. "Because it is pink. Everything in here is pink and girly. It is strawberry, dragon fruit and cream and it has rose, white chocolate cold foam on top! It is amazing! I have never had anyone not like it."

Covell had their soft opening for Black Friday in November of 2022 and fully opened their doors in December.

They are now open Tuesday through Friday from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m..

Miller said she has one employee named Hannah who according to her, is super sweet. "If I am not here, she is here!"





The win led Lebanon to a matchup against Fatima in bracket play.


In this game, the 'Jackets' once again played the role of the comeback kids as LHS scored four runs in the bottom of the seventh inning to steal the win, 5-4.




