MEDIC
 braces
 for big
 changes

Ambulance non-profit seeks
 government affiliation
 to tap more revenue sources

 The MEDIC ambulance service serving most of Scott County is asking county supervisors to make it an intergovernmental partner and enjoy tax and other revenue benefits only available to cities and counties.
 MEDIC director Linda Fredericksen is launching the non-profit's campaign to get 28E agreements with the county, Davenport and Bettendorf. Iowa Code's Chapter 28E allows intergovernmental partnerships that will allow MEDIC to:

 Ambulance call volume by town.

- Go after casino winnings and income tax returns of clients who haven't paid.
- Be eligible for Medicaid's Ground Emergency Medical Transportation funding, a subsidy aimed at city and county-affiliated ambulance services.
- Participate in ET3, a new Medicare demonstration project that pays for transport to doctor's offices, rehab clinics and other medical providers. Right now, Medicare only reimburses for hospital, nursing home and dialysis center trips.

Those funding sources are only available to city-affiliated ambulance services, Fredericksen said in presentations Oct. 1 to the Scott County Board, and in an interview with *The NSP*.
 The Medicaid Ground Emergency Medical Transportation funding alone could bring \$775,000 annually to MEDIC.

Council votes 'no' on more condos

City needs more commercial
 development, not just homes

 The future of Blackhawk Trail and South 16th Avenue remains for commercial development after Eldridge council members on Monday declined a developer's request to rezone a 3.19-acre lot for 32 new condo units.
 The council voted 3-2 against Paul Anderson's re-

quest for residential zoning to accommodate four eight-plex buildings similar to those he's built in Emily Acres on East Franklin Street.
 Realtor Dan Schneckloth represents Anderson and urged the residential zoning, saying it will add about \$5 million in property values on property that hasn't attracted commercial development interest. He said Eldridge's proximity to nearby stores and services in Davenport limits commercial prospects for this site.

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MEDIC: Government affiliation eliminates sales tax for ambulance purchases

The ET3 payments are part of a Medicaid cost-saving effort to get less critical patients to appropriate providers that are less expensive than hospitals.

The 28E agreement also would give MEDIC tax breaks available only to local governments. That includes waiving sales taxes, and state and federal fuel taxes.

MEDIC pays 5 percent sales tax on vehicles and 7 percent on most other purchases. Fredericksen said new ambulances costing up to \$200,000 come with about \$10,000 in sales taxes.

“And we buy about \$300,000 in medical supplies every year, which are subject to sales tax,” she said.

A governmental agreement would waive 49-cents per gallon federal and state fuel taxes. MEDIC bought 86,891 gallons used last year and paid \$42,663 in taxes, Fredericksen said.

She believes those new revenue sources will help MEDIC erase annual operating deficits that grew from \$8,000 in 2016 to \$101,000 last year.

Scott County administrator Mahesh Sharma said the county has agreed to cover up to \$200,000 in deficits.

Launching MEDIC’s 28E partnership requires affirmative votes from Scott County supervisors, Davenport, Bettendorf and the county’s other larger towns.

Fredericksen said MEDIC will make presentations in Eldridge and elsewhere.

“We’re looking for revenue that’s available only to services that partner with cities. It’s really quite unfair, because all ambulance services need that funding, too.”

Under the 28E agreement, MEDIC would operate like the Scott Emergency Communication Center, or the Scott County Solid Waste Commission. Fredericksen insisted MEDIC would never seek its own property tax levy.

“That’s what we’re avoiding with this. Our deficits are paid by county taxes. These new revenue streams should cover our deficits and more,” she said.

A 28E agreement also allows MEDIC to enroll workers in the Iowa Public Employees Retirement System with other state, county and municipal workers. Fredericksen said IPERS enrollment will cost MEDIC more, but provide better retirement security for workers.

She believes better retirement benefits will help recruit workers who are getting harder to find.

“What do employees think?” Scott County supervisor John Maxwell asked.

“They’re wildly excited beyond belief,” she said.

The MEDIC 28E would be governed by a board consisting of the Scott County Board chairman, the Scott County administrator, a mayor or administrator from Bettendorf and Davenport, and a mayor or administrator from one other town in the county. The board also would have representatives from Genesis and Unitypoint Trinity hospitals.

Rural care, sprawl adds to MEDIC’s deficit

Ambulance service costs are being paid more often by Medicare, Medicaid and other government payers at rates subsidized by private insurers and private-pay customers, Fredericksen said.

As more aging residents become eligible for Medicare, a larger share of ambulance visits are paid at rates lower than those charged to insured patients. That’s truer in rural Scott County.

“People who call 911 in rural areas have higher acuity rates,” she said, meaning that calls are for more critical illnesses and accidents. “It’s a different type of patient. They’re older. There are more Medicare recipients,” she said.

She said private insurers, including Blue Cross, had covered about 25 percent of all visits. “Now that’s slipping to 22 percent, and we see that trend continuing,” she said.

Davenport calls make up about 75 per-

cent and Bettendorf, about 15 percent of MEDIC’s calls. That means 10 percent come from Eldridge, LeClaire, Walcott, Blue Grass and other towns in rural Scott County.

MEDIC is pursuing a partnership with Scott County and its cities in order to win tax exemptions and other benefits only available to governments.

Fredericksen said independent fire districts throughout the county may want to consider similar partnerships.

“This could mean potential sustainability for every non-profit fire department throughout the state,” she said. Durant, Bennett and Wheatland are volunteer non-profits that could seek their own partnerships.

Rifle donations worth \$14,000 to police

Eldridge police officer Andrew Lellig hopes he never has to draw his new LMT semi-automatic rifle.

But if he does, he'll value its lighter weight, easily attachable light and noise suppressor, and its construction by a company that now calls Eldridge home.

Lewis Machine and Tool donated 10 new rifles valued at \$14,000 to Eldridge police through Spirit of Blue, a nationwide non-profit that helps local departments find equipment.

Lewis has been a Spirit of Blue donor for at least three years.

"These are great products, and we can't thank them enough," Eldridge police chief Dave Kopatich said.

The donated rifles will replace Smith & Wesson AR-styled rifles the department purchased in 2015. Kopatich said those weapons worked fine for four years. Still he welcomes Lewis' innovations, including adaptability and a much lighter weight.

"The recoil is much better," Kopatich said.

Kopatich and Lellig said those advantages certainly will make a difference in the field. But both officers agree it's a rare day in Eldridge when they deploy semi-automatic rifles.

Lellig recalls carrying his old Smith & Wesson last year responding to a burglary call in Mount Joy. The call suggested an intruder in a home. Police found a resident's acquaintance locked out and trying to get in through a window. They also found a suspect with an outstanding warrant.

His only other recollection of using a rifle as an Eldridge officer was assisting Davenport police in April searching for suspects who'd shot a Davenport of-

ficer. Lellig toted the rifle during a short neighborhood search until a suspect was collared.

So as a practical matter, the Lewis rifle advantages will come in handy most often, "in training and at the range," Lellig said.

Still, he appreciates the fire power.

"Some people are carrying same or better guns as police," he said.

Among Lewis' innovations are easy access attachments such as lights and suppressors. Kopatich said the suppressors

are essential to protect officers' hearing during range practice.

Lewis built the donated weapons at their old Milan plant, so they don't carry a "Made in Eldridge" label. The Lewis catalogues show a manufacturer's suggested list price of a similar model at \$1,399.

Kopatich said that would have been too much for the city of Eldridge to afford right now.

Lewis donated the rifles to Spirit of Blue, a national non-profit that provides

equipment and grants to local police.

In 2017, Lewis pledged \$25,000 a year to Spirit of Blue. That cash was generated mostly through sales of a special edition law enforcement patrol rifle through Kiesler's Police Supply, an Indiana firm with customers nationwide.

"Our new LE rifle program is a tangible way for us to provide high quality products to those that need them the most while providing funding to Spirit

of Blue who is involved in protecting officers in other important ways,” LMT founder and president Karl Lewis said at that time.

LMT made that weapon available to departments at about \$900, with \$100 of the price going to Spirit of Blue. Last December, Spirit of Blue donated five tactical rifles from Lewis valued at \$12,995.

Eldridge police also issued officers new tasers and is in the process of introducing new handguns.

Smith & Wesson MP 9 millimeter handguns replace Glock .40 caliber weapons. Kopatich said officers tested several models before choosing the Smith & Wesson product that is smaller and lighter than the Glocks.

The 9mm ammo is slightly smaller, allowing up to 17 rounds, which is two

more than the Glock magazine. “When I started as a police officer, the standard was the .357 revolver,” Kopatich said. “Then we went to 9 millimeter, semi automatic. Then it was the .40 caliber,” he said. “After they tried different calibers, they came to consensus to go back to the 9 millimeter. The smaller ammo gives us greater magazine capacity.”

The Smith & Wesson comes with different sized grips so officers can choose their best fit.

“I’m comfortable with it, with the smoothness of trigger pull. The Glocks have been great, but I like this,” he said.

The 10 new Smith & Wessons cost \$425 each, Kopatich said. The retailer offered a \$225 trade-in value on each Glock. Kopatich said the city will offer the handguns to officers at that price.

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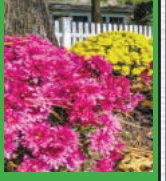

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ELDRIDGE: Split council vote emphasizes commercial prospects

“In my opinion, if a Casey’s or a Kwik Shop wanted to develop it, it would be there by now,” Schneckloth told the council.

Eldridge’s planning and zoning commission already voted down the residential rezoning request. The developers asked council members to overrule the commission. Under Eldridge code, overruling the commission requires four ‘yes’ votes from the council’s five members.

Council members Bernie Peeters, Brian Dockery and Frank King voted “no.” Steve Puls and Adrian Blackwell voted “yes.”

Dockery said long-term plans envision Black Hawk Trail expanding to a major east-west corridor east from U.S. 61 to Territorial Road.

“This was all looked at in the past four or five years,” Dockery said. “We’re looking at a transition from the highway to industrial, then commercial before hitting residential.”

Blackwell supported the condo development.

“I’m not in favor of going against the majority of the planning commission, but in consideration ... of working with Dan, who’s always had the best interest of the city in mind. Mel Foster always is on top of things with water control,” Blackwell said.

Dockery attended the Sept. 19 planning and zoning commission meeting, where he said most neighbors seemed worried about a gas station or convenience store on the lot. At that meeting, some neighbors complained about parking and landscaping at the nearby Blackhawk Hills condos built in 2005 by Anderson.

At Monday’s meeting, Lisa Elgin, of 1620 E. Lomar, said she and other neighbors worried most about storm water runoff and traffic from any development.

Assistant city administrator James Martin told council members the city needs commercially zoned space.

“I must caution the commission that if this trend continues, Eldridge will have no commercial land for development,” he wrote in a memo to the planning and zoning commission. “In the interest of the future development of Eldridge, we must be willing to tell developers no to their plans.”

Martin said the current C-3 commercial zoning allows businesses including a car wash, veterinarian office, hotel, medical office, and inside or outside storage. The current zoning does not allow a gas station or convenience store selling gas, he said.

Martin’s memo said a better site for condos would be land north of Anderson’s Emily Acres on East Franklin

Street. He wrote that property is “available and unsuitable for other use due to a high water table. This location would be a much better site for such development than this highly visible, highly accessible piece of commercial developable land.”

YMCA financing meeting Oct. 14

Council members will meet 7 p.m., Monday, Oct. 14 to publicly discuss financing options for a North Scott YMCA in Eldridge.

The city already pitched in with the YMCA and North Scott school district to study the market area and design a building. Eldridge council members have discussed providing city-owned land at East LeClaire Road and South Third Avenue.

Earlier discussions estimated the city and school district would provide up to \$7 million to build a fitness center, including a competition pool for a high school team.

Sinn refund

Eldridge will not refund city fees to a resident who obtained a zoning variance request he later found out he did not want.

Council members unanimously voted down Steve Sinn’s request the city waive the \$150 variance fee he paid. Sinn sought the variance that allowed him to operate a gun business in his home at 311 W. Pine St. Sinn said he has held an ATF firearms dealer license for years in order to build his own competition rifles, and work on similar rifles for the high school trap shoot team. ATF inspectors routinely reapproved his license without checking the zoning. He told council members that a new ATF inspector this year required proof of zoning compliance.

Sinn paid the fee and won the city’s Board of Adjustment permission, then found out it wasn’t needed since he sells no products and services. He said he donated services to the high school team.

Council members sympathized Monday, but said the fee is needed to cover the costs of services he asked for. A worksheet by the city showed that staff hours and notification costs for the request cost the city \$193.29, which exceeded the fee.

Sinn said he was following ATF instruction. He said he respected the council’s decision, and wished he’d never asked for the variance.

He also said if his business ever involved selling firearms, he agreed, “that should never be approved,” in a residen-

tial setting.

Blanche Drive island

Residents of Blanche and Tombergs drives now say they’d like to restore a landscaped island at the West LeClaire Road entrance to Blanche Drive.

An early-morning newspaper carrier damaged a decorative column and garden that neighbors maintained to mark the street entrance off West LeClaire Road. A similar column is maintained by residents of Tombergs Drive at West LeClaire Road.

City-hired crews finishing West LeClaire Road this year removed what remained of landscaping in the Blanche Drive island after the collision, installed rough rock and painted the curb yellow.

At the last council meeting Blanche Drive residents presented a petition for the city to pave over the island. Another petition from Tombergs Drive residents asked the city to leave it alone.

On Monday, Jennifer Ruth, of 314 S. Tombergs Drive, said the *Quad-City Times* has agreed to replace the column. Blanche Drive residents said they’d prefer to see the island and column restored.

City administrator John Dowd said the islands are on property still owned by developer Terry Knutsen. Council members advised the neighbors to work with Knutsen and the *Times* to restore the island.

Some council members said after repairs are made privately, the city might be able to help restore some of the plants removed by the city’s contractor.

Diamond Builders waiver

Council members agreed to waive

about \$2,300 in city inspection fees for a Century Farms lot dedicated by Diamond Builders to North Scott High School’s student home building class.

Diamond Builders owner Colin Woods urged council members to join him and his subcontractors who are donating and discounting time and materials for the student-built house.

Woods partnered with the school district to continue the program after the school district ended its partnership with the Quad-City Realtors Association.

“I was involved in that class when I went to North Scott, and I have no problem waiving any fees,” said council member Steve Puls, who operates his own lawn irrigation business.

Council member Peeters agreed. “We’re not contributing near as much as others,” he said.

Council member Dockery agreed to waive the fees on a trial basis. He noted council members earlier in the evening declined to waive fees for Steve Sinn’s variance request. He suggested council members review the home sale before waiving fees on future student-built homes in Eldridge.

“I’ll take a look and try this for one year. If it’s for-profit for the other entities, I think the fees should be paid,” he said.

For Juvenile: select Juvenile Audio, Juvenile Audio Visual and Juvenile Audiobook.

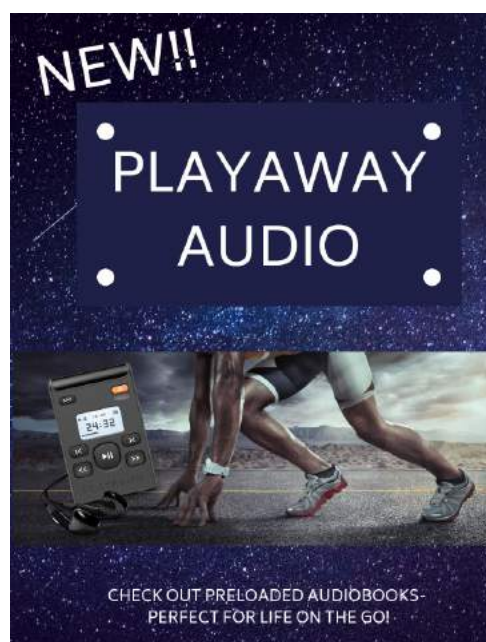
For Middle Grade: select Middle Grade Audio Visual

FRIENDS OF THE ELDRIDGE LIBRARY

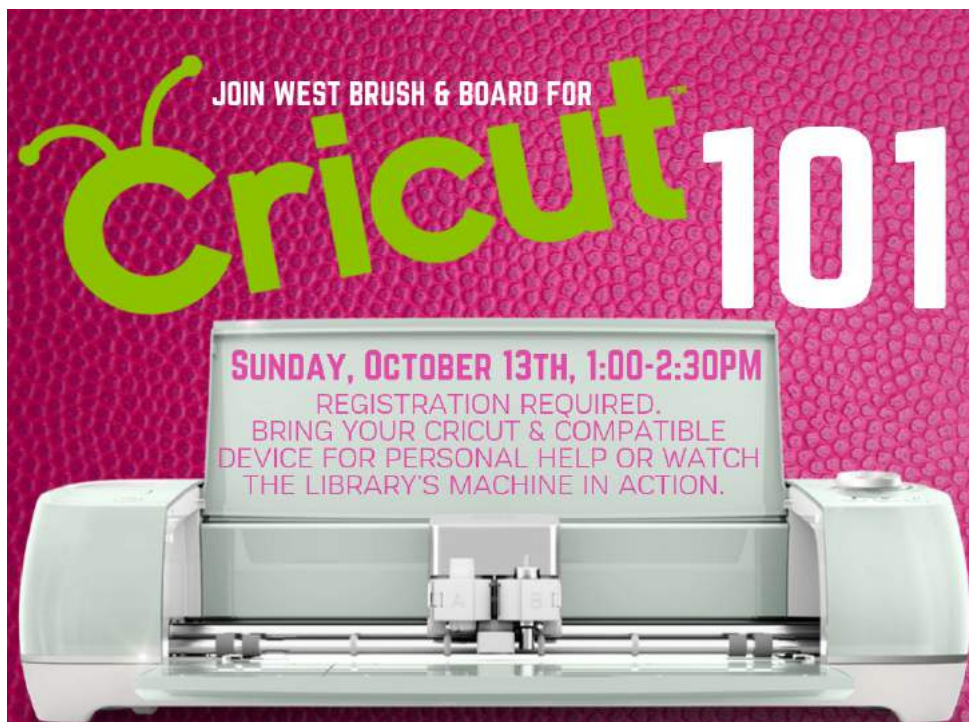

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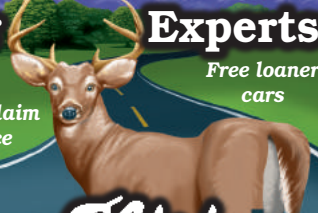

Other winners: North Scott over Iowa City Liberty, Clear Creek-Amana over

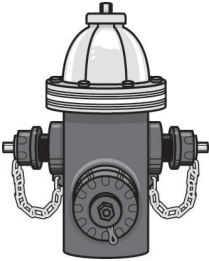

School district shares election day with cities

The Iowa Legislature made two changes to the school board election laws since 2009. Neither, in my view, was for the better.

The first, which occurred nine years ago, was to hold elections every other year instead of every year. The unintended consequence of this cost-saving measure was that a majority (four of seven in North Scott's case) could be elected in one election. If a vacancy occurred for any reason

(resignation, death, job transfer), a majority could be elected at EVERY election, not just every other.

The effect of this was that a newly hired superintendent, Jeff Schwiebert, did not work for the board which hired him. This occurred when opinion was divided about how and where to add space for elementary students. Not one of the seven school board members lived in Eldridge when those decisions were made.

The lawmakers' second change was to move elections from their traditional second Tuesday in September to the general election ballot in November. That, too, seemed like a step backward.

I, for one, liked the September election because it piggybacked on the beginning of the school year, when enthusiasm was high and the entire focus was on education. Granted, turnout was sometimes small, but not always. In 2011, when things were most contested, a record 2,366 voted.

I will be suprised if the number of voters in the upcoming Nov. 5 election, which is the same date as city elections, comes anywhere near that. The focus is divided, and Princeton is the only city in the North Scott district with a contest.

Nevertheless, this is an important election. A majority (four of seven) seats will be filled. Four incumbents and two challengers are on the ballot.

As always, *The NSP* will be here to provide coverage, including of an NSEA-sponsored candidate forum on Wednesday, Oct. 23 from 6-7:30 p.m. at the junior high, which will be moderated by our assistant editor, Mark Ridolfi.

The NSP will strive to be fair to all concerned. Toward that end, we remind everyone of our longstanding policy that we will accept no content (news, ads or letters) in our last issue before the election (Oct. 30) which would put a candidate at a disadvantage by not being able to respond. Erickson tributes top trip down journalism memory lane

I time traveled last week and didn't care for it much.

Ghosts of journalism past and present visited from my – gulp – four decades of Quad-City journalism.

It made me very glad to be experiencing journalism future at *The NSP*.

One friendly spirit of journalism past was Glen Erickson, remembered in heartfelt tributes at an Oct. 1 supervisors meeting by six current and retired Scott County professionals.

Scott County Emergency Center director Dave Donovan, county administrative assistant Chris Burge and county chief planner Tim Huey were joined by retired county health administrator Larry Barker and former county administrator Ray Wierson.

Erickson died July 1 in Arizona, and all shared personal stories of the Quad-City region's pioneering administrator credited for bringing professionalism to governments run by friends, cronies and political pals.

Donovan revered him as a father figure who thoughtfully cultivated relationships among county workers and other Quad-City elected leaders.

Barker recalled Erickson's leadership to anchor countywide ambulance service to hospitals, instead of the competing municipal fire departments and private services.

Burge told how Erickson handled a judge trying to weasel out of a county parking ticket.

Huey honored a personal mentor who saw the value of regional collaboration.

"He used considerable diplomacy, consensus building, and integrity to encourage and achieve intergovernmental cooperation amongst the various municipalities that make up our region," Huey wrote.

I recall Erickson as an easy-to-reach, easy-to-understand plain talker who worked hard, but never showed his sweat.

Malin's return

Moments after the tribute, I walked from the supervisors' meeting to the Scott County Courthouse to encounter another ghost of journalism past. Former Davenport city administrator Craig Malin had subpoenaed me to testify in his lawsuit trial against the *Quad-City Times*. Malin served the city from 2001-2015, when nine of the city's 10 council members signed a separation agreement promising him up to \$310,000 if he'd go away. Malin agreed and

signed it, too.

But he was back with a \$2 million lawsuit alleging the *Quad-City Times* coverage effectively forced council members to sign the agreement.

Long before the trial, Judge Henry Latham dismissed Malin's libel claims as unwarranted. But he let a jury determine if the *Times* reporting, columns and editorials interfered with the employment contract Malin agreed to end.

The jury listened to eight days of testimony and dismissed Malin's remaining claims after a couple hours of deliberation.

The trial resurrected memories about Malin's efforts to have the city own a casino, create a Davenport Today city website, and other initiatives he worked hard to persuade council members to adopt.

Testimony about those forgotten issues seemed as irrelevant as some of the Davenport riverfront development plans touted a decade or so ago.

Remember the Isle of Capri tower

hotel that was intended to connect to the skybridge? How about the replacement Dock restaurant? The big red push pin? Or the raised riverfront walkway?

I wonder how those might have fared under water.

The courtroom remained almost empty through testimony, save for one *Quad-City Times* reporter and a freelancer from the *River Cities Reader*. I didn't see a single council member, city staffer, Malin friend or family member there to support him during the two days I appeared for testimony, and the third morning I observed.

A ghost of journalism present

I also saw the ghost of journalism present in that courtroom. *Times* publisher Deb Anselm sat at the defendant's table with columnist Barb Ickes, and former reporter Brian Wellner.

Ickes remains a *Times* journalist. Anselm laid off Wellner two years ago.

Anselm is the latest in the *Times'* succession of publishers managing its rapid loss of print circulation by trying to push customers online. Year after year, the company touts online audience gains. Year after year, gross advertising revenue plummets. Any remaining profit is derived from laying off employees faster than overall revenue falls.

Shortly after Malin arrived in Davenport, the *Times'* parent Lee Enterprises was climbing toward a record high \$49.70 per share stock price. The company moved to a new headquarters built at Second and Main streets. Full-time employment at Lee exceeded 5,200.

Today, that headquarters building is empty. Company-wide payroll is about 3,000, despite having added 14 newspapers in 2005. Lee's stock opened at \$2 this week.

In 2017, Lee bought the remnants of Small Newspaper Group's Illinois Quad-Cities news operations, pledging to operate the papers independently. This year, Lee closed the *Dispatch/Argus* Illinois newsroom, laid off more people and is consolidating the handful of remaining news staff in Davenport.

In most places across America, journalism present is a grim place.

Journalism future

Those trips to journalism past and present eclipsed a bit of my time for journalism future. After testifying, I went back to work teaching future journalists at Muscatine Community College. Back at *The NSP* office, I knocked out stories on Long Grove's new city hall and the expansion of a century-old eastern Iowa bank into Eldridge. We prepped our readers for the next Election Day by publishing the name of every candidate on the Nov. 5 school and municipal election ballot. We started planning our school board candidate forum Oct. 23 at North Scott Junior High.

I photographed the junior high color run and got a little yellow and green on my collar.

And I wrote this column, thankful to be with a company and in a community still committed to journalism future.

Journalism future is a scary place for readers stuck with companies more committed to seven-figure salaries for CEOs and ex-CEOs than hiring local journalists.

But journalism future feels much better with family businesses who still put subscribers first.

from Davenport Central. Just three days after claiming a 2-1 decision over the Blue Devils at the Dubuque Senior Invitational, North Scott proved that losing a set to Central was a fluke, and sent a loud and clear message to the rest of the MAC that the conference title chase is far from over. The win improved North Scott's MAC mark to 4-1, and kept them just one game behind league leaders Pleasant Valley and Davenport Assumption with three games to play.

The Lancers will travel to Muscatine tonight (Wednesday), will participate in Saturday's Clear Creek-Amana Invitational, and then host Davenport North on Monday. If the Lancers can take care of business against the Muskies and Wildcats, that could set the stage for a mammoth MAC showdown at Assumption on Monday, Oct. 21 in the regular season finale. Of course, whether it's for all the marbles will depend on the outcome of next Tuesday's much-anticipated matchup between No. 5 (Class 5A) Pleasant Valley and No. 1 (3A) Assumption.

If, and it's a big if, the Lady Knights can defeat PV and the Lancers can run the MAC table, there would be a three-way tie at the top. Just for the record,

Lancers lock in! Roll past Liberty

Tippet: 'We were focused. We played hard. I'm proud of our kids'

One game doesn't necessarily constitute a turnaround, but all signs are pointing in the right direction for North Scott.

It was a happy homecoming for the Lancers Friday night as they took an early punch from Iowa City Liberty and responded with a methodical, clean and promising 24-10 Class 3A district win.

Keeping their focus while celebrating all the trappings of homecoming week, the Lancers put the ugly 42-21 win over Central DeWitt a week earlier in the rearview mirror, and seemed to put the pedal to the metal as they steered a course for a second straight district title.

Coach Kevin Tippet was smiling after this one, but made it clear the victory, which improved North Scott's overall mark to 5-1, was just one step in the right direction.

"I thought our effort was good," said Tippet. "We played hard. I thought we played clean. We were focused and didn't make many mental mistakes. We were locked in, and I'm proud of our kids."

"However, one game doesn't make it. We have to do that week in and week out. Is this the team we are, or was it last week? The question is, 'Can we do this every week?'"

"I don't think you can look at one game and say we're fixed, we're awesome," he continued. "We did it tonight, but can we do it every day? Can we do it next week? Can we do it three weeks from now when you hit the playoffs and it's one game at a time?"

Tippet said he didn't yet have the an-

swer to those questions.

"Our kids have to answer it," he said. "The answer will probably be how they play next week."

On paper, this should be a feel-good week for the Lancers, and a chance to gain some momentum as they head into a difficult two-week stretch that will most definitely determine the District 5 championship.

North Scott will visit winless Clinton on Friday, and it's no secret the River Kings are struggling, having been out-scored 240-40 in their first six games, including a 43-0 shellacking at the hands of Clear Creek-Amana last week.

Still, Tippet is taking nothing for granted.

"This week is about us. It's about getting better," he said. "Obviously, we will focus on Clinton. I think you do a disservice to the game if you don't. I will watch film. Our kids will practice."

"But for us, it's all about getting better this week, and not being content. We got better against Liberty. We have to get better against Clinton."

Tippet gave his team Saturday morn-

ing off with a postgame huddle announcement, and the Lancers were feeling good after sending the Lightning home with their second loss of the season.

"We had some adversity this week, but we showed up at practice, had consistency there, and we got it done tonight," said senior Ben Belken, who caught three passes for 27 yards, and had a hand in five tackles. "The difference was the attitude. We prepared a little better. We came out more physical."

"I felt like we were clicking for the first time all season," said senior Quentin Allison, who had 56 yards in 15 carries. "All the guys, I didn't hear one negative comment all night. We were picking each other up each and every possession, each and every play."

"It felt good. We can go up from here. I like where we're at."

Lancers overcome ominous start

There's no question that Lancer fans were squirming in their seats early. It had to be difficult watching Liberty take

There was a different vibe on the sidelines. The Lancers were more focused than a week earlier, and that carried over onto the field. I have to admit, I was a little concerned after Liberty's opening drive, but those fears were for naught. You really can't underestimate this Lancer D.

I thought it was a big game for Ben Belken. He was a constant fixture in opposing backfields a year ago, and Friday night he looked like his old self.

The Lancer offense looked sharper, and it was nice to see just two penalties. Coach Tippet and quarterback Jake Matthaideess did a good job of balancing the attack, which resulted in several big plays.

This should be a feel-good week for the Lancers, and it will be hard not to look past Clinton. Looming on the horizon are Clear Creek-Amana and Assumption, and I'm guessing the district title could hinge on that final game with the Knights.

the opening kickoff, reel off 20 straight plays, and chew up the entire first-quarter clock before settling for a field goal with one second left.

The Lancers were frustrated, but not worried.

"My only thoughts were, 'I'd like to have the ball,'" said Tippet. "We didn't have a snap in the first quarter, and in my 13 years of calling an offense, that's never happened. I'm an impatient guy, and it was frustrating."

"Holding them to a field goal was huge. An offense like that is very tough to simulate in practice, but once we got it figured out, we only gave up one big play the rest of the game."

Liberty's "three yards and a chunk of mud" mentality worked perfectly, but only for that one drive.

"They put 11 guys within an 8-yard space, and try to smash it out of you for two or three yards," said Tippet. "If they get three yards a play, they get a first down."

"The key is to get them off schedule. If you can get one negative yardage play, and get them off schedule, it makes it tough for them."

The Lancer D bent, but it didn't break, and senior Logan Vis led the way with eight tackles.

"I honestly wasn't worried that first quarter," said senior linebacker Zach Campbell, who had a big night with seven solo tackles. "Yeah, we were getting out-physicaled a little in the beginning, but I'm confident no team can do that the whole game. I think we can outlast almost any O-line with our defense."

"I was juiced that first quarter," said Belken. "They were moving the ball, but we weren't going anywhere on defense. We held them to three, and that was big. After that, we took control."

That the Lancers did. Liberty covered 62 yards on their opening drive, but finished with just 202 yards of total offense. Fifty-one of those came on quarterback Drake Woody's scoring jaunt with just over four minutes left in the game, after the Lancers had built a 24-3 cushion.

As for the Lancer offense, quarterback Jake Matthaideess engineered a methodical and balanced attack that covered 278 yards of real estate, including 128 through the air and 150 on the ground.

North Scott took a 7-3 lead on its second and final possession of the first half, thanks to Matthaideess' five-yard burst with 3:20 left, and that's the way things stood at the break.

Fortunately, the Lancers were just getting started, and wasted no time in showing their supremacy in the final two quarters.

North Scott took the second-half kickoff and marched 67 yards in just seven plays, with senior Luke Jennings scoring his second touchdown in as many weeks, this time with a nifty seven-yard

NS runners looking for mental edge

Lancers will compete at Thursday's invitational at Central DeWitt

It's gut-check time. The end-of-the-season finish line is in sight. Goals have long been established, and now it's time to make them come to fruition.

Thursday's annual trip to Grace Lutheran Camp for the DeWitt Invitational will provide the final tune-up for North Scott's cross-country teams, before the Lancers set their sights on next week's Mississippi Athletic Conference meet, and the Class 4A district meet on Oct. 24.

The Lancers have put in the miles. Now, it's time to get their heads on straight and their minds singularly focused.

"Going into this week, with most of our kids only having two meets left with DeWitt and conference, we need to focus on what's important," said Lancer coach Amy Knoche. "We don't have a game plan, or X's and O's per se, and we don't go scout other teams."

"This week we will be focusing a lot on mental toughness and having a mental edge. We've talked all year about learning to be comfortable being uncomfortable, and that's the key these final weeks."

"In some instances, the kids seem to just be satisfied with running in the spot they're at, instead of changing gears. We'll talk a lot about that."

There are still some varsity spots up for grabs as the Lancers prepare for the final two meets, and Thursday's run in DeWitt could help clear up the varsity picture. Knoche thinks her team will run well.

"I'm excited that it's going to only be 60-some degrees the next couple weeks," she said. "I'm always confident that our kids will respond. I think they will come around mentally, and that's a good sign."

The Lancers had just one meet last week, and they brought home a couple of middle-of-the-pack finishes from the Iowa City West Invitational on Tuesday (Oct. 1).

"You know, I'm OK with how we ran," said Knoche. "On the girls' side, the three teams that beat us are all ranked, and there were seven ranked team in the boys' field. It was pretty a competi-

tive meet.

"Our boys' times have been pretty consistent with what they've been running, and the girls were a little bit slower, but they competed well."

North Scott's girls finished a solid fourth in the 11-team field, trailing only three state ranked teams, including No. 9 Cedar Rapids Prairie, No. 6 Dubuque Hempstead and seventh-ranked Ankeny Centennial.

Once again, freshman Bailey Bodicker was the first Lancer to cross the finish line, coming home 15th. Freshman Kaitlyn Knoche and senior Abbi Lafrenz finished just a second apart in 28th and 29th, and they were followed by junior Sadie West (32nd), sophomore Ava Garrard (33rd), and seniors Emily Kundel (40th) and Zoe Warm (42nd).

"Sadie was our No. 4 runner for the third meet in a row, and Kaitlyn and Abbi seem to kind of flip-flop every other race," said Knoche. "It was also good to see Ava score for us."

"Our MAC lineup could be interesting, in terms of those four, five, six and seven spots. We have several kids competing for those."

The conditions weren't ideal, as the weather was hot and humid. In addition, it was uncertain if the meet would be run at all, as thunderstorms were predicted for the area.

"We all kind of thought it could get canceled, and the schedule changed two or three times," said Lafrenz. "That kind of threw us off, because you just weren't sure what to prepare for."

"We still have to work on discipline, but this week was big. I definitely felt the change from last week, and we can get better."

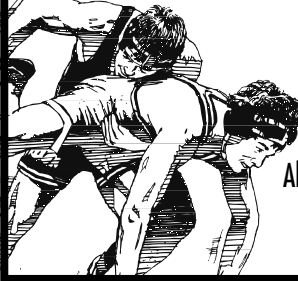

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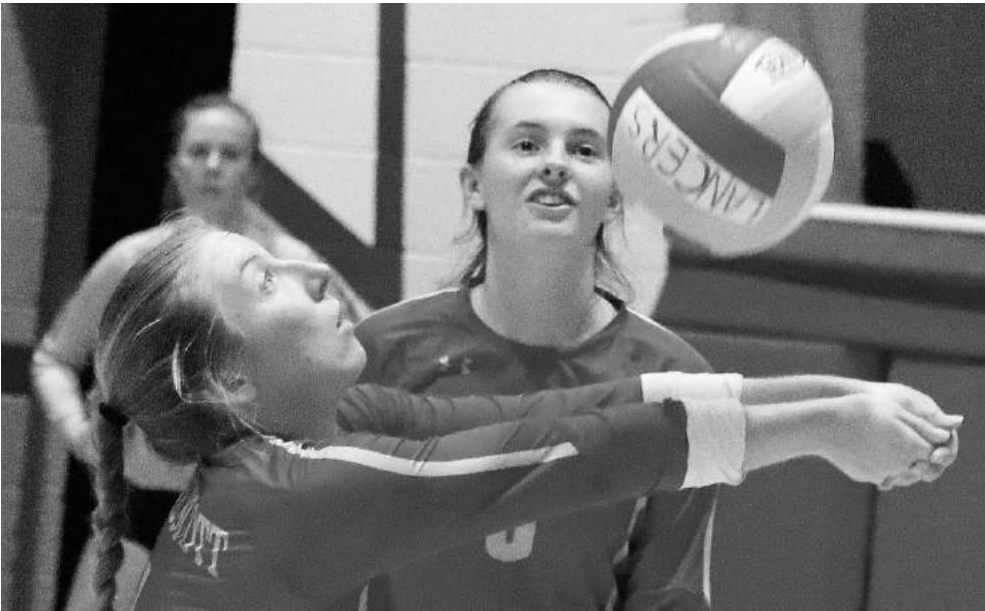
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Junior Olivia Young (11) and senior Kendall McNaul took control of the net on this play and easily stuffed a Blue Devil attack.

After a so-so outing at the Senior Invitational on Sept. 28, the Lancers dropped a notch to No. 4 in last week’s Class 4A rankings, but are still in good shape to claim home court advantage for the regional tournament later this month.

The sweep of the Blue Devils is just what they needed. “Tonight was good,” said Lancer coach Taryn VanEarwage. “I don’t think we were expecting them to be as scrappy as they were, but we definitely hung strong and pushed to the finish.”

Central even held a 22-20 lead before Powell and McNaul took control of the net to lead a Lancer surge that solidified the sweep.

“I was pleased with our ability to stay confident all night,” said VanEarwage. “Central pushed us the entire time, but we stayed strong and finished when we needed to.”

“I think Emma and Kendall stepped up at super key moments, and Sam played really well, too,” said VanEarwage. “She did a good job of distributing the ball to different hitters in different situations.”

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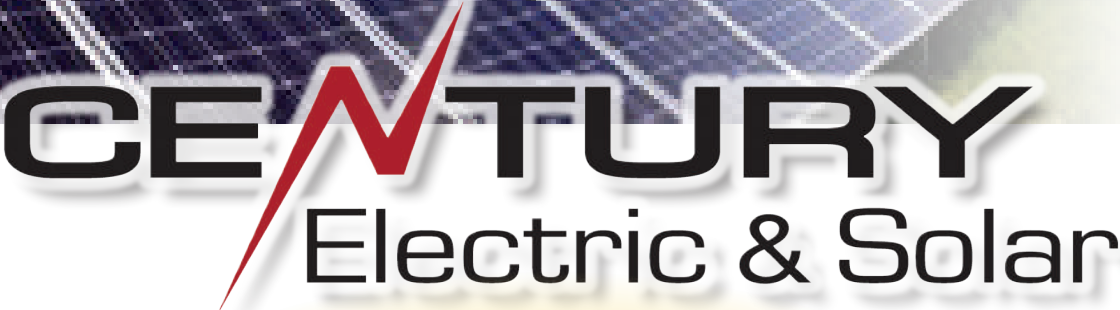

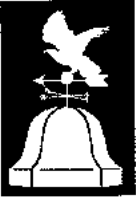

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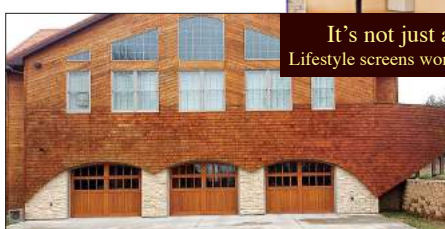
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
