Political newcomer will lead Denham

DENHAM SPRINGS — It was close, so close that the lead changed several times as the eight precincts in Denham Springs slowly but steadily got their final numbers to the Secretary of State. In the end, Gerard Landry claimed the Mayor's race in Denham Springs, 1,779 votes to John Wascom's 1,668, a 3% margin of victory. Roughly 50 supporters, family members, and campaign assistants crowded into Landry's election night party in a Greystone Country Club home outside of Denham Springs and awaited the results. Tensions rose and fell as individuals hovered over computer screens and phones, awaiting updates from the Secretary of State's website. Wascom, on the other hand, awaited election results in one of the back rooms of Big Mike's Sports Bar and Grill in Denham Springs. Wascom had a white board set up, with runners reporting votes as quickly as they could contact Wascom's wife, Linda. Much like Landry's visitors, Wascom's supporters' tensions were high with every phone call. Eventually, Landry stepped outside to take a phone call.

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Runoffs in judicial races

A December 6 runoff will decide the outcomes on two district court races, based on unofficial returns from the Tuesday primary election. Jeff Johnson of Ponchatoula and Michael "Mike" Betts of Denham Springs — both Republicans — will vie in the runoff for the Division A seat, while GOP candidates C. Glenn Westmoreland of the Town

of Livingston and Jeff Cashe of Hammond will face each other in the runoff in Division J. Johnson led the Division A race with 35,418 votes (49.29 percent), while runner-up Michael Betts garnered 21,112 votes, or 29.40 percent of the votes. Russell Beall notched 15,341 votes (21.31 percent). "Our team has worked very, very hard," Johnson said. "Today is the culmination of a lot of work and many years of

New Albany Mayor plans to push annexation, sewer, drainage solutions

decision to challenge the status quo might be an empty gesture. Glascock said he decided to take a shot at the Mayor’s job even if that cost him his Council seat because he became frustrated by lack of progress in addressing growing needs, among them a languishing annexation near I-12 to

bring in commercial areas that can improve the tax base and solutions to sewer and drainage problems. “I’m kind of flabbergasted,” Glascock said Wednesday morning. “I didn’t really expect to win. I went house to house and talked to everybody. I didn’t buy signs. All I asked is to consider me.” Stewart said he’ll wait

until the results in such a close race are confirmed, but he is prepared to walk away. “A lot of my friends were surprised, but I knew it was going to be close,” he said. “I’m still a Democrat and he changed to Republican. That’s the difference.” Both candidates are distant cousins and consider themselves personal friends.

Glascock won 171-167 in the single precinct election that was so close he had to wait for the report of absentee votes to make sure he was still ahead. Ahead by four votes on the machine at the end of election day, he picked up two more votes when absentees were counted. The incoming mayor said he believes the results reflect a growing

belief in the community that infrastructure issues must be addressed. “I think leadership is the main thing the town of Albany needs,” he said. “There are probably a lot of things that could have been done the last four years. We have serious sewer problems. The ponds are 30 years old and have never been cleaned out. We’ve almost got

canals where we should have had ditches and we see where we’ve got land washing away. Other than that, the town’s in pretty good shape. “Whenever they called me and said you won it, I decided I’m ready to go to work and do what’s right,” he said. “Let’s pull the Council together and work together.”

Denton reelected Marshal in landslide

DENHAM SPRINGS — A nasty Ward 2 Marshal's race ended in a landslide victory for incumbent Jerry Denton, who has been elected to serve another 6 years after receiving 81 percent of the vote and defeating previous employee Willie Brooks.

"I can tell you one thing, we worked very hard," Denton said. "I'm just so elated that the people put their trust and confidence in giving us another opportunity to serve them for the next 6 years."

Denton's re-election was not without its challenges, however. Denton stressed that one of the major issues with running the campaign in Ward 2 is covering the entire area. According to Denton, the district starts at the top of Amite Church Road and extends all the way to Colyell Bay. In fact, Denton said that some people don't even know that they have a marshal.

"It's just a tremendous effort to cover it," Denton said. "It's a very difficult issue to run in because it's so dissected across the parish."

Also during the campaign, the Marshal's personal and work life were attacked in ways the Marshal believes crossed the line when his family was targeted.

"There was some issues that should never have been in the race," Denton said. "I'm fair game,

politics can be kind of dirty, but you know, they attacked my family and that set a different tone. I lost all respect for the man."

Denton said he can shrug off those problems with his victory and looks toward the future of his department. He, and his deputies, will continue to focus on acquiring education and certification.

"The Sheriff has been extremely helpful to us," Denton said. "In fact, all my men just got court certified through a program that the Sheriff extended to my office to allow us to participate with his men in the new courthouse."

Denton said this is the first time all of his officers have been certified for court duties. He added that he, and his Chief Deputy Joe Schumate,

have been working on the first phase of the Trilogy FBI Academy Class and hope, now that he has been selected to continue on as Marshal, to finish the class this upcoming spring.

The Marshal will also continue his cooperative endeavors with local municipalities, including a recent campaign to help the City of Walker collect on unpaid traffic bills and warrants. The Marshal's office also works in conjunction with the Denham Springs Police Department and Sheriff's Office, helping to serve papers and warrants.

Denton expressed gratitude to voters for choosing him to serve as Marshal, and hopes he and his deputies continue to provide the best service possible.

Big leads for judicial frontrunners

Johnson carried Livingston Parish with 14,794 votes (40.94 percent), while Betts finished second (11,995, or 33.08 percent) and Beall took third (9,391, or 25.99 percent).

In Division J, Westmoreland tallied 28,739 votes (39.31 percent) to eclipse runner-up Jeff Cashe, who had 24,305 votes (33.24 percent).

Jenel Guidry Secrease, a candidate from Poncha-toula, drew 20,066 votes (27.45 percent) for third.

In Livingston Parish, Westmoreland led the Division J race with 48.44 percent or 17,752 votes. Cashe drew 10,751 votes (29.34 percent), while Secrease finished third with 8,146 votes (22.23 percent).

"With three Republican candidates, I knew

it would be hard for anyone to get more than fifty percent," Westmoreland said. "I thought it would be a better turnout altogether."

"Polls all along said it would be very hard to win outright in the first primary," he said. "As for the results, I was very pleased."

A short campaign – just over 30 days – looms for candidates who head into the Dec. 6 runoff.

"We're going to continue to do the things we've done, meet the people and let the voters make the decisions based on who we are and what we stand for," Johnson said.

Betts said the dynamics made a runoff almost inevitable.

"It's what we thought from the get-go when Russell Beall got into the race, when you'd have two candidates from

Livingston, one from Tangipahoa, so you'd have split the Livingston vote," Betts said. "Not what we hoped for, but that's what you get in this kind of primary."

Betts applauded Beall for his efforts in the campaign.

"Russell ran a good campaign, and spent a lot of money and time, so it was inevitable he'd get a good percentage of the vote," he said. "He spent a lot of time and efforts on magazines, TV ads and radio and pounded the ground well. He worked hard."

Westmoreland said he plans to stay the course for the runoff campaign.

"It's about personal contact and more personal contact – the more you can have, the better," he said. "I want to go out and let them know my plans for family court."

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Livingston Parish tells story of American election

Livingston Parish did itself proud in the mid-term elections turning out 40,000 voters in the 6th District House race from a registered voter pool of a little over 79,000. That makes for turnout well above 50 percent, better than the historic average for even-year elections in Louisiana without a presidential race on the ballot.

The turnout here reflected a nationwide dissatisfaction with the state of the nation, and a strident resolve for change. Incumbent Senator Mary Landrieu can see the handwriting on the wall by the clear reading of the results in Livingston Parish. Six years ago against state Treasurer Republican John Kennedy, she got 42 percent of the vote here. This time around, she got 16.3 percent and actually finished third behind both Bill Cassidy and Rob Maness.

For Maness, Livingston Parish was by far his best parish of the day, and the only parish where he actually finished with a larger vote than Mary Landrieu. Cassidy carried Livingston Parish with 59.5 percent, but Maness got 19.1 percent beating Landrieu with 7,686 votes to the incumbent's 6,576. Statewide, Maness claimed 13.76 percent to Cassidy's 40.96 and Landrieu's 42.08. Landrieu's hopes for a first primary victory were dashed on a wave of Republicanism.

Landrieu now enters a month-long runoff with Bill Cassidy, whose Republican support machine has already purchased over \$5 million in TV time to be supplemented by ample use of other media. The incumbent, on the other hand, faces the stark reality that Senate control has already shifted to the Republicans, erasing her claim to the Chairmanship of the Senate Energy Committee (for what that was worth under Harry Reid). Where does she go to raise money? Not even the old reliable labor unions are interested in throwing good money after bad. She has no choice but to fight it out, but her political hanging is scheduled for December 6, and it's doubtful that the voters will grant her a reprieve.

In Louisiana's two contested races for Congress, Republicans Dr. Ralph Abraham and Garrett Graves appear poised to join what is now a six-member

House delegation in Washington, although both must go through the process of defeating Democrats in the December 6 elections. Abraham, who will run in the 5th District against Democrat Jamie Mayo, narrowly made the runoff by edging out the nephew of Duck Dynasty star Phil Robertson, Republican Zach Graham. The Kissing Congressman Vance McCallister finished a distant fourth.

In the 6th District, there were no surprises. The conventional wisdom predicted a runoff between convicted felon Edwin Edwards and the leading Republican fund-raiser, whoever that might be. The whoever took the form of long-time congressional staffer Garret Graves who reported raising over \$1 million, or about twice as much as his nearest opponent. With 20 percent of the vote African-American, Edwards was expected to run first, and he did with 30.12 percent of the vote. But Graves ran a strong second at 27.32 percent, far above third-place finisher Paul Dietzel's 13.55 percent. State Senator Dan Claitor finished fourth, and state Rep. Lenar Whitney fifth.

Note: The data show Edwin Edwards received about 13 percent of the white vote in the primary election, and almost all the black vote to achieve his 30.12 percent total. African-Americans comprise about 20 percent of the vote in the 6th District, one of the highest percentages of minority voters in any Republican-held district.

In Livingston Parish, Paul Dietzel's hopes were dashed as Graves won a plurality here with 12,483 votes to Dietzel's 9,352. Edwards finished third with 7,507 followed by Lenar Whitney at 3,495. State Senator Dan Claitor from Baton Rouge finished a distant fifth with 3,010 votes.

Overall, Graves carried only three of the 6th District's 12 parishes. In addition to Livingston, Graves also led the field in Ascension and West Baton Rouge. Edwards carried all nine remaining



parishes, with his best parish being St. Helena where he actually lapped the field gaining more than 50 percent of the vote.

Statewide there were 1,470,692 votes cast in the U.S. Senate race, but by the time voters arrived at the 14th constitutional amendment, only 1,299,608 bothered to put a finger to the machine. That amendment was defeated, along with several others including the

proposal to eliminate the 70 year-old retirement age for state court judges. What did pass, among other proposals, were three (Nos. 1, 2 and 8) to dedicate state funds for nursing homes, hospitals, and artificial reefs offshore. Never let it be said that Louisiana voters will pass up an opportunity to dedicate state funds beyond the reach of the Legislature. With a few more constitutional dedications, legislators will become irrelevant. Perhaps that's the way voters would like them to be.

Our pick for the absolute worst amendment, the one that would have established a state Department of Elderly Affairs, proved the worst loser of the 14 on the ballot, wisely put asunder by some 70 percent of the voters. Also soundly defeated was the proposal to allow local taxes to be collected by private contingency fees, our choice for the second most offensive amendment on the ballot.

Around the nation, Republicans emerged in the House with their largest margin since 1928. They changed Senate seats in Montana, South Dakota, West Virginia, Colorado, Iowa, Arkansas, and North Carolina. Alaska will also change as late votes arrive, and Louisiana will switch in December. That's a 54-seat majority in the Senate and the biggest party switch since 1932. There can be no other reading of the results than a total repudiation of the Obama presidency.

What Obama heard Tuesday

The outcome of Tuesday's national referendum on President Obama has been so predictable for so long that the pundits didn't even wait for their piling on in the immediate aftermath. Several lengthy, well-researched pieces on "how the Republicans did it" popped up in media like the *New York Times* and *Washington Post* on election night. Despite the sound spanking delivered to the Government Party, don't look for any relenting or contrition in Washington.

"I hear you," the President said in the aftermath of losing the Senate and watching the House of Representatives swell to near Reconstruction levels of Republican control. That's about as good as it gets.

The two sides will talk about compromising, as they usually do. Yet voters did not send Republicans to Washington in droves to compromise. Mr. Obama said this election was a referendum on his policies. He lost, and the winners are coming to Capitol Hill to oppose those policies, scale them back, slow them down. Long-tenured public officials like Mary Landrieu are casualties in a war to stop Obama. She can claim all she wants that she puts Louisiana first.

All too many of her constituents can see is a voting record that put Obama first.

If Obama heard anything, it would have been the footsteps of a retrenched Republican Party. The GOP has fixed a number of its internal issues, has gotten its act together on the campaign trail and looks prepared to be a force in 2016. These Republican operators proved they knew how to take advantage of Democratic weaknesses and avoid mistakes.

New faces and new stars are emerging. Veteran Joni Ernst became the first woman ever to represent the usually Democratic state of Iowa in the Senate. South Carolina's Tim Scott made history as the first black Republican since Reconstruction to be elected a Senator from the South.

Obama and his friends from the Government Party know better than anyone the razor thin margins of politics in a divided America and the consequences of letting an election cycle get away from them as they have this time. What the Government Party of the Beltway heard Tuesday was the sound of a once-devastated opposition party coming back to life.

The GOP will pick a standard-bearer, presently unknown, to run against the Democrats' "inevitable" Hillary. At this moment in history, the Obama and Clinton magic of yore appear very much to be damaged goods in the marketplace of politics.

Strange and uncomfortable feelings from primary season

Things could have gotten weirder during Louisiana's primary election cycle, but the candidates and campaigns ran out of time. As it stood, it was bonkers enough, with more than a few moments that were beyond awkward.

The mayoral race in Shreveport was somewhat late-breaking with its strangeness, most of it following the release of a poll two weeks ago commissioned by *The Shreveport Times* and KTBS-TV. Since then, we've learned that first place finisher Ollie Tyler shot her first husband in 1968. Media reports have unearthed inconsistencies, including explanations of self defense involving domestic violence, that it was possibly an accident and that the husband had his own gun.

If that wasn't enough, the local media has questioned the mental state of Victoria Provenza, who finished second in the poll. She has attributed her problems to a "traumatic brain injury," but fell short of proving her supposedly classified work for the Defense Department and other professional brags. Then there's the third place finisher, state Rep. Patrick Williams, who was accused earlier in the cycle of double billing some of his legislative expenses.

If you think folks in Shreveport had a difficult primary choice to make this season, just consider the field in New Roads' mayoral battle. Incumbent Mayor Robert Myer accused the campaign of challenger Cornell Dukes of buying individual votes with \$2 and a 40-ounce beer. Myer said he had recorded proof during a press conference last week, but when pursued by reporters shouting questions, he jumped in his vehicle and drove away.

There has also been more talk of creatures and critters this election cycle than in any other in recent memory. U.S. Senate candidate Rob Maness grabbed headlines around the country by literally grabbing an alligator in his first television ad, but not so much for his later radio spots comparing Congress to cockroaches. State Sen. Elbert Guillory, who is featured in TV ads attacking incumbent U.S. Sen. Mary Landrieu, also told a national magazine last month that he killed a bear in single combat. You have to "get in close" he told *National Review*.

And who would have ever thought that Louisiana's two competitive congressional races would turn on the words of "actors" from reality television programs on A&E? In the 6th Congressional District, former Gov. Edwin Edwards didn't seem to be hurt by the cancellation of "The Governor's Wife," although I'm sure we can all agree that "The Governor's Last Run" would have made for better entertainment. In the 5th Congressional District, the boys from "Duck Dynasty" sent buckshot the way of Congressman Vance McAllister, whom they backed last year, in hopes of clearing a path for cousin Zach Dasher. Patriarch

Phil Robertson even cut a spot boiling down the race, and America's founding and future, to "bibles and guns."

The 6th District was also home to automated robocalls from pop singer Pat Boone, the 50s and 60s teen idol. He asked voters to support state Rep. Lenar Whitney, noting her anti-abortion and pro-gun stances. "Lenar Whitney is the kind of conservative who would have made my friend

Ronald Reagan very proud," Boone said in the recording. Not to be outdone, Ian Somerhalder, an actor from CW's "Vampire Diaries," issued an endorsement for Alan Black in the St. Tammany Parish district attorney's race via Instagram in October.

Even lower-profile races presented intrigue and confusion this cycle. In August, it appeared that somewhere in the neighborhood of 189 justices of the peace and constables would not be allowed to seek re-election after an age-related grandfather clause was eliminated by the Legislature this year. Officials ironed out the problem eventually and opened up the ballots to those wanting to run, but not before all hell broke loose.

Roughly two dozen races, including some for mayor and chief of police, failed to draw any candidates at all this year. That means many incumbents who were looking forward to retirement had to make other plans. Likewise unprecedented, more than 100 candidates withdrew or were disqualified from other contests this cycle across the state.

We learned that Landrieu still lives with her parents, when she's in New Orleans, and doesn't shy away from keg stands. Challenger Congressman Bill Cassidy thinks the Senate operates like a "plantation," and he's opposed to keg stands. Gov. Bobby Jindal campaigned more for Republicans in other states than in Louisiana.

I could go on, but the like the candidates and campaigns, I've run out of time.

Of life in general, late author and gonzo journalist Hunter S. Thompson was fond of saying, "It never got weird enough for me." Too bad he couldn't have stuck around for this primary election cycle in Louisiana. While it has indeed been a long, strange trip, the trip isn't over. The question now becomes how crazy the election landscape will get in the runoff, when all bets are off and there's more at stake. For those who equate politics to entertainment, and strategy to conspiracy theories, get the popcorn and tinfoil hats ready. The sequel begins now.

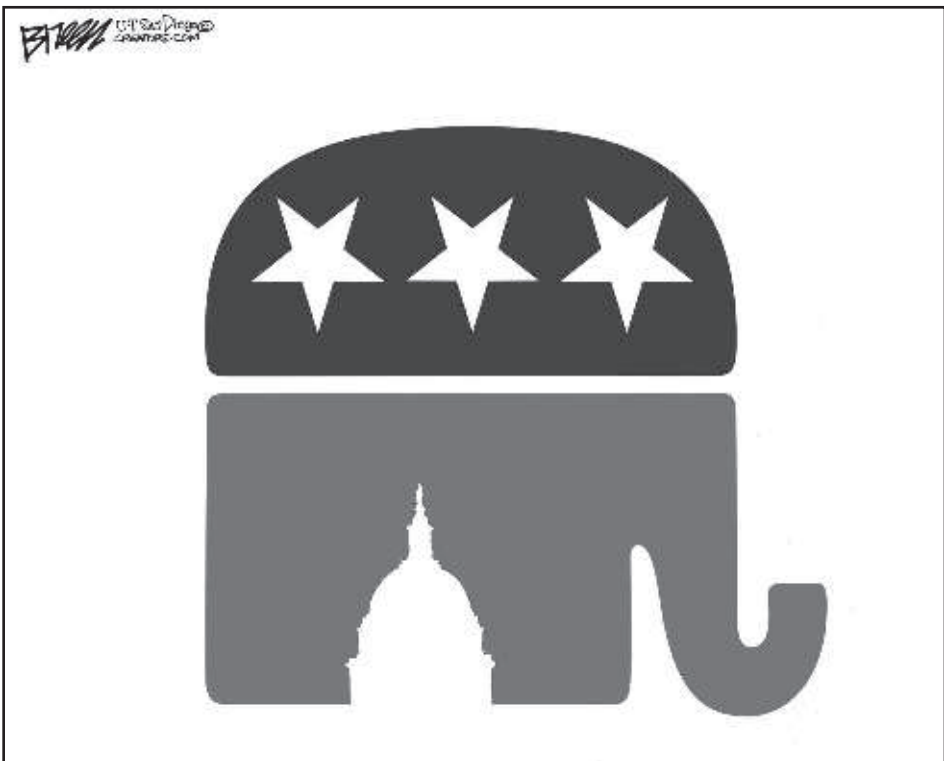

During that period, the final precinct - No. 27, Denham Springs Junior High - reported their tally, which gave Landry the victory. When asked about his vision for Denham Springs, Landry mentioned the "responsible growth" he stressed during his campaign. When asked to elaborate, Landry said that he believes Denham Springs needs to maintain a certain quality of life and a standard of living that citizens have become accustomed to. The soon to be Mayor of Denham Springs is against growth for the sake of growth. "I know we're all chasing the retail sales tax dollar, I know that's very important because it's how we operate our city," Landry said. "But we also need jobs — not just entry-level jobs but management jobs at businesses that want to be here and make our

city proud." Landry says he currently has some ideas on how to do things differently in Denham Springs, but will be reaching out to local officials and Mayors to get their ideas. After he gets acclimated, and covers budgetary matters, he'll be working with a Council that has one incumbent returning and one in a runoff. Currently, Jeff Wesley, Lori Lamm-Williams, Robert Poole, and Rene Delayhoussae have secured seats on the five-person council. Chris Davis and Julie Dyason-Norris will face a runoff on December 6 for the last seat. Wesley is a retired police chief with no council experience, Lamm-Williams is an incumbent, and Poole and Delayhoussae

sae have previous council experience. Dyason-Norris is making her first run for public office. "If we have those two incumbents that would bring a lot of stability to the Council, and they could train other members of the Council and I think that will be wonderful," Landry said. "I feel I can work with anybody, I've done that all my life, and I don't think it will be a problem." Finally, Landry said that he will be taking the next two months to get his personal affairs in order, specifically his grocery stores. "At this point I think I need to figure out something a little different," Landry said. "The Mayor is a full-time job."

Bungled health millage shot down

LIVINGSTON — An error on a proposed millage renewal for the Livingston Parish Health Unit proved to be toxic Tuesday as voters soundly rejected it 57 to 43 percent.

The Health Unit's 10-year property tax renewal incorrectly stated its expected income. Instead of \$2,363,600 revenue from 5 mills, the ballot put the estimated income at \$763,780.

The vote against the

millage was 21,010-15,953.

Discovered just days before the vote, parish officials already announced it would have been null and void and the current chairman of the Parish Council predicted before Tuesday's election the proposition in its correct form will be tried again next spring. In addition, the new version might offer the opportunity to fund parish animal control and reduce taxes, Chairman Ricky Goff said

Monday.

"The numbers on this tax renewal passed through several offices, and nobody caught the mistake," Goff said Monday. "I'm not going to assign blame."

"When we looked through the financials, we saw a \$6.6 million surplus, more than the Health Unit needs," Goff said.

Goff said he intends to ask other councilmen to consider a new allocation of funds when a corrected tax renewal

goes back to the voters, perhaps in May 2015.

"The Health Unit would begin drawing on the existing surplus to pay for its operations, and will also have additional revenue once its facilities are paid off," Goff said. "Since the Health Unit will not need that full 5 mills, the financial re-structuring would mean savings to taxpayers."

The tax savings would be less if voters wanted to use a portion of the Health Unit millage for

animal control.

Currently, full service animal control is only available inside Walker, Denham Springs, and the Town of Livingston. The parish picks up strays inside Livingston, where its shelter is located. The rest of the parish has only limited services.

"The shelter currently picks up only from Sheriff Department calls pertaining to vicious dogs or bite cases, cruelty cases, and abandonment cases resulting in

charges being pressed against the owner," according to the parish shelter's website.

The parish does not accept stray dogs brought to the shelter, and does not accept any cats.

"Even these animal control services will have to be cut back if we don't find a new source of funding," Goff said.

"It's hard to ask voters for a new tax, but here we have an opportunity to offer a tax cutback plus a new service," Goff said.

Voters approve fire, recreation renewals, reject Killian tax

DENHAM SPRINGS – Voters on Tuesday approved millage renewals that benefit Parks and Recreation of Denham Springs (PARDS) and Livingston Parish Fire Protection District 5.

Despite approval of both millages, a strong anti-tax sentiment among voters prevailed in both proposals.

The renewal of a 15-mill tax to support the recreation program passed with 5,094 votes, or 53.11 percent – a margin of fewer than 600 votes.

The margin proved more decisive for a 10.14-mill property tax to support Fire Protection District No. 5. A total of 65.57 percent of the voters (4,074) supported the renewal, while 2,139 voters (34.43 percent) opposed.

The PARDS millage generates around \$2.2 million annually.

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Amendments fare poorly here, statewide

DENHAM SPRINGS – State-wide voters rejected eight of 14 constitutional amendments on the ballot Tuesday, including one that would have eliminated a mandatory retirement age state court judges.

Amendment 5 would have eliminated the current retirement age of 70 for state court judges.

A total of 58.16 percent of the voters (782,393) statewide nixed the proposal, while 562,790 (41.84 percent) supported the amendment.

In Livingston Parish, a total of 24,699 voters (64.76 percent) rejected

the measure, while 13,442 (35.24 percent) approved.

Twenty-first Judicial District Court Judge Bob Morrison was among the judges who last spring sought legislative approval to bring the measure to voters for approval.

The amendment on the book since 1974 stated that judges who turn 70 while in office are allowed to serve out the remainder of their current term before the forced retirement.

The state prior to 1974 mandated that judges retire when they turn 75.

The proposal was among 14 on a crowded ballot.

Here's how other proposals fared with voters:

- Amendment 1, to allow the Legislature to create the Louisiana Medical Assistance Trust Fund, passed statewide with 56.16 percent of the vote. The measure drew 54.35 percent (20,919) against it and 45.65 (17,631) in favor here.
- Amendment 2, to create the Hospital Stabilization Fund, passed 53.21 percent statewide. Livingston Parish rejected the plan 56.03 percent (21,500), while 43.97 percent (16,869) approved it.
- Amendment 3, to authorize allowing an authorized agent of a

tax collector to assist in the tax sale process, failed off 64.23 of the statewide votes. Parish voters filed suit with 72.57 percent (27,505) opposing and 27.43 percent (10,395) in favor.

- Amendment 4, to authorize the investment of public for eligible transportation projects, failed statewide with 67.52 percent in opposition. Parish voters also nixed the measure, with 76.20 percent (28,680) rejecting and 23.8 percent (8,956) supporting.
- Amendment 6, for fire and police protection in Orleans Parish, barely passed with 51.16 percent in favor, while 54.24 percent of

Livingston Parish voters (20,192) opposed and 45.76 (17,034) approved.

- Amendment 7, which increases homestead exemption for disabled veterans, passed with 74.39 percent of statewide voters in favor. Livingston Parish approved it 74.67 percent (28,284), while 25.33 percent (9,597) opposed.
- Amendment 8, which establishes the Artificial Reef Development Fund, passed with 57.16 percent of statewide voters in favor. The measure drew 52.83 percent (19,890) approving and 47.17 percent (17,759) in opposition here.
- Amendment 9, which would allow special as-

essment levels for the disabled, failed with 53.1 percent of statewide voters opposing. In Livingston Parish, the measure drew 56.07 percent (21,046) in opposition and 43.93 percent (16,490) in favor.

- Amendment 10, which would set a redemption period on abandoned property, passed with 56.07 percent of the votes statewide. Livingston Parish also approved, with 51.09 percent (19,104) in favor and 48.91 percent (18,291) against it.
- Amendment 11, which would the change the maximum

number of departments in the executive government from 20 to 21, failed on 70.15 votes statewide. Livingston Parish soundly rejected it, with 78.94 percent (29,537) against and 21.06 (7,879) in favor.

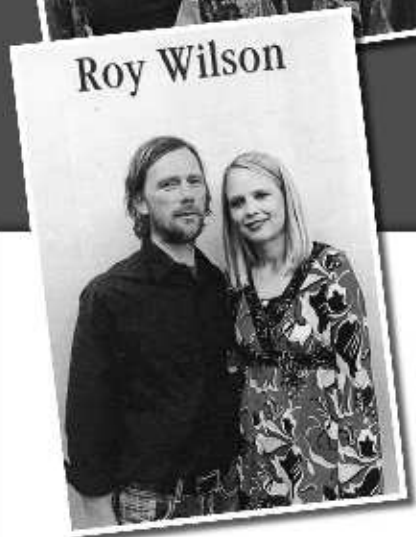
•Amendment 12, which would require two members of the state Wildlife and Fisheries Commission be electors from parishes north of the parishes of Beauregard, Allen, Evangeline, Avoylles and Pointe Coupee, failed with 58.87 percent of voters nixing it statewide. Livingston Parish voters rejected

it with 66.07 percent (24,553) against it and 33.93 percent (12,610) in approval.

•Amendment 13, which would authorize a Lower Ninth Ward property sale, failed with 59.46 percent of the statewide voters in opposition. In Livingston parish, 64 percent (23,727) opposed and 36 percent (13,346) approved.

•Amendment 14 would provide legislation that would ban during an even-numbered year any legislation relative to tax rebates, tax incentives and tax abatements. That failed 58.56-41.44 percent (76,1078-53,8530).

Plant now for colorful fall fruits, shrubs and flowers

Most people think about landscaping and planting new plants in the spring. The flowers of spring can get you in the mood, but by far the best month to plant new trees and woody ornamental shrubs is in November.

Fall presents not only the opportunity to plant but to observe plants that will add color and character to your garden now. There are plants that you should consider that just say autumn when you see them.

One plant that really sticks out this time of year is Japanese persimmon. You can see their large orange fruit in lawns as you go down the highway and they look as much like fall as pumpkins. Persimmons are divided into two major groups, astringent and nonas-

be fully ripe and soft before eating. They have high tannin content and if they are not fully ripe they will make you pucker like you have never puckered before. Those varieties are usually referred to as Japanese persimmons and the varieties to try are Hachiya, Sajio and Tanenashi

The nonastringent varieties can be eaten green and have a crisp texture much like an apple. Those recommended varieties include Fuyu,

tringent. The astringent varieties are the ones that I became familiar with as a young boy growing up, and they have to

Fuyu Imoto, Hana Fuyu and Jiro. Another fruit that gives great fall color is citrus. Satsumas are not only good to eat but they are a good small evergreen tree that can have attractive orange fruit into December. Owari is the most cold hardy variety of the Satsumas and is recommended for planting here.

A second citrus option that provides good orange color from mid-October to February is the kumquat. There are two types, one tart and one sweet. The Nagami kumquat variety is considered to be tart but it is very tasty. It produces an oblong fruit with a smooth rind and a deep orange color. The juice is acid but the plant is very cold hardy and adapted to making a hedge or corner evergreen tree. The Meiwa

kumquat variety produces round fruit and the pulp is sweet.

These trees are considered less vigorous than Nagami.

If you want to sway your color toward roses, pinks and whites, look at Camellia sasanquas and other dwarf camel-

lias. These have always been popular in old Southern gardens. They have fine textured dark blue-green foliage with flowers from mid-October through December or January. Some of the popular camellia sasanqua varieties in Louisiana include Yuletide, Bonanza, Leslie Ann, Stephanie Golden and Sparkling Burgundy.

Shi Shi Gashira is another popular dwarf camellia that has been selected as a Louisiana Super Plant because it is one of the best of the low growing camellias. It is a heavy bloom producer of double flowers that are rosy-pink in color. This evergreen shrub grows in full sun to part shade and reaches a size of 4-5 feet tall by 4-5 feet wide.

Pyrancantha with its orange berries are striking and has

caught my eye in a number of lawns. The hollies are displaying their red berries both in the tree form such as Savannah and Needle Point. I have also noticed a number of Cassia plants recently, an interesting coarse texture shrub with yellow fall flowers.

The choices abound and are all around to see. We may not have the prettiest fall leaves in south Louisiana but if you want fall color there are lots of choices of fruit, flowers and foliage. Now is the best time to make your decisions and plant for fall color.

The third incarnation of the Walker Pine Tree Festival will be held this weekend in beautiful, tree-shaded Sidney Hutchinson Park with a new carnival supplying rides for all ages.

A new independent Pine Tree Festival committee has taken over the festival, which has had a long history as Walker's signature event.

It started out in 1960 as the Louisiana Pulpwood Festival, but organizers quickly changed the name the following year, because the pine tree has contributed greatly to the economy of Livingston Parish, where it grows faster than anywhere else in the South.

The festival was held in this self-proclaimed "Pine Tree Capital of the World"

until 1975 and was reactivated under the Walker Jaycees in 1979 to be held with music, old time competitions and special days for children with disabilities and seniors.

After being dropped again in the 80s and 90s, the Pine Tree Festival was revived in recent years by Walker High School, which added carnival rides supplied by the Miller Brothers, who have also supplied them to the Immaculate Conception Festival and the Live Oak schools Cajun Fest.

The new citizens committee, which includes the 2013-2014 Queen Courtney Jarrell, her co-founder Stacy McMorris, committee chair Glenda Jones, vice chair Ellen Vandevuss, treasurer Nancy Baughman, secretary Kathy Lockhart and sergeant-at-arms Darren Blevins,

has booked in Crescent City Amusements out of New Orleans, which will supply a different array of rides. Local folks who have attended the Italian Festival in Amite can testify to their quality.

Bracelets for all you can ride for four hours will be sold for \$15 for Friday from 6 to 10 p.m.; Saturday from 12 to 4 p.m. and 6-10 p.m. and Sunday from 1-4 p.m. Rides will be open Saturday from 4 to 5 p.m., but will be by individual tickets only.

If St. Thomas and Central win, Jeff wins. Pretty simple. Since all three went with Alabama over LSU, they have the luxury of sitting back this week and rooting for the Tigers. Life is good. (Note the teams that are consensus picks are emphasized with underlines. * means consensus evenly split.)

Live Oak, Springfield volleyball heading into post-season

Only Live Oak and Springfield's volleyball teams earned playoff spots in their respective divisions among the 24-team brackets. Both, however, must take to the road today for their first-round matches.

The Lady Eagles, which finished the season 16-18, were seeded No. 22 in Division II and will travel to No. 11 South Terrebonne for its first-round match-up. South Terrebonne is 22-14 and finished runners-up to Assumption, which happens to be the top seed in Division II.

The LOHS-South Terrebonne winner will take on sixth-seeded Academy of Our Lady, which received a first-round bye.

The other top seeds

in Division II are St. Scholastica (No. 2), St. Thomas More and Lakeshore.

The Lady Bulldogs will have a much-more familiar opponent as Division III's No. 17th-seed Springfield will take on league foe Pearl River, which was seeded No. 16.

Pearl River won the district title, with Springfield runners-up. The Lady Bulldogs will take a 17-7 record into the match, while Pearl River is 20-3 overall. They defeated Springfield 3-1 (26-24, 25-12, 19-25, 25-12) in their first district meet inside the Lady Dogs' gym and then rallied from two games down to win 3-2 (1-25, 16-25, 25-22, 25-22, 15-8) at Pearl River.

The winner of the Springfield-Pearl

River match must face top-seeded Teurlings Catholic in the second round. Teurlings earned a first-round bye.

New Orleans-based Ursuline Academy earned a No. 2 seed, while Lutchter was No. 3 and Parkview Baptist No. 4.

LOHS' district foes Central and Belaire both earned a spot in the Division II bracket, as the No. 8 Lady Wildcats earned a first-round bye and will take on the No. 9 Cabrini-No. 45 Landry-Walker winner in the second round, while the No. 19 Lady Bengals travel to No. 14 Belle Chasse.

Both Walker (12-23) and Denham Springs (13-24) failed to make the playoffs in Division I, while Albany (8-12) did not make the Division IV bracket.

How did LSU lose all those in-state stars?

If you haven't already, take a look at LSU's roster — you're going to see a lot of underclassmen, with a sprinkle of junior and seniors, in the starting lineups on offense and defense. One has to wonder, what happened over the past few years to put LSU in such a predicament?

One reason is obvious — LSU, and Alabama, continue to put freshly eligible juniors and ready-to-move-on seniors into the NFL. The Tiger offense was gutted this year, sending Zach Mettenberger to the Titans, Jarvis Landry to the Dolphins, Odell Beckham Jr. to the Giants, and Jeremy Hill to the Browns.

Those names are familiar from LSU's extremely productive offense of last year — which averaged 35 points a game, 251 yards passing a game, and 202 yards rushing a game. As for this year in the pros, all of those players are in rotations for their respective NFL teams, with Mettenberger actually earning the start.

Surely, however, LSU should have found players to fill the gaps? Alabama did. However, if you take a look at many of the teams in top 10, you'll find a very interesting statistic — many of them have players from Louisiana. In this day and age, that's not extremely hard to imagine, with interstate travel and distance across this state, it's not surprising to see players choose other schools that might be a bit closer to home.

What is surprising is to see some of these players in top 10 rosters that were not only pursued by LSU, but either lost interest or were pushed aside. Take, for example, Denham Springs' own Tevin Lawson who was on his way to playing on Saturday nights in Death Valley on the defensive line. What happened? Well, Lawson was asked to gray shirt for a quarterback from California, Hayden Rettig. As you might have noticed, Rettig decided to play somewhere else.

Before that happened, Mr. Lawson decided to take his talents elsewhere as well — namely the TCU Horned Frogs in Fort Worth, Texas. The same TCU, by the way, that apparently accepted Lawson on film alone. Now, Lawson is part of the starting 4 man rotation on the number 7 team (5 in some ranking systems) in the nation.

It doesn't end there, though. Anthony Jennings is a true sophomore. Brandon Harris is a true freshman. Dak Prescott? He's a junior, and he and the Mississippi State Bulldogs are currently ranked 1st. What's that have to do with anything? Well, he's from Louisiana, and LSU was after him heavily. The Tiger offense could really use someone with his skillset right now. He chose not to come to Baton Rouge because, according to Prescott, LSU recruited his mother but not him.

Whoops. There's another defensive piece missing — Landon Collins. Collins is currently anchoring the Crimson Tide secondary, and while LSU showed promise in the Ole Miss game flying around to the ball, they sure could use an upperclassman leader. If you watched Collins make his commitment to Alabama, you'd noticed that his mother was clearly repulsed. Sounds familiar, doesn't it? It could be that she was simply an LSU fan at heart, or, it could be another situation where the mother was recruited and not the player.

Three players who are either starting or in rotation at positions where LSU could use some experience and leadership. Perhaps LSU should change their recruiting practices for some players — or maybe they were just unlucky. Either way, fans might have to endure a year or two more before this Tiger team is ready to compete with the big boys. While we're waiting, those other Louisiana natives are in the hunt for a national championship and, in some cases, coming to Baton Rouge and beating the Tigers.

Denham-Walker game dates back to 1931, Denham leads recent series 13-3

a loss to Broadmoor on Friday. The Broncos dealt the Yellow Jackets a devastating blow last Friday, as Zachary scored on a fourth-down, 60-yard pass play with just under a minute remaining in the contest to pull out a stunning 28-24 win. Walker, meanwhile, fell to Central, 68-26, to remain winless at 0-5 in district and 0-9 overall. The Wildcats are led by junior quarterback Terry Bozeman, who

enters the contest with 2,833 yards and 23 touchdowns this season. He has completed 178 of 336 passes, with a pair of sophomores as his favorite receivers. Jacob Kennedy has over 900 yards in receptions so far this season, while Terrell has over 800 yards. Last week against Central, Bozeman was 20 of 53 for 288 yards, with Warner grabbing touchdowns of 47 and 14 yards. He also connected with Kyle Nevels for a 3-yard TD. Denham Springs has counted a lot on its young players as well, starting with freshman running back Tyre Golmond, who broke the 1,000-yard mark last week against Zachary with another 100-plus yard game. Golmond, who rushed for 113 yards on 26 carries and one touchdown, raised his rushing totals on the year to 1,018 yards and 12 touchdowns on 136 carries. Junior running back Robert Thomas continues to complement Golmond in the backfield, with a 63-yard night against Zachary on just eight carries. Yellow Jackets' junior quarterback Torez Kinchen completed

11 of 24 passes for 112 yards, with one touchdown and one interception. Kinchen's main two receivers all year have been senior Kyandre Brooks and junior D'Juante Edwards. Brooks had five catches for 36 yards, including a 15-yard touchdown reception, while Edwards had four grabs for 65 yards. While the DSHS-Walker series dates back to 1931, the Yellow Jackets and Wildcats

have only played in 17 regular-season games. Nineteen other meetings were in jamboree action. Denham Springs leads the series 13 to 3 with one tie, but the Yellow Jackets have won the last eight meetings, dating back to 2006. Prior to that, Walker had won three in a row from 2003 to 2005. After both programs battled to a scoreless tie in 1931, 28 years would pass before they

would meet again on the gridiron in 1959. Denham won that contest 33-0. Another nine years would go by before their third meeting in 1968 and then after four straight years of playing each other in the regular season, the two programs only met in the jamboree from 1975 until 2002. In 2003, Walker moved up to Class 5A and joined Denham Springs in District 4-5A.

Springfield hopes offensive potency, speed will carry them past Falcons

marks, while St. Helena is 2-3, Archbishop Hannan 1-5 and Pope John Paul II, 0-5.

While either St. Thomas Aquinas exits the game with the clear-cut district championship, or Springfield manages to take it, both the Falcons and Bulldogs will go in opposite directions when the playoffs begin next week.

Prior to last week's win, Springfield was ranked No. 5 in the Class 2A 'non-select' schools latest unofficial power ratings by the Louisiana High School Athletic Association. Kinder was ranked No. 1, followed by Many, Northeast and East Feliciana. There are 38 non-select teams in Class 2A, with 32 making the playoffs and the Top-16 hosting a first-round game.

St. Thomas Aquinas was ranked No. 7 in the latest "select schools" power ratings by the LHSAA with a 12.89 rating. Calvary Baptist is ranked No. 1, followed by Catholic-New Iberia, Riverside Academy, Opelousas Catholic, Isidore Newman and Episcopal of Baton Rouge.

St. Thomas Aquinas remains under the guidance of ninth-year head coach John White. The offense is led by senior quarterback Cameron Dantzler (6-3, 175), with seniors Ralph Haynes (6-0, 220) and Mason Miller (5-10, 170) and junior Jacob Bordok (5-10, 175) in the backfield at running backs.

The wide receiver is freshman Jacob Becerra (6-3, 180), while the tight end is senior Samuel Abene (6-3, 180). Upfront, junior Chris Boudoin (5-10, 250) lines up at center, flanked at guards by senior Richard Henry (6-1, 230) and junior Jarrett Jordan (5-10, 195), while the tackles are juniors Jalen Bickham (6-4, 300) and Logan Thompson (6-2, 235).

Defensively, the Falcons have juniors Hayes Perrilloux (6-0, 180) and Brett Bass (6-1, 200) at ends, while the tackles are juniors Edwin Alexander (6-3, 310) and Collin Lee (6-1, 225).

St. Thomas' lineback-

ing corps consists of three juniors, Jesse Hester, (6-1, 225), Ralph Haynes (6-0, 220) and Dantzler, along with sophomore Trey Milazzo (5-9, 210).

The Falcons' secondary is led by senior Brad Shafer (6-1, 180), along with juniors Hunter Stanley (5-11, 160) and Reed Bolton (6-1, 175).

The Bulldogs' potent offense is hoping to make some headway in that Falcons' defense. Springfield's offense is led by senior running back Josh Taylor who has 1,244 yards on 165 carries (7.5 per-carry avg.). Along with averaging 155 yards per game, he has 13 rushing touchdowns.

Taylor's longest rush from scrimmage this season is 69 yards.

Also complementing the Bulldogs' rushing attack is sophomore Demariae Claiborne, who has 390 yards on 47 totes (8.3 avg.) with six touchdowns.

Senior quarterback Milan Love has engineered the Bulldogs' attack all year, with limited passing, but a threat with his feet. Love has 396 yards

on 70 keepers (5.7 avg.), along with eight touchdown runs. He has completed 32 of 62 passes for 489 yards for a 15.3 yard-per-play average. He has also thrown three touchdowns, with four interceptions.

When Love does put the ball in the air, his primary receivers are senior Mark Patterson with eight catches for 153 yards (19.1 avg.) and senior Zach Jackson with seven grabs for 152 yards (21.7 avg.) with two touchdowns.

Claiborne has also nabbed eight passes out of the backfield for 113 yards (9.4 avg.) and one touchdown, while junior teammate Keenan Austin has six receptions for 73 yards (12.2 avg.), with two touchdowns.

Defensively, the Dogs are led by senior Jordan Carter with 69 tackles, 21 of which have been solos. He also has five tackles for a loss.

Sophomore Kaleb Frickey has been on 51 tackles for Springfield, with a team-high 23 solos and one tackle for a loss.

Austin has 18 solos, along with 12 assists for

30 tackles, while Love has 16 solos and 17 assists for 33.

Patterson has 10 solos and 31 assists for 41 total, but leads the team in quarterback sacks with four and a half. He also has five and a half tackles for losses.

Senior Dale Ouber is also in double-digits in solos with 11, while added eight assisted tackles for 19 so far this season.

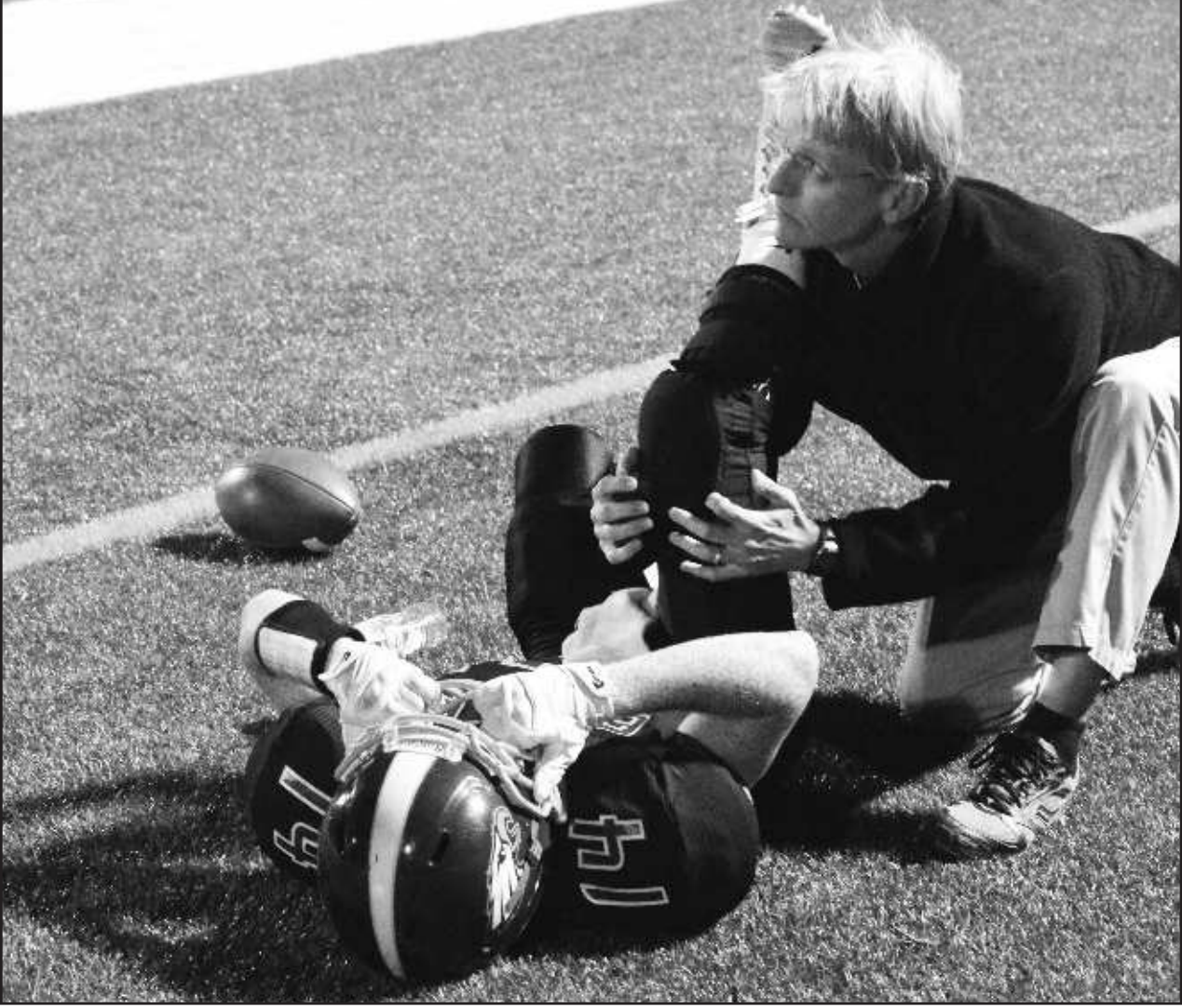

SECTION 1. The City hereby ratifies its previous authorization of the issuance of its Revenue

Refunding Bonds (the "Bonds") in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$10,000,000, the proceeds of which will be used by the City to: (i) refund a portion of its \$23,765,009 Louisiana Local Government Environmental Facilities and Community Development Authority Revenue Bonds (City of Denham Springs Sewer Project), Series 2006 (the "Series 2006 Bonds"); (ii) funding a reserve fund or purchasing a reserve fund surety, if necessary; and (iii) paying costs of issuance of the Bonds.

SECTION 2. The following definitions contained in Section 1.1 of the Prior Authorization shall be amended, deleted and/or added to read as follows:

"Average Annual Debt Service" shall be deleted in its entirety.
"Bond Insurer" means, if applicable, the issuer of the Municipal Bond Insurance Policy."
"Combined Utility Enterprise Fund Net Revenues" means, collectively, the Water System Revenues, the Sewerage System Revenues, the Gas System Revenues and the Sanitation System Revenues, in each case, less operation and maintenance expenses related to the applicable utility system. Such operation and maintenance costs shall not include depreciation or amortization."
"Issuer's Payment Obligations" shall be deleted in its entirety.
"Lawfully Available Funds" means, collectively, the funds, income, revenue, fees, receipts or charges of any nature from any source whatsoever on deposit with or accruing from time to time to the Issuer, provided that no such funds, income, revenue, fees, receipts or charges shall be so included in this definition which have been or are in the future legally dedicated and required for other purposes by the electorate, by the terms of specific grants, by the terms of particular obligations issued or to be issued (to the extent pledged or budgeted to pay debt service on such other obligations) or by operation of law, and provided further that neither the full faith and credit of the Issuer nor any specific tax of the Issuer is pledged and there is no obligation to levy or increase taxes or other sources of revenue above any legal limits applicable to the Issuer from time to time."
SECTION 3. Section 2.1(a) of the Prior Authorization shall be amended to read as follows:
"This Bond Ordinance creates a series of bonds of the Issuer to be designated "Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 2014," however, the Bonds may carry any other series designation as may be determined by the Executive Officers depending on the circumstances or date of their delivery. All references in the Prior Authorization to "Series 2013" shall be amended to read "Series 2014."
SECTION 4. Section 6.2 of the Prior Authorization shall be amended to read as follows:
"SECTION 6.2. Rate Covenant. The Issuer, through its Governing Authority, hereby covenants to fix, establish, maintain and collect, so long as any principal and interest is unpaid on the Bonds, such rates, fees, rents or other charges for the services and facilities of the Combined Utility Enterprise System, and all parts thereof, and to revise the same from time to time whenever necessary, as will always provide Combined Utility Enterprise Fund Net Revenues combined with District Net Revenues in each Fiscal Year sufficient to (i) make payments and deposits required by the Parity Bond Agreements and this Bond Ordinance for the payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds, Outstanding Parity Obligations and any Additional Parity Obligations issued hereafter; (ii) equal one hundred twenty-five (125%) of the required deposits to the debt service funds established for the security and payment of the Bonds, Outstanding Parity Obligations and any Additional Parity Obligations; (iii) make all other payments required by this Bond Ordinance; and (iv) pay all other obligations or indebtedness payable out of the Combined Utility Enterprise Fund Net Revenues for such Fiscal Year. The Issuer further covenants that such rates, fees, rents or other charges shall not at any time be reduced so as to be insufficient to provide adequate revenues for such purposes."
SECTION 5. Section 6.3(A)(i) of the Prior Authorization shall be amended to read as follows:
"(i) Payment of Current Expenses. Current expenses of the Combined Utility Enterprise System from month to month as the same shall become due shall be paid. Current Operation and Maintenance Expenses will not exceed the reasonable and necessary amount thereof."
SECTION 6. Section 7.1(b) of the Prior Authorization shall be amended to read as follows:
"(b) Additional Parity Obligations may also be issued on parity with the Bonds and the Parity Obligations if all of the following conditions are met:
(i) Additional Parity Obligations secured by Combined Utility Enterprise Fund Net Revenues may be incurred if the Combined Utility Enterprise Fund Net Revenues combined with District Net Revenues for the most recently completed Fiscal Year immediately preceding the issuance of the additional bonds, notes, or other obligations have been not less than 125% of the Maximum Annual Debt Service for the Bonds, Outstanding Parity Obligations and the proposed Additional Parity Obligations secured by Combined Utility Enterprise Fund Net Revenues. The calculations of "Combined Utility Enterprise Fund Net Revenues" and "District Net Revenues" may be adjusted to reflect (i) adopted rate increases, as though such rate increases had been in continuous effect during the most recently completed Fiscal Year, and (ii) projected customer increases based on the report of a consulting engineer.
Additional Parity Obligations secured by Unrestricted Revenues or Lawfully Available Funds may be incurred if the average annual Unrestricted Revenues or Lawfully Available Funds for the two (2) Fiscal Years immediately preceding the issuance of the additional bonds, notes, or other obligations must have been not less than 150% of the Maximum Annual Debt Service on all debt secured by Unrestricted Revenues or Lawfully Available Funds and the proposed Additional Debt secured by Unrestricted Revenues or Lawfully Available Funds. For purposes of calculating "Maximum Annual Debt Service" on obligations secured by or payable from Unrestricted Revenues or Lawfully Available Funds, "Maximum Annual Debt Service" shall not include any debt service on bonds, notes or other obligations that are payable from a dedicated revenue stream which would not otherwise be a component part of the Issuer's Unrestricted Revenues or Lawfully Available Funds and which dedicated revenue stream for each of the two (2) Fiscal Years immediately preceding the issuance of the proposed Additional Parity Obligations must (A) have been not less than 125% of the maximum annual debt service on the bonds, notes or other obligations that are payable from the dedicated revenue stream and (B) secure the bonds, notes or other obligations payable from such dedicated revenue stream until paid in full.

Albany travels to district leader Amite

ALBANY – With only three of its 10 games this season at home, Albany has the tough test of being road warriors this season. Unfortunately, the Hornets will have to end their season Friday against some home Warriors in a very talented Amite team.

Kickoff for the District 8-3A finale is 7 p.m.

Riding a four-game losing streak, Albany brings 2-7 record into its final game of the season, along with a winless 0-4 district mark.

Amite brings an unblemished 4-0 district record into the contest, while the Warriors are sporting a 7-2 overall record. Four of their wins have been shutouts, including back-to-back shutouts of District 8-3A foes Jewel Sumner (18-0) and Independence (35-0) over the past two weeks.

Loranger, whose lone league loss was

to Amite (12-7), is on their heels in the league standings at 3-1, along with Bogalusa, while Jewel Sumner is 2-2, Independence at 1-3 and Albany winless at 0-4.

The Warriors also defeated Bogalusa (33-7).

Along with non-district wins over St. Helena (32-0), Southern Lab (20-16) and Belaire (41-0), the Warriors lone two losses this season came to Class 5A Ponchatoula (55-6) and Class 4A Franklinton (39-13).

Amite, which returned 17 starters from a year ago, is led by senior quarterback Devorius Henderson (6-1, 170), along with senior running back Devin Head (5-7, 17) and junior back Kenner Harrell (5-8, 170).

The offensive line is powered by the likes of senior tackle Joseph Montgomery (6-2, 245) and senior guard Fred Torrence (6-3, 320), with senior D.J. Downing (5-7, 173) heads up the receiving corps.
