Walker awaits vote

Schools seek \$25 million for upgrades

THE FACE OF WALKER High School will change forever if voters in the community decide to fund a facelift that will orient it in the future along Florida Boulevard instead of Burgess Avenue.

WALKER — Voters went to the polls beginning early Saturday morning to decide the future of the Walker School District.

At stake are major renovations that would change the face of Walker High School and improvements for all the other schools in the district.

Voters are being asked to approve a millage to raise \$25 million in bonds for improving Walker school facilities that are needed to keep up with the fastest growing area of Livingston Parish, School Board member Jimmy Watson said.

Watson and other officials held several community meetings in March to explain the plan.

Superintendent of Schools John Watson said the enrollment of Walker 9th through 12th grades is now up to 1,500 and will reach 1,700 by the time students set foot on the rebuilt and combined Walker

High and Walker Freshman High campuses over the next four years. In 2004, before the freshman high school existed, that enrollment was less than 1,200. Watson said three years after South Fork Elementary opened to relieve overcrowding, the South Walker Elementary enrollment is already nearing its old level of 750 students.

"They're still moving in," Superintendent Watson said. "By that time, there's a possibility we'll need another junior high."

Jimmy Watson, who is the superintendent's brother, estimates that half the growth in Livingston Parish schools over the last decade has come in the Walker School District.

The Walker District last raised millages after a \$12 million bond issue in 2004 to open North Corbin Junior High and purchase property to expand North Corbin Elementary. The

GIVING BACK

Theriot's fund major university endowments

DENHAM SPRINGS — Over the past year, while former longtime city and parish engineer Alex Theriot Jr. has been in a battle for his life against cancer, his focus has been on something else too: philanthropy.

Theriot, a St. Martinville native who has lived most of his adult life in Denham Springs, is responsible along with his wife for the first endowed chair of civil engineering at his alma mater, University of Louisiana at Lafayette. They also have created two other UL Lafayette scholarship funds and a permanent endowment for Catholic

One-year alternatives for students failing LEAP

LIVINGSTON — The School Board Thursday approved state-mandated revisions to the parish's Pupil Progression Plan for 2013-14.

Dawn Rush, director of curriculum, told the board that the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education has granted a waiver this year to fourth grade and eighth grade students who fail to achieve satisfactory scores on the LEAP test.

Superintendent of

Schools John Watson said the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education approved the changes in April and the parish's progression plan needed to reflect the changes.

Rush said BESE mandated that first time fourth and eighth graders who are classified as non-proficient based on LEAP test scores will have the opportunity to go to summer school and receive 50 hours of remediation and then test again in the subject they failed.

"We now have the opportunity to provide a waiver to the School Building Level Committee to use classroom grades, attendance, growth in test scores and benchmark assessments administered at the school level to determine if the student should move on," Rush said.

If the student is promoted to ninth grade based on these criteria, Rush said that student will go into a transition program where mentoring will be provided.

Rush said the student will then become a graduation cohort when they enter the tenth grade.

Rush said the waiver is only applicable to the 2013-14 academic year. The 2014-15 pupil progression plan is still in development and will also have significant changes, Rush said.

During the meeting, the board approved a new Service Animals in Schools policy.

The policy applies to animals that the Department of Justice

has approved as part of the American with Disabilities Act, which is currently just dogs and miniature horses.

Assistant Superintendent Rick Wentzel explained after the meeting that some visually impaired people may choose miniature horses ranging in height from 24 to 34 inches since the horse may live longer than a guide dog and provide more a stable base for daily activities.

Wentzel told the board that there have been no

requests for any service animals at this time and that each request that comes through would be evaluated on each individual situation.

In other action, the board:

- Accepted the remodeling of the Denham Springs High School science building as substantially complete.

- Adopted a resolution recognizing and proclaiming May 5-9, 2013, as Livingston Parish Public Schools Employee Appreciation Week.

dealership and much rental property. He was principal organizer and Chairman of the Board of Tuscaloosa Commerce Bank until it was sold in the first of many mergers under which it is currently part of Regions Bank. He also served on the Board of Directors for Southeast National Bank that was later acquired by Hancock Bank, which is now Whitney Bank. He also served as the Chairman of the Louisiana Board of Commerce and Industry.

His wife, meanwhile, was office manager and treasurer of Delta Concrete Products in Denham Springs for over 25 years. The Alex and Loretta Durand Theriot Jr. Chair in Civil Engineering was added in 2013 to the \$100,000 Endowed Professorship in the College of Business created in 2007 and the \$100,000 Endowed First Generation Scholarship in the College

of Business created in 2012. The second helps students in the same situation Loretta began life, as a first generation family member attending college.

The 2007 gesture was made in honor of their parents, Alex and Evelyn Theriot and John and Isabelle Durand.

The 2012 fund honors their three children, Aline, Andre and Ben Theriot. Both were created with the help of the Moody Foundation, which Alex Theriot said he discovered one day when reading an advertisement in his hometown newspaper The Teche News.


The \$50,000 matching donation toward \$100,000 to St. Landry came about, he said, after he watched the movie "The Rookie" in 2002.

The true story of a high school baseball coach who attempts to become a Major League Baseball pitcher in middle age and succeeds, the movie

begins with a scene of two nuns by the wildcat Santa Maria oil well in West Texas casting rose petals and praying to St. Rita for a miracle. Theriot said the depiction made him curious, which led him to look for a book about St. Rita. Instead, he came upon one about Father Joseph Verbis Lefleur, a military chaplain who died in 1944.

The Theriots joined with another couple in funding scholarships at Sacred Heart, the school Lefleur attended as a boy, Opelousas Catholic where his vocation began and Vermillion Catholic School in Abbeville because of his association with that parish.

Theriot said the endowment put in place raises \$3,500 per year to fund three \$1,000 scholarships. Meanwhile, he noted that the Santa Rita oil well depicted in the movie produced for 67 years.

Keystone of a wrecked campaign

Will the Obama White House throw Mary Landrieu under the bus? It sure looks that way from the insider fight going on in Washington among leading Democrats over the controversial Keystone pipeline.

The economic impact of the proposed international pipeline seems obvious on the face of it. It would provide transportation from the Canadian oil and shale fields to U.S. refineries on the Gulf Coast including several in Louisiana. Economic projections, even if half believable, show thousands of new construction jobs and residual permanent jobs all along the pipeline route and, most importantly, to Mary Landrieu's home state at the tail end of the pipeline where refineries would need added jobs and output capacity to handle the new source of raw product.

The pipeline would also insure that the bulk of oil extracted in Canada would go to the United States rather than countries like China where a growing economy cries out for energy from any source it can get. The Canadians have used the threat of selling their oil to China as a negotiating tool to obtain American approval of the pipeline. So far, such threats have failed to impress the Obama White House which, true to its wacko greenie colors, has opposed the Keystone pipeline from the beginning.

Remember that the basic platform for the 2014 Democratic Party includes raising the minimum wage, opposing the alleged Republican war on women, attacking the Koch brothers, and reducing global warming. It's the part about reducing global warming that they're having a hard time selling to the American people, and apparently to a goodly portion of the members of their own party now sitting in the United States Senate.

Years of obfuscation from the Obama White House on the issue of the Keystone pipeline resulted in March of 2013 with a non-binding Senate



Resolution approving the project. This particular President of the United States has shown no proclivity during his six years in office to obey a supposedly binding act of Congress, much less a non-binding one. Predictably, Obama never acknowledged the Senate Resolution passed last year.

But with real elections coming up this year for a half-dozen Sen-

ate Democrats in states that would profit greatly from the Keystone pipeline, pressure has mounted inside the Senate Democratic caucus for President Harry Reid to allow a binding vote in the Senate, one that the President would be obliged to veto, potentially creating a huge schism between Obama and members of his own party. Reid gave his nod of approval to Landrieu's elevation this year as Chairman of the Senate Energy Committee, a move designed to help her reelection campaign in a conservative, energy-driven state. But that move backfired late last week when Landrieu led almost a dozen Senate Democrats to sign on as co-sponsors of a binding bill that would force the White House to approve the Keystone pipeline as soon as its route, being challenged in court, is finally determined.

Democratic co-sponsors of Landrieu's bill include Mark Pryor of Arkansas, Claire McCaskill of Missouri, Jon Tester of Montana, Mark Warner of Virginia, Kay Hagan of North Carolina, Mark Begich of Alaska, Joe Manchin of West Virginia, Joe Donnelly of Indiana, Heidi Heitkamp of North Dakota, and John Walsh of Montana. Pryor, Begich, and Hagan, along with Landrieu, are up for election this year and are considered particularly vulnerable. But up for election this year or not, there are now enough Democratic Senators as co-sponsors on the bill to pass it with the help of the 45 Republicans in the Senate, all of whom support the pipeline.



Landrieu's move to put pressure on President Obama has gathered at least 60 votes, enough steam to pass a Keystone bill and put it on Obama's desk, forcing him to veto it. Landrieu does not appear to have enough Democratic support in the Senate to obtain the required 67 votes to override a Presidential veto, if it comes to that. But if it does come to that, the Democratic Party will be split down the middle and

in shambles as the November elections approach.

Last week, Senate President Reid told reporters there was a "75-80 percent chance" that he would allow a vote soon on the Keystone pipeline, although he refused to say that the Landrieu bill would be the proposal voted upon. Democrats remain embroiled in a behind-the-scenes struggle to find an accommodation between Senators from conservative or oil producing states and the dedicated greenies inside the Democratic Party, many of whom are using their trust fund money to promote the global warming ruse (no doubt to salve the guilt that comes from vast inherited wealth).

The latest word from the White House has been the usual doublespeak designed in the end to kill the project without actually saying so. The President, if you wish to believe a word he says at this point, claims that he is attempting to keep the Keystone pipeline "outside of politics," a contention so blatant that only a hearty guffaw seems appropriate in response.

Obama's Nest of Socialists in the White House appear hell bent on a direct collision course not just with the Senators of their own party, but with American voters as well. Less energy means a lower standard of living. That might be OK for Obama's trust fund baby contributors, but for the rest of us, it's bad deal.

After further review ... uh oh!

High school sports is one of those disciplines that is supposed to teach life lessons to the participants.

One of those life lessons, we find out this week, is that when things don't go your way, hire a good lawyer. You never know when you roll the dice in the legal system what will come up. A look at the mess that has become of the Class 3A baseball playoffs is instructive here.

The Louisiana High School Athletic Association, which governs high school sports and makes sure everybody plays by the rules, has been enjoined from enforcing those rules against Livonia High School, a high-rolling football and baseball program that was determined

to have used an ineligible player in both sports this past season. The standard penalty in such instances, one that has been applied to many schools over the years, is to require them to forfeit any wins in any games in which that ineligible player has participated. For that matter, forfeiting

games is pretty much the standard for state associations across the United States.

Along come some parents with their lawyer and a friendly judge who issues a temporary restraining order to prevent Livonia from being ousted from the baseball playoffs. Note that the LHSAA did not ban the school. Livonia simply had to forfeit games, which affected its ranking and caused it to fall short of qualifying. This judge put the team in anyway, reinventing the bracket to accomplish that since playoffs had already begun. This was after a state appellate court had dissolved the judge's first temporary restraining order.

One school adversely affected was 31st seed Kaplan, which must play Livonia for the right to play Evangel in the first round. And Kaplan did nothing wrong. Should the Kaplan parents find their own friendly judge to get their own TRO?

There has been no finding that the LHSAA failed in any way to administer its rule properly or that it denied due process to Livonia High School. That matter will be argued later, presumably after the playoffs are over. Meanwhile, there will now arise a debate over the appropriateness of courts of law inserting themselves into athletic competition. Should a judge, with no proof of any inequities, take over the process on a whim? How is that fair, especially since not every school community has equal resources to bully its way into the playoffs through courts of law? And what's next? Will judges review balls and strikes too? Was he safe or out? See you in court.

Thoughts about the 'bright future,' now that it's here

Graduation is almost upon us again. It's been a few years since mine, though I still remember it well. I remember sitting out in the middle of a football field in front of a stadium full of townfolk with flashes popping. I remember the little beads of sweat and the discomfort of humidity as one speaker after the next waxed on about our bright futures.

I was not one of the people asked to give speeches that day, make of it what you will. I was among those having a bright future, as the mortarboard above my head signified. I've heard so many commencement addresses since then, there's no doubt what I would have said has been said often before and since. Of course, had I known then what I know today ...

The first thing I would say to those with the bright futures is simply this: You won't believe how fast they go by. No really, you won't. You can understand it intellectually, I'm sure, especially all you honor graduates. But you can't process it. Impossible.

The last four years that were an epoch for you, do you know how many blinks those years took for the likes of me? That's how it goes when you are sitting on this side of your bright future looking back on it.

The next thing I'd say is that your future won't be what you imagine. The job you wind up doing may not even exist yet. If it does, the nature of it will certainly change. Technology is different, but also culture. When we were in school, my generation might be tempted to tell you, life was simpler. Yet it did not seem so at the time.

For guys, there was this thing called the military draft that might get you sent to a place called Vietnam, which was hot and full of mosquitoes like Louisiana and full of hostiles with guns too. We had to sweat out those prospects, among other things.

There was talk of counterculture and drugs, especially on TV, and concerns about the deteriorating morals of society, though most of it seemed far away from rural Louisiana. I guess that part is not so different.

I think about some of the teachers I had and the respect they were given. Teachers then were not paid nearly as well as they are today and they are not exactly making a killing in 2014. I've seen a few of my old teachers over the years, though too many of them have passed on. They all remain so alive to me in my mind, just as they were 42 years ago — that's the stretch of time for my promising future so far.

The list of graduates handed out that day in 1972 was done on a "Ditto Machine." Does anybody even remember that contraption?

The photos people took were either Polaroids, which you got to look at right away, or images stored on film that went to the drug store for a three-day wait. There were no cell phones.

There was no Facebook. There was no Internet. What's next? Will judges review balls and strikes too? Was he safe or out? See you in court.

The one thing about Polaroid pictures you

could count on was they would be terrible. That was the price you paid for getting them right away.

There was this business just getting ramped up, Fox Photo, that would let you drop off film and get it back the same day, in some situations within an hour or two. It all seems so quaint now.

It would have been something had any of our graduation speakers predicted what the world of that bright future would

turn out to be.

My senior class was three years removed from the beginning of racial integration in this region of the Deep South. At times our community had been rocked by incidents of resentment on both sides and thuggery on both sides, though most people I knew tried their best to be decent and reach out, up to a point. Things had settled down a lot by the time of my senior year, but black students and white students still tended to stay to themselves and their groups most of the time. Is it still that way?

I see evidence when I go to various campuses these days that kids pay much less attention to race than they used to. Yet it's still there, this separateness to us, just as it remains in the adult world.

One of the elective classes we had in high school was typing. I never took it, though I taught myself to type as I moved into this field. These days I see high school students in Livingston Parish studying things like nursing and television production. Walker High School has its own TV studio. We could not have imagined such things. Certain guys (never girls) took shop or welding or auto mechanics. Nobody expected college or vo-tech school credit for any of these courses. Back then, you were lucky if you could transfer credit hours for classes you took at Southeastern to LSU or vice versa. But at least anyone who wanted to attend those schools was allowed and could afford it.

I think the first checks I wrote to LSU for my first semester, which included tuition and three months of room and board, totalled less than \$500. The books were probably another couple hundred. I was able to pay my way through school flipping burgers part-time without a single student loan. Can anyone imagine that today? Most contemporary college grads will owe thousands in loans as they depart, though statistics suggest the ROI is still pretty good.

The bright future that awaits us all has its ups and downs. To the Class of 2014, let us celebrate the ups.

Secrets and lies of Obama's drone war

Barack Obama promised to install his administration in a glass house lit up like the Super Bowl, with everything visible to the citizenry he serves. So you will not be surprised to learn that Director of National Intelligence James Clapper wants nothing more than to keep the public well informed.

The administration, he said in a recent letter to the Senate Intelligence Committee, "is exploring ways in which it can provide the American people more information about the United States' use of force outside areas of active hostilities."

That's what he said. Then he laughed so hard he fell off his chair.

What Clapper was trying to convey in his charmingly oblique way is that he is exploring ways to deny basic information to anyone who wants it. His letter came in response to a bill approved by the committee requiring the president to divulge how many people he kills or injures with drones.

It doesn't seem too much to ask. During the Vietnam War, the U.S. military had regular press conferences to publicize the latest enemy body count, to prove the effectiveness of our fighting men. It gave up that practice after officers inflated the numbers, but by 2005, in an effort to confirm the progress of the Iraq war, the Pentagon was again enumerating corpses and proudly releasing the tallies.

The drone war in Pakistan, Afghanistan and Yemen has been going on for years, though the number of strikes has declined lately. But the people in charge see no reason to reveal anything about its consequences. The intelligence committee, told by Clapper to butt out, dutifully abandoned its brief quest.

The president says he has kept his campaign promise to be more open: "This is the most transparent administration in history." But when it comes to the subject of blowing people up with unmanned aerial vehicles, the windows are painted over and boarded up. You can look all you want; you just can't see.

It's not only drones that are concealed. Jill Abramson, executive editor of *The New York Times*, has covered presidents going back to Ronald Reagan and calls this "the most secretive White House" of them all. But when the government is slaughtering residents of countries with which we are not at war, the value of information is especially high — and so is the harm from secrecy.

The whole world always knew about the drone strikes, but the administration didn't even admit it was carrying them out until 2012. Obama also refused to publish the Justice Department "white paper" explaining the rationale for targeting U.S. citizens overseas for sudden, fiery death from the sky. The document came out when someone leaked it to NBC News, prompting the department to officially release it.

The white paper was based on a lengthy legal memo, but the president would not willingly expose that memo to the light of day. Recently, a federal appeals court ordered him to, concluding there is no risk of "disclosing any aspect of military plans, intelligence activities, sources and methods, and foreign relations."

The same can be said for Clapper's stonewalling on numbers. It's not as though the individuals targeted by missiles, or their families, would learn anything new from this information. The only point of secrecy is to let the government tell self-serving lies without fear of contradiction.

The CIA attested last year that the total number of innocents killed was in the "single digits," but a United Nations investigator determined it was over 400. A report by the Washington think tank CNA agrees that the evidence "points to higher casualty numbers than suggested in official statements." Why should Americans have to get their information from guesswork in outside studies instead of the government that does the killing?

In his letter, Clapper frets about "the disclosure of intelligence sources and methods or other classified information." But if the U.S. military, during wartime, can safely put out the number of enemy bodies found on the battlefield, the CIA ought to be able to disclose how many terrorists and bystanders it has extinguished.

Obama's drone war is a covert offensive conducted in remote places far from America, and it's easy to forget because it doesn't put our aviators at risk. But if our government thinks it is justified in killing people, it shouldn't act like it has something to hide.



Sales tax revenues hold up despite vehicle slowdown

LIVINGSTON — This year's sales tax collections continue to exceed fiscal year 2012-13 despite a slump in car sales, according to the School Board Sales Tax Division.

The School Board division, which compiles statistics for all 11 entities receiving sales tax revenue in the parish, reports a total of \$58,069,440 collected during the first nine months of the current fiscal year. This total represents a 4 percent increase over the same months in the prior fiscal year, when collections amounted to \$55,686,980.

March tax collections come from February sales, and are reported in April.

The downturn in motor vehicle taxes can affect all 11 governmental entities because this tax revenue goes to the purchasers' taxing districts, even if the sale was made in another parish.

For each of the first five months of this fiscal year (July through November), motor vehicle tax revenues exceeded the previous year, with particularly strong showings in August (\$1,125,496) and September (\$1,212,711), when collections were 12 percent and 31 percent higher, respectively, than the previous year.

The slump began after Christmas, with a 4 percent decline. Subsequent months showed comparative declines of 1 percent in January, 20 percent in February, and, a 2 percent decline in March, compared with March 2013.

March motor vehicle tax revenues amounted to a total of \$985,679.

Total collections for all 11 taxing entities in March amounted to \$5,892,666, a 1 percent increase over March 2013.

The Bass Pro development contributed revenue to the School Board, City of Denham Springs, the Parish Council, the Sheriff, and Gravity Drainage District 1. Each of these governmental entities is currently receiving 28 percent of the revenue it will receive after the Bass Pro bonds are paid off.

The Denham Springs Economic Development District, which oversees Bass Pro revenue, saw a 4 percent increase last month, with \$292,511 in sales taxes.

About 72 percent of the 6 cents in local sales taxes collected in the Bass Pro district is paying off bonds that raised funds for construction. Once the bonds are paid off, all the local sales taxes will go to the five local contributors.

Christmas sales in the Bass Pro development generated the highest revenue this year, with local sales taxes of \$518,431.

Revenue from the 3 percent surcharge on hotel and RV park occupancy was also up last month, with collections of \$24,428, an 11 percent increase over March 2013. Revenue from the surcharge goes to the Livingston Parish Convention and Visitors Bureau.

The School Board receives more sales tax than any other governmental entity in the parish—2.5 cents on the dollar parish-wide, and two districts with one-cent taxes.

with \$35,935,700 during the 2013 fiscal year.

The state is the School Board's largest revenue source, contributing \$151,100,000, according to the audit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2013.

The School Board's revenue from local sales taxes last month amounted to \$2,813,872, only \$11,799 more than collections in March 2013.

School District 22, in Watson, collected \$127,268 last month, a 5 percent decrease from the \$134,133 collected in March 2013.

School District 33, in Maurepas, collected \$8,044 last month, a 7.25 percent increase over the \$7,500 collected in March 2013.

Denham Springs was the only municipality with collections last month falling below March 2013. Denham Springs is also the only municipality with year-to-date sales tax revenue above collections for the same nine months of the previous fiscal year.

Denham Springs sales tax revenue dipped 3 percent last month, with collections of \$543,277.

Total year-to-date

collections for Denham Springs amount to \$5,347,483, a 6 percent increase over the same nine months in the previous fiscal year.

Walker, with year-to-date collections of \$2,530,151, is 1 percent below the previous fiscal year.

Last month, Walker collections of \$247,225 marked a 3 percent increase over March 2013.

Both Denham Springs and Walker collect 1.5 cents on the dollar.

Livingston, Springfield, and Albany are all about even with year-to-date collections of 2013.

Livingston, with a 1-cent tax, and Springfield, with a 2-cent tax, are matching their respective 2013 year-to-date revenues, Livingston with \$268,552, and Springfield with \$286,220.

Livingston brought in \$29,230 last month, an 8 percent hike over March 2013.

Springfield brought in \$31,018 last month, a 10 percent hike over March 2013.

Albany's monthly collections amounted to \$27,488, a 9 percent increase over March 2013. Albany has collected \$240,730 year-to-

date, which is 1 percent under its position last year.

The Parish Council and the Sheriff, both with parish-wide taxes, had 1 percent increases in March collections, and 4 percent increases year-to-date.

The Parish Council, which has a one-cent tax (for roads and jail expenses), collected \$1,084,059 last month; and stands at \$10,661,359 year-to-date.

The Sheriff's Office, which has a half-cent tax, collected \$542,340 last month and stands at \$5,332,472 year-to-date.

Revenue from all three drainage districts is so far exceeding year-to-date collections last year, especially Gravity Drainage District 1, which is 9 percent over collections from the first nine months of the previous year.

Drainage District 1 collected \$815,019 year-to-date, and collected \$80,843 last month, an increase of 5 percent over the previous March.

Drainage District 1 is in the Denham Springs area.



All three drainage districts collect a half-cent tax.

Gravity Drainage District 5, in the Walker area, is 2 percent over collections from the first nine months of the previous year.

Drainage District 5 collected \$1,091,992 year-to-date, and collected \$108,051 last month, an increase of 6 percent over the previous March.

Gravity Drainage District 2, in the Watson area, is 4 percent over collections from the first nine months of the previous year.

Drainage District 2 collected \$608,201 year-to-date, and collected \$64,552 last month, a 6 percent decrease over the previous March.

Hedges thrilled with quick passage of equal pay bill

BATON ROUGE — A local member of the state legislative delegation lauded the swift passage in committee on a House bill that would make it unlawful to pay an individual less than another individual on the basis of gender.

State Rep. Valarie Hedges, R-Watson, said the quick approval of House Bill 956 marked "a monumental event for women in the state of Louisiana."

Hedges co-sponsored the bill authored by District 79 Rep. Julie Stokes, R-Kenner, which would require

equal pay "when both individuals work on jobs that require equal skill, effort, and responsibility, and which are performed under similar working conditions."

The bill would also prohibit employers from cutting any other employee wages to

come into compliance with the legislation.

The measure heads to the House floor for debate Monday.

Hedges cited statistics from the U.S. Labor Bureau that stated that in the Louisiana population — 51 percent female — 40 percent of them earn a living, but

women earn 67 cents to the dollar in comparison to the work performed by their male counterparts at the same skill level.

"It's time to make changes in our law," she said. "This legislation will balance the scales for working women."

The elimination of the wage gap would significantly improve the quality of life for women in Louisiana.

"With the expectation of a booming business climate in Louisiana, I am proud to be a sponsor of this bill and the fight for equality," Hedges said.

Pope rejects Common Core compromise

BATON ROUGE — A House bill that softens the impact of Common Core testing may cause more harm than good for the Louisiana public schools, according to a state representative from Livingston Parish.

Denham Springs Republican J. Rogers Pope said Thursday he believes House Bill 953

should address potential problems with the curriculum and its related testing, rather than prolonging a solution.

The legislation, sponsored by House Speaker Pro Tem Walt Leger II, D-New Orleans, would extend the transition phase from two to three years for the new academic standards and testing associated with the hotly-debated curriculum.

"They might be doing this as a compromise, but it doesn't achieve anything," Pope said. "It just delays it by one year, which I don't think would make for a lot of stability for our school parents and teachers."

The bill passed 10-6 Tuesday in the House Education Committee, amid opposition from supporters and foes of the new standards, which are set to take effect the next school year.

Pope, a longtime Livingston Parish educator/administrator and former Superintendent of Schools, has been vocal in his opposition to Common Core curriculum since it came under criticism last fall.

He believes states should reserve the right to implement standards for its educational assessments, rather than adapt to one national test standard.

Pope believes the state could serve teachers, parents and students to make one decision — go with Common Core or abandon it.

"It needs to be settled one way or another — either we do it or we don't do it," he said. "They're probably trying to work out something that would appease both sides, and I'm not sure they'll be able to do that."

State Superintendent of Education John White said in a recent hearing that any delay in full implantation of Common Core and the PARCC testing would prove disastrous, both fiscally and academically.

Governor Bobby Jindal, meanwhile, remains critical Common Core. He particularly opposes the PARCC testing, which he criticized as a "one size fits all" form of testing.

'TIED UP IN KNOTTS'

TV ICON DON KNOTTS' DAUGHTER talks to fans at the library about his life, his career and the people he knew.

Some of Denise Powers' fondest memories involve the laughs she and her father shared when they watched TV reruns that featured the man they considered their all-time favorite comic actor.

Those memories brought her from Baton Rouge to the Livingston Parish Library to attend "Tied Up in Knotts," a fond tribute to the late Don Knotts, presented by his daughter, Karen Knotts.

Powers listened with others to the one-person show, which focused on the childhood, career and close relationship with the man best known for his roles as Barney Fife on "The Andy Griffith Show" and Ralph Furley on "Three's Company."

"This was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity," said Powers, 43. "My dad and I watched him on those two shows every chance we got, but after this, I gained an even greater appreciation of him."

"Aside from that, I gained an appreciation for his daughter," she said. "She's very witty and charming."

Karen Knotts, an actress and now librarian in her native Los Angeles, used a combination of hats, wigs and songs to enhance stories about different people and eras in the life of her father, who

died in 2006 at age 81.

She discussed her father's childhood in his native Morgantown, W.Va., and the influences that would ultimately play a role in his career.

"Dad, like so many in his era, enjoyed the radio comedy teams of that era, such as George Burns and Gracie Allen, Bud Abbott and Lou Costello, Fibber McGhee and Molly and most of all, Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy," Karen said. "He developed an appreciation for

the humor and wit that brought so many laughs."

Bergen and McCarthy (a wooden dummy) so fascinated Knotts that he embraced the art of ventriloquism. It coincided with his fledgling skills to captivate audiences and draw laughter.

She also discussed her father's time in the U.S. Army, during which he entertained fellow soldiers. In the years after World War II, her father spent time in New York City, where he and other aspiring comics sought their big break. He landed guest spots on various variety programs, most notably "The Red Skelton Show."

"He played a cowboy in a sketch in which he showed a lot of the same persona that later became Barney Fife," Karen said.

Knotts also enjoyed a stint as a regular on "The Steve Allen Show" which featured him in 'Man on the Street' sketches.

He also had a brief stint on the long-running soap opera "Search for Tomorrow."

"Nobody today would ever imagine he did a soap opera," she said.

Despite the TV roles, she said, a supporting role in a movie classic changed his life. Knotts played a high-strung psychiatrist in the Broadway hit-turned-movie "No Time for Sergeants," which marked his initial pairing with Andy Griffith.

"They hit it off immediately," Karen said. "They had perfect chemistry."

Knotts approached Griffith not long after that when Griffith filmed a pilot for what would become his long-running TV sitcom. "The Andy Griffith Show" (1960-68) was a smash hit for CBS and made Knotts – and his character, the manic deputy Barney Fife – iconic TV personalities.

"Andy was the perfect foil for my dad," she said. "They had great chemistry together, and it showed from the start."

But the role of Fife was not intended as a prominent character.

"Dad was originally supposed to be the straight man," Karen said. "But it didn't take them long to discover that it worked better with Andy as the straight man."

Karen said her dad and Griffith often hammered out additional dialogue to fill a scene.

"They'd gather in a corner, talk it out and come back with something truly great," Karen said. "That's just how good their chemistry was."

Don Knotts won several Emmys during his five seasons on the show. Despite the character's believability, Karen said the role was not a leisurely stroll for her father. Production often lasted 10 or 12 hours five days a week.

"He spent all day Sunday studying the script over and over - we knew not to bother him," she said. "It took him hours to determine the best way to read even a small line."

She said she became friends with Ron Howard and Jim Nabors, among other cast members from the sitcom.

"It was a great big family," Karen said.

The sitcom has built a whole new appreciation across several generations, thanks to syndication.

"I love that show, and I really enjoyed learning more about both the show and him," said Elizabeth Jordan, 18. "I'd have to say my favorite episode was 'The Pickle Story.'"

Don Knotts left the series only in response to Griffith's intention to end the series after five seasons.

He accepted the title role in "The Incredible Mr. Limpet" and signed a multi-year film deal with Universal Pictures.

Knotts followed the film roles with a short-lived NBC variety series. The variety format was not his cup of tea.

"It was far different from doing a sitcom," Karen said. "There was also trouble with the writers and trying to get good material."

Knotts also did cartoon voice roles, most notably two guest spots

on "Scooby Doo."

"That was the first time I saw him," said Michael Preston, 25, who also attended the library event. "From there, I started watching him on other shows, and I've been a fan ever since."

Karen also discussed growing up with her father in Beverly Hills after her parents divorced and the close relationship they enjoyed during her high school and college years.

"I had trouble making friends, so he decided to have a swim party at our house and let me invite my entire high school class," Karen said. "That's just the kind of loving father I had."

He took on the role of landlord Ralph Furley in 1979 on the sitcom "Three's Company," which paired him with John Ritter, who would become a close friend.

Similar to his earlier series, writers did not originally put Knotts in a prominent role. That changed upon the departure of Suzanne Somers, which led to a bigger role for Knotts.

"He got all the 'dingy' lines and essentially became the replacement for Chrissy Snow," Karen said.

Knotts spent the rest of his career doing guest spots, occasional movie roles and a reunion of "The Andy Griffith Show."

Karen even got to work on the TV movie, playing the secretary for Opie (her longtime friend Ron Howard). But she recalled that it was not an extremely happy experience for her father.

"It just wasn't the same, as he told me," she said.

Karen and her father enjoyed a close relationship during his final years. Her father knew he had reached the end when he was diagnosed with cancer.

"In his last hours, I asked him if he would make it," she said. "He simply said, 'No!'"

Karen said she forever misses her father, and that he was always grateful for the opportunities he had as an actor.

"He so enjoyed bringing people happiness and laughter," she said.

As for Powers, she left with a whole new appreciation for Don Knotts.

"They just don't make them like him anymore," she said.

Hunter's Style Pork Chops

1 Tbsp. salad oil
4 pork loin blade chops, each cut
3/4-inch thick
2 medium-sized green peppers
1 medium-sized onion
1/2 lb. mushrooms
1 (8-oz.) bottle sweet-spicy French dressing
1/4 c. water
1/2 tsp. sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
1 tomato, chopped

In 12-inch skillet over medium-high heat in hot salad oil, cook pork loin blade chops until browned on both sides. Remove chops to plate. Meanwhile, cut green pepper into strips. Chop onion. Cut mushrooms in half if they are large. In drippings remaining in skillet over medium heat, cook vegetables until tender-crisp, stirring occasionally. Return pork chops to skillet. Stir in French dressing and remaining ingredients except tomato; heat to boiling. Reduce heat to low; cover and simmer 45 minutes to 1 hour until chops are fork-tender. Skim fat. Add tomato; heat. Makes 4 main-dish servings.

Holstein struck out the next two batters and got Chase Rivers to fly out to shallow left field to end the threat.






