SAMA makes use of some of the over \$24,000 donation given by diocese

The Stockton Area Ministerial Alliance (SAMA) has spent some of the funds from a recent financial donation of \$24,524.98 given for the thrift store and food pantry by the Springfield-Cape Girardeau Catholic Diocese recently.

Fr. Tuan Nguyen of St. Peter's Catholic Church in Stockton submitted SAMA as a candidate for the children's "Mission of Mercy." The mission funds were raised by youth to help the poor, the marginalized, and those in need of special assistance during a time of crisis in their life.

Michael Tunnel, president of SAMA and pastor of the Stockton Christian Church, said, "We were told by the local Catholic Church representative that we were the organization they had selected to give to over their season of Lent.... this is the first time that we have been selected for such an honor."

SAMA encounters many food-insecure families. Approximately 250 people a month receive assistance from the food pantry, which is open on Mondays from 9 a.m. until noon.

This timely donation will help supplement food needs and assist families and children in the Stockton R-1 School District.

When asked if any funds had been spent from the donation, Tunnel said, "Part of the money, \$5,000.00, has been designated to help out financially with the Backpack Program through Tiger Tasters. Ten thousand dollars has been sent to Ozarks Food Harvest to help with food purchases for the remainder of the year and possibly beyond."

Although it hasn't been entirely determined, the remainder of the funds will most likely be used for food and food pantry needs to come.

Tunnel concluded, "It was overwhelming to think that the children of this Diocese would not only select little old us but raise this incredible amount of money.... This was beyond any dreams we have had. But we serve a God who does more than we can ask or imagine; Ephesians 3.20.

Different devices are available, with usage guidelines to be followed.

A balanced diet is crucial for maintaining good health and positively impacting mood.

Establishing a consistent daily routine can help regulate sleep patterns and maintain a sense of structure. This can be achieved by setting specific times for waking up, eating, and sleeping.

STOCKTON, Mo. — Trevor and Holly Bough and family of Stockton were among the families honored during the 66th annual Missouri Farm Family Day, Aug. 14 at the Missouri State Fair.

The Bough family was selected as the Cedar County Missouri Farm Family by University of Missouri Extension in Cedar County and the local Farm Bureau. The family also includes Reagan (9) and Landon (7).

Each year, the fair sets aside a day to recognize farm families from across the state that are active in their communities, involved in agriculture, and/or participate in local outreach and extension programs such as 4-H or FFA.

The Bough family owns and operates a partnership with Trevor's parents, Neal and Alisa Bough. The operation is

a Certified organic egg layer operation and feed mill. The farm is made up of 240 acres where they also run cow/calf pairs and sheep.

The annual event is sponsored by five partner agencies: the Missouri Farm Bureau; the Missouri Department of Agriculture; the Missouri State Fair Commissioners; the MU College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources; and MU Extension.

The event showcases the impact that Missouri farm families have on the economy and heritage of the state, said Missouri State Fair Director Mark Wolfe. "These families are involved in agriculture activities in their communities and are active participants in local outreach and extension. As the premier showcase for Missouri agriculture, the Missouri State Fair is most certainly the appropriate place to celebrate these families."

CEDAR COUNTY APPROVED COMMISION MINUTES

Met with Leah Morton, County Assessor

Requests to process court order #28972-28982 to add-on the assessed valuation of newly purchased personal property.

Motion by Anderson to appoint Harold Fugate to the Cedar County Hospital Board to fill the vacancy left by Judy Renn upon her passing, second by Boultinghouse. Anderson – Yes; Boultinghouse – Yes; Thornton – Yes

Met with Sheriff McCrary

Inmate Housing: Cedar –10; Dade – 6; Barton – 2; Bates – 1

Reported that the Sheriff's Association had a discussion about the insurance mandating body cams and there are several companies trending in this fashion. It still is not state law that body cams be utilized, 30% of our deputies are using them.

Resident stopped by to report concerns about CR1201 and CR1125 recent maintenance needs to be redone, CR1201 being the worst of the two.

Met with DJ Ford, Road and Bridge Supervisor

Received reports of THANK YOU from Maintenance was done to correct the erosion on CR300, repaired CR850, placed rock at CR1200, and also at CR1525. The Commission requested the new grader operator clean up the ap

proaches on the entrance and exits of the roads he's working on. DJ requests consideration for a batwing mower in 2024. If the weather is this dry next year the crew will be able to do more trimming when they can't grade roads.

Marvin Manring, Cedar County Hospital Board stopped in to visit with the commission.

Thornton points out his concerns about the reopening of the Stockton branch of the Cedar County Hospital Board. Manring states that supplies were provided for family care, not for emergency care from the beginning, this was a "soft opening". Gilpin had expected it to be full emergency services from the beginning. Manring has dealt with a hospital that has been reducing the number of services and they are now adding back some of those services. So there are costs involved to re-establish them. Manring reminds the Commission that they went through a vetting process with a 10-member approval board during the hiring process. Manring addresses his concerns with the Commission minutes from the statements of concerns from concerned citizens of Cedar County. Manring presented a timeline of events for the Stockton Clinic startup. Gilpin rearranged the medical supply closets making it difficult for the nursing staff to locate supplies. Thornton is concerned that the current administration is heading down a path to sell out. Manring says there

has been a solid plan from the beginning under Nichol's administration, selling out is not in the plans. Gilpin received pay through the Friday she was scheduled to leave on so while she turned in her keys early, she was paid through the time she was scheduled to be. Boultinghouse wants to address the situation with the doctors changing. Manring won't discuss personnel other than to say that there are some difficult situations ahead of them. Thornton is concerned about Nichols being involved with the Rural Hospital Group since the early 2000's. Manring says the board is all about Cedar County first and will keep striving for that. Manring points out that a return-on-investment analysis is made on each thing that they do. The hospital has no debt, there are investments in place, but there are outdated items that are being replaced, there is approximately 40% of the building that can't be billed for that does not currently make any money for the hospital. Bringing services back is what helps. The board has been having concerns about industry standards vs the needs of the community. Certain aspects of getting services in place takes a lot of time. What is the end game: to serve the community of Cedar County. Manring has an entire file on fires that Nichols is putting out every day. Thornton points out a few of have been started by him. Manring says none of these names who visited the County Commis

sion on 8/7/23 have been present at board meetings that he is aware of. The goal of reopening the clinic in Stockton has been a long-time goal for some of the board, and it's still a good plan that they will continue to improve on.

Met with Sheriff McCrary

Began review of the 2023 City Police Contract in preparation for the upcoming meeting with the City of Stockton on 9/11/2023 at the Stockton Community Building. McCrary reports that it requires 4.2 deputies to cover a 24 hr a day/7 day per week service and that is without accounting for vacation. The City of Stockton has done away with their Municipal Court so some of the contracts will need to be changed as it effects how the Sheriff's Office tickets.

Resident stopped in to request temporary speed limit signs on CR1200, CR1801, CR1300, CR1775 while construction is occurring on the M highway bridge. The Commission agreed to this. Four – 35 mph signs will be ordered for temporary speed limiting.

Rusty Norval stopped in to report approval from MODOT for the Jerico repeater, and Raymond Heryford is considering approval at his property if the Motorola survey indicates it's a prime location. 400' to 500' square foot area. Barton County has an 80' tower available but it may require 120'. The results of the survey will clarify. They ordered a new ambulance today to be ready by

2026, the orders are that far out.

Conference call with Victoria Barker

The air conditioning unit in Chris's car is still not working, the Commission agreed to take to Mike and Joe's for repair. Taylor will be out Tuesday and Thursday. Susan will be there the rest of the week. 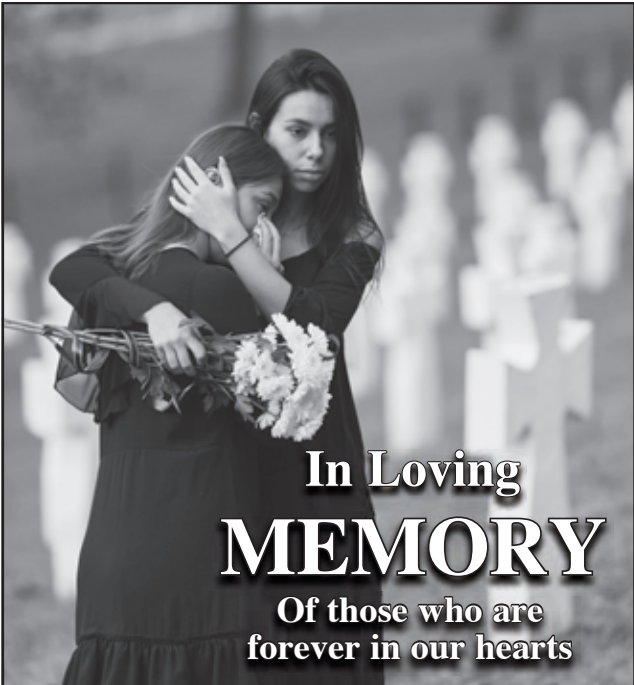

If I see one more rerun of House Hunters, I'll go nuts. I want to hunt down that annoying suburban couple who wouldn't stop whining about a powder room painted a color they don't like. Just paint the tiny room, people! You can learn how on YouTube.

I should turn off the television and do something useful – read a book, do some chores, or start flossing daily like I promised my dental hygienist. But old habits die hard. I grew

up on TV, and I still like it.

When my brother and I were kids, we watched Three's Company, Gilligan's Island, and The Beverly Hillbillies after school. We heated Chef Boyardee ravioli in the microwave and ate it in the living room using fold-out TV trays.

After dinner, we watched shows our parents liked since there was only one TV in the house. If Dad had the remote, we watched The Rockford Files, MASH, The A-Team, or MacGyver. When Mom chose the channel, we watched The Love Boat, Dallas, or Dynasty. And sometimes my older brother talked Dad into watching Knight Rider.

Artificial intelligence is one of the big sticking points in the negotiation. Writers don't want robots to take their jobs, but that's not the whole story. Artificial intelligence learns to

create scripts by reading and mimicking the work of human writers. But those human writers aren't paid for teaching computer programs how to write. It's like having a robot cheat off your English exam so it can win an Oscar for best screenplay. Writers want new ground rules to be put in place because artificial intelligence continues to change the game so drastically.

As someone who loves characters, stories, and the new worlds in which they happen, I hope the writers and studios find common ground – soon. I miss the stories that come alive in my living room. I miss laughing at the late-night show monologues (written by a team of writers) before I shuffle off to bed.

I don't want to watch a "Golden Bachelor" give out roses. I don't want to see people eat bugs on Survivor or celebrities spin the wheel for Pat Sajak. I want what only good writing and acting can deliver – the magic of

the human imagination.

So, to our number-crunching friends at the Hollywood studios, could you pay the humans, please? And regulate the robots?

Because we have plenty of popcorn and hundreds of channels but nothing fun to watch.

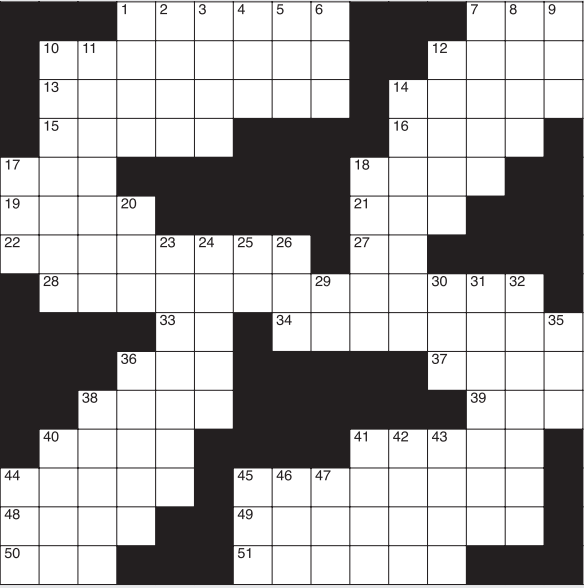

Stay alert during the harvest season

In 2022, there were 177 Missouri traffic crashes involving farm equipment/implements. In those crashes, seven people were killed and 63 were injured. Missouri has entered harvest season and it's important that drivers and farmers pay attention and share the road. Farmers and motorists are encouraged be courteous drivers and to obey all traffic laws.

Whether you're driving a vehicle or operating farm machinery, you must pay attention to the roadway, other drivers, and traffic signs. Distracted drivers are dangerous drivers. Please remain vigilant!

Farmers

- * Make sure your farm equipment is properly marked with lights and a "slow-moving vehicle" emblem when you travel on the roadway.
- * If traffic accumulates behind you on the road where it is difficult to make a safe pass, pull off onto the side of the road in a level area, so vehicles can pass.
- * Always drive as far to the right as possible.
- * It's harder to see you at dawn or dusk, so please don't travel on the road during those times if possible.
- * Often, all-terrain vehicles are used for agricultural purposes. ATVs being used for farming can only travel on highways during daylight hours and must be equipped with lights, a bicycle flag, and a "slow-moving vehicle" emblem. The law requires anyone under the age of 18 to wear a safety helmet when operating an ATV; the Patrol, however, recommends operators wear a safety helmet regardless of age.
- Remember: Missouri law allows agricultural machinery and implements to be operated on state highways between the hours of sunset and sunrise for agricultural purposes provided such vehicles are equipped with the required lighting. Like other motor vehicles, most modern farm tractors have seat belts. Always use a seat belt when operating a tractor equipped with a roll-over protection structure.

Drivers:

- * Stay alert for slow moving farm equipment.
- * When you drive up behind a tractor or other farm machinery, please slow down and be patient.
- * Wait to pass until you have a clear view of the road ahead and there is no oncoming traffic. Never pass on a hill or curve.
- * Collisions commonly occur when a motorist tries to pass a left-turning farm vehicle. A tractor that appears to be pulling to the right side of the road to let motorists pass, may be preparing to make a wide left turn. Watch the farmer's hand and light signals closely.
- * It's important that you pay close attention to farm equipment entering and leaving the highway from side roads and driveways. Special attention must be paid when traveling at dawn or dusk when the sun makes it difficult for drivers to see.
- Traffic safety is everyone's responsibility. It's that simple.
- Too many people die in traffic crashes each year in Missouri. The choices you make when you're behind the wheel matter. Make good choices, so you'll never have to say, "If I could just go back ..."

Seek other help

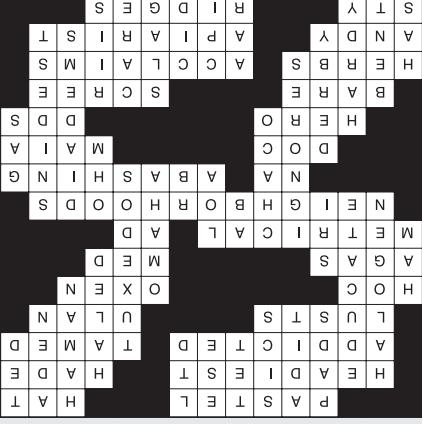
If conflicts cannot be resolved through the methods discussed, then it may be time to involve human resources or consult the employee handbook.

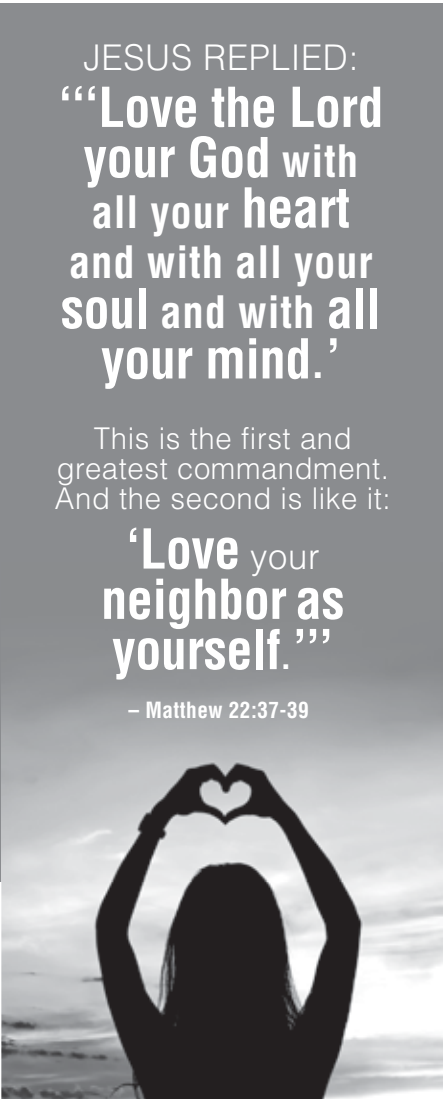

Missouri’s fall color can be enjoyed from almost anywhere. For spectacular vistas, choose routes along rivers with views of forested bluffs, and along ridges with sweeping scenes of forested landscapes.

“MDC conservation areas or Missouri state parks are wonderful places to take in the fall color,” suggested Hin-nah.

And fall color isn’t just limited to trees. Prairies and roadsides display beautiful shades of gold, purple, olive, and auburn with autumn wildflowers, shrubs, and grasses. In cities and towns, enjoy places with mature trees such as older neighborhoods, parks, and even cemeteries.

MDC provides its annual fall color update at mdc.mo.gov/fallcolor. The weekly reports include what species of trees are turning and suggestions on best places to see them. The updates run September through November.

MDC Oct. 3 program at Shoal Creek Conservation Center to focus on fall turkey hunting

Free clinic will cover fundamentals of harvesting a bird in the fall.

JOPLIN, Mo. – Harvesting a turkey in the fall requires different hunting strategies than in the spring.

Individuals can learn more about the strategies and techniques of fall turkey hunting at the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) program “Turkey Hunting: Fall Turkey Hunting” on Oct. 3 at MDC’s Shoal Creek Conservation Education Center. This free program will be from 6-9:30 p.m. MDC’s Shoal Creek Conservation Education Center is located in Joplin at 201 Riviera Drive.

Missouri’s fall turkey season runs from Oct.1-Oct. 31. The season runs from 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset. The season limit is two turkeys of either sex. The basic strategy of fall turkey hunting is to find a flock, break it up, and then try to call the birds back close to the spot where you’ve set up.

At the Oct. 3 program, MDC Conservation Educator Andy Rhodes will cover the regulations, calling strategies, use of decoys, and safety. People can register online at: <https://mdc-event-web.s3licensing.com/Event/EventDetails/194781>

Though this program is free, registration is required to participate. Use the link above. People can stay informed about upcoming programs at MDC’s Shoal Creek Conservation Education Center and other MDC facilities by signing up for text alerts and e-mail bulletins.

The Constitutional Separation of Powers

PART ONE:
THE WISDOM OF THE FRAMERS

The Framers of our Constitution understood human behavior and created a system of government that would protect our nation from the worst of those human instincts. Humans are emotional and capable of actions they might later regret. Humans love power and may not exercise that power in the best of fashions. The Constitution was written to guard against these instincts.

One of the ways the Framers sought to accomplish this was with the separation of powers into legislative, executive and judicial branches. Congress, the President and the Supreme Court would each have checks upon the other branches and in turn would each be checked by the other branches. This system of separation of powers and its web of checks and balances was designed to allow government to rise above human frailty.

England and the failed attempt to govern ourselves in the Articles of Confederation. They wanted to learn from these experiences and create something better.

James Madison, the Father of the Constitution, argued that if there was concern about the abuse of power by government, then we should stop putting all the power of government into a single set of hands. The King possessed all the power under colonial rule, which led to tyranny. Under the Articles of Confederation, all the power was given to the states, leading to chaos. The Framers wanted to avoid both extremes. Their solution was to create a substantial federal government, but divide power between a Congress, a President and a Supreme Court.

powerful it threatened the principles that formed the foundation of this new system: limited government, commitment to the rule of law and protection of civil liberties.

This was the initial wisdom that allowed us to flourish as a constitutional republic.

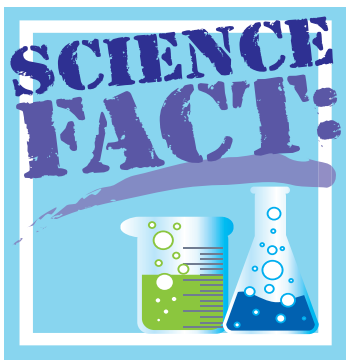

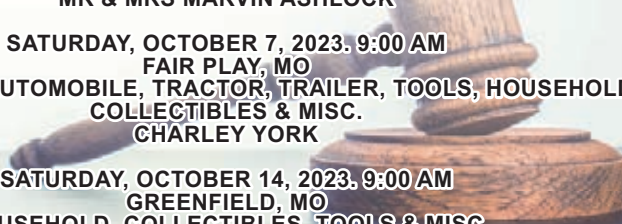
