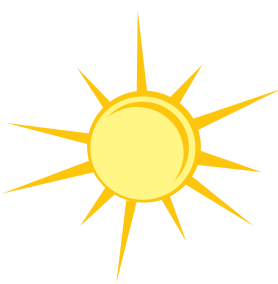

Six-Mile Creek plans on the table

City aims to reduce impact  
of regular flooding.

BROOKINGS —City councilors received an update at Tuesday night’s meeting on an effort to mitigate the impact of Six-Mile Creek, which has a propensity to overrun its banks every so often, putting lives and property at risk.

Known formally as the Six-Mile Creek Feasibility Study, the three-year effort by the city and its consultant,

RESPEC Engineering of Rapid City, has put forth five options to mitigate the impact of the creek’s floodwater — options that would cost millions of dollars apiece to implement and are likely years away from actually being built.

The options focus on an area from the U.S. Highway 14 Bypass on the north to Sixth Street on the south and from the U.S. Highway 14 diagonal on the west to Medary Avenue on the east. Roughly 230 structures are contained within that zone.

The options are:  
Lengthen north U.S. Highway 14

bridges

- Goal: Allow for better water flow by lengthening the bridges from 100 feet to 500 feet and lowering the existing terrain beneath the bridge.

- Cost estimate: \$20.2 million.

- Proposed benefits: \$7.4 million to \$11.5 million.

- Challenges: Downstream impacts. Channel connectivity plus U.S. Highway 14 bridges

- Goal: Allow more water to flow through the north channel in order to alleviate flooding along the south channel that passes through the city.

BROOKINGS — A deer darting out in front of a moped sent a 55-year-old Brookings man to the hospital on Monday night, according to a Wednesday news release from the Brookings County Sheriff’s Office.

The nature and extent of Michael Siegel’s injuries were unknown, Assistant Sheriff Scott Sebring wrote, adding that Siegel was taken to the emergency room at Brookings Health System.

The incident occurred at 8:34 p.m. on 212th Street near 468th Avenue. According to the release, Siegel was riding westbound on 212th Street when the deer entered the roadway. His moped struck the animal, ejecting Siegel and flipping the moped, causing an estimated \$1,600 in damage.

The incident is being investigated by the sheriff’s office. Other assisting agencies were the Brookings Fire Department and Brookings Ambulance.

Connecting S.D. women in ag

MITCHELL — While reflecting on the need to build her own network within the South Dakota agriculture industry, Rebecca Blue began to wonder if other women in ag were encountering the same challenge.

Blue has an extensive agriculture career that’s taken her from her hometown of Huron to Washington, D.C., and Argentina. With an undergraduate degree in agronomy and a masters in soil sciences from South Dakota State University, Blue followed an opportunity to Washington where she continued her career in agriculture, trade and appropriations policy for eight years.

She now divides her time between South Dakota and her husband’s native country, Argentina, while running her own agriculture consultancy, Blue Consulting.

As Blue began reaching out to South Dakota women about their networks, what she discovered was eye-opening.

“When I shared the idea of creating a place to connect, learn and collaborate, it immediately resonated with them and energized me to take it to the next level and form something meaningful,” she recalled.

With a passion for moving her idea into something tangible, Blue used her personal savings to start a podcast, “The Best Job In South Dakota,” now wrapping

Two state departments victimized by the allegedly criminal behavior of some employees said Monday they are implementing reforms, including a full-time internal control officer and an anonymous tip line for employees.

During a meeting in Pierre with the State Board of Internal Control, officials from the Department of Social Services and the Department of Revenue outlined the new measures.

“We have been inspired to rethink our internal controls, ensuring they are more robust and frequent,” Social Services Secretary Matt Althoff said.

A former employee allegedly stole \$1.8 million from the department’s Division of Child Protection Services over a 13-year period. She allegedly submitted

up its third season.

“I went out on my own and realized I was not alone. There were all these women going through the same thing,” she said. “Women in agriculture have been a pivotal part of my own career. They expose you to leadership and opportunities, helping you get to these new avenues you maybe didn’t see yourself getting to.”

## Access to funding

Through the podcast, Blue continued to grow her network.

Then one of her guests in Season 1, Rachel Lawton, served as what Blue calls “the spark” to take her ideas to the next level. Lawton is a Natural Resources Conservation Service urban conservationist for the South Dakota Soil Health Coalition.

“That’s when the bigger program started to develop,” recounts Blue. “Networking at its best — that interview with Rachel led me to have conversations with other people at NRCS and they said, ‘Hey we think we might know of a funding opportunity.’”

In addition to NRCS, Angela Ehlers, executive director of the South Dakota Association of Conservation Districts came aboard.

Ehlers said she and Colette Kessler, assistant state conservationist for partnerships at NRCS, were having a conversation about what they could bring to the table.

“USDA had some increased funding for reaching out to underserved or

unserved populations,” Ehlers shared.

Ehlers advised Blue that SDACD and the Jones County Conservation District wanted to apply to fund a project that would support increased engagement of women in agriculture and conservation through networking and educating.

“Rebecca brought a wealth of experience. She’s been out there interviewing women across the state and ruminating on what they’re saying, what their needs are,” Ehlers shared.

## Significant award

In June, a Conservation Collaboration Cooperative Agreement for \$1,173,682 was signed by NRCS, the Jones County Conservation District and the South Dakota Association of Conservation Districts. The project team, led by Blue, includes Ehlers, Kessler and Darrel DuVall, state outreach coordinator for NRCS.

Work is underway to develop and implement a program to connect, engage and educate women in agriculture and conservation, empowering them to grow their networks, expand their opportunities and build collaboration.

The proposal includes the hubs staffed by managers in six regions across the state, within the vicinities of Sioux Falls, Brookings, Huron, Eagle Butte, White River and Spearfish.

Sharing knowledge of opportunities in conservation is another key.

“A lot of organizations in

the world care about agriculture, cropland, grasslands, habitat and water quality and their societal benefits,” Kessler said.

“This project aims at connecting those rural people with some larger resources so they can make things happen in their local communities.”

While NRCS provides science-based help for farmers and ranchers, conservation districts identify water, grassland or cropland projects and help producers organize and take on these projects.

“So many communities across the state and the nation are concerned about food security, food sovereignty, having fresh foods at the local level,” Kessler said. “There are ways that are not capital intensive that can help bring young people back.”

## Next steps

The project team announced an advisory committee to help with programmingDakotafest in Mitchell served as the initial project rollout.

The team also plans a survey and focus groups.

Ehlers and Blue said if the team members find a statewide issue that needs to be addressed, they will focus efforts there.

“I’m hopeful our first successes will guide the project and bring forward what we need to be doing to serve women across the state,” Ehlers said.

“We have an idea. Until we put it on the ground we won’t know exactly what it will look like.”

- Cost estimate: \$24.1 million.
  - Proposed benefits: \$10.1 million to \$15.7 million.
  - Challenges: Wetlands, easements and downstream impacts.
  - Channel bypass
    - Goal: This bypass would redirect Six-Mile Creek’s flows around Brookings.
    - Cost estimate: \$48.8 million.
    - Proposed benefits: \$19.5 million to \$30.4 million
    - Challenges: This option would require two to three new structures. Other concerns include wetlands, property acquisition/easements, downstream impacts and, frankly, complexity.
  - Upstream detention
    - Goal: Detain water upstream. The dry dam would be north of the U.S. 14 Bypass, between Medary Avenue and Interstate 29.
    - Cost estimate: \$11.8 million.
    - Proposed benefits: \$18.7 million to \$29.2 million.
    - Challenges: High hazard dam classification, property acquisitions/easements and wetlands.
  - Levees
    - Goal: Protect homes and businesses from flood-water. Levees would be built near both of Six-Mile Creek’s channels.
    - Cost estimate: \$27.5 million.
    - Proposed benefits: \$19.2 million to \$29.9 million.
    - Challenges: Complexity, no question. Also, levee classification along with land acquisition/easement.
- Don’t feel alone if the mind-boggling cost estimates leave you a bit rattled.

That’s why grant options are being pursued, including, Richter said, two in particular: A hazard mitigation grant and a BRIC grant.

The BRIC grant is more competitive, but South Dakota also provides a contribution, he said. Normally, the hazard mitigation grant is a 75-25 split, while the BRIC is either an 80-20 or 85-15 split, depending on what percent the state contributes, which, Richter said, could be 5% or 10%.

Furthermore, additional refinement of the five mitigation options is likely — a solution, for example, could be one of the five options, or a hybrid of two or more options, according to Richter.

“As you can see, these solutions are pretty extensive both in cost and magnitude,” he said. “We are working with FEMA right now — with their technical assistance portion — to navigate that. It’s not every day that communities tackle projects such as this.”

He continued, “We don’t take these options very lightly. There’s obstacles with each one of them that we need to navigate, and we’ll have to carefully navigate that so that everyone’s interest is realized.”

The upstream water detention option drew the attention of Councilor Bonny Specker, who asked about the potential impact on the city’s wellhead field.

Eric Witt, the water and engineering manager for Brookings Municipal Utilities, said it would put water over the city’s wellhead protection area — but that already happens.

“My understanding is

that, as a dry dam, it’s not retaining the water there permanently; it would just increase the depth of the flood event and then meter itself back out,” he noted.

“That’s an area that definitely floods already, so I have that circumstance with a flood event now.

“There’s been times that there’s been 4 feet of water over that whole area, let’s say. If we do a dry dam and it retains more to protect the downstream creek channel through town, maybe it goes up to 6 feet,” he continued. “I don’t know what the incremental difference in risk to the wellhead is for that additional volume of water that’s retained there, but as that event goes through just like any other flood event, it will drain back out and function like a normal creek.”

Witt said he’s not necessarily opposed to the detention option due to the occasional water issues at that location he’s already dealing with, but he would want an evaluation and more details before committing to the upstream detention.

Beyond the Six-Mile Creek floodwater mitigation options, discussion also centered briefly on plans to develop a maintenance program along the creek. It’ll start small, but could grow from there.

“The area west of the Western Avenue bridge is being targeted for debris removal possibly this fall, with a possible larger project in the future,” Richter said.

# STATE: Former employees allegedly stole from SD gov.

financial assistance requests for children in the state’s care, intercepted the checks, deposited them into an account she controlled, and transferred the money to her personal account.

The former employee, Lonna Carroll, is charged with aggravated grand theft.

Althoff said new measures include stricter supervisory approval processes, such as a two-person protocol to ensure no

single employee has unchecked control over financial transactions. Another addition is the appointment of a full-time internal controls officer, a role created to continuously monitor and refine the department’s processes.

Similarly, the Department of Revenue is taking steps to address internal vulnerabilities after a former employee allegedly used her position to create 13 fake vehicle titles, which she then used to secure approximately \$400,000 in loans. That employee, Sandra

O’Day, has since died. Another former Department of Revenue employee is being investigated for separate but similar allegations, according to The Dakota Scout.

Kristen Jasper, chief legal counsel for the Department of Revenue, discussed the department’s new efforts.

“Internal controls are a living document,” Jasper said. “They need to be constantly reviewed and updated as things change.”

Initiatives include an anonymous reporting system that allows

employees to report suspicious activities without fear of reprisal. Additionally, the department has ramped up its internal training programs, and is looking to hire a full-time internal controls officer like the Department of Social Services.

Meanwhile, Althoff said he would look into setting up an anonymous tip line for his department.

The Board of Internal Control reviewed recent state audit findings and updates on various

departments’ internal controls.

The 2023 audit highlighted weaknesses in the Department of Social Services. It found inadequate controls over the payment of claims, allowing the same individual to both initiate and approve transactions without a secondary review.

The legislative Government Operations and Audit Committee has said it will meet in October and December to review the alleged criminal activity in both departments.

## Consider fall leaves a gift from nature

Put fall leaves to work in your landscape. This valuable resource makes a great mulch in planting beds, adds organic matter and nutrients to the soil, provides habitat for many beneficial insects, and is insulation for ground-dwelling queen bumblebees, toads, and more.

Leave any disease-free leaves in garden beds but pull them away from the trunks of trees and stems of shrubs. Mulch piles against trunks or stems create a moist environment that is more subject to rot and disease. It also provides a hiding place next to these plants for voles that feed on bark over winter.

Avoid thick layers of leaves, six or more inches deep, in garden beds. They can block sunlight and smother the plants below. Pull leaves off the crowns of perennials and move the excess leaves to gardens with little or no mulch.

Use your mower to recycle fall leaves that land on the lawn. As you mow the grass you'll shred the leaves into smaller pieces. If they are the size of a quarter or smaller your lawn will be fine. As these leaf pieces decompose, they add organic matter and nutrients to the soil.

When the lawn is overwhelmed with leaves burn a few extra calories and rake them into nearby planting beds. Whole leaves provide the best habitat for overwintering insects. Spread the leaves over the soil surface to help insulate the roots, conserve moisture, suppress weeds, and improve the soil as it breaks down.

If your garden beds are already filled with leaves or this is not practical, attach the bagger to the mower to shred and collect the excess leaves on the lawn. Only use grass clippings collected from lawns and leaves not treated with a weed killer this fall.

Dig extra shredded leaves into vacant annual flower and vegetable gardens or incorporate them into the soil as you prepare new planting beds. They will break down over winter, improving the drainage in heavy clay soils and increasing the water-holding ability in fast-draining soils.

Bag shredded leaves you want to save for next season. Tuck them out of sight for winter under trees or around the foundation of your house for added insulation.

Create compost with fall leaves, plant-based kitchen scraps, and other landscape trimmings. Do not use meat, bones or dairy that can attract rodents, charcoal ash, and human, pet or bird droppings that may contain disease organisms. Avoid diseased and insect-infested plant debris, perennial weeds, and weeds gone to seed. These can survive in compost piles that don't produce sufficient heat to kill them and end up back in the garden in the compost.

Oak and large maple leaves make great mulches and additions to the compost pile but break down slowly. Shred them with your mower or leaf shredder first for quicker results.

You can compost black walnut, laurel, and eucalyptus leaves that contain chemicals toxic to other plants. Shred them first to speed decomposition and when they are fully decomposed the compost is safe to use in the garden.


As you begin putting the fall leaves to work in your landscape you will start considering them a gift, not a curse, from nature.

## Trooper named Hero of the Year

PIERRE — Trooper John Berndt was awarded Hero of the Year on Sept. 20 at the National Promenade of The Society of the Forty Men and Eight Horses, more commonly known as The Forty and Eight.

Berndt was recognized as the 40 and 8 Hero of the Year by Voiture 146 in Aberdeen, in April. He was then selected as the state Hero of the Year, and most recently, chosen as the national award recipient from among many other state finalists.

The state trooper from Aberdeen was shot at when he responded to an incident during the 2023 Sturgis Motorcycle Rally.

"The 40 and 8 is a large group of Veterans from around the United States, Canada, Germany and France. A significant number of veterans in this organization were sent thousands of miles from their families and have seen the gruesome reality of war that I cannot even imagine," Berndt said. "I was in a life-or-death event that lasted for several minutes, then I stayed in my own bed that night. The fact this group of veterans would find my event "heroic" is humbling to say the least."

The purpose of the award is to recognize and pay tribute to a person who, without hesitation or regard for their own safety, demonstrates an unselfish desire to aid others. The plaque presented to Berndt states, "The Society of the Forty Men and Eight Horses proudly present this award in recognition of his quick thinking and bravery which resulted in apprehending a dangerous criminal."

The titles and symbols of The Forty and Eight are in French, derived from the experiences of U.S. troops during World War I. American soldiers were transported to the front on the French rail system. Cramped into narrow gauge boxcars, each stenciled with "40 Hommes/8 Chevaux," denoting its capacity to hold either 40 men or 8 horses. This uncomfortable mode of transportation was familiar common experience for every Doughboy that fought in the trenches; a mutual small misery among American soldiers. Thereafter, they found "40/8" a lighthearted symbol of the deeper service, unspoken horrors and shared sacrifice that bind all who have endured combat.

## Harris continues to dodge the border issue

■ The vice presidents "leadership" on the border issue lacks substance.

Entertainment legend Oprah Winfrey recently held a star-studded town hall for Vice President Kamala Harris. It took place in Farmington Hills, Michigan, in a key swing state, but celebrities from


around the world connected via Zoom to help celebrate Harris' last-minute candidacy for president. Meryl Streep, Julia Roberts, Chris Rock, Jennifer Lopez, Ben Stiller and others joined in.

Don't confuse anything that happened with the kind of scrutiny candidates undergo when they hold town halls under real campaign conditions. No, in this case, Winfrey's first question was, "Can you feel the joy rising here?" (Harris said she could.) After that, Winfrey said, "It seems to us that something happened to you the moment Joe Biden stepped aside and withdrew his candidacy, that a veil or something dropped and you just stepped into your power."

And so on. The event was part love fest, part pep rally. Harris said almost nothing of consequence because 1. her entire approach to the campaign is to avoid saying anything of consequence, and 2. it wasn't that kind of event. So rather than go through Harris' various statements, it might be a good idea to take another look at her way of avoiding any substantive discussion of her record on what is one of the top three issues in the campaign — the border.

About 40 minutes into the event,

a man named Justin rose and said to Harris, "When you become president, what would be your specific steps to strengthening the border?" It was one of the few real questions of the day.

"So it's a wonderful and important question," Harris said. "You know my background was as a prosecutor, and I was also the elected attorney general for two terms of a border state, so this is not a theoretical issue for me. This is something I've actually worked on. I have prosecuted transnational criminal organizations for the trafficking of guns, drugs and human beings. I take very seriously the importance of having a secure border and ensuring the safety of the American people."

The credentials Harris claims to have on the border predate her time in the Senate and in the vice presidency. She does not cite anything she has done in the White House as proof that she could secure the border as president. She continued: "Sadly, where we are now can be traced most recently back to the fact that when the United States Congress, members of the Congress, including some of the most conserva-

tive Republicans, came up with a border security bill, and here's what the border security bill would have done. It would have put 1,500 more border agents at the border. Let me tell you, those border agents are working around the clock. It would have just been about giving them some support and relief, which is probably why the border agents actually endorsed the bill. ..."

Harris continued: "The bill would have allowed us to have more resources to prosecute transnational criminal organizations, and it would have been part of the solution. And Donald Trump called up those folks and said don't put that bill on the floor for a vote. He blocked the bill ... because he'd prefer to run on a problem instead of fixing a problem." The room erupted into applause. "And this again gets to the point about what does leadership really look like — is it about you or is it about the people?"

At that point, Winfrey stepped in and said, "So to answer Justin's question, now that that bill has gone and hasn't passed, will you reintroduce that?"

"Absolutely," Harris answered. "And when I am elected president of the United States I will make sure that bill gets to my desk and I will sign it into law."

It was an absolutely surreal moment, as is every moment Harris addresses the border issue. The bill, which she has made the centerpiece of her case on the border, was introduced in the Senate on Feb. 4, 2024. Yes, this year. It died in the Senate in May. It was never introduced, and would never have passed, in the House of Representatives. In the Senate, most

Republicans opposed the bill in part because, even though it would have done some good things, it would also have regularized massive, daily flows of illegal crossers into the United States, which is specifically the problem Congress needed to stop, not normalize.

Here's the thing: President Joe Biden and Harris took office on Jan. 20, 2021. They opened the door to illegal border crossers, and millions came into the United States. It went on through 2021, through 2022, through 2023. Only when an election year came around did they make any noise about "securing" the border.

Now, the entirety of Harris' border security agenda is to somehow revive the bill and somehow get it passed in both Senate and House. And then she will bring about border security by signing it into law.

That is simply not a serious position. It's a dodge, a deflection — and a totally transparent one at that. Harris claims signing a bill would show what leadership really looks like. But she has been in a position of leadership for nearly four years, and for all that time her administration has sought to accommodate, not to stem, the flow of millions of illegal border crossers into the United States.

And yet that is the only case Kamala Harris makes for what she claims would be her "leadership" on the border. Yes, it's unreasonable to expect serious policy discussion during an Oprah cheer-leading party. But Harris has not offered any more substance anywhere else, either. At this point, it seems obvious that she doesn't plan to say anything more before Election Day.

Tiny bones begin to form in the arms and legs, and vocal cords begin to develop in the 13th week.

The South Dakota Department of Health "2022 Report of Induced Abortions" lists the "multiple reasons" officially given for induced abortions. The most common reason stated in 63.9% to 70.4% of the cases (2018-2022): "mother did not desire to have the child."

The next most common reason (46.4% to 51.8% of the cases): "mother could not afford the child."

During 2018-2022, 75.3% of aborted babies were of "gestational age" 10 weeks or younger, well within the

first trimester. Amendment G would consecrate in our South Dakota Constitution right to abort babies on this type of scale — unending, and with "no prohibitions."

Amendment G has no regard for the God-given innocence and purity of unborn babies.

President Ronald Reagan stated in Human Life Review, 1983: "Abraham Lincoln recognized that we could not survive as a free land when some men could decide that others were not fit to be free and should therefore be slaves.

## Helene's winds batter Florida

CRAWFORDVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Tropical storm force winds began battering Florida on Thursday as Hurricane Helene prepared to make landfall, with forecasters warning that the enormous storm could create a “nightmare” surge along the coast and churn up damaging winds hundreds of miles inland across much of the southeastern U.S.

Helene, which has already strenthened to a major Category 3 storm, was expected to get even more powerful ahead of its evening landfall on Florida’s north-western coast. Hurricane and flash flood warnings extend far beyond the coast up into northern Georgia and western North Carolina.

The storm's wrath was starting to be felt Thursday afternoon, with water lapping over a road on the northern tip of Siesta Key near Sarasota and covering some intersections in St. Pete Beach along Florida’s Gulf Coast. Lumber and other debris from a fire in Cedar Key a week ago was crashing ashore in the rising water. And winds of up to 125 mph have already left around 180,000 Florida homes and businesses without power.

Beyond Florida, up to 10 inches of rain has fallen in the North Carolina mountains, with up to 14 (36 centimeters) more possible before the deluge ends, setting the stage for flooding that forecasters warned could be worse than anything seen in the past century.

With forecasters also warning of

tornadoes and mudslides, the governors of Florida, Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia have all declared emergencies, as did President Joe Biden for several of the states.

He is sending the head of the Federal Emergency Management Agency to Florida on Friday to view the damage.

Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis said Thursday morning that models suggest Helene will make landfall further east than earlier forecast, lessening the chances for a direct hit on the capital city of Tallahassee, whose metro area has a population of around 395,000.

The shift has the storm aimed squarely at the sparsely-populated Big Bend area, home to fishing villages and vacation hideaways where Florida’s Panhandle and peninsula meet.

“Please write your name, birthday, and important information on your arm or leg in a PERMANENT MARKER so that you can be identified and family notified,” the sheriff’s office in mostly rural Taylor County warned those who chose not to evacuate in a Facebook post, the dire advice similar to what other officials have dolled out during past hurricanes.

Still, Philip Tooke, a commercial fisherman who took over the business his father founded near the region’s Apalachee Bay, plans to ride out this storm like he did during Hurricane Michael and the others – on his boat. “If I lose that, I don’t have anything.”

Many, though, were heeding the mandatory evacuation orders that stretched from the Panhandle south along the Gulf Coast in low-lying areas around Tallahassee, Gainesville, Cedar Key, Lake City, Tampa and Sarasota.

Among them was Sharonda Davis, one of several gathered at a Tallahassee shelter worried their mobile homes wouldn’t withstand the winds. She said the hurri-

cane’s size is “scarier than anything because it’s the aftermath that we’re going to have to face.”

Federal authorities were staging search-and-rescue teams as the National Weather Service office in Tallahassee forecast storm surges of up to 20 feet and warned they could be particularly “catastrophic and unsurvivable” in Apalachee Bay.

#### Son accused of killing father, stepmother, stepbrother

(AP) — A New York man accused of killing his father, his stepmother and his stepbrother in Vermont earlier this month appeared in court in Lake George on Thursday and waived having an extradition hearing, according to the district attorney.

Brian Crossman Jr., 23, of Granville, New York, faces three counts of aggravated murder in the fatal shootings of Brian Crossman Sr., 46, Erica Pawlusiak Crossman, 41, and Colin Taft, 13, in their Pawlet, Vermont, home on Sept. 15, state police said. He will be moved to Vermont to face charges.

The investigation found significant evidence linking Crossman Jr. to the killings, including digital information, statements, injuries and various interviews, Vermont State Police said. His public defender representing him in New York did not return a phone message seeking comment.

A search of his cell phone found multiple internet searches related to serial killers and unresolved murders, police said. Relatives told police that he had a troubled relationship with his father because of Crossman Jr.’s mental health and learning disability.

He was spending the weekend with his father and stepmother while his mother was out of town, according to a police affidavit. He called police shortly before 4 a.m. Sunday to report that he had found the three family members shot, and that the residence was covered in blood, police said.

He then agreed to meet with Vermont State Police Corporal Joseph Duca who said when they met, Crossman Jr.’s clothes

were covered in blood, according to the affidavit.

Crossman Jr. said he his clothes had blood on them because he tried to drag his deceased father outside of the house and load him into a utility vehicle to take him to his grandmother’s house across the road, police said.

Police said they found multiple guns and ammunition around the house as they were investigating the killings, including a semi-automatic handgun on an area rug in the mudroom, a 12-gauge shotgun on a table in the dining area, another shotgun on a couch, and an open firearm cabinet and firearm safe.

Crossman Jr. was admitted to a mental health unit of the Glens Falls Hospital on Sept. 15, according to police. New York State Police arrested him on Sept. 19, and he made an initial court appearance in Warren County Court on a charge of being a fugitive from justice on Friday. He is being held without bail.

#### Man arrested for running a motorcycle off the road in Montana

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — A Montana man has been arrested after witnesses said he intentionally and repeatedly swerved his car at three motorcycles in south-central Montana, running one off the road and killing its driver, officials in Carbon County said.

Prosecutors want to charge Michael J. Gambale with one count of deliberate homicide and three counts of attempted deliberate homicide, according to a motion filed Wednesday in state District Court in Red Lodge. He was arrested in Cody, Wyoming, on Tuesday afternoon and faces an extradition hearing there on

Friday, court officials said.

A silver car first tried to run two brothers off the road while they were riding their motorcycles near the town of Rockvale early Tuesday afternoon, court records said. The car hit one of the riders on the leg, but they were able to avoid being forced off the road, they told investigators. One man reported the driver made a U-turn and traveled on the wrong side of the divided highway to pursue him, forcing him to jump a curb to avoid being struck.

The brothers described the driver as “yelling wildly” and flipping them off, court records said.

About 2:30 p.m. Tuesday, a silver car forced another motorcycle off the road near the town of Belfry, killing 70-year-old Martin Hans Peter from Switzerland, the sheriff’s office said. Peter’s passenger suffered “road rash” and was hospitalized in Billings.

When Gambale was arrested, his car had damage on the driver’s side and was missing a plastic cover for his passenger side mirror, court records said. A mirror cover was found at the scene of the fatal crash.

Gambale, who remained jailed in Cody on Thursday, also faces a hearing Friday on a Wyoming probation violation, officials said.

Gambale told investigators he believed he was being harassed by a motorcycle gang after encountering a motorcycle on Interstate 90 near Laurel, Montana, court records said. However, his version of events did not match witness statements, Carbon County Attorney Alex Nixon wrote in his motion to file the charges.

#### Giuliani disbarred in Washington, DC

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former New York City Mayor Rudy Giuliani was disbarred in Washington on Thursday, months after he lost his law license in New York for pursuing false claims that then-President Donald Trump made about his 2020 presidential election loss.

The brief ruling from Washington D.C.’s appeals court said Giuliani did not respond to an order to explain why he should not be disbarred in Washington after he was in New York last summer.

Ted Goodman, a spokesperson for Giuliani, called the decision “an absolute travesty and a total miscarriage of justice.” Giuliani has argued that he believed the claims he was making on behalf of the Trump campaign were true.

“Members of the legal community who want to protect the integrity of our justice system should immediately speak out against this partisan, politically motivated decision,” Goodman said in a text message.

It’s the latest blow to the man once lauded as “America’s mayor.” His advocacy of Trump’s false election claims has also led to criminal charges. He’s also facing financial ruin after a jury last year awarded \$148 million in damages to two former Georgia election workers who sued him for defamation over lies he spread about them in 2020.

Giuliani was one of the most vocal defenders of Trump in 2020, pushing

unsubstantiated claims of large-scale voter fraud in the election the Republican lost to President Joe Biden.

Giuliani previously had his law license suspended in Washington. A review panel last year recommended that he be disbarred over claims in a Pennsylvania lawsuit seeking to overturn Trump’s loss there.

Giuliani “claimed massive election fraud but had no evidence,” the panel wrote.

The former Georgia election workers — Wandrea “Shaye” Moss and her mother, Ruby Freeman, asked a court last month to force Giuliani to turn over his New York apartment, any remaining cash and some of his prized New York Yankees memorabilia, including three World Series rings and a signed shirt of player Joe DiMaggio.

#### Charges against gas station attendant thrown out

DETROIT (AP) — The Michigan Court of Appeals threw out a manslaughter charge against a Detroit gas station clerk who locked the door before an angry customer shot three bystanders, killing one.

Prosecutors have argued that clerk Al-Hassan Aiyash’s actions make him criminally responsible. But the appeals court said an involuntary manslaughter charge doesn’t fit.

It was “not reasonably foreseeable” that the customer, Samuel McCray, would pull out a gun and start shooting, the court said Wednesday.

Aiyash was working behind protective glass at 3 a.m. when McCray’s failed attempt to make a \$3.80 electronic purchase turned into violence in May 2023.

Video showed McCray repeatedly cursing and insisting he was going to leave the gas station with the items. Three more people entered before Aiyash pushed a button to lock the door, keeping the four inside.

The door was eventually unlocked. But before anyone left, one person was fatally shot and two more were wounded.

Prosecutors seeking to keep the case on track cited a groundbreaking 2023 legal precedent that cleared the way for charges against the parents of Michigan school shooter Ethan Crumbley. Authorities said their son’s actions were foreseeable.

The appeals court, however, said the Crumbley case is not a match.

“Holding a defendant criminally liable for a third party’s intentional misconduct remains the exception, not the rule,” the court said in a 3-0 opinion.


The prosecutor’s office could ask the Michigan Supreme Court to take an appeal. “We are currently deciding on next steps,” spokesperson Maria Miller said.

McCray, meanwhile, faces trial in October on murder and attempted murder charges.

In response to what happened, the Detroit City Council prohibited businesses from remotely locking a door when customers are present. The ordinance applies to businesses whose workers are protected by security glass.

Sept. 19, 1942 - Sept. 25, 2024

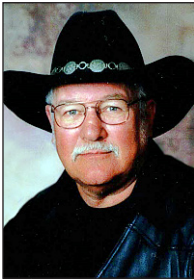

## Cowboys win 7th straight over Giants, 20-15

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Dak Prescott threw one of his two touchdown passes to CeeDee Lamb and the Dallas Cowboys taunted the Giants yet again, winning 20-15 on Thursday night for their seventh straight victory over New York and 14th in 15 games.

Prescott, who has won his last 13 starts against the Giants, hit running back Rico Dowdle on a 15-yard screen pass for a touchdown to put Dallas ahead in the first quarter. He then found Lamb for a 55-yard catch-and-run TD on a play that ended with the receiver being called for taunting.

Lamb slipped past two defenders and trotted into the end zone. He then fired the ball in their direction and flexed his muscles, drawing an unsportsmanlike-conduct penalty.

Prescott finished 22 of 27 for 221 yards, while Lamb had seven catches for 98 yards.

Brandon Aubrey kicked field goals of 60 and 40 yards for Dallas (2-2), which came into the game with major concerns after being thoroughly beaten at home by New Orleans and Baltimore. A new issue for the Cowboys is an apparent leg injury to star pass rusher Micah Parsons, who was carted off the field in the fourth quarter.

Greg Joseph kicked field goals of 52, 41, 38, 22 and 42 for the Giants (1-3), who controlled the ball for 35:37 but failed to score a touchdown at home for the second straight game. They had two field goals in a 28-6 loss to Minnesota in their opener.

What hurt New York was its inability to run against the league's worst rush defense. Dallas been giving up an average of 185.7 yards, but it held the Giants to 26 yards on 24 carries, a 1.1-yard average.

Daniel Jones' arm kept this one close. He completed 29 of 40 passes for 281 yards, finding sensational rookie Malik Nabers 12 times for 115 yards and Wan'Dale Robinson 11 times for 71 yards. But the one thing he could not find was the end zone.

Nabers left late in the game with a concussion. Jones threw an interception on the Giants' final series after Aubrey missed a 51-yard field goal try — his first career miss from over 50 yards — to give New York one slim last shot.

If there was a bright spot for the Giants, they were at least competitive against a bitter rival. They lost last year's two games by an 89-17

margin.

The girls team won the opener 3-1 while the boys team lost the second game 3-1.

The Bobcats will return to action when they host Sioux Falls Washington at the Fishback Soccer Complex for a doubleheader beginning at 4 p.m. on Tuesday.

## GIRLS ■ Brookings 3, Sioux Falls Jefferson 1

The Bobcats won their fourth game in a row, defeating the Cavaliers in the opener of Thursday's doubleheader.

The recent hot streak has helped Brookings force their way into the Class AA playoff picture and head coach Adam Juba believes the momentum began when they defeated Huron 10-0 to begin the streak on Sept. 10.

"We went out and scored a bunch of goals and that really gave us

"Going into those three games, you want to be hopeful and say you're going to get three wins out of it but obviously, that didn't happen," Weber said. "But I'm proud of the boys in the way they've

battled in the last three games that made the other team work for it."

The Bobcats rattled off a five-game unbeaten streak midway through the season to put them in the conversation to earn a home playoff game but back-to-back losses to top-ranked Sioux Falls Lincoln and eighth-ranked O'Gorman put Brookings back on the bubble.

The Bobcats came out of the gate strong against the third-seeded Cavaliers when Forest Giard scored an unassisted goal but Jensen Hyronimus evened the game for Jefferson a few minutes later.

Anthony Hernandez Barrera scored for Jefferson to give them the lead with 15:10 left in the first half and the Cavaliers added two more goals, one from Caleb Brink and another by Hyronimus, to put the game away in the second half.

Still, Weber and the Bobcats left encouraged due to the effort throughout the game.

"There were just a couple little moments where we lacked a little bit of intensity defensively and they pounced on it," Weber said. "In the second

half, one goal came on a really good strike and then we were pushing forward and were going to give up space behind but they were just a little bit better in those moments."

Tony Nguyen made six saves for the Bobcats, who also had three corner kicks in the game.

Brayden Schreiber and Giard each had two shots with one on goal. Dominic Van Hofwegen had four shots with a shot on goal. Braeden Love had two shots. Keller Peterson and Connor Shelden each had a shot.

After falling to 5-4-2, the Bobcats will head down the final stretch of the season beginning with Tuesday's game against Washington. Weber hopes that his team will take what they've learned and apply it to the final games while also becoming motivated to finish the year strong.

"I want to see a reaction out of the boys," Weber said. "We're going to play two teams that aren't going to be as strong as the last three we've played. So, I want to see the same intensity that we brought to these higher-level teams over the final two games."
