Lebanon City Council hears presentation on potential purchase of local golf course

The Lebanon City Council has a new decision on its plate as of Monday's work session: whether it will decide to purchase the golf course formerly known as Lebanon – GreatLife Golf and Fitness.

Supporters of the course – located at 16744 MO-64 – attended the session, where John Gideon, board president of Lebanon Area Community Golf Course, the 501(c)(7) nonprofit that bought the course Aug. 27,

gave a proposal to the Council asking the City in turn to purchase the course.

"We don't like being here asking, none of us do, but that's just where we're at. We don't know where else to ask, so that's why we're coming to the City and trying to offer you what could be a nice asset with improvements," Gideon said.

As Gideon explained after the regular Council meeting, the nonprofit bought the course in a total business acquisition. A shareholder group had owned the real estate while

GreatLife owned the business and management. The nonprofit had bought the course with the help of four local banks – Heritage Bank of the Ozarks, Mid-Missouri Bank, Commerce Bank, and First State Community Bank.

Gideon said the first step towards Monday's proposal had been a shareholder conversation about the future of the course with the City of Lebanon 18 months ago with former City Administrator Mike Schumacher.

City approves agreement for Munger Moss sign

The Lebanon City Council Monday night

approved an agreement to take ownership of the Munger Moss motel sign.

The motel at 1336 East Route 66 was a longtime stop on Historic Route 66. The sign was restored in 2010 with the help of a National Park Service matching grant.

City Administrator Troy Schulte said renovations for the sign had been included in the city's 2026 budget. He said that in conversations with city officials, Mark Bertel of the Dels Corporation, the motel's new owner, said he would be willing to pay the city for the renovations.

"We'll work that out as part of the process, but the goal is to get the sign fully renovated in time for the anniversary centennial of Route 66, which kicks off on Jan. 1, so it will be a nice addition to the skyline of Lebanon," he said.

"We'll start working on that and we'll see some progress on that over the next couple of months."

According to the agreement, the sign will remain on its original premises and will be owned by the city, subject to an easement for access and maintenance from Dels to the city.

The city will maintain the sign at the

city's cost. If the Munger Moss Motel ceases to exist, the city can choose to relocate the sign.

"In the event the sign is damaged beyond repair or destroyed, the City shall remove the damaged or destroyed sign from the Dels premises, and this agreement shall terminate," according to the agreement.

According to a Lebanon-Laclede County Route 66 Society article online, Schulte said he has already had conversations with the owners of other Route 66 signs with the idea of

Sandy Calton celebrates 30 years with Laclede County Sheriff's Office

Sandy Calton has left her mark not just on the civil papers she enters into the computer or the roads she names but with the people she has worked with for over 30 years.

Calton, who works in the Sheriff's Office as a 911 mapper and coordinates civil paper service, sat with co-worker Captain Casey Pitts to reflect on her decades-long career within the department.

"I don't know what we'll do if Sandy ever decides to go, because

she has been here so long. She knows everything," Pitts said. Calton joked about being able to remember everything, but Pitts reaffirmed that it would be tough to imagine work without her.

When Calton began work at the Sheriff's Office 30 years ago, she worked to readress the entire county in preparation for Enhanced 911, which the Federal Communications Commission noted reports the location and telephone numbers of 911 calls.

Calton worked in the porch of the old county

jail museum with one other person during this time.

After E-911 came online, Calton worked as a dispatcher. A supervisor of hers, Larry Woods, was a great teacher. Though the monitors and other technology of today's dispatch would be a challenge to learn, she has had to adapt to changes in her field before.

After her time as a dispatcher, she returned to addressing. She also coordinated the locking and unlocking of the county jail's doors during this time.

Now she works on the second floor of the county's emergency communications center, where she coordinates the serving of civil papers and continues to map the county's addresses.

Calton receives civil papers and then enters them into the computer to send them on to the deputies to serve them, noting them as served once they have been.

The civil papers, such as ex parte and subpoenas, can be digital, but Calton noted that most attorneys still mail their papers in.

Whether Calton pre-

fers civil papers or addresses depends on the day. The civil papers that come in differ day-to-day, and she likes the addressing work that she does.

In her addressing and mapping work, Calton gets to name new roads in the county, which are typically private roads. She tries not to name the roads after people – roads with those kinds of names tend to get their signs stolen, she said – but takes owner suggestions into account.

Road names are

New Missouri attorney general inherits more than 120 pending Sunshine Law requests

There will be more than 120 public records requests sitting on Catherine Hanaway's desk when she takes the oath of office Monday morning to become Missouri's next attorney general.

Some of the requests are months old, but all but one were submitted

this year, said Stephanie Whitaker, spokeswoman for the attorney general's office.

And while higher than most state agencies, the 126 requests is an improvement on the 224 Hanaway's predecessor, Andrew Bailey, inherited when he took office in 2023. That number ballooned at one point during Bailey's short stint as attorney general to more than 400, with Missourians stuck in limbo for months — and in some cases, years — waiting for public records to be turned over.

The backlog of public records requests has befooled Bailey since he was appointed to take over the office after Eric Schmitt resigned to join the U.S. Senate. It's a situation observers say would be unacceptable for any government agency but is especially problematic for the office in charge of enforcing Missouri's Sunshine Law — designed to ensure the public has access to government records and meetings.

Bailey assigned five staffers to deal with Missouri Sunshine Law backlog, Whitaker said — four attorneys, one intern and a custodian of records. It's why only 126 requests remain unfinished, she said, despite the office receiving more than 400 between January and July.

"There is definitely not


a massive backlog that Catherine will be inheriting," Whitaker said.

Bailey is resigning from office early to become co-deputy director of the FBI. Gov. Mike Kehoe appointed Hanaway, a former U.S. attorney and speaker of the Missouri House, as his replacement. She will be sworn into office in a private ceremony Monday morning.

Testifying to a Missouri Senate committee in February, Bailey said the office had received 1,465 requests under the Sunshine Law since January 2023 and managed to complete work on 1,390. Only 75 pending requests remained, he said at the time, a tally some lawmakers still felt was too high.

The only request left over from 2024, Whitaker said, produced more than 40,000 records and will take some time to complete. But, she said that is not slowing down work on others.

Whitaker signaled a change in the office's pol-



icy that has focused on working through requests on a first come, first serve basis. That meant newer inquiries that were small and easily dispensed with sat on hold as staff worked on older and more expansive requests.

Critics argued the policy exacerbated the problem, letting requests pile up and ensuring the backlog took even longer to work through.

Whitaker said that's no longer the case.

"It has changed a little," she said. "We're not putting you or anyone else on hold to satisfy this one request from 2024. So it would not be accurate to say inquiries are fulfilled

in the order they've been received."

But that doesn't mean the public doesn't still face delays.

In May, The Independent submitted a request for Bailey's public calendar. Most state agencies turn around that type of request in a matter of days. The attorney general's office turned the records over last week.

While slow, it's still an improvement over previous attempts by The Independent to access Bailey's calendar that took more than 10 months.

Lebanon varsity boys swim finishes ninth at Ozarks Invitational

The Lebanon Yellowjackets are looking at early state standings following their third meet of the season.

The varsity swim finished ninth out of 22 teams, some from Columbia, Kansas City and St. Louis, in the Ozarks Invitational Saturday. Head Coach David Krev wrote in an email Monday. He also provided updated state standings.

"Everyone swam well, time wise," Krev wrote of the team's performance in the meet. "To finish in the top ten was awesome."

At the invitational, senior Eli Havens took sixth place in the 100-yard butterfly and seventh in the 200-yard freestyle.

Junior Jackson Fisher took ninth in the 50-yard freestyle, and 10th in the 100-yard freestyle.

Fisher, Havens, senior Lucas Keen and junior Hunter Fore took eighth place in the 200-yard free-

style relay.

Krev also provided state standings for the following individuals and teams:

Havens (11th in the 200-freestyle, fourth in the 100-butterfly, and eighth in the 500-freestyle).

Jackson Fisher (15th in the 200-freestyle, 12th in the 50-freestyle, and ninth in the 100-freestyle).

The 200-freestyle relay team is ranked 13th, and the 400-freestyle relay team is ranked 18th.

Accidents over the weekend

Two injury accidents were reported over the weekend in Laclede County by the Missouri State Highway Patrol.

A Stilwell, Okla. man was hurt in a motorcycle wreck at 12:10 p.m. Saturday

day on Missouri 32 east of Route U.

According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol, the 45-year-old male driver of an eastbound 2025 Harley Davidson Motorcycle struck a dog in the roadway.

The driver was transported by ambulance to Mercy Hospital Lebanon, with what the Highway Patrol described as moderate injuries.

Three people were hurt in a 10:45 a.m. crash Sunday on Interstate 44 at the 134.4 westbound mile marker.

The wreck occurred when the 23-year-old male driver of a west-

bound 1999 Suzuki GSX 1300R struck the rear of a westbound 2018 Ford Escape driven by a 57-year-old female from Independence and the 28-year-old male driver of a westbound 2008 Suzuki GSX 1300R from Rolla struck the 1999 Suzuki GSX 1300R.

The driver of the 1999 Suzuki was airlifted to Mercy Hospital in Springfield, while the other two drivers were transported by ambulance to Mercy Hospital Lebanon.

The Highway Patrol described their injuries as moderate to serious.

All were reportedly wearing safety devices.

Lebanon's potential purchase of the course (\$775,000) and payment of the golf cart lease (around \$130,000) would relieve the debt on the course, Gideon said. Another \$2 million in improvements – like building repairs, irrigation – would make the course sustainable.

After those improvements, Gideon thought that the City of Lebanon could add elements like pickleball courts and

biking trails to make the course a community destination. He thought of the proposal as a way for the City to improve an amenity and options for residents.

Back at the meeting, Gideon and the Council discussed how the City would manage the golf course, with Gideon suggesting an advisory board, like the joint city-county 911 advisory board he serves on, that

would work with the course's staff.

City Administrator Troy Schulte predicted that the acquisition of the course would likely mean a cash lease purchase with economic development funds and some sort of financing mechanism for the improvements.

Winter, Gideon said, would be an optimal time to begin those improvements.

The reactions to the

proposal from City Council members were mixed. Councilman Randy Wall was one member that advocated for the non-quantifiable value that the golf course brings to the community, such as the businesses he speculated would not be in Lebanon without it.

Councilwoman Sheila Mitchell was unsure of the economic benefit such a city acquisition would bring compared to

the investment required and asked for more detailed figures concerning city management of the course.

To Councilman Dan Mizell, the city's hypothetical acquisition of the course would result in an additional land asset worth around \$1.2 million (with a deed restriction related to the playable portion of the golf course) regardless of whether the city's im-

provement of the course was a success.

Mayor Jared Carr thought the prospective purchase was a great opportunity that the City of Lebanon should not miss out on.

The City Council took no action related to the presentation during the work session or regular meeting.

based on an alphabetical grid of the county – those beginning in the southern end with the letter “A.” Roads typically go east and west and drives typically go north and south.

Calton updates addresses via computer now, but she has kept two paper maps from 1981 and 1996. She updates her 1996 map with new addresses and roads, the process for which Pitts has seen from their shared time at work.

“It’s amazing to see, and I only know this because I sat in front of her office for seven years. I used to solely serve her papers that she would get from the courts, so

I would watch her be so delicate because the maps are paper,” Pitts said. “So she unrolls the one she needs, and then she’ll write on it so easily. You can tell it’s like her baby.”


The 911 mapper had no plans to leave the Sheriff’s Office soon. She likes the job security and the people she works with.
