"None of the windows

Despite the impediments the project is \$1,800 under budget, said Project Manager Phillip Kern.

## Denham mourns city treasurer

DENHAM SPRINGS — City officials were somber Thursday night as they began their meeting with a silent prayer for Treasurer Clarence Speed Jr., who died

Wednesday in Houston after a long battle with cancer.

"He was a diligent, wonderful employee and a wonderful friend," said Mayor Jimmy Durbin, who

credited the former finance director as the driving force behind 12 consecutive accounting certificates of excellence for the city.

"Our finances were impeccable. Our books

## Lawmakers ready to rumble

DENHAM SPRINGS — Three state representatives discussed their plans and expectations for the regular session of the Louisiana Legislature during a luncheon Wednesday for the Livingston Parish Republican Women.

State representative Valarie Hodges, J. Rogers Pope and Sherman Q. Mack all touched upon issues involving education, an anticipated cornerstone for the 2014 session that kicks off at 9 a.m. Monday.

Hodges and Pope both voiced their opposition to Common Core Curriculum.

Hodges said the program brings further government intervention into the class-

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# Ex-parish consultant seeks to recuse DA

LIVINGSTON — The long standing case of a parish consultant accused of intentional billing errors may leave Livingston Parish again if his attorney persuades a judge that District Attorney Scott Perrilloux must recuse himself.



**Delahoussaye** McLindon said.

An adversarial relationship between Perrilloux and Delahoussaye would also bear on the District Attorney's eligibility as a prosecutor, McLindon said.

Perrilloux appeared on television Nov. 3, 2011, announcing an investigation into the possibility that Delahoussaye's timesheets may not reflect actual hours on the job.

The timing of the unusual announcement two weeks before the Parish President's election raised interest as Delahoussaye worked for incumbent Mike Grimmer, who was defeated by current Parish President Layton Ricks. Delahoussaye has been an antagonist to the engineering firm where Ricks had worked before the election, Alvin Fairburn and Associates.

Hired in 2009 when the Hurricane Gustav debris removal program was facing challenges by state and federal agencies, Delahoussaye gathered records and information used by Grimmer to justify shutting down

the debris program and by FEMA as a rationale for denying payment to the parish for most of the work done by the debris contractor, International Equipment Distributors (IED).

On Feb. 24, 2011, IED filed a \$52 million lawsuit against the parish. The lawsuit said that the parish must pay its bills, with or without help from FEMA.

Perrilloux said that parish assets were public assets and as such, could not be seized to pay a judgment.

Perrilloux worked with IED's lawyers at Jones Walker to freeze the lawsuit until FEMA made a final determination on payment.

In July 2011, Honeycutt advised Delahoussaye that he needed to choose sides and be a team player, or else suffer consequences, a conversation that Delahoussaye recorded.

That month Delahoussaye was caught between the interests of Gravity Drainage District 1 and Alvin Fairburn and Associates, one of the monitoring firms hired by the parish to see that FEMA's eligibility criteria were followed for waterway debris removal in the three drainage districts.

After Delahoussaye showed drainage district board members work or-

ders from AFA unknown to them, those work orders were removed from the parish appeal for federal funds.

Soon afterwards, former councilman Jimmie McCoy insisted that Delahoussaye be prohibited from working in Drainage District 2, and a committee started re-writing the C-Del contract to exclude work inside drainage districts.

During a Council meeting, Honeycutt faulted Delahoussaye for doing "too much research."

On August 25, 2011, the Parish Council terminated C-Del's contract on a 5-4 vote. During that same meeting, Delahoussaye raised questions about IED billing for unauthorized work on School Board property.

The School Board and the Parish Council both billed FEMA for clearing debris from Lewis Vincent Elementary and Albany High School.

After he was fired by the parish, Delahoussaye entered the political arena as an unsuccessful candidate for Assessor against incumbent Jeff Taylor, who easily won and endorsed Ricks against Grimmer in the presidential runoff.

On November 3, 2011, just before the election for Parish President, Perrilloux made the televised announcement concerning his upcom-

ing investigation of Delahoussaye.

On November 14, 2011, Delahoussaye was deposed as a witness in IED's \$53 million lawsuit against the parish and invoked the Fifth Amendment against self-incrimination.

On his first day in office, Ricks stopped a \$379,518 check to C-Del, written by Grimmer.

Perrilloux's investigation into Delahoussaye's billing was also stopped. Perrilloux said the investigation was taken over by the U.S. Attorney's Office. After several months, the U.S. Attorney declined the case.

After seven months without any charges filed against Delahoussaye, the Parish Council hired Ralph Stephenson with the Postlethwaite and Nettverk accounting firm to investigate the C-Del bills.

Stephenson, a certified public accountant and an attorney, reported five "unusual items," that totaled \$6,275.

Perrilloux questioned Delahoussaye vigorously at the June 19, 2012, Council meeting.

Perrilloux challenged Delahoussaye to account for FEMA's decision not to pay a title research bill. The research involved parish property used for a hurricane debris burn site.

Delahoussaye said

former DPW Director Wayne Martin could not produce the documentation of parish ownership of the entire property, records required by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers before the site could be used.

FEMA did not pay the bill because FEMA regulations do not require the title work, Delahoussaye said.

"That's ridiculous," Perrilloux said.

In spite of Perrilloux's objections, the Council directed Ricks to pay the C-Del bill (minus \$6,275).

A year later, Delahoussaye was still waiting for the check.

By then, the state Inspector General's Office had the case.

State Inspector General Stephen Street said in an interview that in 2012 he was asked to investigate Delahoussaye's billing.

On July 25, 2013, men from the Inspector General's Office raided Delahoussaye's home and removed all the computers.

On Nov. 22-25, 2013, Perrilloux sent the case to a grand jury.

Delahoussaye was accused of filing false public records and theft. Perrilloux said after falling one vote short of the needed 10 out of 12 to indict Delahoussaye, he decided to use his prerogative to file charges on his own.

"And what happens after three years?"

Hodges said the federal government could funnel the cost responsibility to state government.

"It's another expansion of government, something we see every time we turn around," she said. "They want more people on government rolls — banks, car companies, education ... it just doesn't stop."

She also stressed the need to continue the fight against human trafficking.

Hodges spearheaded

a task force last year against human trafficking, but now wants to raise the bar on the fight.

"We want to set the gold standard among states in the war against human trafficking," she said.

Trafficking amounts to a \$32 billion industry, Hodges said.

"It's the largest underworld industry on the globe, with the exception of illegal drugs," she said.

Hodges also wants to speed up the Comite Diversion Canal project, which has been on the drawing board more than 20 years and started construction in 2003 before running out of promised funding despite a local tax collected in four parishes for completion of canal.

She said the project would lower flood levels 7 feet, 5 feet in Central and 4 feet at the Amite River Bridge.

Mack, meanwhile, discussed his plans to oppose any measure that would legalize marijuana.

He said he has received calls from some residents who want him to support legalization.

"I will not vote in favor of that," Mack said. "As an attorney, I deal in a lot of criminal cases linked to drug abuse, so I can tell you that it's a gateway drug — one

that leads to those more dangerous."

Mack said at least 18 deaths in Livingston Parish have been linked to heroin abuse.

He also asked the members to pay close attention to the Congressional and Senatorial races this fall.

"It's not only a big deal for Louisiana, it's a big deal for Livingston Parish," Mack said.

He said reelection of Democratic U.S. Sen. Mary Landrieu could give a Democrat more footing in the 2015 gubernatorial election.

"We need to come together and stand tall for what we believe," Mack said.

On another matter, Pope stressed the need for legislation which would help Livingston Parish expand its infrastructure.

A spike in industrial development in Ascension Parish will bring an influx of new residential development to the area, which would require more roads, he said.

"People in Ascension, St. James and other parishes will look to locate here," Pope said.

He said 70 percent of the Livingston Parish workforce is employed in other parishes.

A study is already underway for a north-south boundary along La. 447, Pope said.

were impeccable," said Durbin, calling Speed "a friend" and "Christian brother."

Durbin was a City Council member when he sat in on Speed's interview with former Mayor Jim Delaune in 2000.

Speed had been the finance director in Ascension Parish under President Tommy Martinez until he lost a re-election bid.

"Both Mayor Delaune and I were so impressed with Clarence, it became obvious there was not another choice," Durbin said.

Speed, 58, passed away at 3 p.m. Wednesday at M.D. Anderson Cancer Center four and a half years after a leukemia diagnosis. He was declared cancer free after chemotherapy, but the cancer returned nine months ago, Durbin said. Speed and his family had just made a decision to try a bone marrow transplant this week, Durbin said.

Other Council members remembered Speed fondly as a hard worker who was always pleasant and helpful.

"I found it easy to talk to Clarence," said Councilman Arthur Perkins, who has served as Council Finance Chairman and looked forward to the annual awards that he came to expect.

"He was always accessible," said Councilman Annie Fugler. "Whatever he was working on, he would stop and answer questions. What I was most impressed by, he would always come to work, no matter how bad he must have felt and how hard it must have been."

Visitation will be at First Baptist Church in Greensburg Saturday from 8 a.m. until 11 a.m. followed by funeral services. Arrangements are handled by Seale Funeral Home of Denham Springs.

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

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# Denham watching commercial changes

DENHAM SPRINGS — The demise of Backyard Burger, the coming of Hardee's and questions about the delayed arrival of Chick-Fil-A were topics of discussion at a brief City Council meeting Thursday night.

Hardee's is taking over the Florida Parishes locations of the shuttered Backyard Burger franchise, including the 2701 S. Range Avenue store in Denham Springs that was the first business to open in 2005 in the Denham Springs Economic Development District centered around Bass Pro Shops Outdoor World.

Hardee's franchise owner Paradigm Investment Group also will operate locations at 2327 O'Neal Lane in Baton Rouge and 2250 Florida St. in Mandeville as well as 30 new restaurants it plans to build in Louisiana.

Denham Springs Building Official Rick Foster said the major remodeling plans for Hardee's, including construction drawings, have been submitted to the city.

Meanwhile, the city is awaiting the resolution of a dispute between Chick-Fil-A and the Department of Transportation and Development over a requested second access to its planned location at 2341 S. Range Ave., the site of the former Chinese Inn.

Councilman John Wascom said many residents have asked him about the project first announced about a year ago at the same time as a new CVS pharmacy that opened last fall.

Mayor Jimmy Durbin said Chick-Fil-A's

request for a second entrance just north of the Starbucks location next door was turned down by the DOTD District 62 office in Hammond. Durbin said an agency committee will hear an appeal on March 18.

Foster, who reviews commercial building plans for compliance with city regulations, said he does not know why the state rejected the restaurant's plans.

After a surge in development in 2013, commercial projects have been flat so far this year in Denham Springs according to statistics provided to the Council by Foster. Permit fees collected by the city in January and February totaled just \$1,080, down 64 percent from a year ago. Total fees for all types of construction year to date are \$3,562 compared to \$9,893 during the first two months of 2013, also a drop of 64 percent.

In other business Thursday night, the Council approved an alcoholic beverage retail sales license for the owners of a convenience store at 1003 Florida Boulevard at Hatchell Lane to be called Denham Food Mart. The store was previously Jimbo's Corner. The applicants for the Class B License are Rakesh Jariwala and Javed Mohammed representing RJ Food Mart.

The Council held its first March meeting five days early because Durbin and three Council members are leaving Saturday for a National League of Cities conference in Washington, D.C. The Council members are Chris Davis, Annie Fugler and Arthur Perkins.

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## 2014-15 school

year starts Aug. 7

LIVINGSTON — The School Board Thursday adopted the calendar for the 2014-15 school year, setting school to begin Aug. 7 and the year to close out on May 27, 2015.

Assistant Superintendent Rick Wentzel said an email with the proposed calendar was sent to system personnel. Wentzel said there was little feedback aside from a few questions but no opposition to the proposed calendar.

The calendar includes a three-week Christmas holiday, beginning on Dec. 22, a week for Thanksgiving from Nov. 24-28 and a week for the Easter holiday starting on April 3.

A parent-teacher conference day is scheduled for Oct. 16 a week after the Oct. 10 fair holiday.

Students will also add a day off from school on Nov. 4 for Election Day so schools can accommodate voters from the various precincts.

Martin Luther King Day will be observed Jan. 19, 2015, while Mardi Gras holidays fall Feb. 16-17, 2015.

The students will also have a day off for Labor Day.

During the meeting the board scheduled a Budget and Goals Committee meeting for 6 p.m. March 19 to discuss budget adjustments and the distribution of \$2.7 million the board received from the state over the summer.

Superintendent of

Schools John Watson said the recommendation at the time was to use 50 percent of the monies for teacher salaries in the form of a one-time supplement, likely to be distributed on May 1.

Watson said \$500,000 of the monies was used to fund the effectiveness stipend.

Watson said there is still some additional money remaining, with the other 50 percent of funds still on the table.

"I'd like to see what we can do to benefit all of our employees," Watson said. "Everyone has shared in these financial hard times we have had in the past two or three years."

In other business, the board recognized Danielle Dustin for her second place finish in the Louisiana School Board Association 2014 Art Contest.

Dustin attends Denham Springs High School and is part of the talented visual arts classes at the school.

## Bobby Jindal's viable presidential campaign

Conservatives galore gathered at National Harbor, Maryland, just downstream from Washington last week to glorify their cause at the annual Conservative Political Action Committee conference, an event that has become must-appear for any Republican with national political ambitions. Getting left off the speakers list at CPAC has become tantamount to black-listing for a presidential contender.

Despite a softness of support in the polls back home, Louisiana Governor Bobby Jindal was invited back for his third appearance, indicating that Republicans still consider the Louisiana Governor a serious contender for the presidential nomination in 2016. Jindal was granted a prime location on the three-day speakers list, an appearance Thursday sandwiched between two presidential heavyweight contenders, Gov. Chris Christie of New Jersey and Sen. Marco Rubio of Florida.

The Governor peppered his delivery with humor, even giggling at himself for his legendary poor showing during the response speech to Obama's first State of the Union address. Jindal's stumbling delivery on that night left a lasting impression among Washington people in particular, and he carries that cross on his shoulder every time he visits the nation's capital. Outside of Washington, however, the speech is far less remembered, and Jindal remains very popular outside his home state with evangelical Christians and with Americans who share a similar Indian heritage.

Jindal remains a credible presidential candidate for two principal reasons. First, his base of Indian supporters throughout the nation gives him broad fundraising capacity. Second, presidential campaigns begin with the Iowa caucuses, and the Republican Party in Iowa is very much influenced by evangelical Christians. A well-funded campaign in Iowa, followed by a strong showing at the caucus

meetings could potentially catapult Jindal into a real contender in the next presidential step, the New Hampshire primary.

Or, at least, so goes the Jindal plan for political success. That success calls for repeated and frequent attacks on President Obama, and Jindal's speech to CPAC was littered with scathing insults directed toward the White House. Despite being mired between Christie and Rubio, Jindal was able to grab his share of the news coverage coming out of the day's speeches by declaring at one point that Obama had replaced Jimmy Carter as the worst President in U.S. history. That remark generated the much-coveted eight-second sound bite on the major TV networks, and gave Jindal an A-grade for his CPAC appearance.

As for the substance of Jindal's speech, if any, it was largely directed at Obama and his Attorney General Eric Holder for filing a suit designed to stop Jindal's voucher program in Louisiana. Jindal's standing in his home-state polls fell steadily year after year as he cut one sacred cow after another from the state budget. But the biggest opposition to him has been, ironically, from his political base in the white suburban areas like Livingston and St. Tammany parishes where public schools form the cornerstone for the local economy.

Jindal took this opposition head on during his CPAC speech, touting vouchers as a way to "empower parents" with the decisions over their kids' educations. Vouchers are a hot topic in the media center of New York right now as the city's new socialist mayor wants to eliminate the NYC voucher program now serving 140,000 students. Jindal is jumping on that issue, and making it his own.

Jindal also made a big play during his talk for the evangelical vote when he heaped praise upon himself for coming publicly to the defense of *Duck Dynasty*'s star after it had been suspended from the

air for pro-Christian remarks by one of the show's stars during a magazine interview. The *Duck*

*Dynasty* controversy proved high political cotton for Jindal, enabling him to make a strong move toward one of his most important bases of support.

All in all, it was a good showing for Louisiana's Governor, whose third appearance before CPAC proved much livelier than last year's when he gave what amounted to a rewritten speech already delivered several days before the CPAC meeting to another audience. This time, Jindal was obviously more prepared. Mixing liberal doses of humor into a political speech is always risky business.

Humor has a way of backfiring if it's not artfully done. But Jindal has obviously picked up a gifted speech writer, and the humor integrated into the Governor's remarks fit the bill.

In addition to Christie and Rubio, this year's CPAC speakers list included

Texas Senator Ted Cruz, Kentucky Senator Rand Paul, former Arkansas Governor Rick Huckabee, and Congressman Paul Ryan of Wisconsin, Mitt Romney's running mate in 2012. Also on the list was Texas Governor Rick Perry, the former Texas Aggie cheerleader, who brought the house to its feet several times during a rousing talk to begin the day Friday morning. These gentlemen will likely comprise the list of opponents facing Louisiana Governor Bobby Jindal in the Iowa caucuses in January 2016.

A fair political assessment at this juncture can only conclude that Bobby Jindal holds as good a hand as any of them.

## Free the MFP from games

The games go on with the MFP, the complex formula used by state government to determine how much money local school systems have available to educate students. Though it is seldom talked about outside of school board central offices, the issue of MFP is one of the most important affecting citizens year in and year out. It's right up there with highways and taxes.

On Friday the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education deferred voting on a \$3.5 billion formula to be allocated to school

systems across the state next year because of disagreements over details far too numerous and complex to explain in this limited space. That's been the recent history of the MFP, which has stayed largely frozen in place for the last six years while expenses to school districts continue to rise. Last year

came a reprieve in the form of a one-time additional appropriation by the Legislature to make up for this freeze.

That \$69 million would be rolled into the next MFP following the plan under consideration. At issue is whether the version BESE wants to pass might be diverted into something called "Course Choice" that allows high school students to take free online classes if their regular school does not offer a particular subject they want or if their school had been rated a C, D or F by the state. The Louisiana Federation of Teachers says this back door voucher program violates a ruling by the state Supreme Court last year that bars the use of MFP outside of public schools.

Will Livingston Parish and all the other school systems have to endure another year of funding freezes while the state Education Department continues to play these games with our tax dollars?

Get the dollars to our public schools, as the constitution requires. Let the Legislature come up with general fund appropriations for "Course Choice" and other experiments like that if it cares to and can do so legally. Leave the MFP out of it. The MFP is too important to too many people to be held hostage like this, especially after the Supreme Court made clear the restrictions on its use written into our state constitution.

## 21st century blackboard jungle

Rudyard Kipling's *The Jungle Book* describes the ruins of an ancient city taken over by orangutans. The apes are quite at home within the human architecture, though incapable of appreciating much else about the civilization they have displaced. Such fun. Monkeys to remind us of our foolish grandiosities, like Shelley's *Ozymandias*, literature's rock star of narcissism.

Ours is an age of narcissism, worshiping all that is modern without proof or even, sometimes, evidence of its excellence.

In a sign of the times, the College Board, keeper of the SAT college entrance exam, has announced its intention to drop the essay requirement in future years. King Louie, ruler of the orangutans, would certainly approve. What use are critical thinking skills in the age of Siri? Let our calculators do our math and our word processors take care of the spelling. There is already a movement under way to do away with spelling in elementary school.

College entrance tests long ago let in calculators for math problems. After all, everybody uses calculators for math in real life, right? Even NASA contract engineers, like the ones that crashed their Mars probe because they forgot to convert English measurements to metric. Bad things happen with too many shortcuts. Ours is not to reason why.

College Board President David Coleman at an announcement event in Austin, Texas, Wednesday said the new, improved SAT will offer "worthy challenges, not artificial obstacles." Most of his peers think Coleman is merely trying to keep up with his rival, ACT, which seems to be taking over the college entrance exam market, such as it is. Both tests were silly before and will be even sillier now. The real travesty is that they have become the driving force of day-in, day-out education, along with the so-called "Common Core" curriculum that meddling bureaucrats want to impose on everybody.

The SAT has decided to tweak its vocabulary words so that students are challenged no more by the unfamiliar.

"Some of the SAT words that we've seen, well personally, I've seen, taking the SAT ... I've never heard of them and stuff," said a high school senior interviewed for an Associated Press story about the changes. Such intellect. This girl believes her score would have been higher had she taken this "new, improved" test coming and she's probably right. Who wouldn't do better?

Dress it up in all the high-blown rhetoric you want, there are economic forces at work. Education "reform," as we have seen in Louisiana, was invented by a confederacy of dunces, education bureaucrats and testing companies. Teachers now teach the tests. A quid pro quo is required by the testing companies to make sure they make the results of this process look like progress.

More than 3 million students take SAT and ACT tests every year. They do so to perpetuate a system that puts young minds on an assembly line of conformity and calls the

measured results education. No wonder in the real world, the wealthiest man turns out to be a Harvard dropout.

Added to the tasks now of the college entrance tests is an evaluation mechanism for teachers. Good results mean teachers are doing their jobs. Bad results mean they are not, or something like that.

What if it all went out of style tomorrow? What if somebody came along and declared that these tests are rotten and teaching them is

bad and stuff?

What if teachers set aside multiple choice tests and turned instead to instilling critical thinking skills? Those pesky "artificial obstacles" are the essence of problem solving, even if measuring such abilities is inconvenient to the spreadsheet educators and their computer programs.

The only thing remotely progressive about the new SAT is this opening of the door to guesswork. Until now, the test had a disincentive to stop test takers from attempting to pick the right answer to a problem if they were not sure. Gone now.

Of course, the reason for this change has nothing to do with the encouragement of thought. The testing companies know full well that under their rules changes, scores have to go up. In any multiple choice test with four possible answers, the odds of success for taking a guess are 25 percent. Clever people can do even better since they know at least one answer will be patently ridiculous and can be therefore immediately discarded. Clever people also realize the odds of getting the question right if you don't guess are zero, so they will guess.

As far as vocabulary is concerned, words go in and out of fashion. It appears now that modern eyes consider such words as "prevaricator" and "sagacious" to be quaint. They will pass into the night to make room for whatever the Facebook/Twitter generation considers relevant. Click "Like" if you approve.

We'll probably never know whether, had people kept "prevaricator" in general usage, the election of a Prevaricator in Chief could have been avoided. A sagacious nation would certainly have discounted those prevarications about keeping our health insurance policies we liked.

As I watch what is happening, all I can see are those orangutans, blissfully ignorant of the world they inherited and, apparently, proud of it. The current modes of educating and testing need to take their places in historical museum exhibits alongside "new math" and other quackeries of the blackboard jungle in the past. If not, we are looking at a future of abject ignorance and the ruins of a once great civilization.

# Our irrelevance in Ukraine

The Russian invasion of Crimea occurred in a place little known to Americans, for reasons rooted in a tangled and bloody history. The showdown between President Vladimir Putin and the new Ukrainian government is a fight about tangible matters of intense mutual interest.

But many Americans can't address international crises without sounding like a Toby Keith song: "I Wanna Talk About Me." If bad things are happening anywhere in the world, it must be something we caused and something we can fix.

Listen to John McCain, the Arizona Republican senator whose current mission in life is to confirm the wisdom Americans showed by not electing him president. "Why do we care?" he thundered in a speech this week in reference to the Russian invasion. "Because this is the ultimate result of a feckless foreign policy in which nobody believes in America's strength anymore."

This will be enlightening to Ukrainians who cherish democracy and human rights and thought our attention stemmed from shared values and concern for their welfare. No, we care about what's happening there because it proves the ineptitude and impotence of Barack Obama.

Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., insisted the Russian aggression came because "we have a weak and indecisive president."

Sarah Palin crowed that she had predicted that if Obama were elected president, Russia would invade Ukraine because of his "indecision and moral equivalence" when Russia invaded Georgia.

Both of them seem to forget that Putin brazenly attacked Georgia during the presidency of George W. Bush, who had gone to considerable trouble to prove his "strength" by invading Iraq and Afghanistan.

Obama, of course, has not been averse to using force abroad — mounting a surge that more than tripled U.S. troop strength in Afghanistan, bombing Libya to bring down Moammar Gadhafi, ordering the raid that killed Osama bin Laden and approving drone strikes that have left some 2,400 corpses.

True, Obama did stupidly threaten retaliation if the Syrian government used chemical weapons — a threat he proved unwilling to carry out. But the belief that the KGB veteran who rules Russia would have behaved differently had Obama launched some missiles at Syria is a risible delusion.

In this instance, Putin perceived that measures of toughness were irrelevant, because no American president was about to use military force to reverse an occupation of Crimea. Even McCain lamely agreed, "There is not a military option that could be exercised now."

The only humor in this situation is the dark sort, which consists of contrasting the hard rhetoric of Obama's critics with their pillow-soft recommendations. An editorial in *The Wall Street Journal* mocked Obama's stern condemnation of the attack: "That will have the Kremlin quaking."

It argued that, instead, "all trade and banking relationships with Russia ought to be reconsidered." Trade and banking relationships? All of them? Reconsidered? Ooooh. That's going to leave a mark.

Sen. Marco Rubio, R-Fla., offered eight steps Obama should take to punish Putin, none of which involved the use of military force. He did propose an offer of NATO membership — not to Ukraine, strangely, but to Georgia.

Putin used force because he thought the fate of Ukraine was too important to leave to Ukrainians. That's not exactly a new policy for the Kremlin. The notion that a great power is entitled to respond militarily to unwelcome events in its backyard has a long pedigree in Washington, too. Ask the Cubans. Or the Nicaraguans. Or the Dominicans.

What was obvious to Putin is also obvious to just about everyone in American politics: A violation of Ukraine is not important enough to the U.S. or its allies to elicit a military response. It didn't matter what Obama did in Syria — any more than it mattered for Georgia what Bush did in Iraq and Afghanistan.

It wouldn't have mattered if Obama had not tried to "reset" relations with Russia. It wouldn't have mattered if Palin herself had had her finger on the nuclear button.

What mattered, as University of Chicago defense scholar John Mearsheimer puts it, is that "Ukraine is of enormous strategic importance to Russia" and that "we have hardly any good cards to play." In this scenario, Obama's policies were as irrelevant as Bush's were in 2008.


In Washington, many politicians assume the world revolves around us. The people in power in Moscow have a very different and puzzling trait: They think it revolves around them.

# Livingston eyes parks expansion

LIVINGSTON — During a brief meeting on Feb. 13, the Board of Aldermen here authorized Mayor Derral Jones to apply for a Local Government Assistance Program grant to acquire property to expand Parks & Recreation facilities in the town.

"We are eligible for a maximum of \$35,000 through an LGAP grant," Jones said. "I'm suggesting we use that money to partially pay for some land. The property we are trying to purchase is at the corner of Texas Street and S. Range Road, and there are 9.06 acres. It's adjacent to our park, and this is probably our last opportunity to find something that is contiguous with our parks."

The town has had trouble in the past finding practice fields for the hundreds of children that sign up for various Parks and Recreation sports, so this purchase will help alleviate that problem.

Jones said they had been trying to purchase the property for years, but the owners did not want to sell until now.

He added that if the sale does not go through, the town can use the grant money towards another project.

In other business, Engineer Ed Knight said that there has not been much work done on improvements to the Red Oak sewer treatment plant because of the icy, rainy weather, but they are adding a catwalk around the clarifier to improve safety. The catwalk was not in the original plan. They are also adding handrails at the facility.

In other business, Jones said he and Senator Dale Erdey are working with the Department of Transportation and Development (DOTD) on a roundabout at the intersection of Texas Street and Hwy. 63 to improve safety.

Jones said in August

that there is a roundabout in Port Vincent and one in Hammond. He mentioned asking for a street light, but DOTD suggested a roundabout instead for financial reasons.


In other business, the board also voted to add the mayor pro temp as an approved check signer for town banking business.

"We will add David McCreary and give him the authority to be one of the signers on checks. We always have two signers on every check," Jones said.

The board also voted to adopt the Louisiana Compliance Questionnaire.

"It's something that we do every year," Jones said. "It basically says to your knowledge, we've done everything right and violated no laws that you're aware of."

In other news, McCreary said for the month of January, the fire department had 16 first aid calls, three motor vehicle accidents, and one structural fire in town; and 20 first aid calls, seven motor vehicle accidents, two structural fires, four grass fires, two mutual aids, two canceled/false alarms and one agency assist outside of town.

## Marshal offering amnesty

DENHAM SPRINGS — The Ward 2-Denham Springs City Marshal's Office is offering an amnesty program for anyone with an outstanding warrant issued by the City Court of Denham Springs, beginning March 15 through May 15.

Hundreds of people with outstanding warrants are currently facing mounting fees and possible arrest. Marshal Jerry Denton said the amnesty program will allow those who have an outstanding warrant to pay their fines and court costs, and in most cases pay a \$35 bond fee to schedule a new

court date, without the retribution of arrest or additional recall fees.

"This amnesty program is an easy, economical way to resolve some of the backlog, and to give people an opportunity to get on the right side of the law," Denton said.

Denton said his office offered an amnesty program in 2012 that helped to clear more than 500 outstanding warrants and generate more than \$60,000 in fines collected for the court.

Denton said the program only applies to outstanding warrants issued by the Ward

2 City Court of Denham Springs. Defendants wishing to take advantage of the two-month amnesty program must appear voluntarily and pay fines or bond with a new court date. Once a new court date has been issued the outstanding warrant will be recalled, he said.

Once the amnesty program ends on May 15, the Denham Springs Marshal's Office will again actively seek and arrest those individuals with outstanding warrants, Denton said.

Denton said his office enters all warrants into a

national database. If a person with an outstanding warrant is stopped by law enforcement and his or her license is checked, the database will show the warrant and that person may be arrested. The Department of Motor Vehicles is also notified nationwide, and the person's license will be suspended until such time as the warrant is satisfied.

Persons wishing to pay their outstanding fines by phone can call 1-800-701-8560. There will be a service charge up to 10 percent of the fine.

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## Courthouse trims \$1.1 million to stay under budget

the agencies involved have trimmed that original \$20.3 million budget to \$19.3 million.

"The reason we are this far along is the extreme cooperation between the agencies and the vendors," Labarre said.

The architect listed numerous changes that totalled \$1.14 million in savings, though other change orders added back around \$140,000.

Taken out of the project were a prisoner sallyport, fencing around a secured area for judges and the District Attorney's staff to enter and a concrete wall replaced by a chain link fence. Labarre said designers swapped roofing products while maintaining the industry standard 20-year warranty. More savings were realized by changing glazing types and swapping vinyl types of flooring and types of ceiling tiles, he said.

Labarre said multiple generators were consolidated into one on a campus that also has its own water tower tied into the town of Livingston water system.

The project has developed a history of weather related delays. Immediately after the contractor was hired, rains delayed the start of construction until March 2013. The metal framework went up in June, followed by a formal groundbreaking in July when officials predicted the project would be done in July or August of this year.

Labarre said the contractor is on time, though the company may be awarded some additional days because of change orders.

# MUSICIANS FIND THEIR VOICE

People of all ages gather in the Watson Library on the first Thursday of the month, known as Open Mic Night.

"I tried to encourage everyone who had the slightest bit of interest in playing music or reading poetry to come," said Watson Library Associate Luke Ash.

Live Oak sophomore Ian Sims has been a regular at Open Mic Night since Ash implemented the program three years ago.

"When I met Ian, he had only been playing guitar for a month at most, but since then he has blossomed as a singer, songwriter and guitarist," Ash said. "He has superstar potential."

Over the years, many teens started coming to Open Mic Night to practice their musical skills, mostly singing and playing acoustic guitar.

All the teens at Open Mic Night Feb. 6 agreed that the program has helped build their self-confidence, and not only as performers.

Live Oak sophomore Jonathan Barksdale said his confidence has skyrocketed after a year of Open Mic Nights.

Ash said many Live Oak teens started coming due to Sims' popularity, but the teens themselves agree that they also attend because of Ash.

"Luke Ash is freaking awesome, such as his manly beard and mustache," Barksdale said.

An original song by Ash, "Where's Your Mustache, Dawg?" is a favorite among teens at Open Mic Night.

In addition to songs filled with humor, Ash also writes lyrics dealing with love and spirituality.

Ash is a well-known musician in Baton Rouge and has played at many venues, including the Varsity Theatre.

Ash remembers what it was

like as a beginner performing in public, and saw himself as the "odd man out" during his teen years.

A friend overheard Ash doing impressions in high school and encouraged him to be a church worship leader for small group meetings, which included singing. When Ash told him he didn't know how to sing, his friend told him to just do an impression of a vocalist he liked.

"The worship at Comite Baptist Church sounded like a Pearl Jam knock off for a couple of years," Ash said.

Ash then started singing his prayers when he was alone, strumming simple chord progressions on his Fender Squier guitar.

He also wrote songs for rock band "4th Man" between his junior year in high school and his sophomore year at Southeastern.

A newcomer to Open Mic Night, Julie Zimmer-McQuiston, started writing and performing her own songs during her high school years in Bastrop during the 1970s.

"There was a lot of racial tension at that time because of school integration," McQuiston said.

McQuiston joined a band that included students of both races.

"Because we all shared a love of music, we all got to know each other on a personal level," she said.

"We learned how to play different instruments and write songs together. Race wasn't an issue."

Initially, McQuiston and her friends received many invita-



tions to perform, but were later shut out because of "the race issue."

An African American saxophone player named Selman was like her big brother.

"He also influenced my musical style, which is a mix of folk, rock and blues," she said.

After the success of Open Mic Night, Ash started the Songwriter's Circle for adult songwriters on the third Saturday of the month.

Musician travel from Baton Rouge for Songwriter's Circle, including Ash's brother, Ben.

"It's easier to get song writing ideas in a non-pressure and supportive environment with other musicians," Ben said.

Another Baton Rouge resident, Ralph Goodson, said he had only written one or two songs when he first came to the Songwriter's Circle.

"I've written quite a lot since I've been coming here over the past year, and people seem to like them," Goodson said.

Former Watson resident Dorothy LeBlanc now lives in Baton Rouge, but

returns for Songwriter's Circle.

"I was suffering from songwriter's block when Luke Ash invited me to Songwriter's Circle," LeBlanc said. "Luke's assignment for the next meeting was to write a song with the words 'in the grass.'"

Eight hours later, LeBlanc came up with a lovely tune and her "song writer's block" was over.

"About 75 percent of the songs I write now are inspired by the Songwriter's Circle," she said.

LeBlanc is well known to Livingston Parish children as Mrs. Dorothy & Her Traveling Shaky Egg Band. During library performances, she provides young audience members with percussion instruments so they can be performers, too.

LeBlanc is also a favorite at retirement and assisted living communities, church groups, and Alzheimer's Centers throughout Baton Rouge.

"I learned how to play jazz guitar so I could perform classic songs by artists like Duke Ellington, songs that many of these seniors loved when they were growing up," LeBlanc said.

LeBlanc said she did not make it to "center stage" until her children were grown and her husband had retired.

Live Oak Junior Amelia Holden started singing at a very young age. Like Ash, Holden's public performances began in church. Joining the Livingston Parish Children's Choir gave her the opportunity to tour Austria when she was 10.

Despite her early musical achievements, Holden admits she felt nervous the first time she went to Open Mic Night.

# Get going on corn in early spring



## SHARPE'S POINT

growing point is near the surface of the soil and then cold injury increases.

On our upland soils we should be fertilizing corn with 120-190 pounds

of nitrogen per acre. You can apply all of the nitrogen at pre-plant or use a split application where 50-75% of the nitrogen is applied pre-plant and the remainder is applied when the corn is 3-12 inches tall. Apply phosphorous and potassium according to soil test recommendations, that will usually be in the range of 40-60 pounds of each which is applied

at planting. Corn is planted by plant population according to your potential for yield. Our thinner soils cannot match those river bottom soils, but we can grow corn. I would plant on the lower range of the plant rates. Recommended plant populations are from 25,000 to 30,000 live plants per acre. To achieve this assume 80% field emergence and plant 31,250 to 37,500 seeds per acre.

If you are trying to plant some fairly small areas, estimate that it will take about 12-20 pounds of seed to plant an acre, depending on the variety because the seed size varies by variety. Spacing would be about 8 inches apart and plant at a depth of 1.5 to 2.0 inches.

Check with suppliers for varieties that are

available and recommended for our area. You can get corn that has some interesting

traits such as glyphosate tolerance and insect resistance.

Sweet corn is planted much the same. One thing to consider for the home gardener is good pollination. Plant at least 3 rows of corn in a block, side by side to get good

pollination. Poor pollination will lead to ears that are not filled out properly.

Some of the recommended standard sweet corn varieties include Merit, Funk's G90, Seneca Horizon, Silver Queen and Gold Queen. Sugar enhanced varieties (SE) have higher levels of sugar content than normal but still have comparable starch levels to keep the texture of regular standard sweet corn. Recommended varieties of SE corn include Ambrosia, Avalon, Bodacious, Delectable, Honey Select, Incredible, Lancelot, Miracle, Precious Gem, Temptation, Silver King and White Out.

The improved super sweet varieties (sh2) have 2 to 3 times more sugar than standard sweet corn. These variet-

ies should be isolated away from regular sweet corn varieties. The super sweet varieties will not germinate well in cold weather so wait a little later after the soil warms up to plant those varieties. Recommended varieties of super sweet corn would include Honey and Pearl, How Sweet It Is, Summer Sweet 7210 and 8101 and Xtra Tender 372, 270, or 282.

New varieties in sweet corn are abundant and there are lots of sweet varieties that combine traits of sugar enhanced and super sweets. Experiment and find the ones you like.







# Doyle rallies in thriller

Underwood fuels Lady Tigers, 49-47

LAKE CHARLES — Anything can happen over the course of four quarters in basketball, but Doyle's Class 2A semifinal clash against Lake Arthur proved anything can happen over the course of a minute.

The lead switched a dizzying six times in the course of 45 seconds in the fourth quarter as DHS pulled from a 14-point halftime deficit.

Once the smoke cleared, Doyle punched its ticket to the 2A state championship game with a 49-47 win over Lake Arthur in a thriller Wednesday at the Louisiana High School Athletic Association girls Top 28 basketball tournament at Burton Coliseum.

"We went into half-time refusing to give up and refusing to give in," Doyle head coach Guy McDonald said. "It paid off in the end."

The No. 3-seeded Lady Tigers reached the state title game for the first time since 1998.

Southeastern Louisiana University signee Taylin Underwood powered the Lady Tigers with a game-high 32 points and 10 rebounds. She also went 7-for-9 at the free-throw line.

"She's probably the most competitive person I've ever met," McDonald said. "She hates to lose at anything."

"They had made what I felt was a very good adjustment when they switched their point guard to a bigger player, so we decided



to switch to a bigger defender," McDonald said.

The Lady Tiger comeback rolled into gear off a Courtney Edwards three-pointer with 4:03 left in the third.

Edwards, the only other double-digit scorer for Doyle, netted 10.

The Edwards basket laid the groundwork for the furious pace that defined the second half.

Doyle faced a five-point deficit heading into the final stanza, but the Lady Tigers pulled closer after an Underwood three-pointer.


An Edwards basket

put the Lady Tigers in the lead, but LAHS responded with a shot to tie the game. Another Underwood shot put DHS ahead 41-40.

"I was so down at the start of the fourth, but I was in that situation before and we just knew we had to play together more," Underwood said.

A pair of Underwood free throws stretched Doyle's lead to 47-42 in the last 51 seconds. Gabby Guidry cut the Lady Tiger lead on a three-point bucket and helped force a Doyle

McDonald also reminded his team that they proved in the quarterfinal game that they could pull out of a slump.


"I told them we were in familiar territory and shouldn't panic," he said.

# Shotputter Davis leads Live Oak to indoor ranking

BATON ROUGE — First-year teams seldom make a considerable impact in indoor track, but the Live Oak girls squad dispelled that notion.

The Lady Eagles, in their inaugural season, racked up a 14th-place finish among 50 teams in Division I competition at the Louisiana High School Athletic Association indoor track and field meet recently at LSU's Carl Maddox Field House.

LOHS chalked 10 points off a first-place finish by sophomore Ashley Davis, who captured the gold medal in the shot put with a throw of 38-10. She eclipsed Peyton Montgomery of Barbe (36-1) and Carrie Bridges of Ruston (35-2).

It marked a nice addition for the already solid resume for Davis, which already includes a No. 16 ranking in the nation. She placed sixth in the nation last summer at the United States Track & Field Junior Olympics in Greensboro, N.C.

"She's already got quite a few colleges looking at her," said coach Ron Holden, who has worked the last six years in the LOHS track and field programs.

Baton Rouge High racked 47 points for the

top spot in girls competition, ahead of Lafayette (44) and Zachary (35).

"We actually had a very limited program," Holden said. "We only have seven girls, and Ashley Davis was the only to qualify for the state championship."

In another showing from Livingston Parish Schools, junior Kyle Baudoin finished second in the pole vault (14.6) for Walker, which placed 17th in boys action.

Layni LeBlanc, also of Walker, notched 10th in the 3,200-meter run with a finish of 13.21.

Denham Springs senior Phoenix Richardson placed seventh in the hurdles (8.91), while Amber Ferguson finished eighth in the 3,200-meter run (15.49).

In Division II action, Doyle senior Carlisa Smith claimed second in the 3,200 with a clocking of 11.48.

High hopes prevail for the Live Oak outdoor track and field program, which will boast a roster of more than 100 competitors.

Holden believes the Davis' accomplishments in the indoor meet will carry over to outdoor action.

"Ashley will score twenty points herself and win the shot put and discus events hands-down," he said.

"We just need to get her a little help."

Speed — or lack thereof — figures as the only factor that could slow down the LOHS program.

"We have no speed," Holden said. "We need to develop a distance program similar to what you see at a school like St. Paul's."

"For that, you have to put in over distance

and speed work," he said.

Madison Larsen could also make an impact for LOHS. Holden expects her to qualify in the 100- and 300-meter hurdles.

"That will help a lot, but what we need is more running events," he said. "That's the only one in which we have any chance in at this point."
