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Talking Labor Day numbers with Stockton businesses, campgrounds

Labor Day pays tribute to the contributions of American workers and is celebrated the first Monday in September. This holiday also symbolizes the end of the summer and provides extra traffic for the Stockton and Cedar County area.

As usual, many locals and visitors sought to enjoy the lake and the activities being offered last week.

Andi Presley, manager for the Cabins at Stockton Lake, said the Cabins had “a great Labor Day weekend.”

The Cabins have over 50 cabins in the resort and 32 cabins in the rental program. “We were completely booked that weekend and had a great time soaking up every minute of summer,” Presley said.

“It is always a fun time with our guests soaking up the end of summer,” Presley added. “It is a great time to enjoy family and friends while making memories at a cabin together and enjoying all of the wonderful activities at the lake.”

Chasity Anderson, new owner of the Venue at Stockton Lake, said they hosted a beautiful three-day wedding on Labor day weekend.

“Congratulations to Mr and Mrs Scott!” Anderson said.

Caplinger Woods, an RV park with campsites and cabin rentals located 8 miles outside of Stockton, had approximately 150 people in the park over Labor Day weekend, according to owner Danny Finch.

At Caplinger Woods, rentals for canoes, kayaks, tandem kayaks, child size kayaks and a few six-person rafts are offered for a 5-mile float, and approximately 100 rentals took place over the holiday weekend.

Kimmy’s at Caplinger offers a 27-acre full RV hook up with campground and nature exploratory. Trails branch off the center of the campground while a main trail stretches from the meadow, alongside cliffs, a creek and a lot of timber.

On Labor Day weekend, all of Kimmy’s full hookup sites not occupied by full-time campers were full, “plus two of our new electric and water only sites,” owner Kimmy Warner said.

“Many of these visitors had additional family/friends; kids and grandkids for example, visited our campground during the day too, so we probably had between up 45-60 additional guests,” Warner said. “The most enjoyable part of the holiday weekend was meeting new campers. We always enjoy showing them around and getting to know their families’ expectations.”

Sundaes Drive Inn restaurant provides local farm fresh beef burgers and hand-dipped ice cream, as well as sells USDA farm raised beef and pork, bacon, and sausage.

“Traffic is always different on Labor Day compared to the other summer holiday,” owner Sarah Bock said. “We prepared by beefing up the staff numbers on the shifts we knew would be heavier traffic and had more burger freshly baked.”

Time Turner General Store and Antiques said there was no shortage of

Agape Boarding School closing delayed again, oversight permitted

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Agape Boarding School, a Christian troubled teen boarding school in Stockton, can remain open despite the Missouri state attorney general alleging a “dark pattern of behavior,” after a judge’s ruling Monday, Sept. 12.

Missouri Attorney General Eric Schmitt’s office first sought to shut down Agape on Wednesday last week after learning that someone on the state registry for child abuse and neglect had been actively working there.

The petition stated that on Wednesday, the Missouri Department of Social Services added a Agape staff member to the state’s Central Registry after the agency found that the staffer had committed child abuse.

Judge Munton signed the order to immediately close the school and remove students Wednesday evening. But on Thursday morning, Judge Munton put that order on hold and sent Cedar County Sheriff James McCrary to Agape to determine whether that staff member was still working at Agape.

On Thursday morning, Agape administrator Bryan Clemensen told McCrary and the CCR that the staffer had been fired on

Wednesday. The KC Star reports that the staffer still lived on the property.

According to a new Missouri law, it is prohibited for someone to work at a residential care facility if that person has a substantiated finding of child abuse or neglect or is placed on the Central Registry.

During Monday’s hearing, Agape’s attorney John Schultz said the terminated employee no longer lives on Agape property.

On Friday, the attorney general’s office filed an amended motion alleging systemic abuse.

“Agape’s operation of a residential care facility must cease because it presents an immediate health and safety concern for the children residing at Agape,” the injunction stated.

The injunction also accused Agape of providing the state with incomplete information concerning which adults have access to children.

“These new developments are sadly consistent with the dark pattern of behavior at Agape previously exposed by the Attorney General’s Office” and the Missouri Department of Social Services, the filing alleges.

Munton last week considered closing the school, but Agape officials told authorities that the person on the abuse and neglect registry was fired on Wednesday. Munton

allowed the school to remain open for the meantime with state supervision.

A new state law created last year requires stricter oversight of such facilities. Among other things, the new law allows state or local authorities to petition the court for closure of a facility if an immediate health or safety threat to the children is believed to be occurring.

Judge Munton’s ruling allows continued round-the-clock monitoring of Agape Boarding School by state child welfare workers.

In the Cedar County Courthouse on Monday for the injunction hearing, the state was prepared to call two former Agape students and a DSS worker to testify against Agape.

However, Schultz told Judge Munton there was no proof of any immediate health or safety concern for students.

Schultz also said that allowing former students to testify was “simply for publicity” and argued that of the two witnesses prepared to speak on Monday, one hadn’t attended Agape recently enough and the other was prepared to testify via a webcam from California.

Judge Munton didn’t allow the testimony, but scheduled another hearing for Wednesday, Sept. 21, so Schulz can depose the California teen.

‘If it is to be, it’s up to me’

Lee lays out vision for prosecuting attorney write-in campaign

As Peter Lee, Stockton, looks ahead to the Nov. 8 general election, he’s not wasting any time as he puts the Aug. 2 primary race behind himself in the rear-view mirror.

“Being a judge is kind of where I always saw myself at the end of my career, and that’s why I ran for judge in the primary.”

But last weekend, Lee announced that after much prayer and thought with his family and friends, he’s now taking on a more unconventional route by running a write-in campaign for the position of Cedar County Prosecuting Attorney.

Cedar County Prosecuting Attorney incumbent Ty Gaither — with a criminal defense background and eight years of experience as Cedar County Prosecuting Attorney — narrowly defeated Michael Tighe in the primary by less than 100 votes.

Lee said that he hadn’t been thinking of running for the prosecutor’s position in the Nov. 8 general election. On Aug. 1, he was personally asked by somebody in the community if he was planning on running a write-in campaign for prosecutor in the general November election.

“After the primary results came in, it got me wondering,” Lee said. “As I also thought back to my campaign in the primary, and I realized that when I was campaigning for judge, I received more questions about the prosecutor’s position than judge.”

Lee said that in his view, the biggest concern held by community members he visited during his primary campaign was mostly about the position of prosecuting attorney. He said that many community members expressed concern about offenders not spending full sentences in jail and getting out on parole seemingly quickly.

“Not all of the decisions that are made in the

City recycling center summer hours extended indefinitely

Our Stockton city recycling center will continue to be open 9-11 a.m., Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday. The recycling center is closed on Federal holidays and during bad weather, including rain. Please do not leave items when the center is closed. The city's recycling vender, Republic Services, collects recyclables in two dumpsters: glass only, and comingled aluminum; plastic containers, #1-2 only; paper, paperboard, corrugated cardboard; steel and tin cans, lids, and caps. All items must be clean, dry, and loose; no plastic bags. Rinse all recyclable materials for employee safety at sorting facilities. Separate glass from all other kinds of recycling, ready to de-

posit loose into the glass recycling dumpster. Flatten or crush plastic bottles and containers to fit more material into the co-mingle recycling dumpster and into bales as it moves through the commodity pipeline. Pack all kinds of paper, including shredded paper, in paper bags or boxes to deposit directly into the co-mingle dumpster. Consider collecting recyclables in reusable containers, like designated buckets, boxes, or cloth bags that are easy to transport and empty into the dumpster without using a plastic bag. Republic Services currently accepts only plastics with chasing arrow symbols numbered 1 and 2; dispose of plastics numbered 3 through 7 with household trash. Remove all plastic lids and caps

from all plastic containers and dispose of lids and caps with household trash. For more information, visit the city of Stockton recycling services Webpage or pick up a flier from the box on the gate at the recycling center. Thank you for doing your part to keep recyclable materials out of our landfill. Directions to the city recycling center located northwest of the city square. Take Mo. 32 west from the square. At the first street past MFA, turn north (right) onto Fourth Street, then west (left) onto Arnold Wallen Way. Pass the solar array at the north pumping station and see the recycling center on the right. Turn north (right) into the fenced area and follow instructions.

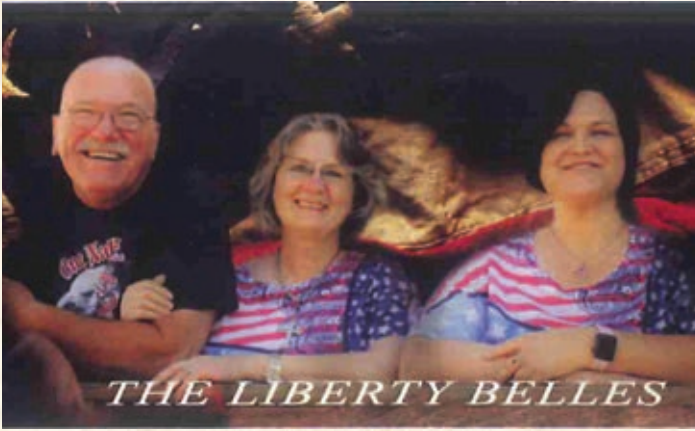

criminal justice process are on the prosecutor,” Lee said. “There are lots of pieces to that puzzle, but the prosecutor has a great deal of influence in the process. Even though some of the decisions are outside of the prosecutor’s control, they are not outside his influence, though.”

Lee said that if elected as prosecuting attorney in November, there’s “more that can be done” regarding criminal justice in the county — but that change can’t all necessarily happen here.

Alex Masters, an El Dorado man facing a felony murder charge for the Oct. 2021 death of Johnny Billings in Cedar County, is one example Lee pointed toward in his vision as prosecuting attorney.

Masters had originally been sentenced to the Missouri Department of Corrections two or three years ago to serve a 14-year sentence. He was released from the Department of Corrections after 11 months. While he was out on parole in

Cedar County, he allegedly was paid in meth to murder Billings.

One of the facts that came out in the primary was that the Department of Corrections had requested funding for two more prisons, funding which has yet to be approved.

Lee said that more legislative funding on the state’s level will help Missouri’s problem of overcrowding in prisons. More action and communication with Jefferson City from the county’s end will help chip away at this problem, he added.

“It would be great if all of the citizens here could contact their representatives and tell them to get more funding for the prison system. However, the prosecuting attorney has the ability to explain to our elected officials in Jefferson City firsthand about the problems that are occurring in our county due to decisions made in Jefferson City,” Lee noted. “My concern is going forward, if we don’t do something to

advocate for a different outcome on that issue in Jefferson City, the door is wide open for more situations (like Alexander Masters) to occur here. ... We need somebody to be a persistent voice and an advocate.”

Another priority, Lee said, would be to communicate with the public and law enforcement regarding ongoing criminal issues and progress.

If elected, Lee said he’ll want to have regular communication with law enforcement and the public, including sitting down with law enforcement on a regular basis and receiving feedback from them to be effective in creating a safer environment here.

“One of the things you learn in public service is that the decisions you make are only as good as the information they are based on,” Lee said. “The public needs to know what is being done by the prosecutor to keep the community safe, and the prosecutor needs to get feedback from the public about whether those

efforts are having an effect in the community.”

“I want the public to feel free to set up a time to come into my office and express their concerns,” Lee said. “The prosecutor’s office is not an ivory tower. The prosecutor is the advocate for the public and for the victim.”

Gaither’s first public response to Lee’s announcement on social media was to imply Lee had eschewed the principles and platform of the Republican party for political expediency. When asked about that statement, Lee responded, “I’m the same person today as I was 6 months ago. My values haven’t changed, and my desire to use my experience to do something better for Cedar County has only increased.”

As a write-in candidate, Lee’s name will not be on the November 8th ballot, but it will be up to the voters to write his name down and fill in the oval for their votes to be counted.

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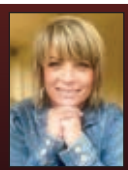

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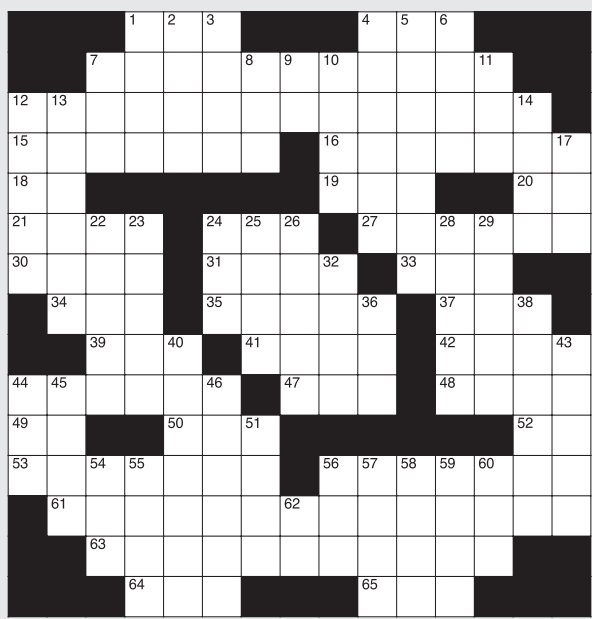

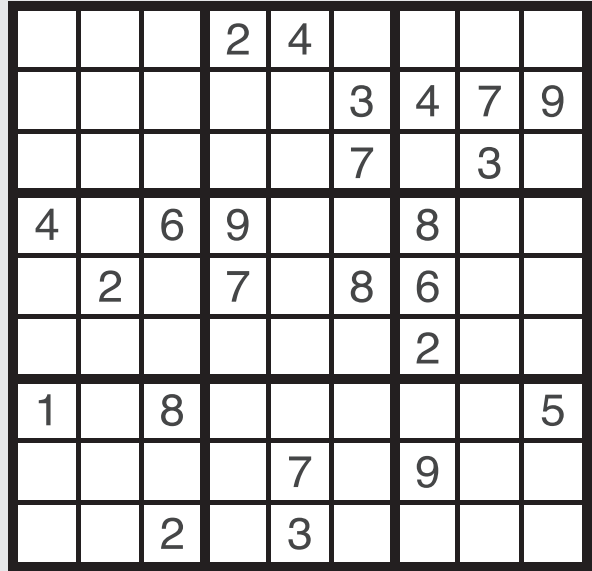

Writer navigates a complex relationship

Now that I'm staring middle-age square in the eye, food feels so much more complicated. When I was a kid and even through my twenties and thirties, food was easy. Hungry? Just eat. Want dessert? Sure, why not. Late night bowl of cereal? Go for it.

I didn't think about food because I didn't need to. I'd lucked out with one of those young, speedy metabolisms that forgave most sins, even the ones including cheese dip or hot fudge. Then things changed.

That dependable metabolism went from the roar of a fast motorcycle to the weak hum of a scooter that has water in the gas tank, sputtering as it tries to keep pace.

Scientifically, I should've seen this coming. Experts say that changing hormone levels shift a middle-aged woman's fat storage to her waistline instead of her hips and thighs. So even if she's doing everything she's "supposed" to do, her body shape will likely change with age.

The slim reed becomes a sturdier trunk. This applies even to those of us who hoped we were the one special flower who would never be impacted by something as inconvenient as science and reality.

Such a bummer.

So here we are, stuck in this food relationship fraught with too many feelings, both good and bad. Tom and I went to lunch today and shared a grilled chicken salad with fruit on top, and we commiserate over how tough it is to choose the right foods — to make decisions that won't show up on the scale

two days later and shame us for being bad.

But experts say we shouldn't use words like "good" or "bad" to describe different kinds of food. Rigid labels make it harder to avoid falling down a junk food rabbit hole. The human brain has a way of rebelling against rules that are too strict, too absolute.

If you tell your inner teenager (who is moody and impulsive by nature) that she can't eat a French fry ever again, that's all she'll think about. Suddenly you've turned a simple French fry into a cute bad boy who wears a beat-up leather jacket and smokes behind the school gym. And she will sneak around and cheat on common sense just to be with him.

So, this year I've adopted a more realistic yet flexible approach to food. (I started shortly after a Christmas-cookie shame spiral, and I downloaded a weight-loss app for guidance.) These days, I still flirt with calorie-rich foods because life is too short to be lived without chips and queso. But it's just occasional flirting. I go steady with fruits, vegetables, chicken and salads.

I'll admit that I dip the tips of my fork into a small cup of Ranch dressing now and then for a taste — just to keep things interesting. It convinces my inner teenager that she can still have a little fun without running off to Reno with a super-sized order of curly fries.

So far, this new method of co-existing with food has helped me shed 15 pounds and feel better overall. But the last five pounds (still to go) are being real jerks. They're like stubborn houseguests. Every time I'm about to pry

them loose, they show back up and insist on staying a while longer.

But I'll get there eventually. Because I'm finally realizing that food is not here to be conquered. We can't be at war. So, I'm making peace with the reality that I love food in all its many forms — buttered bread, broccoli, cheesecake, chicken, pasta, peas and so much more.

And like any good relationship, it needs both give and take to make it work.

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Soldier, sailor, soldier

I never knew my uncle John Daly, but as a postwar casualty of World War II, he was one of the most important architects of my character today. His is the face of every World War II GI.

My mother's older brother, John, had an auto repair shop with Uncle Albert prior to the war. Both were modest, gentle spirited men. As a soldier with the U.S. Army in Europe after the D-Day landing, John was always careful not to alarm his family in letters from the front. "I'm doing swell," he repeatedly assured them.

In truth, he was in the thick of combat, and among troops who liberated Hitler's concentration camps.

He could not forget his war experience when he came home. Mom said he harbored a bitter hatred for Germans, unlike the brother she knew before the war.

Revisited often by what we today call post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), John took his life in April 1951. Not only as a WWII GI, for me his face has become that of countless, oft-forsaken returning soldiers.

While Uncle John was

pursuing Nazis, my dad, Harold Hamilton, was doing his part to drive the Japanese from the South Pacific. Deep in the engine room of his ships, he said he never saw combat — was never in danger, he told us boys.

I wasn't so sure. He told Mom a different story.

Dad had joined the Navy as soon as possible after graduating from Pleasant Hope High School in 1944. Even before shipping out he penned patriotic lines about defeating "the yellow peril."

After the war he was never hesitant to dig out his Navy blues for his boys, but he never wanted to set foot on another ship. "Once a seagoing sailor, always a seagoing sailor," the old saying goes. Not so for Dad. He was just a patriotic country boy eager

CMH upgrades MRI equipment to latest technology

An increase in patient comfort and faster scans are some of the benefits of Citizens Memorial Hospital's upgraded Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) machine.

The Siemens Magnetom Altea magnet was delivered to the hospital Aug. 2, and went into service the week of Sept. 5. It replaced the previous MRI that's been in service for 18 years.

An MRI machine uses a large magnet and radio waves to produce detailed images of internal organs, bones, muscles and blood vessels. It is used to help diagnose diseases or injuries such as tumors, stroke, traumatic brain injury, spine injury, aneurysms, infection and more.

"This new unit is a great addition to our state-of-the-art imaging technology," said Gayla Hankins, MOL, RTR(M), director of radiology at CMH. "It will shorten exam times and greatly increase patients' comfort levels. A wider and shorter opening in the machine with special arm supports and positioning aids along with a new window in the MRI suite will make patients feel less claustrophobic and more comfortable."

One advantage of the new MRI is the turbo technology that enables up to 50% faster routine scans and increased image quality.

"If a scan previously took about an hour, the new MRI scan time might be 30 to 40 minutes," said Hankins. "For people who can't lay still for long periods of time or for someone who has a serious injury, the time savings is critical."

The new MRI also uses BioMatrix technology and accommodates patients' anatomical and physiological differences to produce highly consistent results across all patient types and exams including neurological, orthopedic, abdominal and whole-body images.

"The MRI has special sensors so when the patient lies down on the

MRI table, the machine will detect things like the patient's body type and pressure points. It also will sense the patient's breathing so patients won't have to hold their breath during parts of the scan," says Hankins.

Imaging and radiology services are available at the hospital and at CMH Breast Care Center and CMH Imaging Center both located in the Kerry & Synda Douglas Medical Center. Board-certified radiologists on staff include John Gamble III, M.D., Jana Horner, M.D., and Chad Potter, M.D.

After Nehemiah inspected the wall, he called the men together and basically told them, “Don’t be afraid, trust God and work like crazy.” Before the construction began, the scripture tells us, “the people had a mind to work” (Nehemiah 4:6 ESV). A stouthearted decision must be made before we start something or there’s a strong possibility we won’t stick with it when the going gets tough. Nehemiah and the people prayed and partnered with God, therefore, He set a guard as a protection against their enemies day and night.

Those who carried burdens were loaded in such a way that each labored on the work with one hand and held his weapon with the other. And each of the builders had his sword strapped at his side while he built. So we labored at the work, and half of them held the spears from the break of dawn until the stars came out.” (Nehemiah 4:13-18,21 ESV). This formidable half-warrior/half-worker team was committed to build with a sword in one hand and a trowel in the other.

There are times when a believer’s job is to pray, trust, and wait. But the building of Jerusalem’s wall was not one of those times to kick back and see what God would do. This was a time for God to see His people use their elbow grease. If they were determined to work, then He would take care of them. This construction was no walk in the park, but it was possible with God’s favor on His valiant crew. He protected them as they labored, and everyone had a part to play in this huge project which was complet-

ed in just 52 days.

Now that the big Labor Day Week-end is over, hunters, anglers and campers are looking forward to great things like hunting seasons for the hunter and cooler weather for better fishing and camping. Hunters had a decent opening day of the dove season, but the birds are hard to find today. Jim Carpenter had a great opening day by getting his limit of 15 birds, but in the same field on the second day of the season he only shot one dove. "The birds really scattered after opening day," Carpenter said. "They may regroup, but nothing would compare to opening day when the birds seemed to

be everywhere. I shot more than a box of shells to get my 15 birds." Matt Brown, Springfield, was glad he took some fishing gear on the opening day of the teal season last Saturday because it saved the day for him. With weather more suited for fishing and not duck hunting, Brown was at a small lake with decoys set out as the sun rose on opening day of the special teal season. "I dove hunted near the lake and saw some teal using it so I thought it would be a good place to be for opening day of the teal season," Brown said. "However, there wasn't a teal in sight all day so I got out my fishing gear and started casting for bass. By noon, I had caught six bass including a four pounder and lost several others. The fishing saved the day for

me and maybe the teal will arrive before the short season ends." John Henry, manager at the popular Schell Osage Wildlife Area, said there were few teal in the area and on opening day six hunters shot three teal. Missouri waterfowl hunters should be pleased with the season for the fall hunt. Reports from the breeding grounds show a good fall flight heading our way with increases in many species of ducks. Ned Turner, Springfield, is a veteran duck hunter who is looking forward to a great hunt this fall. "I was about ready to give up duck hunting several years ago, but the birds have made a good comeback and hunting is getting close to the good old days," Turner said. "I had a good season last year and it looks like it might be even

Hunting season is here, fishing reports improving

better this fall. I'm glad I kept my decoys and hunting gear." Meanwhile, fishing reports are improving and as water temperature drops, fishing will keep getting better according to Jack Franklin, Sedalia. "For the past several

years I have caught more fish in September and October than I thought possible," Franklin said. "I used to put up my fishing gear after Labor Day and get ready for hunting seasons but I was camping at Stockton Lake on Labor Day and saw white bass feeding so

I went after them. Along with the whites, I caught several walleye and ever since then I get serious about fishing in September." White, a Stockton resident, has a versatile background in sports as a participant and journalist. His column appears weekly.

Bob Phillips shared an article about Emil S. Liston who was born in Stockton and eventually was inducted into the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, Hall of Fame. Bob will share more information about the Liston family at the next meeting.

Longtime member and avid genealogist, Alma Floyd, passed away in Texas, in July, just three weeks shy of her 95th birthday.

The landowner of the Hudson Cemetery requested some history about it. Research showed that Henry and Sallie Ann Hudson and five children lived on the land in the 1850's until Henry's death in 1872, when the land was passed-on to their sons.

Between 1850 and 1900, eight members of the Hudson families of Cedar County had died of consumption (tuberculosis), including Sallie Ann and a young son, Jodie. Sallie and the neighboring Hudson families are all buried at Lindley Prairie Cemetery.

Another son, Charles "Muck" Hudson, lived in the Bear Creek neighborhood until his death in 1951.
