Oakman Elementary student shares his journey to recovery

OAKMAN — Curious hands were raised high Friday morning at Oakman Elementary School as representatives from Children's of Alabama talked to third graders about the brave journey of their fellow classmate, Carson Sherer.

April 19, 2016, is the day Carson was diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukemia. He has been homebound for the past year and has made many visits to Children's of Alabama in Birmingham to receive chemotherapy. After months of treatment, Carson will return to school next week.

To help his classmates have a better understanding of what he was diagnosed with, Caroline Davis, a school liaison, and Lindsay Joe, a child life specialist — both with Children's described what occurred in Carson's body to make him sick. Jasper man to serve a year in jail for running from police

A Jasper man who led a Cordova police officer on a late-night car chase

last month has been sentenced to a year in the Cordova Jail.

Johnny Evans, 33, of Jasper, pleaded guilty to attempting to elude, resisting arrest and reckless endangerment in Cordova Municipal Court on Wednesday, according to Cordova Police Chief Nick Smith.



He was sentenced to 360 days in jail.

Two additional sentences of 360 days were suspended. Evans will also be on probation for



'Sanctuary cities' bill advances in Texas, despite outcry

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A Texas Senate panel shrugged off 16 hours of sometimes tearful pleas and defiant opposition to approve a "sanctuary cities" proposal

that would withhold grant funding from local jurisdictions that don't hand over immigrants already in custody for possible deporta-

A 7-2 vote around 12:45 a.m. Friday from the chamber's powerful State Affairs Committee sends the bill to the full Senate, where a vote could come as early as next week.

Hundreds of Texans traveled from all over the state to testify on the bill and proceedings were repeatedly disrupted by protesters. Supporters say the

measure will impose the rule of law, but civic groups, immigration lawyers, church leaders and Hispanic activists oppose it, fearing it will lead to racial profiling and promote mistrust of law enforcement among minority communities. The committee voted along party lines and the hotly contested bill should clear the Senate too, since Republicans control 20 of its 31 seats. Similar measures have been backed by top Texas Republicans in previous years but never became law. A bill reaching the Senate floor so early in the state's legislative session — which began Jan. 10 and runs through the end of May — bodes well for its chances this time.

The Texas Democratic Party accused Republicans of using the late hour to rush legislation that much of the state doesn't want. The committee had scheduled a second meeting to discuss the bill after 8:30 a.m. on Friday, but canceled that after succeeding in voting overnight.

n the dead of the night, while the very will be targeted by this discriminatory legislation were asleep, Republicans voted to launch Trump's deportation force agenda," Manny Garcia, the party's deputy executive director, said in a statement Friday.

Republican state Sen. Charles Perry said local authorities must enforce the law. "This is not a deportation bill, this is a rule-of-law bill," Perry said. "We have almost a culture of contempt for federal immigration law.

The term "sanctuary cities" has no legal definition, but Republican Gov. Greg Abbott has promoted the legislation as a move to crackdown on criminal suspects who are in the country illegally. The issue has become contentious in many legislatures around the country, especially with President Donald Trump promising to wall off the U.S.-Mexico border and impose strict federal immigration policies.

As proposed, Texas' bill applies to local police forces and law enforcement at college campuses, and seeks to strip authorities of state-controlled grant funding if they don't comply — though some of its key provisions may change as it clears the Senate and makes its way through Texas' Republican-controlled state House.

Individual sheriffs and police chiefs — particularly in heavily Democratic areas — have long opposed enforcing federal immigration law, though some statewide law enforcement groups have endorsed the bill. Abbott has already blocked \$1.5 million to be withheld from the Travis County sheriff, who has said the jails in the state capital, Austin, will no longer honor most federal immigration detainers.

Rule on guns and mentally ill people faces GOP rollback

ATLANTA (AP) — In a strategy officer for the sign of the new climate taking hold on gun issues under a Trump administration with a Republicanled Congress, a rule to keep guns out of the hands of certain mentally disabled people is on its way to being scrapped.

Under the rule, the Social Security Administraprovide tion was to information to the gunbuying background check system on recipients with a mental disorder so severe they cannot work or handle their own benefit checks. Finalized in December as the Obama administration wound down, it affects an estimated 75,000 beneficiaries.

Gun-control advocates say the rule was meant to affect only those found to have a mental illness that makes them a danger to themselves or others, but was written too broadly. federal authorities use The rule didn't make certain people ineligible to buy a firearm, but was designed to ensure the background check system was comprehensive, accurate and flagged those already deemed ineligible.

"We would oppose any efforts to undermine that,"

The idea for the provision emerged after the 2012 Sandy Hook school shooting in which a 20year-old man with a variof impairments, including Asperger's syndrome and obsessive-compulsive disorder, shot and killed his mother at their home, then went to a school in Newtown, Connecticut, and fatally shot 20 children, six adults and himself. Adam Lanza used several weapons that his mother kept in her home and that they used to shoot at a range together.

Republican lawmakers and gun advocates criticized the regulation for reinforcing negative stereotype that people with a mental disorder are dangerous.

"We have already seen psychiatric data to deny

more than 257,000 military veterans their right to keep and bear arms ... But these are honest people who have committed no crimes," said Erich Pratt, executive director of Gun Owners of America.

tional Rifle Association's bidding.

The Social Security regulation also established a process for people to appeal having their names submitted to the background check database. But attorneys general from a dozen states wrote to congressional leaders and said such appeals can take months or years to re-They said the regulation

violates basic notions of due process by permitting an agency to revoke someone's Second Amendment rights without a hearing.

Jared Hamon, an engineering student at the University of Utah, said his mother was designated as his "payee" as a child. When he was born, he had a stroke and has cerebral

He deals with poor balance and he described his left hand as akin to wearing an oven mitt with fin-When he turned 18, he didn't see any reason "to go through a huge bureaucratic process to change" the designation.

He tucked away money each month to eventually afford a gun permit and to buy a firearm, on the very

day of the Sandy Hook shooting.

It's not clear what impact, if any, the rule would have on Hamon, but he said he worried about being deemed unfit to buy a firearm and fretted about not being able to have a gun to protect him-

A House vote on Thursday to roll back the rule "downgrades a system built to enforce existing laws that keep guns out of hands that shouldn't have them," said Erika Soto Lamb, the chief communications officer of Every-

town for Gun Safety. "Our background check system is only as good as the records it contains, and this vote re-opened the door for people prohibited from firearm ownership to illegally pass checks, buy and possess guns. Our public safety has been put at risk because of today's gun lobby-backed maneugers that don't move well. ver to advance their agenda of more guns for anyone, no questions asked."

The House passed the measure 235-180. The Senate has yet to act, and President Donald Trump must sign the bill into law before it can go into effect.

"Even in his last moments as the inmates attempted to take over the building, Sgt. Floyd told a couple of lieutenants to get out of the building and that it was a trap," union President Geoffrey Klopp

Floyd was found dead early Thursday after authorities used a backhoe to smash through a barricade of footlockers and end a nearly 20-hour hostage standoff at the prison. A second hostage, a female counselor, was rescued minutes after teams forced their way into a building at the all-male, 2,500-prisoner James T. Vaughn Correctional Cen-

Delaware Gov. John Carney called the uprising a "torturous" ordeal. In a statement, he said authorities will hold accountable those responsible and "make whatever changes guards and a counselor. washing. Instead, they are necessary to ensure Klopp said inmates filled up metal footlockers nothing like it ever hap-staged a fight to lure and built barricades.

Authorities did not immediately explain how Floyd died. They have said the inmates used "sharp instruments" to Building C and hold the 47-year-old hostage along with two other prison

Floyd, who radioed for help. They then turned on him, forcing him into the

The inmates eventually released two hostages and got authorities to turn the water back on, saying they needed it for drinking and

Klopp said the footlockers were used to hold inmates' belongings. "Footlockers are a necessary evil in prison," he

said. "You've got to have some place to store and transport their personal belongings."

During negotiations conducted via an officer's walkie-talkie

were broadcast online for more than an hour before officials blocked the transmission — the mediator tried to coax an unidentified inmate into letting him talk to Floyd to make sure he was OK.

The inmate responded that the negotiator could only talk to Floyd once the inmates got to talk to the governor. He told the negotiator that the prisoners wanted a "formal apology" from Carney for "decades of oppression."

Floyd, a 16-year veteran with the prison, is the first Delaware corrections officer to be killed, according to Klopp.

The union president described Floyd as a wonderhusband correctional officer who went the "extra mile for any human being he could help." Last year, he received the warden's award for outstanding perform-

An AP reporter who visited Floyd's house earlier Thursday was told the family had been through a lot and did not want to speak.

Dave Dowty, a retired court-transportation worker for the Department of Correction, said he occaworked

"I just know he was a ton.

pretty good guy. He was quiet, professional," Dowty said in a telephone interview.

Former Vaughn Correctional Center inmate Kendall Guinn, of Dover,

had a low opinion of Floyd. "He harassed inmates. He's been doing it for years," Guinn said in a telephone interview.

The others guards who were taken hostage were beaten severely by their captors and suffered broken bones, cuts and eye injuries, Klopp said. Authorities said their injuries were not life-threatening.

It wasn't immediately clear how many inmates took part in the uprising. About 120 were in the building when it began, but dozens were let out as the standoff dragged on. Authorities said all inmates who were in the building are being considered suspects.

One inmate told a local newspaper via phone that they were demanding better education and rehabilitation programs and were also upset over President Donald Trump and "all the things that he's doing now."

"We know that the institution is going to change for the worse," he told *The* News Journal in Wilming-

Cliff gives way at 'firehose' lava flow as tourists watch

HONOLULU (AP) — A section of sea cliff above a massive "firehose" lava flow on Hawaii's Kilauea Volcano has collapsed and splashed into the ocean as tourists and geologists watched on.

A large crack in the section of cliff above the gushing molten lava stream gave way Thursday afternoon as scientists stood just yards away. A tour boat was cruising by when the collapse happened. Video shows guests gasping and screaming as the huge piece of land splashes down in front of them, sending debris high into the air.

The collapse stopped the heavy stream of lava known as a firehose flow that had been arching out from near the top of the cliffs.

Michigan: Potential release of personal info may affect 1.9M

LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Social Security numbers and other personal information of up to 1.9 million Michigan workers may have been compromised, the state said Friday.

The problem stemmed from a software update to Michigan's unemployment system, state officials said, and made people's names, wage information and Social Security numbers available for roughly 3½ months to employers and third-party payroll vendors who should not have had access.

There is no indication yet that anyone used the in-

formation for malicious purposes.

The number of people affected will not be known until an investigation is finished. Those potentially at risk include employees whose payroll is processed by one of 31 third-party vendors that works with the Unemployment Insurance Agency.

Texas boy lifts toilet lid, finds rattlesnake hiding inside

ABILENE, Texas (AP) — A snake removal expert says rattlesnakes often hide in rural Texas homes, but having one peer up from a toilet is an unusual occurrence. Nathan Hawkins said Friday that he was called to a home near Abilene last month after a boy lifted the toilet lid and was surprised to find an adult rattlesnake poking out of the water with most of its body extended down into the drain.

Hawkins says the snake found into the house's plumbing through an exposed pipe.

The boy's mother decapitated the snake and Hawkins removed 23 others that he found nesting in the storm cellar and beneath the home.

Basketball inches closer to ending ban on religious headgear

NEW YORK (AP) — International basketball competitions may soon permit players to wear religious

headgear, including hijabs and yarmulkes. Leaders of basketball's governing body, FIBA, have asked a committee to come forward with a proposal for headgear to be worn safely by athletes in competition, with the goal of approving the change at its meeting in May. FIBA announced the move earlier this week.

It comes following a two-year study and not long after an open letter sent to FIBA president Horacio Muratore and signed by a dozen WNBA players including Breanna Stewart and tennis greats Billie Jean King and Martina Navratilova.



'El Chapo' lawyers say jail conditions too strict in NYC

NEW YORK (AP) He's locked up 23 hours a day. His wife can't visit him. He can't call anyone, except his lawyers. He even was denied water, his lawyers say.

The strict jail conditions for notorious Mexican drug lord and escape artist Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman were outlined on Friday by defense attorneys in a failed bid to get a judge to loosen them.

Guzman smiled at his common-law wife, Emma Coronel, as he was led into the Brooklyn courtroom under heavy guard by deputy U.S. marshals at his second court appearance since being brought to the United States on

"This was so far the only way she has been able to see him," defense attorney Michelle Gelernt said afterward with a silent Coronel at her side.

Guzman. 59 has pleaded not guilty to charges of running a massive drug trafficking operation that laundered billions of dollars and oversaw murders and kidnappings. He's being held at a high-security federal jail in Manhattan, with U.S. officials mindful of how he twice escaped from prison in Mexico, the second time via a mile-long tunnel dug to the shower in his cell.

Defense lawyers complained to U.S. District Judge Brian Cogan on Friday that the restrictions make it difficult for him to make decisions with them about how to fight the charges. They claimed his jailers are so zealous, they denied him water during a recent meeting with the

defense team. "I don't think there's any thought that if I have the guards give him a glass of water during a three-hour

MONTGOMERY — A lawyer for Gov. Robert Bentley is denying that his campaign fund violated the law by paying legal fees for a former aide with whom Bentley was accused of having an affair.

Bentley attorney William Athanas says the roughly \$9,000 payment for legal fees of Rebekah Mason was consistent with state law. He says that's because it involved work she performed as Bentley's senior political adviser.

The lawyer's claims are contained in a letter sent to the Alabama Ethics Commission and made public Friday. The letter follows allegations by Secretary of State John Merrill that the payments were illegal.

The former head of the state law enforcement agency has alleged Bentley had an affair with Mason. Bentley has acknowledged personal mistakes but denies doing anything illegal.

Man fatally shot driving in SUV on interstate in Birmingham

BIRMINGHAM — Authorities say a man found dead after his SUV crashed on Interstate 59 was killed by a gunshot to the head. Al.com reports police were called early Friday to a wreck reported by a passing motorist on.

Officers found the driver dead and windows shattered by gunfire.

Birmingham police Sqt. Michael Kennedy said the victim's SUV stuck a roadside barrier, but the impact appeared to cause no damage or injury.

The Jefferson County coroner's office identified the victim as 27-year-old Charles Lee Brown.

Eight homicides have been reported in Birmingham so far in 2017.

Former Alabama sheriff's worker guilty of drug charges

DECATUR — A man who delivered documents for the Morgan County Sheriff's Office has pleaded guilty to drug charges.

The Decatur Daily reports 55-year-old Steven Eugene Parker of Hartselle pleaded guilty Thursday to drug distribution and possession charges.

Sentencing guidelines mean Parker could avoid serving time, but a prosecutor says he will ask a judge to send the man to prison.

Parker worked as a process server for the sheriff's office, a position that involves delivering court documents to people.

He was fired in 2011 when authorities accused him of arranging prescription drug sales from his patrol car. Authorities found more than 400 unserved documents in the vehicle when he was arrested. Parker has been free on bond for more than five years, and sentencing is set for May 3.

Birmingham police: Man dies after being shot multiple times

BIRMINGHAM — Birmingham police are investigating after a man was shot multiple times at a public housing complex.

The shooting happened Thursday night at Tom Brown Village. Sgt. Bryan Shelton, a spokesman for Birmingham police, said the victim was shot multiple times.

Al.com reports the man died while paramedics tried to save his life. The victim's name was not immediately released as police worked to notify his family. He died while Birmingham Fire and Rescue Service paramedics were working on him.

He will also have lab tests every two weeks and continue home chemotherapy treatment for two and a half years.

Sherer said she is nervous for Carson to return to school next week, but admits her son is ready to go back to being a kid.

"He's been out for almost a year, so he's ready. Socially he needs it, and he likes school. On home-

bound he's done great. He's made straight A's," Sherer said. "He's fought hard to get here. ... The school has been wonderful. I know that he's in good hands."

Pastor on edge after gunmen robbed group at church

SELMA (AP) — Armed with two pistols and a sawed-off shotgun, the gunmen went through the pockets of the Rev. B.T. Booker Jr. and two church deacons, taking their wallets before they "lined us up to kill us.'

It happened after an evening meeting at Morning Star Baptist Church. Booker and the deacons were walking to their cars outside when three men approached them from the street. When the men drew weapons, one of the deacons tried to run. He was grabbed by the arm and forced to the ground with a gun pressed to his head.

They told us they were going to kill us with such cursing they were putting on us," Booker told WSFA-TV. "...I was hollering for my life, begging them not to

shoot us or kill us."

Booker said he's having nightmares a week after the chilling holdup Jan. 26, though the gunmen fled without hurting anyone. The pastor has cancelled all nighttime meetings at his church and added security during worship services.

No arrests have been made in the case. Selma police Lt. Tory Neely said the suspects may be the same armed men who robbed a nearby Family Dollar store two days before the attack outside the church. Security video from the store showed the men hit the clerk in the head with a gun and take money from the register.

Neely said the gunmen fired several shots inside and outside the store and robbed customers at the front door before

Seven words that changed the world

It might surprise you to know the word "faith" is only mentioned two times in the Old Testament. There were many true believers back then, but they were the exception rather than the rule. Synonyms like "believe(d)" and

"trust" are found numerous times. Heroes of faith like Abraham, Moses, Daniel, and others overcame their doubts and displayed great faith in God. The first time the word "faith" appears is a divine indictment against Israel for their lack of it, "I will hide my face from them, I will see what their end will be: for they are a perverse generation, children in whom is no faith" (Dt. 32:20). The main reason the Israelites were not allowed to enter Canaan Land and wasted forty years wandering in the wilderness was due to their unbelief (Heb. 3:19).

The next time the word "faith" surfaced was centuries later in the Book of Habakkuk, a minor prophet with a major message that is still relevant today. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, he prophesied of a New Covenant Age, "For the vision is yet for an appointed time, but at the end it will speak, and it will not lie: though it tarries, wait for it... the just shall live by his faith" (Hab. 2:3-4).

Those seven simple, yet profound words — the just shall live by his faith — lay dormant for over 600 years until the Apostle Paul quoted them in his letters (Rom. 1:17, Gal. 3:11). The writer of Hebrews, perhaps Paul, also reprinted this statement (Heb. 10:38). Notice Habakkuk's original quote included the personal pronoun "his." That's important because no one will make it to heaven based on another person's faith. We all must have our own personal encounter with

make it to heaven based on another person's faith. We all must have our own personal encounter with Christ; our parent's or preacher's faith is not sufficient for us. We must have our own individual salvation experience through faith in Christ (Rom. 10:9-10, Eph. 2:8-9).

The old saying is true, "God doesn't have any grandchildren, just children."

Let's break down this powerful phrase: The just (those who are justified or declared righteous in the sight of God) shall live (become and remain spiritually alive) by faith (belief and trust in God). In other words, the way we get saved is the way we stay saved. We become spiritually alive at new birth by faith in the finished work of Christ on the cross. We remain spiritually alive by continuing to believe in His atonement. The classic hymn says it well, "My hope is built on nothing less than Jesus' blood and righteousness, I dare not trust the sweetest frame, but wholly lean on Jesus' name...On Christ the solid rock I stand, all other ground is sinking sand, all other ground is sinking sand."

This simple truth doesn't seem like a big deal to us today, but 500 years ago, these seven words literally changed the church order and the world. In 1505, a German university student was approaching a town when a violent storm erupted. Lightning struck so close that the young man fell to the ground. Scared, he made a rash vow and desperately prayed, "Saint Anne, help me and I will become a monk." True to his word, Martin Luther became a devout monk. He lived a life of extreme self-discipline and isolation in a monastery. He was a tortured soul who deprived himself of most earthly pleasures. He fasted, prayed, studied Scripture, embraced poverty and celibacy, and fulfilled every ritual of the church to the max. He even refused blankets in the winter, slept on the cold, hard ground and nearly froze himself to death, all in an effort to gain God's favor. Still, he couldn't remove his sense of guilt and unwor-

"At times, he was proud of his sanctity and said, 'I have done nothing wrong today.' Then the misgivings would arise. 'Have you fasted enough? Are you poor enough?'" He believed later in life that his extreme fasting regimen permanently damaged his digestive system. He later said, "I was a good monk, and I kept the rule of my

order so strictly that I may say that if ever a monk got to heaven by his monkery it was I...if I had kept on any longer, I would have killed myself with vigils, prayers, readings, and other work."

In 1515, Martin Luther taught a class on the Book of Romans that turned his theology topsy-turvy. Studying Paul's writings, he rediscovered a simple truth that was forgotten during the Middle Ages. "Night and day I pondered until ... I grasped the truth that...through grace and sheer mercy, God justified us by faith. I felt myself to be reborn and to have gone through open doors into paradise. The whole of Scripture took on a new meaning ... this passage of Paul became to me a gateway to heaven."

Luther finally realized that keeping religious rituals and shunning sin is NOT what makes us right with God; rather, simple faith in Christ imparts to us His righteousness (all our righteousness is like filthy rags — Is. 64:6). Works do not replace faith in justification; they are merely the evidence of true faith (where there is fire, there is smoke) because "faith without works is dead" (Jam. 2:17-26).

Luther's "new revelation" was not well received. In fact, after nailing his 95 theses to the Wittenberg Church door in 1517, he was condemned as a heretic and ordered to recant. When he refused, his writings were banned and burned. He too would have been burned at the stake but he escaped and later translated the Bible into German. God used Martin Luther to spark the Great Protestant Reformation that swept the world. Protestants worldwide owe him a debt of gratitude all because he boldly believed a simple truth—the just shall live by his faith. Those same seven words can change your life too...if only you believe!





However, not all doctors feel this way and advise that around 8 or 9 months complete proteins be introduced into a baby's diet to ensure the child gets enough iron. This is why this very important subject should be discussed with your child's pediatrician to help you decide what is best for her.

Israeli settlers on Friday shrugged off White House criticism of settlement construction, convinced they have the sympathies of President Donald Trump. The Palestinians, still wary of Trump, warned that the settlers' hard-line stance could spell the end to a two-state solution to the conflict.

Trump has been perceived as sympathetic to the settlements, an issue at the heart of the Israel-Palestinian conflict that was a frequent source of friction between Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and former President Barack Obama. Israeli nationalists believe they now have an ally in the White House and have made no secret they will push for more settlements in the West Bank.

The White House said Thursday that although the administration doesn't "believe the existence of settlements is an impediment to peace, the con-struction of new settlements or the expansion of existing settlebevond their current borders may not be helpful in achieving that goal."

The unexpected warning came hours after Netanyahu vowed to establish the first new West Bank settlement in over two decades "as soon as possible," promising to make up for a court-ordered demolition of an illegal settlement outpost.

Israeli security forces dismantled the West Bank outpost of Amona earlier in the day amid clashes between police and dozens of hard-line settlers who had barricaded themselves in a synagogue.

Oded Revivi, the chief foreign envoy of the Yesha settlers' council, said his group "thanks the White House for asserting that our communities were never an impediment to peace." Using the biblical name for the West Bank, he said "nothing is more natural and morally just than Jews building in

"We look forward to working closely with our friends in the new Trump administration to build a brighter future all," he

The settler movement is a potent political force in Israel, and Netanyahu's narrow nationalist coalition government is dominated by settlers and their supporters.

The Palestinians claim

Iran bans travel of U.S. wrestlers in

response to Trump order

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) -Iran on Friday banned U.S. wrestlers from an important international tournament this month in response to President Donald Trump's executive order forbidding visas for Iranians, the official IRNA news agency reported.

A senior Iranian cleric vowed, meanwhile, that his country would continue its missile program despite threats from the Trump administration that it was preparing to levy new sanctions.

IRNA quoted Iran's foreign ministry spokesman Bahram Ghasemi as saying a special committee reviewed the case of the U.S. team for the freestyle World Cup, and "eventually the visit ... was opposed." The competition, one of the sport's most prestigious events, is set for Feb. 16-17 in the western Iranian city of Kermanshah.

The decision marks the first action taken by Iran in response to Trump's executive order banning visas for seven Muslim countries. Earlier this week, Iran said it would take retaliatory action.

Israeli settler group shrugs off White House criticism

JERUSALEM (AP) — all of the West Bank and east Jerusalem along with the Gaza Strip — areas captured by Israel in the 1967 Mideast war — for their state. The Palestinians and much of the international community consider all Israeli settlements illegal and view them as a hindrance to reaching a two-state solution to the conflict.

Husam Zomlot, spokesman for Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas, said "this statement of the White House is in the right direction, but we need more than words to protect the two-state solution, otherwise we will find nothing to talk about when President Trump" unveils his policies on the Israeli-Palestinian

"We need actions rather than words to stop the Israeli settlements expansion, which is violating the international law and killing the two-state solution," Zomlot added.

Israeli nationalists, including Netanyahu, defend the settlements on both security grounds and the historic religious ties to the territory. They say east Jerusalem, home to key sites sacred to Jews, Muslims and Christians, is an eternal part of Israel's capital and not up for negotiation.

Today, there are some 400,000 Israelis living in West Bank settlements, in addition to roughly 200,000 Israelis in east Jerusalem, also captured in 1967 from Jordan.

In 2005, Israel withdrew



Deputy Foreign Minister Tzipi Hotovely said Friday if the U.S. concedes that settlements are not an obstacle to peace, then "it must be concluded that expanding construction is not a problem."

Education Minister Naftali Bennett, leader of the Jewish pro-settlement Home Party, has been pushing Netanyahu to abandon the internationally backed idea of a Palestinian state and to annex the Maaleh Adumim settlement near Jerusalem. The White House statement could help Nepressure to keep building and annex territory. For decades, U.S. presi-

dents have joined the international community in condemning the settlements. In December, the Obama administration allowed the U.N. Security Council to pass a resolution condemning the settlements as a "flagrant violation" of international law. In his farewell speech, U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry also harshly criticized them.

Trump has said he wants to broker a peace deal between Israel and the Palestinians but has given no indication of how he plans to accomplish it. His campaign platform made no mention of a Palestinian state, for decades the cornerstone of U.S. Mideast policy, and he has surrounded himself with advisers with deep ties to the settlement movement.





QB Michael Vick tells ESPN he is retiring

Michael Vick, who rose to stardom with the Atlanta Falcons before he was sent to prison for running a dogfighting operation, tells ESPN he is retiring from playing in the NFL.

The 36-year-old Vick, a dynamic dual threat with his speedy legs and powerful left arm. passed for 22,464 yards and 133 touchdowns during his 13 seasons with the Falcons, Eagles, Jets and Steelers. His 6,109 career yards rushing are an NFL record by a quarterback.

He did not play this season. Vick was selected

by Atlanta with the No. 1 overall pick in the 2001 draft. He made three Pro Bowls with the Falcons and became the first quarterback in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season.





Trustees approve stadium renovation



CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP) - Jordan Morris scored in the 59th minute, and the United States beat Jamaica 1-0 Friday night to give Bruce Arena the first win of his second stint as national team

With the U.S. scoreless streak at 280 minutes, Benny Feilhaber took a 20-vard pass from Dax McCarty and played the ball to Morris with a backheel pass. Morris returned the ball to Feilhaber, who was making his first start in five years.

Feilhaber dribbled into the penalty area and pushed the ball back to Morris. The 22-year-old forward, last season's Major League Soccer Rookie of the Year, took a touch and beat goalkeeper Ryan Thompson inside the near post with a right-footed shot from 8 yards.

Arena replaced Jurgen Klinsmann in November and changed nine starters from his return match, a 0-0 tie against Serbia last weekend.

After starting 0-2 final round of World Cup qualifying in North and Central America and the Caribbean, the U.S. resumes the hexagonal March 24 against Honduras in San Jose, California, then plays four days later at Panama.

I will always ask myself, 'What is the story behind it?' I hope people see the iersev there and remember the story. Not just myself, but my teammates, my opponents, we put a story together."

The Rockets are set to retire Yao's No. 11 jersey in a halftime ceremony Friday night when they host the Chicago Bulls.

A 7-foot-6 center from Shanghai, Yao was the top overall draft pick in 2002 and was an eighttime All-Star, playing nine seasons in Houston before retiring in 2011 because of mounting issues with injuries.

Danica Patrick's sponsor sued by Stewart-Haas racing team

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) - Stewart-Haas Racing has filed a breach of contract lawsuit against Nature's Bakery, accusing the company of refusing to pay millions of dollars it owes the team to sponsor Danica Patrick this season.

Nature's Bakery was scheduled to sponsor at least 20 races this NASCAR season, the second year of a three-year deal to be the primary sponsor for Patrick.

The lawsuit filed Friday in state superior court indicates Nature's Bakery had cash flow issues not long after signing its sponsorship agreement and asked to rework the payment schedule on the more than \$15 million the company owes the team each season. SHR also accused the company of eventually concocting "a scheme to avoid further payments" by claiming Patrick had been endorsing competing products and was not using her social media presence enough to promote Nature's Bakery.

ESPN and Giants defensive end Pierre-Paul settle lawsuit

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) - New York Giants defensive end Jason Pierre-Paul and ESPN have settled a lawsuit over the network's disclosure of his medical records from a 2015 fireworks accident.

ESPN announced the settlement on Friday, saving it believes that the network's reporting about the injury was newsworthy and journalistically appropriate. Giants spokesman Pat Hanlon declined comment.

The network said despite their different points of view, the parties agreed to resolve their dispute amicablv.

The case was set for trial in August after a Miami federal judge rejected ESPN's motion to dismiss the lawsuit. Pierre-Paul was hospitalized in Miami after the July Fourth accident, which caused serious injuries to his right hand. The lawsuit claimed ESPN and a network reporter violated his privacy and Florida medical confidentiality laws by posting the records on social media.

Patriots locked in to proven approach entering Super Bowl

HOUSTON — Ten words have driven Patriots coach Bill Belichick since he arrived in New England 17 years ago. And they are 10 words that he leans on whenever he is queried about what's gone into making his team an annual threat to hoist the Lombardi Trophy.

"I do what I think is best for the team," he says. For the better part of those 17 seasons, that approach has worked out well for the Patriots.

They will make their seventh Super Bowl appearance under Belichick on Sunday when they take on the Atlanta Falcons. Along with quarterback Tom Brady, Belichick already is part of the winningest coach/quarterback combination in NFL postseason history, taking 24 games together.


The 64-year-old coach has done it by having an uncanny ability of getting his teams to buy into a program that has become known as the "Patriot Way."

"A lot of people talk about the 'Patriot Way'. There's not a straight definition of it, but here you know that we're going to work every day," linebacker and defensive captain Dont'a Hightower said. "Around here you're either getting better or you're getting worse. That's kind of the mantra that's kind of bestowed around here."

It's a program that's led to four Super Bowl rings for Belichick and Brady. And this year's team is strong enough to bring them a fifth title.

The reasons are plentiful, but it starts with the experience at the top. Belichick is preparing for his 36th playoff game, and is an expert at shielding his team from distractions.

Baylor rocked by wave of ugly allegations

AUSTIN, Texas — The allegations against Baylor, its football program and former coach Art Briles, get uglier with each new lawsuit and legal filing.

Among the most recent: More than 50 acts of rape by dozens of football players in four years. Briles asking why an alleged rape victim would hang out with "bad dudes" (his own players).

And coaches encouraging female students in a hostess group to have sex with recruits. And they keep rolling in, deepening the public disgust and mistrust with the nation's largest Baptist university as it tries to fight lawsuits, settle others and fend off withering criticism from all sides as to how things spun so out of control with a sexual assault scandal that included multiple accusa-

tions against the football program.
"It seems relentless," said Fred
Norton Jr., president of the Baylor Line Foundation, the school's alumni organization. "It's all unsettling. Nobody knows what's going to be the next shoe to drop. It wears us all out to have to keep defending what Baylor really is, the true Baylor we know."

Baylor faces at least six federal and state lawsuits as well as a federal civil rights investigation into claims the school and football program, which Briles built into a Big 12 champion, ignored, mishandled or tried to cover up reports of sexual or physical abuse and other criminal misdeeds across campus for

One court filing last week alleges more than 50 acts of rape by more than 30 football players over a fouryear period, and that Baylor football promoted a culture of "sex, drugs

and violence." And after months of refusing to release details from its own investigation, Baylor on Thursday revealed text messages between Briles, assistant coaches and staff members that appear to show them trying to shield players from police and university discipline.

In one instance, when shown a list of names of players a woman said attacked her, Briles allegedly responded, "Those are some bad dudes. Why was she around those

To date, only two of Briles' former players have been tried and convicted of sexual assault, and another is currently charged in a 2016

Though he isn't talking about tak-

ing anyone's job.
"I'm just trying to get settled with school so far," Tagovailoa said. "This is my fourth week, and I'm trying to get situated with everything before we even start to think that far. "I was really shocked that they offered me to start off with, because I didn't know they would have even found me," Tagovailoa said. "I'm all

the way across the map, and they decided to offer. . I just wanted to play for the best and they were No. 1 as well, so that's why I came here."

Soldiers thwart attack on Louvre, tourists held in lockdown

PARIS (AP) — Paris was plunged into panic again — when soldiers guarding the Louvre Museum shot an attacker who lunged at them with two machetes on Friday and shouted "Allahu Akbar!" as the historic landmark went into lockdown.

The threat appeared to quickly recede after the assailant was subdued, but it cast a new shadow over the city just as tourism was beginning to rebound after a string of deadly attacks. Coming just hours before Paris finalized its bid for the 2024 Olympics, it also renewed questions about security in the City of Light.

The soldiers' quick action put an end to what French President Francois Hollande said was "no doubt" a terrorist attack at one of Paris' most iconic tourist attractions.

French prosecutor Francois Molins said the assailant was believed to be a 29-year-old Egyptian who had been living in the United Arab Emirates, though his identity has not yet been formally confirmed.

"Everything shows that the assailant was very determined", Molins told a news conference, adding that the attacker, who was shot four times, was in a life-threatening condition in a hospital.

Anti-terrorism prosecutors took charge of the investigation as police carried out raids near the tree-lined Champs-Elysees linked to the attack, which came two months after authorities carried out a special anti-terrorism exercise around the Louvre.

Molins said the attacker was not carrying any identity papers but investigators used his cellphone and a national data base of visa applicants containing their photos and fingerprints to determine that he was a resident of the United Arab Emirates who arrived in Paris on a

tourist visa on Jan. 26. Two days later the sus-

pect bought two military machetes at a gun store in Paris, the prosecutor said. He also paid 1,700 euros for a one-week stay at an apartment in the chic 8th arrondissement of the French capital, near the Champs-Elysees.

In the apartment, police found an Egyptian passport and 965 euros, as well as a residence permit, driver's license and a credit card all issued from the UAE, Molins said. He said the suspect's return flight to Dubai was scheduled for Sunday.

Friday's attack targeted an entrance to a shopping mall that extends beneath the sprawling Louvre, a medieval former royal palace now home to the "Mona Lisa" and hundreds of other masterpieces.

Waving two machetes over his head, the assailant lunged at the soldiers patrolling in the mall, shouting "Allahu Akbar!" or "God is great!" Molins said.

One soldier fought him off and was slightly injured in the scalp. Another

soldier fell to the ground as the assailant tried to slash him, then opened fire, shooting the attacker in the stomach.

When that didn't stop him, the soldier fired three more time, gravely wounding him. The backpack the man was carrying contained cans of spray paint, but no explosives, Molins

The 1,200 people inside the Louvre — one of the world's biggest tourist attractions — were first shuttled into windowless rooms as part of a special security protocol before being evacuated. The mu-

seum in central Paris remained closed for the rest of Friday but will reopen on Saturday, Culture Minister Audrey Azoulay told reporters.

Those patrols — num-

Hollande, speaking at a news conference in Malta where he was attending a European Union summit, said that while the Louvre incident was quickly contained, the overall threat to France remains high. He said the incident showed the need for the increased security patrols deployed around France since attacks in 2015.

bering about 3,500 soldiers



in the Paris area — were first deployed following the January 2015 attack on Paris' satirical magazine Charlie Hebdo and reinforced after November 2015 bomb-andgun attacks that left 130 people dead at the city's Bataclan concert hall and other sites.

The country has been under a state of emergency since.

Interior Minister Bruno Le Roux praised the soldiers involved in Friday's attack, saying "to wear a uniform, as we can see in the propaganda of those who want to attack us, is to be a target."

Restaurant Sanae Hadraoui, 32, said she was waiting for breakfast at a McDonald's in the Louvre's restaurant complex when she heard the first gunshot, followed by another and then a couple

"I hear a shot. Then a second shot. Then maybe two more. I hear people screaming, 'Evacuate! Evacuate!'" she said. "They told us to evacuate. I told my colleagues at the Mc-Donald's. We went downstairs and then took the

Makram Parisian Chokri, who was shopping in the mall, described hearing a "boom, boom, boom over a few seconds.... We thought it was an exercise at first but you know, you have a lot of scenarios going through your mind.'

Police sealed off mall entrances near the Louvre and closed the area to vehicles, snarling traffic in Paris. Confused tourists were shooed away.

Lance Manus, a tourist from Albany, New York, described young girls crying in panic, and had immediate thoughts of the Sept. 11 attacks in the United States.

'That's what we're used to now," he said. "I mean we have to learn to live with it, be vigilant. So we listen to instructions from the security guards and do what they told us."

Eric Grau, a high school teacher chaperoning a group of 52 students, said: We were in one of the galleries and a voice came through the loudspeakers to alert us, saying there was an alert." He said the group was taken to safety in the African art gallery.
