\$2.5m price tag for Rustic Ridge

Wohlfords offer city 'first dibs' at golf course

Rustic Ridge Golf Course owners Kevin and Sandy Wohlford offered the 73.2 acre course and restaurant to the city of Eldridge for \$2.5 million, giving the city "first dibs" before offering it for development.

Kevin Wohlford told council members at Monday's meeting he was struggling

to keep up with loan payments, and weary from running a business that begins with golfers at daybreak and ends with diners sometimes past midnight.

"I can still do the work, and believe me, it is work that I love doing. But I am not going to last the 13 more years until this loan is paid off. I want to slow down," said Wohlford, 58.

Reading from a four-page prepared statement, Wohlford said loan payments for his purchase and several upgrades now total \$85,000 annually.

"They leave us little or nothing to

save for mowers that die, or new golf carts," he said.

Wohlford said he first golfed at the course in 1988, when it was owned by Bob Beert and Don Hamman. He moved his family to Eldridge in 1996, and joined the club in 1999. After

Bring on the ballots

Filing begins Monday for Iowa's first combined school/city Election Day

Candidate filing begins Monday, Aug. 26, for Iowa's first combined municipal and school elections, and no one knows what to expect.

Iowa lawmakers hoped the single election date would boost school election turnout and cut costs. Scott County records show the 2017 school board election cost \$61,846.77, and the municipal elections cost \$100,749.89.

County Auditor Roxanna Moritz expects the combined elections to shave about \$60,000 off this year's combined costs.

"Not everyone was in favor of this among Iowa's auditors. But I think it is definitely an ad-

West Lake hits mud bottom

Ignore the reek of dead fish, the crusty mud bottom and old tires. The \$5.4 million promise of a new West Lake Park is beginning to emerge.

The park's biggest lake, Lake of the Hills is but a puddle, where a lone angler tried to catch the last fish before excavation work that is the next step in the lake-bottom and bank restoration.

The draining of Blue Grass Lake, Lake of the Hills, Lambach Lake and Railroad Lake began July 15 and ended Aug. 15. Next comes an archeological study, and inspections by excavation bidders.

"Interested contractors can see when

all the lakes are down. Whoever gets the contract will keep the lake down to get the work done. It will switch over from the current contractor doing the draw-down, and the new contractor will do the in-lake work in October after the

bid," said Marc Miller, Scott County Conservation's deputy director.

The Scott County Conservation Board hired FYRA Engineering, in

vantage to taxpayers because you're not paying for two elections," she said. "Hopefully this will increase participation in school board races."

For North Scott schools, turnout can go nowhere but up.

The district peaked with 16-percent voter turnout in 2013's seven-candidate race for three spots. But 2015 and 2017 turnout hovered at about 2 percent among the district's 11,000 registered voters.

Meanwhile, municipal election turnout has varied wildly. Long Grove's contested 2017 election drew 58.4 percent of registered voters. But Eldridge recorded a 3.5-percent turnout in 2015's uncontested ballot.

The main turnout factor is the number of contested races. Long Grove scored a 51.6-percent turnout in 2013 when Michael Limberg beat incumbent Ida Weibel by seven votes. Princeton turnout exceeded 44 percent in 2013 when Keith Youngers beat Brent Herman by four votes. Blue Grass recorded a 33-percent turnout in 2013 when Brinson Kinzer beat Tim Brandenburg by a single vote.

Mayors run again

Eldridge mayor Marty O'Boyle said he intends to seek reelection. So does Long Grove mayor Limberg and McCausland mayor Buzz Koehn. Donahue mayor Ken Schoenthaler is seeking his eighth term after 28 years as mayor.

Riverdale mayor Mike Bawden said he's prepared to run, but would welcome a successor among interested residents.

Candidates can file through Sept. 19. Nomination papers, including petition forms are available through the Scott County Auditor, each city, and online at scottcountyiowa.com under the auditor section. Click on candidate resources.

Eldridge and LeClaire candidates need petitions with signatures from 25 registered voters in those towns. For all other small Scott County towns, just 10 signatures are needed.

"This will be a very busy election season," Moritz told 15 poll workers at an Aug. 16 training session. The change means a greater variety of ballots. For example, Walcott and Blue Grass ballots will include city and Davenport school candidates. Eldridge ballots will include North Scott school candidates. Some rural county ballots include only school candidates.

This election also will debut new voting equipment cages that keep ballots and scanners under lock and key at the polling place until Election Day. Moritz walked the pollworkers through new procedures that keep equipment more secure, but are intended mostly to expedite private delivery and pick up of equipment.

Moritz said contracted delivery crews will roll the cages into polling places a week before the election. They remain locked until Election Day, when the pollworkers report for 16-hour shifts.

Shifts begin an hour before polls open at 7 a.m. and conclude an hour after they close at 9 p.m. Pollworkers at last week's training asked if the shifts could be split, but Moritz said no.

"We can't do that. You have to sign in at the beginning and end, so we can document continuous oversight at each polling place," she said.

Some of those polling places are changing

About 25,000 registered voters will receive "voter acknowledgement cards," disclosing new polling places. Some, like Credit Island Lodge, remain inaccessible after flooding.

The county has moved all but two polling sites from schools because of security and access concerns. Davenport's North High School remains the only public school polling place. The Quad-City Seventh Day Adventist School at 4444 W. Kimberly Road, Davenport, is the only private school.

"We got out of schools because of 9/11. Some schools were not making it easy, and rightfully so. They have an obligation to keep students secure. That gets hard when you have to handle a few hundred voters at the same time," she said.

Thirty-two of the county's 67 polling

places are in churches; 21 are in publicly owned buildings, including the McCausland Community Center, and the Scott County Library in Eldridge. Eight are at fire stations.

She discounted the influence of church polling places on elections, noting that the buildings frequently hold community events and are welcoming to residents regardless of faith.

But she speculated that Iowa's caucus campaigns may influence the state's first-ever combined municipal-school elections. Although this year's elections are nonpartisan, Moritz said voter registration efforts by the 23 Democratic caucus campaigns may encourage more early voting and election day turnout by Democrats.

"Now you have tons of candidates out talking to a lot of Democrats. There's a heightened sense of elections because more people are out hitting the streets. I think that will drive the conversation and awareness that elections are going on," she said.

Riverdale mayor Mike Bawden discounted the influence of parties on city elections.

"In towns like Riverdale, you only get elected if you're a member of the 'fix the darned-road party,'" he said.

Up for election

North Scott Schools: Four of seven board seats are open, and incumbents Glen Keppy, Molly Bergfeld, Joni Dittmer and John Maxwell have announced plans to run again.

Eastern Iowa Community College: Five of nine seats are up this year. Board members are elected to four-year terms from geographic districts in Scott, Clinton and Muscatine counties. Up this year are seats held by these incumbents:

- District 3: Dr. Joe D'Souza, Davenport.
- District 4: Robert H. Gallagher, Bettendorf, board chairman.
- District 5: Bill Vetter, DeWitt.
- District 7: Kendra Beck, Maquoketa.
- District 9: Michelle Garvin, Muscatine.

Blue Grass: Two-year terms for mayor Larry Guy, and council members Brad Schutte, Bonnie Strong and Lisa Smith are up. Strong intends to run. Smith said she is not. "I'm looking to rerun in two years. With all the drama that happened, let someone else take over for a awhile," she told *The NSP*.

Buffalo: Terms are up for mayor Doug Anderson, and council members Joe Buffington and David Stickrod. Candidates have not indicated their re-election plans.

Dixon: The four-year council seats of appointees Jim Tweed and Diana Meyer are up this year. Both filled vacancies created by the resignations of elected council members, including Linda Thomas. Thomas was elected in a drawing after she and Bill Meyer's 2016 write-in campaigns tied with 12 votes each.

Dixon mayor Steve Laughlin's term runs through 2021.

Council incumbent Sue Motz is not up for election.

Donahue: The mayor and three council seats are up for election this year.

Mayor Ken Schoenthaler said he is running for his eighth term after serving 28 years. Council seats held by Adam Ganzer, Britney Carson and Tim Arp also are up for election.

Eldridge: Council seats held by elected incumbents Adrian Blackwell, Bernie Peeters and Steve Puls are up for election.

Peeters told *The NSP*, "I am planning to run one more time."

Resident Bruce Cheek has taken out nomination papers. Cheek is a retired Davenport police officer who has attended council meetings for at least two years.

LeClaire: Terms expire for mayor Ray Allen and council members Jason Wentland and Dennis Gerard.

Long Grove: The mayor and all five council seats are up for election. Mayor Michael Limberg said he will seek his third, two-year term.

Council members Andy Cook and Nancy Herrin are ending their four-year terms. Jon Drumm's two-year term ends this year.

Council members Brandon Cronise and Cindy Blinkinsop were appointed to vacancies and city code requires appointed seats to be on the ballot at the next regular election.

Maysville: Terms expire for mayor David Sindt and the council seats won in 2015 by Matthew Andrews and Kelly Johnson.

McCausland: Council members on Aug. 13 appointed Brian Holland to the council seat vacated by Danielle Whitcanack. That seat is among three up for election Nov. 5.

The council seats held by Lloyd Claussen and Joyce Williamson also are up for election, along with the mayor's spot.

Mayor Buzz Koehn said he intends to run again.

"I didn't know I was up," he said after being contacted by *The NSP*. Koehn is in his 10th year as mayor. Koehn first ran as a write-in council candidate, and the race ended in a tie. He lost the drawing, but a few months later was tapped by council to fill the mayor's vacancy. He's won election since then.

New Liberty: The seats won in 2015 by Mayor Ray Pratt and council members Shallane Krenz and Michael R. Zogg are up this year.

Panorama Park: The mayor and five council members serve two-year terms and all are up for election. Incumbents are mayor Ronald D. Rice, and council members Beth Elmore, David White, Jacque Krause, Mandi Lauritzson and Shawn Rice.

Princeton: Mayor Roger Woomert's position and three council seats are up for election.

Council members Kevin Kernan and Ann Geiger are at the end of their four-year terms.

The seat held by appointee Jami Stutting also is up. James Greenhill won that seat in 2015, then resigned. It was filled temporarily by Keith Youngers, and then by Stutting.

Riverdale: The mayor's position and three council seats are up for election. Mayor Mike Bawden says he's happy to run again, but would stand aside if other qualified candidates appear.

"I'm more than happy to serve again. But if there is anyone else in Riverdale who wants to get involved, I'm willing to help with the transition," he said.

The council seats held by Cheryl J. Channon, Douglas H. Littrel and Kelly Krell are up for election. Krell was appointed to fill the spot surrendered by Dean Halsey, who resigned after his election in 2015.

Walcott: Voters will fill three council positions, including the seats held by Lisa Mengler and Jacob Puck. The third seat was held by Tim Koehler, who resigned at the Aug. 5 meeting.

Long Grove offers \$215,000 for old bank

Council hopes old First Central office becomes new City Hall

Long Grove City Council members are offering \$215,000 to First Central State Bank in hopes of changing the bank's closed, 2,114-square-foot branch bank into the town's next city hall.

The offer is about 28 percent lower than the property's assessed value, which has remained just over \$300,000 since 2015. First Central closed the branch May 31.

Council members voted 4-0 for the offer. Member Cindy Blinkinsop was absent.

Limberg seemed optimistic the bank would accept the offer. He said the bank hopes to close the sale by Oct. 1.

The purchase will require council members to amend the city budget before using savings to pay for the building. That will require a public hearing, tentatively set for the council's Tuesday, Sept. 10 meeting.

Limberg said city staff functions will be on the bank's first floor, which includes a drive-up window suitable for dropping off utility or other payments. Council chambers will likely be in a lower level room, accessible through a walkout basement from the rear parking lot.

"The building is fully accessible, with parking in front and in back," Limberg said.

He added that one of the rooms will become a mayor's office, something the current city hall cannot accommodate.

The current city hall is a 1,238-square-foot former bank building built in 1908. Long Grove bought that building in 1990 for \$10,000 to serve as city hall. Limberg

said the city has been approached by a prospective buyer.

Cadda contract

Long Grove council members approved a contract with Scott County that requires residents to cover \$228,368 of a \$1.28 million resurfacing of Cadda Road.

The agreement will have Scott County pay for the work beginning yet this year and includes widening the shoulders about three feet.

Long Grove agreed to pay for resurfacing the portion of Cadda within city limits, or about 17.9 percent. The county agreed to allow Long Grove to make four annual, interest-free payments of \$57,091, 2020 through 2023.

New hiring policy

Council members voted 4-0 on a new hiring policy that defines the council's role in routine and emergency job filling.

The policy allows council to delegate interviewing and job descriptions to a designated city staff member, the mayor, and a council member most closely aligned to the job opening. For example, the council's street committee liaison and public works director would participate in interviewing snow plow drivers.

The policy also allows the council by vote to include more members in the interviewing process, or completely delegate it to a staffer.

It also allows the mayor to contract for interim services in emergencies. Any contract would require council approval.

Building inspector interview

The sole applicant for the city's new part-time building code compliance officer will be interviewed by council members Brandon Cronise and Cindy Blinkinsop, with help from current building inspector Giles Looney.

Council limits alley garbage pick up

Long Grove council members voted to keep heavy Republic garbage trucks off town alleys through most of the year, but allow alley pickup from the first snow through March.

Public works director Tony Saladino directed the private waste haulers off some Long Grove alleys because of his concerns about wear and tear through the wet spring. Saladino said other Scott County towns have eliminated alley pickup.

Residents David Hoffman and David Amhof asked the council in July to intervene. Both own homes in the 200 block of North First Street and said they've relied on convenient alley pick up for years.

Both said they struggled to roll garbage bins over their broad, hilly front lawns for pickup on First Street.

"It's what you did for at least 35 years I've been here," Hoffman said. "I don't agree we should be put at a disadvantage," Amhof told the council.

Council members voted 4-0 to allow alley pick up through the winter. For the rest of the year, those residents can stage trash and recycling bins at the end of the alley for pickup.

Both residents acknowledged that helps a bit. But neither understood the need for change.

"Give us the rest of the summer," Hoffman said. "If the alley starts breaking up, then we've got a problem."

The council disagreed, changed the pickup policy and agreed to review their decision next March.

The job description calls for inspecting buildings, issuing permits, responding to nuisance complaints, advising the council and helping out with minor maintenance. The city expects the job will require four to 20 hours per week. Applicants need a high school diploma, driver's license, and ability to obtain electrical inspection certification within the first year. It also requires an ability to earn plumbing and mechanical certifications, but does not give a time frame.

Financial exam

Council members contracted again with accountant Tom Engelmann to provide the annual financial exam, a mandatory accounting review that falls short

of a full audit. Clerk Rose Guyer said Engelmann was the only bidder, probably because of his familiarity with the city's old accounting software programs. She said upgrades to new programs likely will draw more bidders next year.

Payroll switch

Guyer said Long Grove is ready to bring payroll services back in house after about a year. The council had contracted for payroll services after the suspension of former public works director Joel McCubbin. Then it ordered new accounting software and provided training so that Guyer can manage payroll with council oversight.

Fire up the ovens for Donahue Apple Pie contest

Donahue will be holding its annual Frontier Day event on Sunday, Sept. 1, and one of the day's activities will be the popular Apple Pie Contest.

Pies must be made from scratch, double crust (lattice crust is acceptable) and baked in an 8- or 9-inch aluminum pan that will not be returned.

Filling must be made with fresh or frozen apples, and no canned filling. All pies entered become the property of the Donahue Day Committee.

The contest is open to juniors up to age 18 and seniors 19 and over. Please enter your pie between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. at the Donahue Sportsmen's Park on the south edge of town. Your name, address and phone number should accompany each entry, and only one pie per person will be accepted.

Cash prizes for first (\$75), second (\$65) and third (\$50) will be awarded in each age division. Two local judges and a mystery judge will judge the pies starting at 1 p.m. The pies will then be auctioned off later in the afternoon, with all proceeds going to the Donahue Fire Department and Donahue Sportsmen's Club.

The Internet and social media are wonderful educational tools for students of all ages, but the information super highway is littered with detours and danger zones.

As a way to help parents and teachers navigate the digital age, North Scott residents are invited to “An Evening With Paul Davis,” a community-wide event hosted by the Pleasant Valley School District on Monday, Aug. 26 in the Pleasant Valley High School auditorium.

Parents, educators, community members and children age 12 and up are invited to attend. The presentation begins at 6:30 p.m.

“We have absolutely dealt with social media issues at North Scott, and this is a great forum for parents to find out what is out there,” said North Scott High School principal Shane Knoche. “I would recommend to all my friends that they attend for their kids’ sake, and as a principal, I would want all of the parents in my district to attend the session as well.”

Davis is a world-known expert who empowers parents and educates children about Internet safety. His expertise includes information on Instagram, Snapchat, Facebook, Twitter, online privacy, sexting, child pornography, hand held devices, cyberbullying and overall digital safety.

He has presented to the Canadian Border Police, the Central Ontario Crime Prevention Association, as well as to more than 560,000 students and 2,500 principals/school leaders.

Davis is no stranger to the area. He first spoke at Pleasant Valley two years ago, and last year the Bettendorf and North Scott districts hired him to speak to students, parents and teachers.

“If you spend anytime online, you should attend,” said North Scott School Board member Molly Bergfeld, who has heard Davis speak on two occasions. “If you have children of *any* age, you *must* attend.”

“As a parent and school board member, offering education to students and parents about online safety is critical to preventing situations that could have lifelong consequences.”

Pleasant Valley officials are hoping for a packed house.

“We want to show the community that we can pull together to help everyone be safe, informed and positive citizens,” said Beth Campbell, an Eldridge resident who is an innovation technology coach at Pleasant Valley. “Not only digitally, but face-to-face.”

“We have found his information to be powerful, relevant, necessary and integral to our school system as we continue to navigate the complicated world of social media, digital footprints, and the Internet.”

“Our young people are all digital natives who have grown up with the Internet,” continued Campbell. “It’s the only world they know. While the Internet has incredible opportunities for us to learn, grow and connect with others, we need to give our young people information and boundaries to insure that they are safe their entire life.”

all of the kids like our own. That’s the important part for me.”

Campbell said it’s important to make sure that students know that their digital footprint is permanent.

“I always tell students I work with that parents who have rules and boundaries do so because they love their children,” she said. “We teach our children how to cross the street safely and make them go to Driver’s Ed before they can drive a car. Why wouldn’t we prepare them for the digital world?”

“I revamp our curriculum every year to insure that we are being as thorough, complete and up-to-date as possible,” she continued. “School networking safety is Paul’s job, and he spends the entire year speaking to groups, organizations and schools across North America.”

In addition to the community event, he’ll be speaking to all Pleasant Valley sixth-, seventh- and eighth-graders during his stay, while also facilitating a meeting with community law enforcement officials, educators and mental health leaders.

hearing sales rumors, he and his father Bill created Tri-Sports Inc., and bought the business in 2001.

"I mortgaged my house up to 90 percent. I liquidated my pension plan. I recruited my father for half. I sold my boat. I scratched up every dollar I could find," he said.

The purchase left him with a \$1.2 million debt that he's paid down for 18 years.

He said he approached the city first with hopes it could stay a golf club.

"I do not want it to go down that I jumped the gun and sold it to somebody like Mel Foster, or Ruhl and Ruhl, or Tim Dolan or Craig Windmiller and never told the city of Eldridge first," he said. "This is me giving the city first dibs."

Council members listened attentively and thanked Wohlford. "This is a lot of information to try to consume. I appreciate you bringing it forward," council member Brian Dockery said.

Mayor Marty O'Boyle agreed.

"This is quite a surprise. I'm sure this decision didn't come easily. I appreciate you giving us an opportunity. You laid it out pretty decently. This is a good amenity for the city," O'Boyle said.

Wohlford confessed a bit of heartbreak. "This has been a blessing. I love to work outside, hear people laughing and having fun at the course."

The commercially zoned land has an assessed value of \$656,930, down 2.8 percent from 2016, according to Scott County Assessor records.

Wohlford said he upgraded the well, irrigated fairways and built six new tees in 2006, and added a 9,500-square-foot asphalt parking lot in 2007. He also added fencing, and a water tower sign visible from U.S. 61.

Yes to Slopertown, no to Cody Road

Council members agreed to formalize a partnership with the county to resurface Slopertown Road, including a 0.4 mile stretch in Eldridge. The work already is under way as part of McCarthy Improvement's \$2.2 million contract with the county to resurface Slopertown and Cadda roads. Eldridge will cover \$72,000 of the Slopertown improvements.

Council members declined the county's offer to split resurfacing of Cody Road, from 210th Street north to LeClaire Road. Scott County's Secondary Roads Department asked Eldridge to cover \$500,000 of the \$1.2 million project, representing about 42 percent of the

road that goes through Eldridge.

Council member Steve Puls said the city has more pressing road needs.

"We have roads within our city with no hard surface. I wouldn't be comfortable spending funds for something with such light traffic," he said.

City administrator John Dowd said the latest Iowa Department of Transportation traffic estimates show just 340 vehicles per day. "The traffic count is a pretty small number for that big of an investment," Dowd said.

Council member Dockery said it might be worth the investment if the city also planned sewer line extension to attract development. "This is a tough one to justify unless it opens up a growth pattern zone," he said.

The three other council members present agreed. "I don't see the need now to prioritize this," Frank King said.

Dockery said the council members should decide to seal coat the road, "or let it go back to gravel."

Council declines Bettendorf project

Eldridge will not allow Genesis Health Systems and its nonprofit senior living partner to use Eldridge to obtain low-interest, tax free loans for a Bettendorf retirement complex.

Council members Steve Puls, Frank King, Bernie Peeters and Brian Dockery had no enthusiasm for the deal. Council member Adrian Blackwell was absent.

"I think it's a bad idea," King said. "The city shouldn't use its resources for a company to compete against a company in our town."

Representatives from Grand Haven Retirement Center thanked council members for declining the deal.

A bonding attorney on Aug. 5 asked council members to invoke a seldom used Iowa tax law that allows municipalities to share up to \$10 million in tax-free borrowing capacity with a private, nonprofit project within eight miles of city limits. Genesis and Wellspire plan to break ground this fall on a \$30 million complex of apartments, assisted living and nursing care.

The Iowa tax law was intended to allow cities to support development of non-profit medical, fitness or other facilities. The law says taxpayers would never be responsible for the debt. But

the borrower would get a lower interest rate, and the investors would enjoy tax-free interest.

The bond attorney had asked the council to expedite the request in order to meet the project's financing deadlines. On Monday, council members dismissed the hurry-up request.

"I'm much more comfortable supporting our in-town facility," Puls said.

East Lomar roadwork

Council members agreed to spend \$21,923 to seal coat a one-block section of crumbling Lomar Street, and install storm water tiles to capture water discharged by homeowners' sump pumps.

The winter's hard freeze and spring's heavy rains destroyed the road built in the mid 1960s and annexed into Eldridge as Fellner's addition.

City administrator Dowd said a high water table keeps sump pumps humming for seven homeowners on the street.

"The drainage from sump pumps along the street only added to the damage on the sealcoat surface," Dowd wrote in a memo to council members.

Engelbrecht Farms Inc. will run an 8-inch tile down the center of the road and connect it directly to the seven private sump pumps, then grade and seal coat the road.

Townsend Farms plat renewed

Council members gave Mel Foster one more year to develop Townsend Farms Phase III, but said they want to see construction before extending the preliminary plat again.

The council voted 4-0 for a one-year extension on a preliminary plat first approved in 2017, then renewed for a year in 2018, and again Monday.

Two teens face adult felonies for Eldridge armed robbery

A 15-year-old Eldridge boy was robbed at gunpoint early Monday afternoon, and two suspects were arrested shortly thereafter.

Eldridge officers were called to the 900 block of West Maple Court at approximately 12:35 p.m. in reference to an armed robbery. Two subjects approached the 15-year-old and displayed a black revolver. They demanded money and the victim's cell phone.

They then fled in a vehicle toward Davenport. Eldridge officers and Scott

Soccer field donation from Lewis

Eldridge's new soccer fields are being leveled with a gift of 66 loads of top soil from Lewis Machine and Tool, valued at about \$4,000, said council member Puls, a liaison to the park board.

The top soil left from Lewis' plant construction on Eldridge's far east side will level playing and parking areas for the new soccer fields by the Buttermilk lagoons, on the city's far west side.

Side yard pool variance

Council members learned the city's Board of Adjustment:

Granted a variance to Garrett Hamilton to put a swimming pool in a side yard of his home at 3200 S. 25th Ave. Eldridge code limits pools to back yards. The property fronts Scott Park Road at 25th Avenue, with a driveway off East Lomar in the Fellner Addition, leaving insufficient backyard space. The variance allows Hamilton to work with the Eldridge building inspector to locate the pool on east or west side of the property.

Approved Steven Sinn's continued use of his home at 311 W. Pine St., for a gun repair and modification business. Sinn purchased the home in 1978 and has been operating the business for at least 25 years, council member Dockery said. City staff learned of the zoning concern when the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms requested zoning verification. The board heard from two neighborhood residents opposed and one supporting the business in a residential area before unanimously approving Sinn's request.

County deputies located and stopped the subjects' vehicle in the 300 block of West Slopertown Road. A black, loaded .22 caliber revolver was located, along with cash.

Two 17-year-old males from Davenport were taken into custody, and both were charged with one count of 1st degree robbery, a class B felony; one count of going armed with intent, a class D felony; and one count of carrying weapons, an aggravated misdemeanor.

The two suspects are being charged as adults and were turned over to the custody of the Scott County Jail.

Officers are continuing to investigate the incident.

North Scott teacher Chris Baldwin, who lives nearby, showed up at Monday's Eldridge council meeting to commend police response.

"I'm so pleased with our police department," Baldwin told council members. "I just want to know what can we do, as neighbors?"

Council member Brian Dockery urged her to organize a neighborhood watch, and let police know which homes have security cameras.

Buck deer rampages Grand Haven

Animal crashes through window and escapes unharmed

Two conspiracy theories surfaced at Grand Haven Retirement in Eldridge when a deer crashed through a window Tuesday (Aug. 13) night.

One, the buck heard that chickens would soon be arriving, and wanted to join the party. Second, it read the sign on the front door that stated no firearms were allowed, and figured the building would be a safe haven with hunting season fast approaching.

Either way, the unexpected visitor caused quite a mess, gave at least two employees quite a story to tell, and left administrator Julie Newell feeling thankful that nobody was hurt.

"We are very fortunate," she said. "Our staff was great, and so were the officers from the Eldridge Police Department and Scott County Sheriff's Department. "Because of the time of day, there weren't any residents in the hallways, and nobody was hurt."

The deer made its grand entrance about 8:45 p.m. when it burst through a small window on the north side of the building, not far from the front door. It came crashing into a hallway, leaving shattered glass in its wake.

"Of all the windows it could have chosen, this one was strange," said Newell. "It's in a little alcove. We don't know if it got disoriented, or saw its reflection in the window."

"One of our staff members (who asked not to be identified) heard the crash, went to investigate, and saw the deer."

Another employee, Kathy Wright, was working in another part of the building and heard the first employee's voice come over the radio.

"I was distributing meds in the 200 hallway, and I heard on my walkie that 'there is a deer on the property,'" said Wright. "I said, 'What?', and she said, 'There is a deer on the property.'"

"I said, 'Who cares, as long as it's not inside.' She said, 'There's a deer in the building.'"

Wright asked the employee which part of the building she was in, and headed for the front hallway that runs east and west.

"I talked to her later, and she said she was walking down hallway 400 to respond to a pendant call, and she heard this great big crash," said Wright. "She said she looked up and all she saw was a white ---.

"After I heard the call, I put my cart in the break room and tried to find her. When I did, I told her she needed to call 911."

Wright headed down hallway 400, where she saw another employee, Terry Randolph, standing in front of one of the residents' apartments.

"Terry had a wheelchair in front of her, and you could hear the deer," said Wright.

By that time the deer had made its way to the 500 hallway, and was trying to escape through a locked door at the north end of the building. It left antler marks on the door, hoof prints on the carpet, blood on ceiling tiles, and broke the exit sign.

Unable to escape, it turned around and headed back down the hallway. There, it encountered Randolph and Wright.

"We were standing in front of 408, and you could hear him pounding and pounding," said Wright. "He finally stopped. We were standing there, and all of a sudden he came around the corner and we ran into 408's apartment."

"I had my wheelchair as a weapon," said Randolph. "I had it right in front of me. I thought it was going to be Bambi, a little deer, but he had a great big rack on him. It looked at me, and I looked at him. I screamed and I ran and jumped in Kathy's arms, and you can quote that. It was exciting."

"My eyes got *this* big. Thank God my bladder was good. We were just standing there hugging each other."

"I had to pull her inside the door, and we waited a few minutes until we couldn't hear anything," said Wright. "We then went down to the cove (a room at the other end of the 500 hallway, that leads into an inner courtyard) and he did some damage down there."

It was then that Eldridge police officer Robert Haxton arrived on the scene.

"When I first heard the call, I thought the dispatcher was pulling my leg," said Haxton, "but we were having such a busy night, and I knew that probably wasn't the case. The dispatcher said a

deer had crashed through the window at Grand Haven and that it was running through the hallways, and that residents were running from the deer."

By the time Haxton got there, residents were locked in their rooms, although a few poked their heads out, and he told them to get back inside.

When Haxton reached the cove area, the deer had crossed the hallway and trapped itself in a small passageway that led out to the facility's garages.

"I told the workers to go ahead and open all the doors, and shortly thereafter we got the deer out, but it caused quite a bit of damage. It was a pretty good-sized buck with velvet on its antlers."

"When I arrived on the scene, that was exactly my plan. I wanted to open all the exits and try to get it out. It ended up cornering itself by the door that led to the garages, and once it opened, it was off and running."

"In my 26 years of doing this job as a civilian and the military, I've never had a call like this."

It was a first for Randolph as well.

"I've seen deer jump in front of cars, but never in the building where I worked. I don't have deer training. It was scary. I thought I was going to have to fight. I was like, OMG, but I had my wheelchair and my buddy (Wright). She saved me."

Wright and Newell were all appreciative that it didn't happen earlier in the day.

"If it would have been earlier, residents would have gotten hurt, because they are always walking the hallways," said Wright.

"We are just very fortunate," said Newell, "and the other thing that's amazing is that despite the damage it caused to the building, it didn't damage any of the residents' decorations that sit outside their doorways in the hall. That's just unbelievable."

"Everybody walked away and nobody was hurt," said Haxton. "The employee said she heard a crash, ran up, and all of a sudden she sees this deer. It was quite a deal."

consultation with officials from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources Lake Restoration and Fisheries programs, for both watershed and in-lake improvements.

The work will excavate silt, deepen the lakes, improve fish habitat and stabilize banks throughout the lake complex.

Conservation board members on Aug. 14 amended the FYRA contract to add \$28,412.25 to include restoration engineering of the adjoining, private, Lake Canyada.

"When we started this we did not have anything calculated in for Lake Canyada. Since then we've had the inspector from the DNR come and look at the structure," said Conservation Department director Roger Kean.

Although separate from the park, Lake Canyada is part of the West Lake watershed. Miller said the engineering work will provide cost estimates for actual restoration.

Conservation board members also

approved project budget amendments drop watershed improvement costs by \$57,980, to a new total of \$212,074. Cost of in-lake improvements went up \$58,183, to \$332,503.

The lake bottom reveals remnants of Telegraph Road, and rail beds that crisscrossed the site.

The lake bottom also reveals rocky paths of sewer lines serving park facilities.

Miller said vehicle salvage yards are beneath part of Lake of the Hill. He expected excavation later this year may unearth old car parts.

We watched them navigate obstacles and followed them into the woods, only to discover that the way "home" was wading through a creek which seemed LONG. I posted on Facebook, "One of us had a blast, and one of us, unprepared, found a way with nothing worse than wet shoes and socks and a skinned

Reconnecting

Two recent activities reconnected Linda and me with her past:

On Sunday, Aug. 4, we were invited guests for the 150th anniversary of the picturesque East Iron Hill Community Church, in the country near the Maquoketa Caves. Linda's dad, the late L.L. Long, whose primary vocation was Jackson County Superintendent of Schools, when county school systems (since replaced by AEAs), provided leadership for the country schools which dotted the landscape, in a second vocation had served as pastor there in the 1960s.

The non-denominational church, which once had ties with Methodists, calls itself, "A Little Church With A Big Heart." Volunteers have kept the spark alive while Ed Briggs, who lives in DeWitt and works for an engineering firm in Davenport, serves as pastor. Attendance the week before was 42, but this week perhaps, 100.

There is a true sense of community here: pre-schoolers and farmers and longtime residents who hold professional positions in nearby towns. Politicians and anyone wanting to understand the heartbeat of America should come to places like this to listen and participate.

Two days later, on Tuesday, Aug. 6, Linda joined six pupils from her first-grade class, which in 1953-54 met in the basement of the Maquoketa Public Library, for a reunion with the teacher, Kay (Hansen) Olson, now 85, of DeWitt, formerly Calamus. It was a serendipitous get-together, complete with old photos and a lunch of peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, Jell-O, milk and sliced carrots and apples.

"Miss Hansen," then 19, in her first and only year of teaching, was in charge of 30 first graders in a room far removed from other district facilities due to rapidly growing enrollment in those post-World War II years. (The modern Briggs Elementary School would open a year later.) There were no teachers or administrators nearby, no special areas and no playground. Imagine that with all the requirements and expectations of education today!

Yet the students, now 71 and 72, learned their lessons well and made their marks in life. There are many high achievers among them.

Would-be mental health provider SBC has disturbing 13-year history

Last month the state of Iowa issued yet another extension to Strategic Behavioral Health for its proposed 72-bed psychiatric hospital in Bettendorf. Readers

may remember that SBH is a for-profit company based in Memphis. Founded in 2006, the company operates 10 psychiatric hospitals in six states with plans to open facilities in Bettendorf and Middleton, Wis., an affluent community northwest of Madison. Despite delays and the 20 percent projected cost overrun of the Bettendorf project, the vote by the Iowa State Health Facilities Council was unanimous and without question or comment.

In stark contrast, the state of Colorado announced only weeks earlier its unprecedented decision to revoke the SBH license to operate a hospital in Johnstown, an affluent community near Boulder. This action followed months of growing public concern. According to Denver-based media reports, more than five dozen patients, family members and employees raised concerns about SBH. Allegations include keeping patients longer than medically necessary; failing to provide required therapy; missing patient valuables; and improper insurance billing. Most frightening are the reports of patient deaths still under investigation. SBH is appealing the license revocation.

But concern over SBH operations is not restricted to the Johnstown hospital. The SBH facility in nearby Colorado Springs was cited after inspectors reported that patients suffered multiple falls, with one breaking an arm and another sustaining a head injury due to a lack of routine assessment. SBH hospitals in North Carolina also have come under media fire. SBH Charlotte was reprimanded for failing to keep the facility secure after 10 patients, ages 12 to 17, escaped through a broken window and were later apprehended by police. According to media reports, the incident amounted to a "riot," one nurse told inspectors.

Also in North Carolina, the SBH hospital in Garner, an affluent suburb of Raleigh, was cited for failing to provide adequate nursing staff. It appears that each of three units was supposed to have at least one nurse. But inspectors said only one nurse was on-duty for all three units. Moreover, that nurse left in the middle of night, leaving no nurse on any unit. Previously, the same hospital was cited for three separate incidents: failing to seek required emergency medical

assistance for a teenage patient; failing to find a lighter used by a patient to set a fire; and, failing to provide necessary neurological care after a patient received a head injury.

New Mexico authorities reported that the SBH hospital in Santa Teresa had 80 incidents of "resident-on-resident violence or aggression," with "numerous injuries." During one 12-month period, the police were called to the facility 21 times and patients escaped 23 times. The report concluded the facility provided an "unsafe environment." The SBH Las Vegas hospital was cited for failure to investigate properly alleged sexual contact between two patients, ages 6 and 8; sexual relations among multiple teenagers; and, physical abuse by staff, including a worker hitting a patient. In another citation against SBH Las Vegas, investigators said staff failed to prevent a 9-year-old boy from escaping and did not notify police. The list of SBH citations goes on.

For the record, I was an early opponent of the proposed SBH project in Bettendorf. Then and now, I recognize that our region has many critical mental health needs. But, more short-term, acute-care beds is not among them. Here's what we do need: long-term residential care and reliable funding for court diversion programs for veterans and others suffering from mental disease or disorder. We need more innovative multi-systemic therapy and comprehensive school-based therapy programs. We need respite care and peer counseling services. We need better access to medication. In short, we need community-based programs that help maintain mental wellness and end the cycle of repeated crisis-based interventions.

For the vast majority, mental illness is a chronic condition that can be managed successfully with proper treatment and support. This is not only more humane, it is less expensive and more effective. No one was ever "cured" by a two-week hospital commitment or a six-month jail sentence. Nonetheless, even if we did need more acute-care beds, the disturbing 13-year history of Strategic Behavioral Health does not suggest it may not be a suitable provider. In the name of public and patient safety, it's time for the Scott County Board of Supervisors to reconsider its support for the SBH Bettendorf project.

Drivers: Let's have a safe school year

Editor:

As school begins this year, we would like to ask for help from everyone to keep our students safe. They will be walking, riding a bicycle and many will be riding a school bus. Please be extra careful in school zones and be alert for school buses that are stopping for students.

Kadyn's Law went into effect in 2012. This law increased the penalty for passing a stopped school bus. The first offense has a fine of at least \$250, but not more than \$675. The court may order imprisonment not to exceed 30 days in lieu of, or in addition to, a fine. The Iowa DOT will impose a 30-day suspension of your driving privileges. These fines increase with subsequent offenses.

When you see flashing yellow lights, it means the school bus is preparing to stop. When approaching the bus from the opposite direction, slow your vehicle to 20 m.p.h. or less and prepare to stop.

If you are following the bus and the yellow lights are flashing, it's illegal to pass the bus at any time.

When you see flashing red lights and a stop sign out, it means that students are getting on or off the school bus. Please stop at least 15 feet from the bus. Remain stopped until the red lights end and the

stop arm goes in.

We hope everyone will remember and recognize that passing a stopped school bus could endanger the life of a child. So please join us and be extra careful and aware that school is starting and we need to work together to keep our children safe.

Let's have a safe school year.

Public awareness for Kadyn's Law

Editor:

At the end of the last school year, I received letters from students who were tasked with contacting a local legislator and advocating for an issue that is important to them. One was from Blake Peterson, a fifth-grader at Northeast Community School District, who was concerned about the lack of public awareness for Kadyn's Law, a law that was created to keep students safe when loading and unloading a school bus.

The "Keep Aware Driving-Youth Need School Safety Act," known as Kadyn's Law, was signed in March 2012. It is named for 7-year-old Kadyn Halverson who was hit by a pickup truck in 2011 while trying to cross the road to get on a school bus. The driver of the pickup violated Iowa's stop arm law - prohibiting drivers from passing a stopped school bus with the stop arms out or when the red or amber lights are flashing.

Kadyn's law increased the criminal penalties and license sanctions for passing a stopped school bus, including fines, imprisonment, and driver's license suspension.

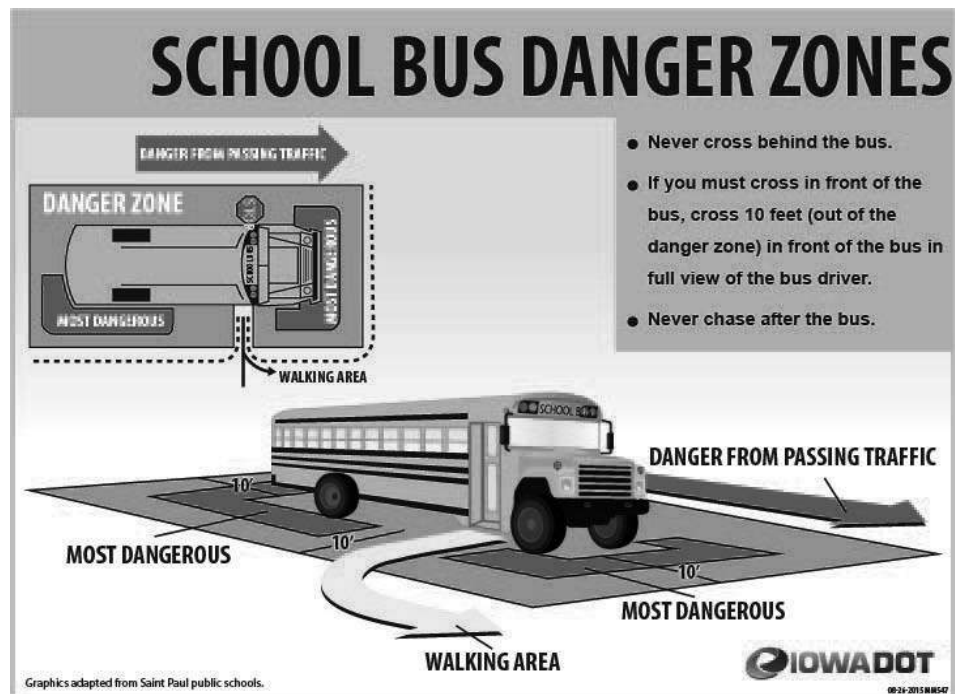
In FY 17, 556 persons and in FY 18, 534 persons had their licenses suspended for first time convictions for violation of this law.

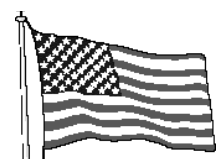

We have a special education advisory committee to help improve communication and provide support for our families with students who have IEPs. We are not only excited to share all the great things happening in our district but to hear from all of you.

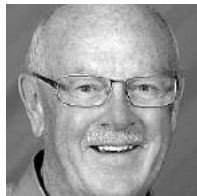
The North Scott Community School District is a great place because of all of you. We honestly believe we are a place where people choose to learn, work, and live. This is true because of the people who make up the school district and community.

Budget Deal is bad for America

With the recently announced two-year federal Budget Deal, discretionary spending will increase \$2.7 trillion over the next two years. Knowing Iowa Republican

Senators Joni Ernst and Charles Grassley along with Iowa Democrat House of Representatives Cindy Axne, Abby Finkenauer and David Loebsack voted yea, they have proven they no longer care about a balanced budget or deficits. Only Rep. Steve King (R-Iowa) opposed the legislation.

During the 2020 re-election campaign endeavors, don't fall prey to Sen. Ernst, Rep. Axne or Rep. Finkenauer touting they are a watchdog of your taxes, fiscally responsible, and the Budget Deal was for the betterment of their constituents - a false claim. Loebsack is not seeking re-election, King has multiple challengers in 2020 and Grassley is up for re-election in 2022, when he will be 89 years old.

The Budget Deal permits the government to resume borrowing to pay its overdue bills and spend an additional \$1.37 trillion - get this, per year. The legislation does nothing to stem the government's out-of-control debt or address repaying the \$2.6 trillion deficits we've incurred since Trump came into office.

The Budget Deal will require the government to borrow 25 cents for every dollar the government spends. (Re-read that sentence to comprehend the severity of this irresponsible legislation.) The federal debt held by the public was \$19.9 trillion when Trump took office. It currently sits at \$22.5 trillion (78 percent of Gross Domestic Product) and analysts predict it will most likely increase to 92 percent of the economy by 2029.

Congress and the Trump administration ignored the Bipartisan Policy Center warning that trillion-dollar deficits will exist annually if no serious action is taken to increase revenues and curtail the ever-growing costs of social insurance programs. Trump and Congress even ignored a warning from their very own Congressional Budget Office that the federal budget is on an unsustainable

path. Maya MacGuineas, president of the Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget, said, "This (Budget Deal) agreement is a total abdication of fiscal responsibility. It may end up being the worst budget agreement in our nation's history." The conservative *Wall Street Journal* and Freedom Works succinctly summarized the action as "a bad budget deal" and "a disgrace," respectively.

In 2016, Donald Trump promised to increase defense spending, balance the budget, eliminate the then \$19.9 trillion federal debt and, let's not forget, build a wall on America's southern border the Mexican government would fund.

Only a modicum of increased defense spending has come to fruition. In regards to our federal debt, \$2.6 trillion has been added since Trump's inauguration, it will topple \$24 trillion by the end of Trump's first term and, if re-elected, grow to \$29 trillion by the end of his eight years in office. Under Trump, tax revenues have fallen dramatically, government spending has increased by 21 percent, federal debt has grown exponentially and it's now proven Trump's alleged business acumen was not a reason to elect him president.

With members of Congress spending four hours per day calling donors, PACs, lobbyists and corporations for re-election coffers instead of insuring for a fiscally solvent America, their after-me-you-come-first mantra rings loud and clear.

Once again, I ask my fellow fiscally responsible citizens, who account for 81 percent of Americans, to please give me one reason we should re-elect any current member of Congress (regardless of political affiliation) or Trump for that matter, who can't or won't give us a balanced budget and resolve the \$22.5 trillion federal deficit while preferring to spend their time dialing-for-dollars, holding re-election rallies and hoodwinking their constituents by claiming to be fiscally responsible.

The board agreed to purchase an 80 by 126 feet tract of land from Frank Ewoltdt, local contractor, at a cost of \$2,500. The land adjoins the district's present property line, and will be used to provide additional access to a proposed expansion of the parking lot at the junior-senior high school.

The board also agreed to exercise an option held for the past year on a 15 acre tract owned by Mr. and Mrs. Edward Elme-green. The ground, located southwest of the junior-senior high school, will be used for future school construction. Purchase price for the 15 acres totaled \$35,000, with five acres selling for \$2,000 per acre, and the remaining ten acres bringing \$2,500 per acre.

The board accepted the resignation of Irwin Wuestenberg as a bus driver, and approved contracts for the following bus drivers - LeRoy Engler, morning

and evening run, \$9 per day; Robert Mohr, morning and evening run, \$9 per day; Jerry Voll-beer, morning run, \$4.50 per day, and Arthur Thee, morning and evening run plus two kindergarten runs, \$19.99 per day.

The board also accepted the resignation of Mrs. Tawny Rolin, who has been employed in the high school office. Her resignation is effective August 18.

The board approved payment of the following bills on the Virgil Grissom Addition, Princeton: Petersen Plumbing and Heating, \$13,275; Butler Electric Co. of Iowa, \$1,111.99, and Rudolph Construction Co., \$13,110.30. Work on the addition has been delayed by strikes, and much remains to be done.

The board approved a motion to change the Precinct 4 polling place from the junior-senior high school building to the Administrative Office building, located at 110 E. LeClaire Road, Eldridge.

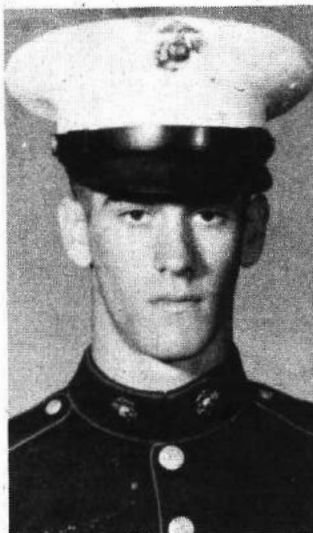
A request from Harold Strohbahn, who is presently residing outside the North Scott District but is moving to Donahue two weeks after school starts, for permission for his children to attend the North Scott Schools at the opening of the school term, was granted. A request from Robert Holst, LeClaire Township, who is paying property taxes in the North Scott District, that his kindergarten child be allowed to attend Virgil Grissom school tuition free was granted.

That board agreed to apply the property tax to tuition costs, in view of the fact the family will move to Princeton Township about January 1. The board also approved a motion that Mark Engelbrecht, who was employed by Wilbert Engelbrecht and made his home there while attending school during the 1968-69 term, be allowed tuition-free.

Edward Fischer, junior-senior high school principal, introduced Rodger Ritchie, new assistant principal. Dale Procter, Summer School Director, presented his report on the summer school program, and reported an enrollment of 197 at the opening of the program on June 16. Children in grades one through six attended the four week term held in all four elementary schools.

The board also discussed a complaint registered by a resident of the district regarding the burning of outdated text books. The books, no longer in use in schools in the district, were burned to provide storage room for other articles. Mr. Copley produced a book "Stories To Remember", published in 1951, and in almost new condition, allegedly included among books to be burned.

This brought forth a remark that it should not have been among those to be disposed of. Mr. Copley reported that there are various places, among them the Friendly House, Davenport, as well as several churches, that would welcome the opportunity to receive and use this type of books, and recommended that the books be given to some such organization which can put them to use, rather than disposing them by burning.

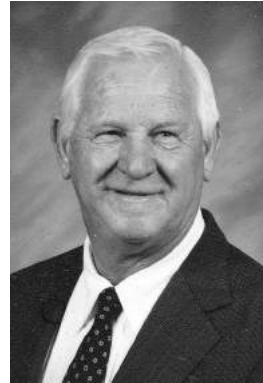

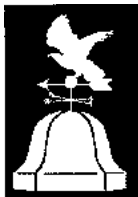

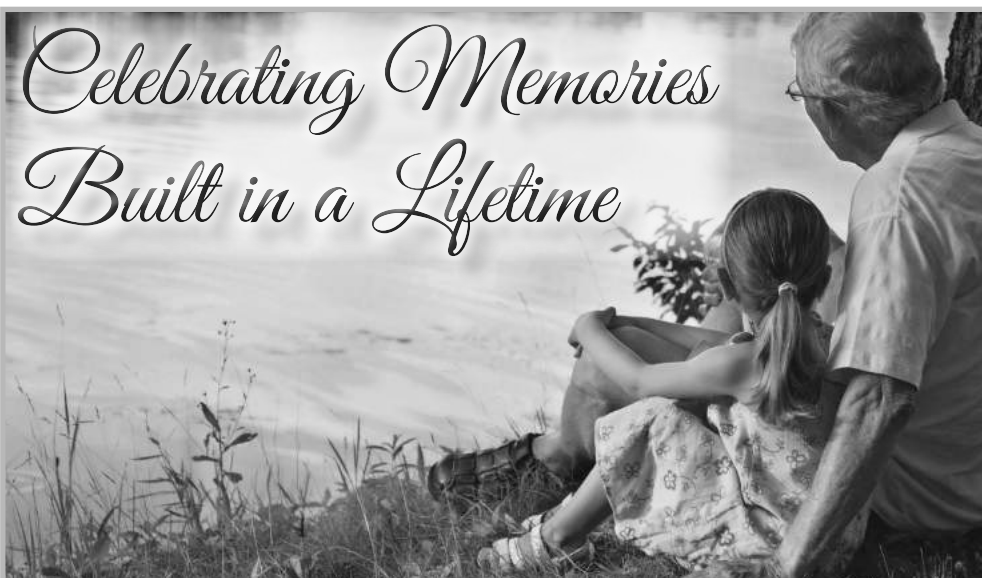

Notice: Corporal Punishment, Restraint, and Physical Confinement and Detention



State law forbids school employees from using corporal punishment against any student. Certain actions by school employees are not considered corporal punishment. Additionally, school employees may use "reasonable and necessary force, not designed or intended to cause pain" to do certain things, such as prevent harm to persons or property.

State law also places limits school employees' abilities to restrain or confine and detain any student. The law limits why, how, where, and for how long a school employee may restrain or confine and detain a child. If a child is restrained or confined and detained, the school must maintain documentation and must provide certain types of notice to the child's parent.

As a district we strive to do everything possible to mitigate situations so that restraint or seclusion is not necessary. In the event that the safety and well-being of any students are in danger, an employee that has been trained will restrain or seclude the student for the shortest amount of time possible to ensure safety.

'An opportunity to do something awesome'

North Scott girls have high expectations; season opener is Tuesday

With all due respect to the talent coming up through the ranks, the future is now for North Scott's volleyball team.

After two years of knocking on the door of the Class 4A state tournament, or at the very least having the bus parked in the driveway, the Lancers are ready to put their collective feet on the gas, shift into drive and steer a course toward Cedar Rapids.

With first-year coach Taryn VanEarwage behind the wheel, and three-year letter winners Kendall McNaull and Emma Powell parked in the front seat, the Lancers are setting the bar high as they head into the 2019 campaign.

Yes, this is the year Lancer fans have been waiting for.

Make no mistake about it, the sting of last year's epic five-set, down-to-the-final-point, regional semifinal loss to Clinton still lingers. However, a new day has dawned since the hiring of VanEarwage two months ago, and North Scott's girls hope to follow in the footsteps of their basketball and softball counterparts by making their own state tournament memories.

"We definitely want to get to state, and we can do that," said Powell, a two-time, first-team all-conference selection.

"We have a lot of talent here," added senior Sam Lee. "We lost a lot of seniors last year, but we have a lot of younger kids coming up, and I think we're really going to do some really good work."

Scott's takeaway

I am excited to see what this team can do, and I have high expectations. Kendall McNaull and Emma Powell are hard-hitting veterans. Their enthusiasm and confidence are contagious, and I fully expect them to be dominant players during what should be sensational senior seasons.

Sophomores Ella McLaughlin and Gracie Graham have proven that they are the real deal, and junior Taylor Robertson has a full season of being a varsity setter under her belt. If the Lancers can develop a strong attack from the right side, they will be incredibly hard to stop.

It will be important for the Lancers to get some big wins early in order to gain traction in the Class 4A state rankings. A top-eight ranking at the end of the season will give them home-court advantage in the regional tournament, and no one wants to come and play in The Pit.

I like coach Taryn VanEarwage's enthusiasm, as well as her honesty about being a young, first-year coach. The girls are having fun in practice, and that should translate to success on the court. It should be a fun year in The Pit.

"Obviously, our end goal is that we want to get to state, and that's very doable. But, we just want to take it one game at a time and keep pushing to get better every game and practice."

VanEarwage was given the reins to the program in June, and she spent the summer evaluating the team's talent level and getting to know her players.

To say she was impressed would be an understatement.

"My very first impression is that we have a great group of girls, and we have an opportunity to do something really awesome this season," she said. "Just the fact that they are willing to come in and give me 100 percent every single time we're in the gym, takes a big weight off my shoulders."

"I don't have to yell at them to get in the gym or weight room, and they are constantly trying to get those reps to get bigger, faster and stronger."

The Lancers are coming off an impressive 22-12 campaign, and even with senior Grace Boffeli deciding not to come out this fall, they still return three of their top four hitters from a year ago.

One thing is for certain: As Powell and McNaull go, so go the Lancers.

Powell has led the team in kills the last two years, including 245 a year ago, while McNaull was second (183), and led the team in blocks (64).

"They are the leaders, and they are so confident in their abilities," said VanEarwage. "Everyone else feeds off their confidence, and it's awesome to have two girls who understand the game and are willing to help their teammates. That is super beneficial to us as a team."

Although Powell and McNaull will

provide the heavy artillery up front, the Lancers are loaded with experience. After impressive freshman campaigns, Ella McLaughlin (165 kills) and Gracie Graham (21 kills, 262 assists, 167 blocks) are primed for breakout sophomore seasons.

In addition, junior Taylor Robertson, who led the team with 453 assists a year ago, is back to run the offense, although she's getting plenty of competition from Lee, senior Lauren Hanssen and sophomore Katherine Belken.

Whoever ends up triggering the attack, there will be plenty of weapons at their disposal.

McNaull and Graham will anchor the middle of the front row — with junior Molly Engler also looking for playing time — while Powell and McLaughlin will fire away at will from the outside.

"Our strength this year will be our connections with our setters," said McNaull. "We've really been working the middle in practice one-on-one, so I really feel like the connection is really there. I think we'll have something to show this year."

While the middle and left side of the net are loaded with varsity experience, there's a platoon of newcomers vying for playing time on the right side, including senior Emily Gehring, juniors Sam Scott, Olivia Young and Brooklyn Harvey, as well as sophomore Lexi Richards.

"It's just a matter of time to see who pushes ahead, and they are all making my job hard," said VanEarwage. "Every coach wants your kids to go out and compete, and be the best they can be, and they are all really challenging each

other."

The same is true in the back row, where there is plenty of talent, and only so much playing time.

Seniors Paige Blaskovich and Rachel Anderson, along with juniors Madison Wiebel and Kaylee Gerardy, as well as sophomores Peyton Wenck and Melena Knutson are all looking for action as the team's libero, and could also see spot duty as defensive specialists.

"There is just a lot of competition in that back row," said VanEarwage, "and they are all pushing each other to be better. It's a good, competitive atmosphere."

With 19 girls on the varsity roster, and only six playing at a time, VanEarwage knows that putting all the pieces together could be challenging, especially for a 22-year-old, first-year coach.

"We can be good if we get everybody in the right position, and that's my job," she said. "It will be a challenge, especially since this is my first time coaching in this atmosphere. It's different when you're coaching club ball, because then you only have 10 girls instead of 19."

"The girls are definitely making it hard for me. We have a lot of talent that I'm super excited about, but again, it comes down to finding the right pieces."

While VanEarwage will have some tough choices to make, she's also certain that all that depth will make the Lancers a better team.

"Our strength is just how deep we are," she said. "I'm confident that I can put anyone out there, and I know they will make a positive contribution to the team. Every coach wants to be able to

Youth will be served on the course

Despite inexperience, Lancers still expect high MAC finish

Where some would see a glass that's half empty, others would see one half full. That's the case with North Scott's boys' golf team as the Lancers swing into the 2019 campaign.

Despite graduating five of their top six golfers from last year's team that finished fifth in the Mississippi Athletic Conference, the Lancer cupboard is far from bare, and it's bursting at the seams with the talents of 28 varsity golfers.

As coach Collin Ellis begins his second year at the helm, he sees a bright future for the program.

"Twenty-eight is a lot of kids, but it's awesome to have that many out," he said. "It makes scheduling meets and practices a little trickier, but it's one of those things where almost every team in the MAC makes cuts, and we were able to choose not to.

"I'm excited. One of the reasons we kept everybody is that they were all putting in the work and staying extra, and you don't always get that. The future of the program looks good. Obviously our numbers are strong. We just need to play some more golf."

The Lancers are definitely short on experience, but long on talent. Senior Luke Haedt is the lone returnee with any significant varsity experience, and his 91 led the Lancers to an eighth-place finish at the Muscatine Invitational in Friday's season-opening meet.

MAC power Pleasant Valley captured the team title with a 332, and the Lancers shot a 380 total, using the scores of sophomore Zach Johnson (92), senior Cael Bredar (97) and sophomore Eli Engelkes (100). Rounding out the Lancer contingent were freshman John Dobbe (100) and junior Collin Harmon (102).

"This is definitely a rebuilding year," said Ellis. "Luke is the only consistent varsity player back, and it's definitely a pretty young and inexperienced group in terms of playing in big-time meets when the score really counts.

"We have talent. We have a big junior class and a big sophomore class. They have definitely gotten better. We have a ton of freshmen out, and there is certainly some talent there as well."

The fact there were two sophomores and a freshman in the opening-meet lineup shows North Scott's youth, but Ellis likes what he's seen from Dobbe, Engelkes and Johnson. However, no varsity spot is by any means signed, sealed and delivered.

Also in the mix are senior Ben Evitts, juniors Liam Latham, Owen Popelka and Max Adkisson, and sophomore Car-

son Kress.

"The fact we have nine, 10 or 11 guys competing for varsity makes it a lot more fun because they are pushing each other and have to compete every day," said Ellis. "Plus, we have quite a few others that look like they have potential. Some of them just need to get a little stronger and play some more rounds in order to compete from those back tees."

Ellis isn't putting a lot of stock in the scores his team posted at Geneva Country Club on Friday, as scores were higher across the entire field, thanks to the toughness of the course.

He feels his team has a good chance of competing for an upper division MAC finish.

"Realistically, we know we aren't the best team in the conference, but we don't really expect to be in the middle of the pack, either," he said. "We want to be in the top three or four, which would be an

improvement after finishing fifth last year. We expect to inch closer to the top teams every year.

"I'm just really excited about this team. The numbers are big, but that doesn't pose a problem. It's more of an opportunity to develop more guys and keep them interested in a game they are going to play their whole life."

The Lancers were scheduled to host their own Lancer Invitational today (Wednesday) with a 9 a.m. start time, and Thursday they'll head to Cedar Rapids to take on the Elmcrest County Club Course.

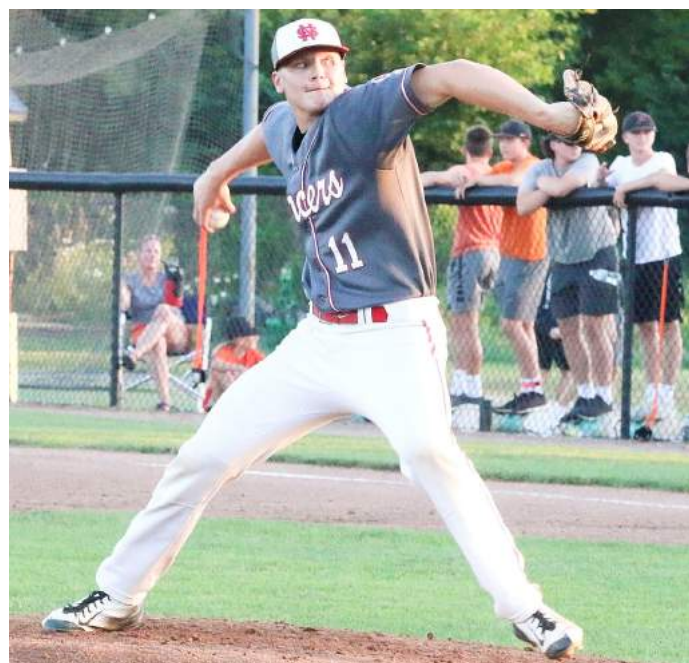

- The President announced that this is the time, place, and date to hold a hearing on the Proposed Use of School Infrastructure Sales, Services and Use Tax Revenue for an Athletic Facility Infrastructure Project. The following persons appeared: None
- The President declared the hearing closed.
- Director Maxwell introduced the following Resolution and moved its adoption. Director Pratt seconded the motion to adopt. The roll was called, and the vote was: Ayes: Wilmott, Dittmer, Maxwell, Bergfeld, Pratt, Lindaman, and Keppy. Nays: none.
- The President declared the Resolution adopted as follows:

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE PROPOSED USE OF SCHOOL INFRASTRUCTURE SALES, SERVICES, AND USE TAX REVENUE FOR AN ATHLETIC FACILITY INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECT

WHEREAS, the School District receives revenue from the State of Iowa Secure an Advanced Vision for Education Fund ("SAVE Revenue") pursuant to Iowa Code § 423F.2; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Iowa Code chapter 423F and an election duly held in accordance therewith on September 11, 2012, the Board of Directors is currently entitled to spend SAVE Revenue for school infrastructure purposes, including the construction of an athletic facility infrastructure project; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has determined that it is necessary and advisable for the District to use revenue from the SAVE Revenue for the following athletic facility infrastructure project that is not physically attached to a student attendance center: constructing a Batting Cage Facility; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has complied with the provisions of Iowa Code § 423F.3(6A) by adopting a resolution setting forth the proposal for the athletic facility infrastructure project, and holding a public hearing on the proposed construction of the athletic facility;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is resolved:

1. The Board of Directors hereby supports the proposed use of SAVE Revenue for the following athletic facility infrastructure project: constructing a Batting Cage Facility. The estimated cost of the construction of this athletic facility infrastructure project is \$1,000,000.

2. Eligible electors of the school district have the right to file with the Board Secretary a petition pursuant to Iowa Code § 423F.4(2)(b), on or before close of business on August 26, 2019, for an election on the proposed use of SAVE Revenue. The petition must be signed by eligible electors equal in number to not less than one hundred or thirty percent of those voting at the last preceding election of school officials under Iowa Code § 277.1, whichever is greater.

3. In the event a petition containing the required number of valid signatures is filed with the Secretary of the Board on or before close of business on August 26, 2019, the President shall call a meeting of the Board to consider rescinding this Resolution supporting the proposed use of SAVE Revenue or directing that the question of the proposed use of SAVE Revenue be submitted to the qualified electors of the School District.

If the Board determines to submit the question to the electors, the proposition to be submitted shall be

as follows:

Shall the Board of Directors of the North Scott Community School District in the County of Scott, State of Iowa, be authorized to use revenue from the State of Iowa Secure an Advanced Vision for Education Fund for the purpose of constructing a Batting Cage Facility, with the estimated cost of construction being \$1,000,000.

PASSED AND APPROVED this 12th day of August 2019.

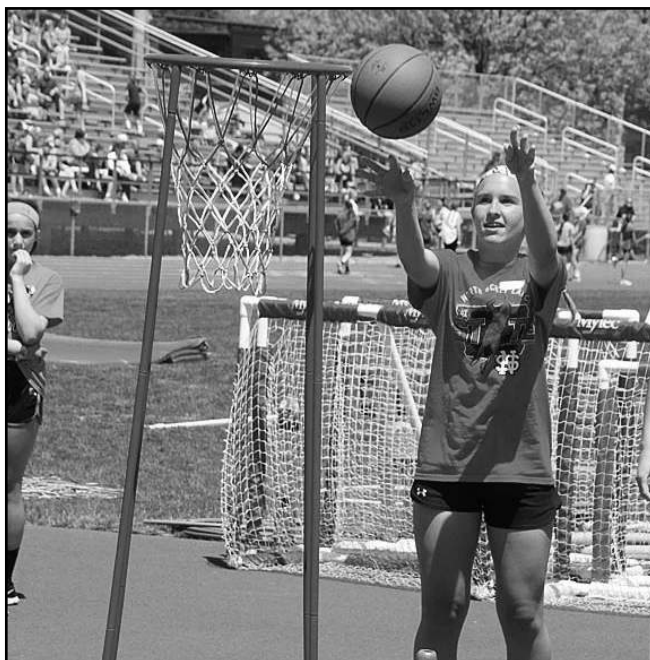

North Scott welcomes 20 new teachers

Staff gathers Tuesday to prepare for school year

Returning North Scott students will greet 20 new teachers, and about 40 new support staff added since the start of school last year.

The entire faculty filled the high school auditorium Tuesday for a welcome back, and three hours of state-mandated health and safety training.

The training on suicide prevention and blood-borne pathogens is among the few changes greeting students this year.

Unlike the new auditorium of 2018, or the new cafeteria of 2017, this school year opens with no major construction upgrades, just maintenance throughout every building and a \$30,000 renovation of the high school agriculture classroom.

Superintendent Joe Stutting anticipates flat enrollment.

"On paper, we're down about 38 kids. White (Elementary) still is shrinking," he said.

White, the district's biggest elementary, is designed for four sections of each grade. "Only fourth grade has four sec-

tions at White," Stutting said.

A Grissom kindergarten class is at 27, enough for the district to consider adding an aide, but not enough to split into two sections.

"Salaries and costs make each new section cost about \$75,000," Stutting said.

The district struggles to find qualified part-time teachers to fill gaps. "The teacher shortage makes it hard to find part-timers," he said. The district filled a part-time Spanish opening with a full-time teacher because of a lack of applicants.

He said Eldridge's growth masks a comparatively high turnover throughout the district.

"We're surprisingly transient," he said of enrollment. He said apartments in Eldridge and Park View cause some of the turnover. But he said the biggest driver is Deere and the Rock Island Arsenal.

"These career transfers drive a lot of our enrollment numbers," he said.

Changes coming

District residents still can expect a new indoor sports training building to replace the Silver Bullet, and a renovat-

ed bus garage at East LeClaire and Scott Park Road.

Students, staff and parents soon will be communicating through a new smartphone app Stutting hopes to unveil yet this year. The app is part of a new district communication plan aimed at streamlining district and social media

actions, and allowing student and family access to their records and other school data by smart phone.

"We also want to improve communication with those in the district who never had kids in the district, or no longer, do. They are our constituents, too," Stutting said.
